SUBJECT: HB 558

I do not anticipate any administrative problems with this bill.

We do not have any statistics which tell us the extent to which benefits from private pension plans are currently being taxed. We do know, however, that there are very few retired people living in Alaska (about 7,000). However, probably less than one-fourth (about 1,500) would be subject to the provisions of this Act. It is therefore possible to speculate that the lost revenue as a result of this bill would be minor.

For example, if we assume that the average retired person who is beneficiary of such a plan received \$400 per month from it and has no other taxable income, then his current tax liability would be \$22.40. Assuming there are 1,500 such households, the tax loss would be \$33,600 for the current year. A projection for Fiscal Years 1973-77 based on a 3 per cent growth rate would result in the following losses:

Please bear in mind that these figures are speculative in the sense that they are based on the arbitrary assumption made above. However, they should be in the ball park.

ANALYSIS STATEMENT TO ACCOMPANY FISCAL NOTE

FOR HOUSE BILL 564

Herewith is a breakdown of estimated annual costs for rental and operation of equipment for fiscal years 1973 through 1977 for construction of bush airports as proposed by HB 564. It should be noted that the first year costs exceed the proposed authorization by some \$67,000, due to initial procurement costs. Some savings would be realized by using operators and mechanics available from existing work forces.

Provisions of the bill should provide that ownership of the equipment be with the Department of Public Works.

Total cost for Bethel would be \$344,778 excluding labor and other minor operating costs. Freight delivery for equipment to Nenana would be approximately \$9,600 for a cost of \$333,500 to run a barge on the Yukon. Overall equipment and barge rental costs for both operations would be \$678,278.


Dear George:

Annual debt retirement is based on 20-year amortization at 6% interest. The proposed capital budget for Fiscal Year 1973 submitted by the University of Alaska and the original version of HB-577 call for two Sea Grant Marine Laboratories at an acquisition, construction and equipping cost of \$3,500.0. Since CSHB-577 provides for 3 such laboratories, we are assuming the cost per facility will not amount to \$1,750.0 as proposed by the University, but will be acquired, constructed and equipped for approximately \$1,166.7 each and will provide a lesser facility than planned.

If approved by the voters, construction is planned for March, 1973 with a completion date of August, 1974.
