HB 43 – Alaska Law Enforcement Officers' Day

2-3-2015 **House State Affairs Committee** testimony from Brandy Johnson – Fairbanks –
Widow of State Trooper Scott Johnson

For the record my name is Brandy Johnson. I am the recent widow of Scott Johnson whose job was that of Sergeant with the Alaska State Troopers. I'm calling today on behalf of all the men and women in law enforcement in the State of Alaska as well as their families. If it weren't HB43 recognizing January 9th as Alaska Law Enforcement Appreciation Day last year alone there were 121 line of duty deaths in the United States. Two of those deaths occurred in Alaska. One of those deaths was my best friend - my husband Scott and the other was Trooper Gabe Rich.

Law enforcement in this state was significantly diminished following this incident. The law enforcement community within our great state need to know they are appreciated. They perform the tasks most of us would never want to experience. They are the people that get the calls at home while the rest of the public is sleeping - to respond to the car accident, a drowning or a murder. Law enforcement cleans up the floor after a teenager commits suicide so the mother doesn't have to. They cut the body out of the frozen river with a chain saw in the winter to recover someone's loved one. They are the ones who answer a call when a domestic violence situation has turned into a hostage situation. Can you imagine what it would be like to interview a suspect that you know from evidence, has raped a dead child. If my words are disturbing here today, imagine having to deal with these situations every day.

Law enforcement also comforts people on the worst days of their life. They demonstrate infinite patience and put their life on the line to protect their communities. They do it when they are tired, when they miss their daughter's birthday and even when it's Christmas.

Most calls are requests for help or to file a complaint. Some of them are calls to just say thank you. Thank you for finding and returning my rifle. Thank you for the compassion you showed when I felt scared and violated, or thank you for patiently answering my questions.

Those letters of thank you from the public often mean the most, yet many do not call to say thank you. Do troopers and officers do their duty without our appreciation? Yes. Do they expect our appreciation? No. Does appreciation encourage them to come to work and perform well at their job? Yes.

I have spent the last 23 years living the law enforcement life. It is extremely draining. A day to recognize law enforcement in Alaska would mean a great deal to the men and women in the law enforcement community. I ask you to consider House Bill 43 and tell Alaska law enforcement their sacrifice and risk have not gone unnoticed. Thank you for the opportunity today to testify before you.

Enclosed is the bill draft you requested establishing a day to honor Alaska law enforcement officers. As I discussed with Ms. Manly, the bill uses the terms "peace officer" and "law enforcement officer," and the day itself is called Alaska Law Enforcement Officers' Day. Although both "law enforcement officer" and "peace officer" appear in the Alaska Statutes, the term "peace officer" is used much more frequently and generally applies to a larger group of people when defined.¹ Please review this draft to make sure it reflects your intent, and let me know if you would like any changes.

¹ For example, "peace officer" is defined in AS 01.10.060(a)(7) to include state troopers, municipal police force members, village and regional public safety officers, and U.S. marshals and deputy marshals. This definition applies to all Alaska statutes, unless the context requires otherwise. Compare this broad definition of "peace officer" with the more limited definitions of "law enforcement officer," for example in AS 08.54.640(d)(1), which applies only to AS 08.54.640 ("a person who is employed by the Department of Public Safety as a state trooper or as a law enforcement officer engaged in fish and wildlife protection; or employed as a fish and wildlife law enforcement officer by the United States Department of the Interior or the United States Department of Agriculture"), or AS 08.76.590(14), which applies only to AS 08.76.100 - 08.76.590 ("a police officer of the municipality where a pawnshop is located; or a state trooper if a pawnshop is located in the unorganized borough or if a pawnshop is located in a municipality that does not provide police protection services").

HB 43 Explanation of Changes

HB 43 Version A designates the Sunday preceding May 15 each year to honor law enforcement officers and peace officers. If May 15 falls on a Sunday, then Alaska Law Enforcement Officers' Day is on May 15. Version W simply changes the date to January 9 of every year.

May 15 is National Peace Officers Memorial Day and the week in which it falls is National Police Week. Initially, we thought this would be a good time to add Alaska Law Enforcement Officers' Day, but it became clear that an additional day of honor might conflict with memorial observances that are already held in Alaska and Washington D.C.

Rep. Lynn intended his bill to honor those law enforcement officers who are still on the job, not only those who have given their lives in the line of duty. For that reason, we changed the date to January 9 to coincide with the National Law Enforcement Appreciation Day. We believe this will provide a great opportunity to thank and honor those officers who continue to serve every day, without distracting from the equally important memorial observances that already occur in May.

HB 43

“An Act establishing Alaska Law Enforcement Officers’ Day.”

HB 43 establishes “Alaska Law Enforcement Officers’ Day” to honor and support the men and women who put their lives on the line for us every day to serve the people of our great state, and protect us from barbarism and anarchy.

There is nothing more descriptive of Alaska’s law enforcement mission than some words from the song “*Impossible Dream*,” sung by the gallant and indemonstrable character Don Quixote: “To fight the unbeatable foe . . . To bear with unbearable sorrow . . . To run where the brave dare not go . . . , To right the unrightable wrong . . . to fight for the right, without question or pause, To be willing to march into Hell . . . And the world will be better for this.”

On January 9th, 2015, partnering organizations in support of law enforcement officers nationwide promoted a National Law Enforcement Appreciation Day. The holiday was started by the FBI National Academy to thank officers across the country who take risks to protect their communities. We believe it would be appropriate to designate January 9th of each year as Alaska Law Enforcement Officers’ Day to honor those who have lost their lives in the line of duty, and those who continue to serve their communities. Peace officers across Alaska wear many different titles: VSPOs, State Troopers, and Police Officers, to name a few, but they share in common a commitment to uphold the laws of our state and to protect its citizens. A Day of Designation would serve as a welcome reminder to thank and honor those who serve us daily in a dangerous line of work.

Alaska and its peoples face many issues and challenges. But without survival those issues and challenges are moot. It is law enforcement and peace officers, and other first responders, who assist our survival. “Alaska Law Enforcement Officers’ Day” helps bring that reality into focus, and says, “Thank you.”

Law Enforcement Appreciation Day Jan. 9, 2015

Governor Walker's Proclamation declaring January 9th Law Enforcement Appreciation Day

On January 9th, 2015, organizations in support of law enforcement officers nationwide will promote a National Law Enforcement Appreciation Day (L.E.A.D.).

In light of recent negativity directed toward law enforcement nationally, there is a need to show law enforcement officers that our citizens recognize the difficult and sometimes impossible career they have chosen, in public service to us all.

Can you imagine going to work each day and wondering if you'll survive your shift and see your family that night? Most people can't. But in law enforcement, this is a fact of life. Each day 780,000 police officers across our country put a badge on and go to work knowing they may face extremely dangerous situations. Yet, they go to work anyway. Being a law enforcement officer is not just a job, it is a calling. The pay is low, the hours can be terrible, and there is sometimes little appreciation for what you do. Yet, they do it anyway.

What the public doesn't see is the toll law enforcement takes to keep our communities safe. On average, between 105 and 203 officers die in the line of duty each year, 50,000 officers are assaulted in the line of duty each year, 14,000 officers are injured in the line of duty each year, and over 300 officers commit suicide each year. There is no other profession in the world, except possibly the military, where you will find these kinds of statistics.

Being a law enforcement officer truly is an impossible job. You must be professional, courteous, caring and yet be ready to protect the public at all times. You must be prepared to make life and death decisions in a moment's notice. You take an amazing amount of abuse at times, but have to view this abuse as just "part of the job." You do not have the liberty to express your emotions during many situations.

Law enforcement officers play such an integral part in our society. Without law enforcement officers, chaos would reign. Have you ever thought about what you would do if you were in trouble - a car accident, a home invasion, an assault - and you did not have someone to call for help? No matter how much abuse law enforcement takes, they continue to do their job, and do it well. They are the guardians of our way of life and they deserve our support.

On January 9th, we call our nation's citizens to action in support of law enforcement. Those citizens who appreciate law enforcement and are discouraged about the negative attention being given to law enforcement are encouraged take time on Friday, January 9th to show their support.

Our citizens can show their support in a number of ways:

- * Change your profile picture on social media to the image at the beginning of this message
- * See a police officer? Thank a police officer
- * Wear blue clothing in support of law enforcement
- * Send a card of support to your local police department or state agency
- * Share a positive story about a positive law enforcement experience on social media
- * Ask children in your community to write letters in support of law enforcement
- * Participate in Project Blue Light and proudly display your blue light in support of law enforcement
- * Organize an event or a rally in support of your law enforcement officers
- * Advertise your support through local media outlets/billboards
- * Post the public service announcement to your webpage or social media pages

Walker announces Law Enforcement Appreciation Day in Alaska

ANCHORAGE – Alaska’s new governor has issued an executive proclamation naming Jan. 9 as Law Enforcement Appreciation Day.

Gov. Bill Walker signed the proclamation late Thursday, at the request of Public Safety Commissioner’s Office, reports Alaska State Trooper spokeswoman Beth Ipsen. It’s all part of a national movement led by the FBI National Academy Association and Concerns of Police Survivors, Inc. to recognize the efforts of law enforcement officers and the dangers they face on the job.

“What the public doesn’t see is the toll law enforcement takes to keep our communities safe,” said COPS, Inc. on their website (<http://www.nationalcops.org/>). “On average, between 105 and 203 officers die in the line of duty each year, 50,000 officers are assaulted in the line of duty each year, 14,000 officers are injured in the line of duty each year, and over 300 officers commit suicide each year.”

In Alaska, four law enforcement officers have lost their lives (<http://www.odmp.org/>) in the line of duty since the beginning of 2013.

- March 19, 2013- Village Public Safety Officer Thomas O. Madole was shot and killed while investigating reports of an altercation earlier that day in Manokotak
- March 30, 2013- Alaska State Trooper Tage Brandel Toll died in a helicopter crash that claimed the lives of two others during a search and rescue mission
- May 1, 2014- Alaska State Trooper Sgt. Patrick Scott Johnson was fatally shot while investigating reports of a man brandishing a firearm in Tanana
- May 1, 2014- Alaska State Trooper Gabriel Rich was also fatally shot while investigating reports of a man brandishing a firearm in Tanana

When asked about the news, Anchorage Police Department spokeswoman Jennifer Castro said, "It's just another day on the job, we're all still working like we do every day."

Observers of the day are encouraged to wear blue as a show of solidarity for law enforcement officers.

Alaska has more than 50 law enforcement agencies throughout the state, according to the last census of state and local agencies in 2008. Over 2,100 law enforcement personnel serve Alaskans, with a reported total of 1,298 sworn officers of the law.

Executive Proclamation by *Governor Bill Walker*

WHEREAS, the dedicated men and women of Alaska's law enforcement agencies serve and protect Alaskans and ensure our communities are healthy and safe every day; and

WHEREAS, law enforcement officers are highly trained and many make daily personal sacrifices to maintain public peace and order, enforce traffic laws, conduct search and rescue operations, investigate allegations of human abuse or neglect, respond to citizen inquiries, protect life and property, and provide current and relevant law enforcement training to law enforcement and criminal justice agencies; and

WHEREAS, Alaska's law enforcement officers wear a badge – a symbol of authority granted by oath – and vow to uphold the highest ideals of law enforcement and truth, regardless of outcome. A badge marks an officer's courage to make the right decisions in the face of extremely dangerous situations and moral dilemmas, and to show compassion to those in need without bias, regardless of circumstances or condition; and

WHEREAS, members of the Alaska Department of Public Safety, the Alaska State Troopers, and the Alaska Wildlife Troopers work to carry out their core values of Loyalty, Integrity, Courage, Compassion, Leadership, and Accountability, and members of other federal and local law enforcement agencies across our state also work hard for Alaskans every day; and

WHEREAS, we appreciate law enforcement officers who remain steadfast, honorable, and uncompromised in the performance of duty while exhibiting leadership and professional conduct; and

it is important to recognize our everyday heroes and their families for their bravery, selfless duty, and commitment to Alaskans.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Bill Walker, Governor of the State of Alaska, do hereby proclaim January 9, 2015 as:

Law Enforcement Appreciation Day

in Alaska, and encourage all Alaskans to recognize and express appreciation for our law enforcement officers for their honorable profession in public service to us all.

My name is Sergeant Gerard Asselin. I have been in law enforcement for more than 17 years. I am the President of the Anchorage Police Department Employees Association (APDEA) which represents about 475 rank and file employees of the Anchorage Police Department. I am writing in support of HB 43 which would establish "Alaska Law Enforcement Day."

The APDEA has among its members more than 325 Police Officers and Sergeants that work daily to protect and serve our community. We do this, not for recognition or fame but out of a sense of duty. Our officers endure many challenging and diverse situations. The work continues with the hope of making our communities better and stemming the tide of ill in society.

Each year, scores of officers die in the line of duty; 121 died in 2014 and already 9 have died to date in 2015. Yearly, more than 65,000 officers are assaulted with many of these assaults resulting in injury. Sadly, every year violent acts upon our Alaskan law enforcement officers add to these national numbers. These statistics represent some of the more tangible affects upon our officers. We should not forget about the less tangible affects related to repeated exposures to death, societal dysfunction and other traumatic events.

As we all know, right now there is a national discussion occurring regarding policing in America. A part of this discussion we must continue to acknowledge and respect the sacrifices that our officers make every day. HB 43 does just that, right here in Alaska on a statewide level. Having a day of recognition can provide an opportunity for Alaskans to recognize these men and women and say, "thank you."

Enclosed is the bill draft you requested establishing a day to honor Alaska law enforcement officers. As I discussed with Ms. Manly, the bill uses the terms "peace officer" and "law enforcement officer," and the day itself is called Alaska Law Enforcement Officers' Day. Although both "law enforcement officer" and "peace officer" appear in the Alaska Statutes, the term "peace officer" is used much more frequently and generally applies to a larger group of people when defined.¹ Please review this draft to make sure it reflects your intent, and let me know if you would like any changes.

¹ For example, "peace officer" is defined in AS 01.10.060(a)(7) to include state troopers, municipal police force members, village and regional public safety officers, and U.S. marshals and deputy marshals. This definition applies to all Alaska statutes, unless the context requires otherwise. Compare this broad definition of "peace officer" with the more limited definitions of "law enforcement officer," for example in AS 08.54.640(d)(1), which applies only to AS 08.54.640 ("a person who is employed by the Department of Public Safety as a state trooper or as a law enforcement officer engaged in fish and wildlife protection; or employed as a fish and wildlife law enforcement officer by the United States Department of the Interior or the United States Department of Agriculture"), or AS 08.76.590(14), which applies only to AS 08.76.100 - 08.76.590 ("a police officer of the municipality where a pawnshop is located; or a state trooper if a pawnshop is located in the unorganized borough or if a pawnshop is located in a municipality that does not provide police protection services").
