### SPONSOR STATEMENT HOUSE BILL 143: Naming the Daniel R. Fauske Building

I am pleased to offer House Bill 143 in honoring Dan Fauske by naming the AHFC Building at 4300 Boniface Parkway, the Daniel R. Fauske Building.

Dan Fauske served as the head of the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation (AHFC) for 18 years, managing assets of \$4.8 billion. During his tenure, AHFC started its Weatherization and Home Energy Rebate Program, which had provided weatherization upgrades for renters and homeowners and rebates for energy improvements to homeowners for nearly 16,000 homes by the end of 2010. AHFC also played key roles in providing affordable housing statewide, making it possible for Alaskans to pursue the dream of home ownership. Under his leadership, AHFC continued its series of annual contributions to the State of Alaska, which totaled \$1.9 billion by the end of 2010.

In May 2010, while serving as CEO and Executive Director of the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation (AHFC), Fauske was selected by the Alaska Legislature to lead a joint development team charged with studying the feasibility of designing, financing and constructing an in-state natural gas pipeline capable of delivering North Slope gas to communities within Alaska. Initially, the Alaska Gasline Development Corporation (AGDC) was created as a wholly-owned subsidiary of AHFC to manage the development of the Alaska Stand Alone Pipeline (ASAP) plan. In 2013, the Legislature re-established AGDC as an independent corporation of the State and appropriated \$355 million towards the project. Fauske continued in a dual capacity, leading both Corporations, until August 2013 when he resigned from AHFC to focus exclusively on AGDC and gasline work.

Dan Fauske served as President of AGDC and was charged with the critical responsibility of ensuring that Alaska's vast North Slope natural gas resources are available for the benefit and use of Alaskans. The Corporation is currently managing two North Slope natural gas projects on the state's behalf -- the in-state Alaska Stand Alone Pipeline (ASAP) project and the Alaska LNG export project.

Prior to his position at AHFC, Fauske served as Chief Financial Officer and Chief Administrative Officer for Alaska's North Slope Borough.

Fauske served on numerous boards, including the National Community Renaissance (CORE) Board and the University of Alaska Anchorage (UAA) School of Nursing Advisory Board. He has served on the Alaska Council on Homelessness, Fiscal Policy Council of Alaska, Fannie Mae's National Housing Impact Advisory Council and Federal Home Loan Bank of Seattle. He holds a master's degree in business administration from Gonzaga University.




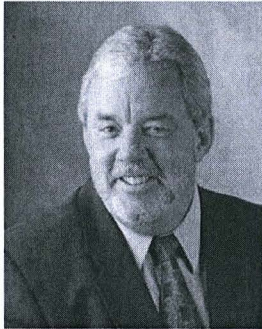
This bill allows for naming the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation building at 4300 Boniface Parkway in Anchorage, the Daniel R. Fauske Building. There is no fiscal impact and therefore a zero fiscal note is submitted.

### Fact Sheet: Key dates & accomplishments, Dan Fauske

- Hired by Board of Directors under leadership of Governor Tony Knowles as CEO/Executive Director of Alaska Housing Finance Corporation on March 1, 1995.
- Instrumental in development of an asset transfer plan between AHFC and the State and as a result substantially improved AHFC's credit rating by Moody's, Standard and Poor's, and Fitch.
- Issued more than \$7.5 billion in bonds and contributed \$1.9 billion back to the State of Alaska through cash transfers, capital projects and debt service payments.
- Issued more than \$650 million in tobacco bonds.
- Shielded AHFC from the sub-prime mortgage bubble that impacted the Lower 48.
- Achieved Moving to Work status under Housing and Urban Development for Public Housing and Housing Choice Vouchers – only 1 of 39 in the U.S. with this distinction.
- Through the Public Housing Division, provides rental assistance to approximately 6,000 families through one of three major programs: public housing; the Housing Choice Voucher; and the Section 8 HUD Multifamily program. Established innovative programs to help Alaskans in need of housing, including Village Public Safety Officer, Teacher and Health Professional, Empowering Choice Housing for victims of domestic violence.
- More than \$500 million in funds have been appropriated by the legislature since 2008 to support energy efficiency in Alaskan homes resulting in averages of 30 percent consumption savings and more than \$1,000 annually for participating households.
- In 2010, Fauske was selected to lead the Alaska Gasline Development Corporation (AGDC) for the specific purpose of developing, refining and producing an in-state natural gas pipeline project plan. The Alaska Stand Alone Gas Pipeline (ASAP) plan was released July 2011 and legislative funding followed in 2013 with passage of House Bill 4, making AGDC an independent corporation of the State of Alaska.



This morning I noticed in the House Journal that you sponsored HB143, naming the Daniel R. Fauske Building. This letter is to express my support for this bill.

In 1995, I was employed as a legislative aide to the LB& A chairman, and was assigned to work on a bill to liquidate the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation. The Legislative Auditor and myself presented the bill to the Senate Finance Committee at its first hearing in early March. Senators on the Committee indicated unanimous support for the bill that morning. Just before entertaining a motion to move the bill, the Chairman asked if anyone wanted to testify. To everyone's surprise, an unknown man in the back of the room raised his hand and came forward.

"Good morning, Mr. Chairman," he said. "My name is Dan Fauske, and I'm the CEO of the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation. This is my second day on the job."

After the laughter subsided, Dan explained his familiarity with bond credit ratings and capital markets. Rather than advance a bill that would have liquidated about \$800 million out of AHFC, the Finance Committee chose to give Dan a chance to prove his words.


Under Dan Fauske's management, AHFC paid more than \$800 million to the State General Fund in cash dividends. At the same time, AHFC's credit ratings were increased while purchasing billions of dollars in home mortgages, veteran's loans, and multi-family developments. AHFC remains a strong public corporation today.

One keynote in Dan's efforts to make AHFC a stronger and better was his efforts in 1997 to move AHFC into the building located at 4300 Boniface Parkway. In 1992, the Legislature merged three separate state housing functions into AHFC. Prior to moving into 4300 Boniface, AHFC was inefficiently and ineffectively scattered in multiple buildings around Anchorage that housed the different merged functions.

The building at 4300 Boniface is a fitting tribute to Dan Fauske for his long list of accomplishments, and also for his efforts to establish AHFC as a premier public finance and housing institution. More importantly, it will provide a positive legacy for all the employees and stakeholders who help provide housing for all Alaskans.

After the 1995 legislative session, I went to work for Dan as the AHFC Legislative Liaison. During the seven years I worked for him, Dan was my boss, my mentor, a tremendous positive influence, and he remains a close personal friend. While I could go on for several pages telling stories about Dan and his accomplishments for the people of Alaska, I will close by just saying that HB143 is a bill that should be passed for many good reasons.
