Representative Harriet Drummond Sponsor Statement

House Bill 275 "Indigenous Peoples Day"

This bill establishes the second Monday in October as Indigenous Peoples Day. Federally, the second Monday in October is Columbus Day. In our Alaskan context it is fitting that this day should also honor the first people of our state and of the Americas. In 2015 Governor Walker proclaimed Indigenous Peoples Day as a one year observance. This bill establishes Indigenous Peoples Day as a yearly holiday that every Alaskan can be proud to celebrate.

Indigenous people are an integral part of the spiritual, cultural, linguistic, scientific and historical fabric of the State of Alaska and the Americas at large. We as a state recognize the unique contributions of Indigenous people as a whole, and of individual Alaska Natives for their role in making the state what it is today.

Historically, Alaska Native people have weathered unfathomable violence, degradation and suffering, often at the hands of the federal and state governments—and in spite of these challenges, have emerged as key players in the State, and as leaders in many fields.

Alaska Native people have exercised agency in the development of the current systems of land management, traditional use of fish and game, and in the relationship between the State of Alaska, tribal, and federal governments. Leaders like Shgúndi William Paul, Kaaxgal.aat Elizabeth Peratrovich, Iggiagruk Willie Hensley and Dits'itnaa Katie John all worked within the legal system to establish a better and more just state for all Alaskans.

Alaska Native people have also contributed to the cultural life of Alaska. Through literature, both oral and written as well as in the visual arts, Alaska Native people have left an indelible mark on the state. Through this bill we recognize the contributions of the philosophers and teachers Angayuqaq Oscar Kawagley, the spiritual teacher Kaajakwtí Walter Sobeloff, the poet and scholar Keixwnéi Nora Marks Dauenhauer, the elders who have retained their languages, and passed on their culture, and the parents, grandparents, aunts, and uncles who teach their children what it means to be an indigenous person. This day of recognition also acknowledges the many artists, some whose names are unrecorded, whose work is used in ceremony and tribal custom—as well as respected and admired in world class museums and private collections.

Through this action, Alaska joins a growing number of states and communities that have adopted the second Monday in October as Indigenous Peoples Day.

While we recognize that Christopher Columbus was among the first Europeans to land on the shores of the North American Continent, it is time for Alaska to eliminate Columbus Day and recognize the Indigenous Peoples of Alaska. The rich culture and Indigenous knowledge of Alaska Natives have been of great influence in Alaska and it is time to celebrate and recognize those cultures by establishing the second Monday in October as Indigenous Peoples Day.


Sealaska Heritage Institute (SHI) is a regional Native nonprofit founded in 1980. The institute's mission is to perpetuate and enhance the Tlingit, Haida, and Tsimshian cultures of Southeast Alaska. Its goal is to promote cultural diversity and cross-cultural understanding. SHI has worked for over three decades to preserve and enhance the culture and language of Native Peoples. We have promoted the integration of culture and language into schools because of the benefits it provides to Native Students. We also believe that these efforts support cultural diversity that make Alaska a richer state.

Governor Walker started the movement toward establishing Indigenous Peoples Day in 2015, and I believe that we should make this change permanent. The past few years we have seen continued support of Alaska Native Heritage with the signing of HB 216 changing the State Language from English to include 20 Alaska Native Languages as official state languages and more initiatives to support Alaska Native education, language and culture.

The contributions by Alaska Natives to the State of Alaska have been significant and it is time we acknowledge and celebrate those contributions.

We respectfully urge you to adopt HB 275 establishing the second Monday in October as Indigenous Peoples Day.

Tanana Chiefs Conference is a non-profit tribal health and social service consortium representing the tribal communities of interior Alaska. Tanana Chiefs was established over 100 years ago when the Native leaders of the time unified to address the needs of the tribes. In 1915, the federal representatives and newspapers were surprised of our chiefs' intelligence and diplomacy¹ as they advocated for the priorities of our people. One-hundred years later, as our cultures have proved resilient and our leaders and tribal members continue to contribute to the State of Alaska, it is important the State pursue a formal day to recognize the achievements of the Indigenous.

We believe this day should be the second-Monday of October in order to provide a learning opportunity for Alaskans and especially the youth to discuss the impacts of historical trauma and successes of Native people. Too often Alaskans fail to be educated on history or governance which prohibits advancement within our state.

Again, we appreciate the consideration of this bill. We believe the bill will create invaluable awareness and educational opportunities.

INDIGENOUS PEOPLES DAY

Effective Date: Monday, October 12th, 2015

WHEREAS, the Indigenous Peoples of the lands that would later become known as Alaska have occupied these lands since time immemorial, and Alaska is built upon the homelands and communities of the Indigenous Peoples of this region, without whom the building of the state would not be possible; and

WHEREAS, we value the many contributions made to our communities through Indigenous Peoples' knowledge, labor, technology, science, philosophy, arts, and the deep cultural contribution that has substantially shaped the character of Alaska; and

WHEREAS, the State recognizes the fact that Alaska is one "big village," with over 16 percent of the State population having indigenous heritage – the highest percentage among all the United States; and

WHEREAS, the State opposes systematic racism toward Indigenous Peoples of Alaska or any Alaskans of any origin and promotes policies and practices that reflect the experiences of Indigenous Peoples, ensure greater access and opportunity, and honor our nation's indigenous roots, history, and contributions; and

WHEREAS, Indigenous Peoples' Day was first proposed in 1977 by a delegation of Native Nations to the United Nations sponsored International Conference on Discrimination Against Indigenous Populations in the Americas; and

WHEREAS, in 2011 the Affiliated Tribes of Northwest Indians, representing 59 Tribes from Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Northern California, Western Montana, and some Alaskan Tribes,

passed resolution #11-57 to "Support to Change Columbus Day (2nd Monday of October) to Indigenous Peoples' Day," and

WHEREAS, the State of Alaska joins a growing number of cities that have recognized the second Monday of October as Indigenous Peoples Day, creating an opportunity to promote appreciation, tolerance, understanding, friendship, and partnerships among Indigenous Peoples and all Alaskans.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Bill Walker, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF ALASKA, do hereby proclaim October 12, 2015 as:

Indigenous Peoples Day

in Alaska, and encourage all Alaskans to celebrate the thriving cultures and values of the Indigenous Peoples of our region and to continue efforts to promote the well-being and growth of Alaska's Indigenous community.

In support of House Bill 275 "Indigenous Peoples Day"

The recognition of Indigenous Peoples Day is meaningful to me – not so much because I am a professor of Alaska Native Studies, or that I am Tlingit Indian – but because it honors our legacy and our existence. Transitions in the state since statehood continued to make for a trying time for Alaska Native peoples. Growing up during this period meant perhaps removal from one's family and placement in other homes or schools, being escorted out of establishments, unwarranted arrests, or many other occurrences that would diminish one's cultural, familial, and even spiritual existence as an indigenous human being. This bill has the potential to bring some sense of peace to a tragic history.

Recognition of a human beings' existence goes a long way. That is what this bill is offering. That recognition that we exist; that we matter. That we contribute to the good of state. That we are here. That our cultures are valuable and worthy. It adds another layer of dignity.

The bill implies there is value in Native people and culture. It is important to say this, because Alaska Native people have been dehumanized, as evidenced through the high numbers of violence against Native women, and the levels of the incarcerated, the deaths, and disenfranchised. Such violence and disregard can only occur, as history has repeatedly demonstrated, when one is dehumanized; reduced to a disposable character. Therefore, for the societal affect alone, this bill is meaningful. It is one spoke in the wheel of change that is so desperately needed. It encourages a way of thinking – the value of each human being.

Please pass this bill.

Please regard this as a letter of highest support for House Bill 275, to establish the second Monday of October as Indigenous Peoples Day.


