9 cost of acquiring, constructing and equipping and
10 making other capital improvements to civic and con-
11 vention centers in various locations throughout the
12 state; providing for the submission to a vote of the
13 qualified voters of the state of the proposition of
14 whether or not such bonds may be issued for such
15 purposes; and providing for an effective date."

16 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

17 * Section 1. For the purpose of paying part or all of the cost of
18 acquiring, constructing and equipping and making other capital improvements
19 to civic and convention centers in various locations throughout the state,
20 general obligation bonds of the state in the principal sum of not to exceed
21 \$15,000,000 shall be issued and sold. The full faith, credit, and resources
22 of the state shall be and are hereby pledged to the payment of the principal
23 of and interest on such bonds, which bonds shall be issued under the pro-
24 visions of AS 37.15 as amended at the time of issuance. The legislature may
25 provide additional sources of money for the payment of such principal and
26 interest, and this Act shall not be deemed to provide an exclusive method of
27 payment.

28 * Sec. 2. The amounts of such bonds to be issued from time to time and
29 the time or times of their issuance shall be fixed by the State Bond

1 Committee (created by AS 37.15.110), and the specific uses of the proceeds
2 of such bonds shall be determined by the governor.

3 * Sec. 3. In the event the issuance of such bonds is authorized by the
4 qualified voters of the state, the sum of \$50,000 or so much thereof as shall
5 be found necessary is appropriated from the general fund of the state to
6 carry out the provisions of this Act and to pay expenses incident to the
7 sale and issuance of the bonds authorized herein. The amounts expended from
8 the appropriation authorized by this section shall be reimbursed to the
9 general fund from the proceeds of the sale of the bonds authorized by this
10 Act.

11 * Sec. 4. In the event the issuance of such bonds is authorized by the
12 qualified voters of the state, a special fund of the state to be known as
13 the "1971 Civic and Convention Center Construction Fund" shall be created,
14 into which shall be paid the proceeds of the sale of the bonds described in
15 sec. 1 of this Act except for the accrued interest and premiums. There is
16 hereby appropriated from the "1971 Civic and Convention Center Construction
17 Fund" to the Department of Public Works the sum of \$15,000,000.

18 * Sec. 5. In the event the issuance of such bonds is authorized by the
19 qualified voters of the state, a special fund of the state to be known as
20 the "1971 Civic and Convention Center General Obligation Bond Redemption
21 Fund" shall be created, to the credit of which there shall be set aside such
22 amounts of money as may be necessary to pay the principal of and interest on
23 the outstanding bonds of the issue described in sec. 1 of this Act, and which
24 fund shall be used for the sole purpose of paying and securing the payment
25 of such principal and interest as the same shall become due.

26 * Sec. 6. The question of whether or not the bonds authorized herein
27 shall be issued for the purposes herein provided shall be submitted to the
28 qualified voters of the state at the next state general election, in accor-
29 dance with the provisions of the constitution and laws of the state. The

1 lieutenant governor shall fix the ballot title to be submitted to the quali-
2 fied voters for their ratification of the state debt authorized by this Act,
3 and shall do everything else necessary to place such proposition before said
4 qualified voters at said next state general election.

5 * Sec. 7. The proposition to be submitted to the qualified voters at
6 said election shall read substantially as follows:

7 Proposition

8 State General Obligation Civic and Convention Center

9 Construction Bonds \$15,000,000

10 Shall the State of Alaska issue its general obligation bonds in the
11 principal sum of not to exceed \$15,000,000 for the purpose of paying
12 part or all of the cost of acquiring, constructing and equipping
13 civic and convention centers in various areas throughout the state?

14 plan and account, which shall be administered as a part of and in like

SUMMARY OF CRITICAL POINTS

1. HB 414 creates a retirement plan for members of the Alaska National Guard or Alaska Naval Militia who have completed 20 or more years service to the State of Alaska through their Alaska Guard/Naval Militia memberships. Benefits are to be \$50.00 per month for the same number of years creditable service in the Alaska Guard/Naval Militia to be drawn upon discharge or deferred to a later date. Lump sum payment of unpaid benefits to beneficiaries upon death of member.
2. HB 414 is of direct benefit to members of the Alaska Scout Battalions which has the highest percentage of "20 year career" members. Of the 130 active members currently having 20 years or more Alaska Guard service, 122 (or 93%) are members of the Alaskan Scouts. A great alternative to the welfare program.
3. HB 414 is designed to recognize service to the State of Alaska similar to that provided by the federal government for 20 years of "reserve" service to the nation. Benefits under the state plan can be more "immediate" in that the individual can draw it upon completion of 20 years of service, where he can use it most. Reference to mortality tables and life expectancy of native population beyond 60 years when federal reserve service retirement program commences.

DETAILED ANALYSIS

1. HB 414 creates the Alaska National Guard/Naval Militia retirement plan which becomes a part of and administered in a like manner as the public employees retirement system.
2. Eligible members are those individuals who are active members on or after 1 July 1971 who have accumulated 20 or more years of active Alaska National Guard or Naval Militia service or upon involuntary retirement because of federal standards imposed on National Guard or Naval Militia membership regardless of length of service.
3. Benefits are \$50/month/man (\$600/year/man) for the same number of years creditable service to the Alaska National Guard or Alaska Naval Militia. Pension may be drawn upon discharge or deferred to a later date. Death benefits to beneficiaries paying off unpaid pension in lump sum is also provided.
4. This retirement program is directly of benefit to members of the Alaska Scout Battalions which has the highest percentage of "20 year career" members in its ranks. Of the 130 active members currently having 20 years or more creditable service to the Alaska National Guard, 122 of them (or 93%) are native members of the Alaska Scout Battalions.
5. This retirement program will provide a direct cash flow into the "bush economy" rewarding individuals for actual services rendered to the State of Alaska as a part of their Alaska National Guard Service. This is a tremendous alternative to the burgeoning welfare program in that the Guardsman have performed actual service to the State in order to receive the benefits.

6. The federal government recognized the "reserve" portion of National Guard membership by providing a retirement program for career Guardsmen, but their benefits do not commence until the individual reaches age 60. There is a move in congressional legislation to reduce this retirement benefits age to 55, however this has been in process for over 5 years and it is still not close to final approval.

7. HB 414 is designed to recognize service to the State similar to that recognized by the federal government, however on a more immediate return basis wherein the individual has the opportunity to draw on his benefits when he can use them the most, upon completion of his 20 years of service (age 40-50) or it can be deferred to a later date to supplement other retirement income. Reference is made to mortality tables for Alaskan native population-very few of the people live to an age where they can draw retirement benefits provided by the federal government after age 60 for "reserve" service.

SUBJECT: HB 431

In response to your request for information relating to the fiscal implications of HB 431, I offer the following comments:

The Legislative Council has included in its budget request for fiscal 1972-73 the sum of \$50,000 for recording equipment. It was the Council's determination that this money would be used to provide more dependable and sophisticated recording capabilities to the various standing committees of the legislature. The Council has not discussed the installation of permanent recording equipment in the Chambers, but if HB 431 were to pass, it would most likely call for between \$10,000 and \$20,000 to install a proper system. The Council's request was not made with the implementation of HB 431 in mind.

It should be additionally noted that HB 431, as written, would have the Division of Libraries do the transcribing of tapes and that the Alaska Educational Broadcasting System would initiate, control and supervise the public broadcasting of all proceedings of each House of the legislature. In view of that, I believe the Department of Education should be consulted as to the very real fiscal implications the bill would have for that department.
