
In response to your request for an estimate of the degree to which school districts would provide minority culture education, we reviewed the applications which had been submitted for supplemental program funding for the current year, as a starting point. Of the forty-one applications totaling slightly over 3 million, three would have met the guidelines of the proposed legislation.

If it is kept in mind that these programs were competing against all the perceived needs of the districts, the relatively small percent which would have been devoted to cross cultural or minority culture is a significant amount. If funds are made available for that type of program only, then we may assume that it would receive a higher priority and could probably be expected to have about three times the demand that was shown initially. This would then approximate the 2% bonus factor we have suggested, or roughly 1.5 million.

We will continue to gather information where possible to refine our projections on this subject.



Dear Representative Degnan:

As we advised you, in preparing House Bill No. 667, this office consulted with the Education Section of the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Juneau and with the Office of the Superintendent of the State Operated Schools in Anchorage in order to obtain a "ball park" figure for the total bond moneys required to construct or replace basic elementary school facilities presently in the hands of the BIA.

The attached data is from the SOS, and we thought you would wish to have a copy of it for your files. At some point during the consideration of this legislation you may wish to reconcile this data with that provided by the BIA which was based on a six-year capital outlay program for elementary schools only (FY 1973-79, inclusive). We talked with Mr. Bob Carnahan of the local BIA Education office, and with Mr. Lee Hayes of SOS in Anchorage.



COMMENTS REGARDING HOUSE BILL 690

\$100,000 FOR HEALY VALLEY SCHOOL PROJECT

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The Healy Valley School construction consists of several phases. Phase 1 is a multipurpose room and instructional center with an approximate area of 20,825 square feet.

The attached memorandum to Stanley Friese, Superintendent, State-Operated School System, explains the bid overrun situation. The basic bid covered the two structures but deleted the utilities and interior completion of the multipurpose building. Actually, the basic bid plus alternate #1 would have to be accepted as the utilities are absolutely necessary.

The alternate for completing the multipurpose room is just about as essential since accepting the basic bid would have provided only a shell with no lighting, heating, finished floor, etc. The alternates served only as a means to determine the costing of these elements.

This project is currently funded from two appropriations: (1) an allocation of \$530,000 under Chapter 170, SLA 1970 (state schools appropriations of \$9,200,000); and (2) \$400,000 under Chapter 131, SLA 1971.

The Superintendent of the State-Operated School System has some flexibility in unencumbered funds in Chapter 170, SLA 1971 and could fund the overrun from this source. According to information available to us, it would take an additional \$149,050 if the basic bid plus alternate #1 is awarded and an additional \$382,000 if the basic bid plus alternates #1 and #2 are awarded.

Several other projects have had overruns or are expected to be over when bids are called for:

Haines High School. An appropriation of \$750,000 was authorized by Chapter 131, SLA 1971, Section 9, to supplement district funds of \$1 million for a high school at Haines. Bids have not been received; but according to information provided by the Haines Borough School District architect, the total project will be underfunded by \$95,000. The attached letter to Haines written by Deputy Commissioner Thomas states the department's position on this matter.

Yakutat. Bids for the Yakutat combined elementary-secondary school were opened February 23. The apparent low bid is approximately \$260,000 over available construction funds.

Nenana and Nome. These are two other large projects covered by Chapter 131, SLA 1971. The Nenana project (\$850,000) has been advertised and the Nome project (\$1,553,000) is in final design. However, we have had no indication from the cities involved that the projects might be underfunded.

It was a pleasure to have the opportunity to meet with you at your office yesterday to discuss securing the additional funding necessary to award the contract to construct the new Tri-Valley buildings. The purpose of this letter is to put in writing the agreements reached at this meeting, and to tell you what further steps we have taken.

- (1) At the meeting it was decided that it was in the best interest of the State of Alaska, State Operated Schools, and the children of Tri-Valley that a contract for the total project, including alternates I and II, be awarded, and that State Operated Schools would back this position. Mr. G. Lee Hayes and myself will appear before the Board of State Operated Schools on March 1, 1972 in Juneau to request the Board to support this position also.
- (2) State Operated Schools agreed to grant \$47,500. to the Tri-Valley project. Adding this amount to the \$765,000. of allocated construction monies available, and subtracting this total from the low overall bid of \$1,143,000., we still need to secure \$330,500.
- (3) Mr. Hayes indicated that he would investigate the prospects for financing the master plan (\$11,000.) and architectural design costs for the multi-purpose facility by means of the Department of Education Planning Fund (Chapter 129?), inasmuch as these projects were initiated during the time that SOS had access to these funds.

Subsequent to our meeting with you, the following actions were taken:

- (1) Mr. Glymer secured an informal agreement from the two lowest bidders to extend the contract award date an additional thirty days, should this be necessary. Mr. Hayes contacted Division of Buildings by phone and was assured that an extension could be worked out. If formal extensions are necessary, this would also entail a thirty day extension to the project completion date.
- (2) I telephoned our legislators representing Healy, Representative Red Swanson and Senator Jay Hammond, to inform them of the results of our meeting, and of our decision to seek the support from the Board for State Operated Schools prior to making appearances before the legislative committees to request funds. Senator Hammond responded that he would cancel our previously arranged appointments for February 24 and 25 with the idea that we would probably want to reschedule them as soon after March 1 as possible.

I feel that with strong support from the State Operated Schools administration and the SOS Board, we will have a solid case to present to the legislature. I am relying on Mr. Hayes to represent the SOS position to both the SOS Board and to the legislative committees.

Dear Representative Chance:

Pursuant to your request concerning the community school concept, the department has pulled together the following information:

1. There are only three community school directors in the State of Alaska who function per the community school concept designed by the MOTT program. Two of these directors are in Juneau and one in a state-operated rural school.
2. Discussion with the two directors in the Juneau school system as to the function of a community school director and associated activities revealed that the cost per director and associated activities would be about \$18,000 to \$20,000 per year. This cost approximates the cost of an existing instructional unit. Based on the recommendation of the two Juneau directors and Mr. Overstreet, the department estimated that it would require a minimum of one instructional unit per attendance area of 300 or more students (K through 12, or any combination thereof). Projecting this to all school districts in the state, there would be 119 instructional units at a cost of approximately \$2 million. No estimates have been computed at this time for the cost of such a program in the state-operated schools.

Discussions with Mr. Overstreet reveal that a year of planning should be provided prior to the beginning of the program. Estimation for the cost of planning with professional assistance from the Department of Education, either through short- or long-term contracts with individuals knowledgeable in the area of the community school or a permanent position with the department in the area of the community school, would cost approximately \$25,000 to \$30,000.

9 \* Section 1. AS 14 is amended by adding a new chapter to read:

10 CHAPTER 36. COMMUNITY SCHOOLS.

11 Sec. 14.36.010. PURPOSE. The community school is an expression  
12 of the philosophy that the school, as the prime educational institution  
13 of the community, is most effective when it involves the people of  
14 that community in a program designed to fulfill their educational  
15 needs. The community school promotes a more efficient use of school  
16 facilities through an extension of school personnel, buildings and  
17 equipment beyond the normal school day. The purpose of this chapter  
18 is to provide state leadership and financial support to encourage and  
19 assist local school districts in the establishment of community  
20 schools.

21 Sec. 14.36.020. COMMUNITY SCHOOL PROGRAM, APPLICATION FOR GRANTS.  
22 Under regulations adopted by the state Board of Education, a school  
23 district may submit to the commissioner an application for a community  
24 school grant. An application shall include

25 (1) a comprehensive plan for the community school program,  
26 including but not limited to, activities for preschool age children,  
27 after school hours activities for both children and adults, continued

5 Sec. 14.36.030. APPLICATION REVIEW, DISPOSITION. The commissioner

13 Sec. 14.36.040. COMMUNITY SCHOOL DIRECTOR. The community school  
14 director or coordinator is administratively accountable to the school

16 Sec. 14.36.050. TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE. On the request of a  
17 school district, the department shall provide whatever technical  
18 assistance a school district requires to develop and submit an applica-
