10 CHAPTER 04. BOUNDARIES AND ORGANIZATION OF BOROUGHS

11 IN THE UNORGANIZED BOROUGH.

12 ARTICLE 1. BOUNDARIES, ADMINISTRATION AND INCORPORATION.

13 Sec. 07.04.010. BOUNDARIES. By the tenth day following the
14 convening of the first session of the Eighth Legislature, the Local
15 Boundary Commission shall propose to the legislature a division of the
16 unorganized area of the state into unorganized boroughs. The Local
17 Boundary Commission may propose adjustments to the boundaries of exist-
18 ing boroughs to the extent necessary to secure conformity with the
19 standards for borough boundaries set forth in the statutes and in the
20 Constitution of the State of Alaska. A proposed adjustment of existing
21 boundaries shall provide for those transitional matters the commission
22 considers necessary or appropriate. The boundaries proposed by the
23 Local Boundary Commission become effective 45 days after presentation
24 or at the end of the session whichever is earlier, unless disapproved
25 by resolution concurred in by a majority of the members of each house.

Dear Mr. Speaker:

Pursuant to the Uniform Rules of the Legislature, I am submitting a bill establishing boroughs in the presently unorganized areas of the state.

The bill is designed to fulfill the constitutional mandates to divide the entire state into boroughs, organized and unorganized, and to extend maximum local self-government throughout the state.

The bill directs the Local Boundary Commission to propose boundaries, which would become effective upon failure of the Legislature to disapprove them. Under the bill the voters within new unorganized boroughs may choose to remain in unorganized status, to organize in the manner now provided for borough incorporation, or to adopt a home-rule charter. The bill includes procedures for election of advisory councils in unorganized boroughs and for election of charter commissions where desired.

The bill contains a savings clause which preserves any organization petition which is pending on the effective date of the Act.

HOUSE BILL NO. 600

The House Local Government Committee, in recommending do pass on this bill, discussed at some length the effect of funding newly included municipalities in the shared revenue program. Our conclusion was this: The inclusion of certain new communities, as allowed by HB 600, is only fair where those communities are performing municipal services. The committee did not feel, however, that the appropriations under this bill should cut down on the dollars which will be appropriated to other municipalities. In other words, if the number of communities enjoying shared revenue is to be raised, then the total appropriation for shared revenue should be raised as well. The dollar amount in question is not excessively large and should be added so that every community receives its full entitlement under the shared revenue program.

Dear Mr. Hohman:

H. B. 602, requesting \$20,000 for a project rebuilding of an old frame building for use as an elementary school in Craig should not pass. It represents very questionable use of the taxpayers money and I doubt that the completed building could possibly pass the state requirements for a school. At least I presume the state does have such standards.

The local school authorities have propogandized at great length over the suitability of this building. In a pictorial sheet asking for "HELP" from the legislature they state -"We have the old health center--it's sound and it's fit--but we need \$20,000.00-- To remodel it." It will take a great deal more than \$20,000 to make this a fit building- they are presently putting creosoted piling under it but the old sills are also rotten-- as well as the rough and many parts between. After all the windows are replaced, insulation installed a new furnace, wiring, plumbing, etc., it still will be basically an old two story building with considerable fire hazard potential and certainly not suitable for a grade school. With this the community will have to live for a number of years once the investment is made.

Also, I might add that the situation is not really as desperate as it would sound as there is considerable space available in the Klawock school to take care of some seventy new students, without undue crowding. The Klawock school is a modern, one-story building and has an excellent staff, and can easily take care of many of the new comers anticipated with the starting of operations at the new saw mill, which, incidentally is located less than a mile from Klawock. Since housing must be built or mobile homes brought in, whether the new comers locate in either Craig or Klawock, it is reasonable to assume that most will locate in the Klawock area, anyway. At the present stage of the game even the number of students is pure speculation so I would hope that the members of your committee would not be unduly pressured into deciding in favor of this bill.

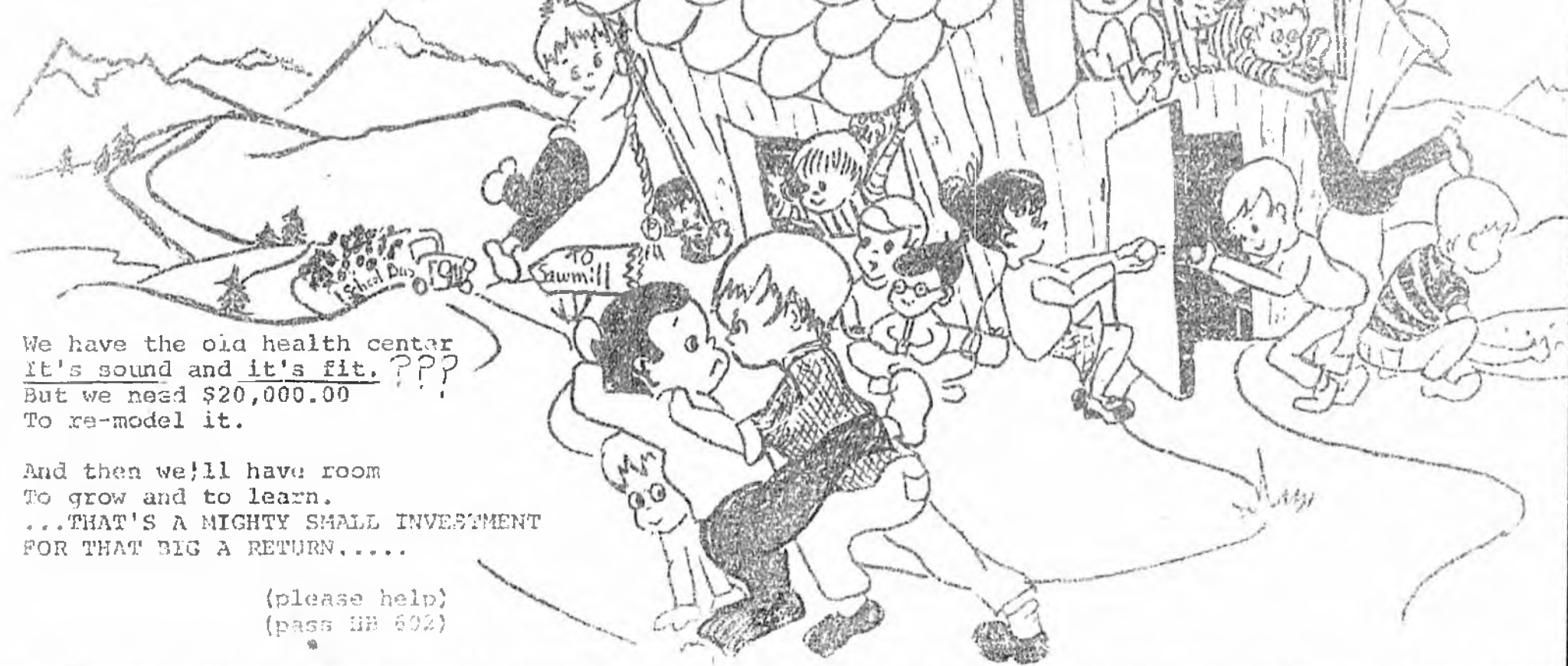

Dear sir:

We are opposed to House Bill 602 and urge you to not be unreasonably influenced by the barrage of school instigated mail that seeks it's passage. This bill proposes a real waste of tax payer's money on an old building that we feel sure can not be brought up to standards for an elementary school for the state of Alaska--and surely the \$20,000 asked is inadequate to do the elementary improvements needed to make the building barely inhabitable, The whole project is ~~xxx~~ poorly planned and the need is not as dire as the school people would have you think. A very large part of the urgency that the Craig district claims is based on the false assumption that all of the new families for the Alaska Timber Mill near Klawock will be sending their children to Craig. At present, the Klawock school, a beautiful, modern and fire-safe building is half empty and capable of handling 70 more students without crowding. The Craig district this year took in 6 of the Klawock students, thus depriving Klawock of an extra unit (lacking 2 students) and adding to the crowding at Craig.

There is no question that Craig needs a new elementary school--but we personally are appalled that parents would approve of putting their small primary youngsters in this old fire-trap of a building, which it will still be if they spend \$50,000 on it. The project is a brainstorm of Superintendent Stanley Bippus, is a shoe string operation, with home-made plans and he even has the school-children (including elementary) working on the building, trying to dramatize the project as a community effort. We submit that this is not what our education dollars were appropriated for.

When the hysteria subsides over H.B.602, we believe that the real and urgent need of the entire west coast area will be recognized which is to get on with the regional high school project. This is where the urgent need lies for as soon as the new high school is built, the present Craig school will be more than adequate to handle the Craig elementary students, until a new, onestory, safe building can be provided for Craig. I realize you are not in a position to know the full story here in the west coast area but the real facts are that HB 602 is a boondoggle and waste of taxpayers money and certainly should not be passed. SUBJECT: House Bill 607

The amendment to AS 14.40.290(b) that is contained in House Bill 607 has no effect on the University if we continue to receive a single lump sum appropriation.

Section 14.42.290 deals with property and funds generally, specifically with the take down of such funds from the State Treasury by providing for the disbursement of funds on properly drawn vouchers signed by the President and Secretary. There is no provision in this section of the act to provide for allocation of funds by account.

Therefore, in my opinion, this change is inappropriate and it imposes an improper restriction on the activities of the Board of Regents.

Recognizing the desires of the committee, I would assume this change is primarily to coincide with House Concurrent Resolution No. 19 relating to the budgeting procedures of the University of Alaska.


The House Concurrent Resolution deals with the allocations of resources after the appropriations are made by the Legislature and the fact that no arbitrary transfer of funds should be made after the budget has been developed. Historically, we have made few transfers after a working budget has been developed and this 5% limitation if imposed on the working budget would have little or no effect on the decisions to be made by the administration.

I believe our best approach would be to the extent that if the Legislature desires to impose certain restrictions on the reallocation of funds within the University, then they should base this reallocation limitation on the approved working budget.

I believe we should discuss this point with the proper committees and request their assistance in placing the restriction, if it is their desire to so impose, within the proper segment of the budget development so as not to place unnecessary restrictions on the control and disbursements of funds.

My comments on House Bill 610 appropriating \$100,000 for construction of an airport at Crooked Creek are as follows. Subject to a question of land acquisition, the \$100,000 should be ample to construct a very adequate secondary strip for the village. Because of the limited population and lack of industry at this community, my feeling is that this would be the most appropriate means of providing an airport facility.

The \$100,000 should be sufficient to build a strip at least 1500' long and possibly 2000' or more, along an alignment that would intersect the downriver strip, sometimes referred to as Sam Parents' field. Slight regrading of the eastern portion of the existing strip would provide very adequate apron facilities. I doubt that I would try to get a gravel surface; a good sod strip would be adequate. The alignment and other details are described in the 1956 site survey report, and I suspect sufficient survey data for a rudimentary design is available in existing field books. The field was proposed for construction in the late 1950's, but was specifically deleted by the legislature at that time in favor of other projects.

Aside from the land acquisition problems associated with the settlement of the Native Land Claims, there may be other claims on the property that would make acquisition difficult. For example, the ground is close enough to Sam Parents' Trading Post that it may be covered by a TIM site. If it hasn't been patented yet, or if it's involved in an estate, acquisition could be tedious.

The site lends itself well to Force Account construction, using rented equipment; I do not believe that a unit price contract could be justified. I do not believe the size and importance of the village warrants the \$500,000 S75-7 project in the C.I.P.

Director Schmidt of the Division of Aviation forwarded your letters dealing with airports for the communities of Portage Creek, Little Russian Mission, Twin Hills, and Kallignak.

In response to your first letter, the letter of intent in the June 4, 1970 Senate Journal didn't list Portage Creek, Little Russian Mission, and Twin Hills. Never-the-less, we have done preliminary engineering at Portage Creek and Twin Hills, as the intent states that consideration isn't to be limited to the listed projects. Russian Mission has not carried such priority due to its size and proximity to Uziak.

A site survey has been run at Portage Creek, but the Division of Aviation wants to review and supplement the data that was obtained. Safe, adequate airport sites are limited there, and if the strip is built where the survey was run, the airport would crowd the village. The engineers want to look at other alternatives, and also gather soils information.

The Division was able to conduct a fairly comprehensive site survey at Twin Hills, and is relatively satisfied with the data obtained. The field work was done while the crew was in the area for work at Uziak, but no design allocation has been set up. We expect a future appropriation will cover design and construction costs.

The situation at Kallignak revolves around complex soils problems that the Division hasn't solved yet. The contractor for the original construction did everything that was called for, and the contract has been closed out. However, the strip has remained so saturated and soft that it has never been officially commissioned. Additional gravel from the river was placed on the runway in an attempt to improve the surface, but didn't

solve the problem. The engineers are faced with a complex and trying situation, as there is substantial grade and crown for surface drainage, and good ditching. An additional problem is that pilots have complained about the crosswinds. The Division has exhausted construction funds, and is working up a plan that will correct the situation without wasting money. So far, there has been good co-operation from the FAA and other agencies, although environmental impact requirements have slowed up our recent work.

Please feel free to write me if you have other questions. As you requested, copies of this letter are being sent to the councils of the villages involved.

Re House Bill 612 calling for an appropriation for \$100,000 for the construction of an airport at Russian Mission (Kuskokwim), I suspect that the financing might not be sufficient. On that basis, I would not be inclined to recommend support of the legislation.

To the best of my knowledge no Division of Aviation engineer has ever conducted a site investigation or site survey at this community. However, I have circled the village while enroute between various points on the Kuskokwim, and we have obtained some aerial photo information. As I recall, the terrain around the village consists primarily of moderately steep slopes. There is little to no timber and an almost insignificant cover of willows or other brush; and evidence of solifluction. If a strip is to be reasonably close to the village and not involve a steep access road, at least part of the construction would likely involve a side hill cut. There might be some similarity to the Russian Mission field.
Marshall

As to the need of an airport, the population of Russian Mission is about half the population of Aniak; and the school population is better than half. Since the village is well above flood-level, a migration from Aniak to Russian Mission taking place somewhat as described in Senator Hammond's letter of 1968. Although the village is fairly close to Aniak, its location on the opposite side of the Kuskokwim means that it is completely isolated during freeze-up and break-up. The situation might be compared to that of Naknek and South Naknek, where we are operating two airports and have made several capital investments in recent years, including lighting systems on both strips.

Even considering Force Account construction using rented equipment, I think that I would want at least \$150,000 before attempting to build even a rudimentary 1200' to 1500' strip comparable to Marshall; and we might need more money in order to get a longer strip. I recommend a site investigation prior to repeating any cost estimates.
