Sponsor Statement

House Bill 339 - Motor Vehicle Arson

House Bill 339 aims to increase public safety by expanding the circumstances where the act of arson may be classified as arson.

Current law provides that damaging a vehicle by fire or explosion may only be charged as arson in the third degree if the crime is committed on state or municipal land. An identical action on private land would be criminal mischief in the third degree. Both crimes are class C felonies.

The narrowness of the Arson 3 statute hinders fire and arson investigators' ability to track repeat offenders. Serial arsonists are often prime suspects when a new arson crime is committed, but difficult to track when they have only been previously convicted of criminal mischief. House Bill 339 would aid investigators in solving these crimes by creating a clearer criminal history. I urge your support of this bill.

Thank you for taking time to address this matter as it is of great importance to the Alaska Fire Service and victims of violent crimes.

The Alaska Fire Chiefs Association support House Bill 339 and Senate Bill SB 187 "An Act relating to Arson in the 3rd degree.

This simple addition to the existing law will allow people to be held accountable for the crime of arson when lighting a vehicle on fire regardless of the ownership of the land the vehicle is parked on.

Under the current statute they can only be prosecuted if the vehicle was located on state or municipal lands. The addition of "Private Property" will give prosecutors additional tools to help combat Alaska's arson crimes.

I am writing this letter on behalf of the Alaska Association of Fire Arson Investigator in support for HB 339, Motor Vehicle Arson on Private Property, which was introduced by the House Judiciary Committee on 02/24/2016.

The Alaska Association of Fire & Arson Investigators believes that House Bill 339 and Senate Bill 187 eliminates an unforeseen loophole created in 2008 when House Bill 268 was originally created.

In short, the existing law restricts enforcement to vehicles geographically located on government lands thus eliminating law enforcement charging an individual for intentionally setting another person's vehicle on fire which is located on private property.

In one case a female was sitting in a vehicle not owned by her in the parking lot of CARRs Gambell in Anchorage. A witness took photographs of her setting a fire in the vehicle prior to leaving. The female had to be charged with a felony Criminal Mischief. The charges were eventually reduced and she pled to Criminally Negligent Burning a Class A misdemeanor. Although a felony conviction was not obtained the original charge did not accurately reflect that she intentionally used fire as a destructive weapon to destroy another person's property.

Upon the passage of this bill, it will correct this error, improve record keeping and permit proper charging by law enforcement. This bill will also allow a person's criminal history to reflect an arson conviction and provide for proper sentencing evaluation on future fire related offenses.
