FISCAL ANALYSIS

This bill does not directly affect funds appropriated to the Department for teachers' salaries. The State-Operated school teachers in election district No. 12 are being paid on the highest salary scale under AS Sec. 14.20.220(3)(d)(3). Teachers in borough city school districts receive their salaries from the district for which they work. The districts in turn receive funds from the State under the Foundation Program. This relationship does, however, affect State Foundation payments to districts in that Sec. 14.17.051 Instructional Unit Allotment refers to AS 14.20.275 for area differentials for instructional unit allotment purposes. The effect of such change would be to increase King Cove and Unalaska's instructional unit allotment by 5 percent. The total increase in general funds for FY 72 would amount to approximately \$16,000, as detailed below:

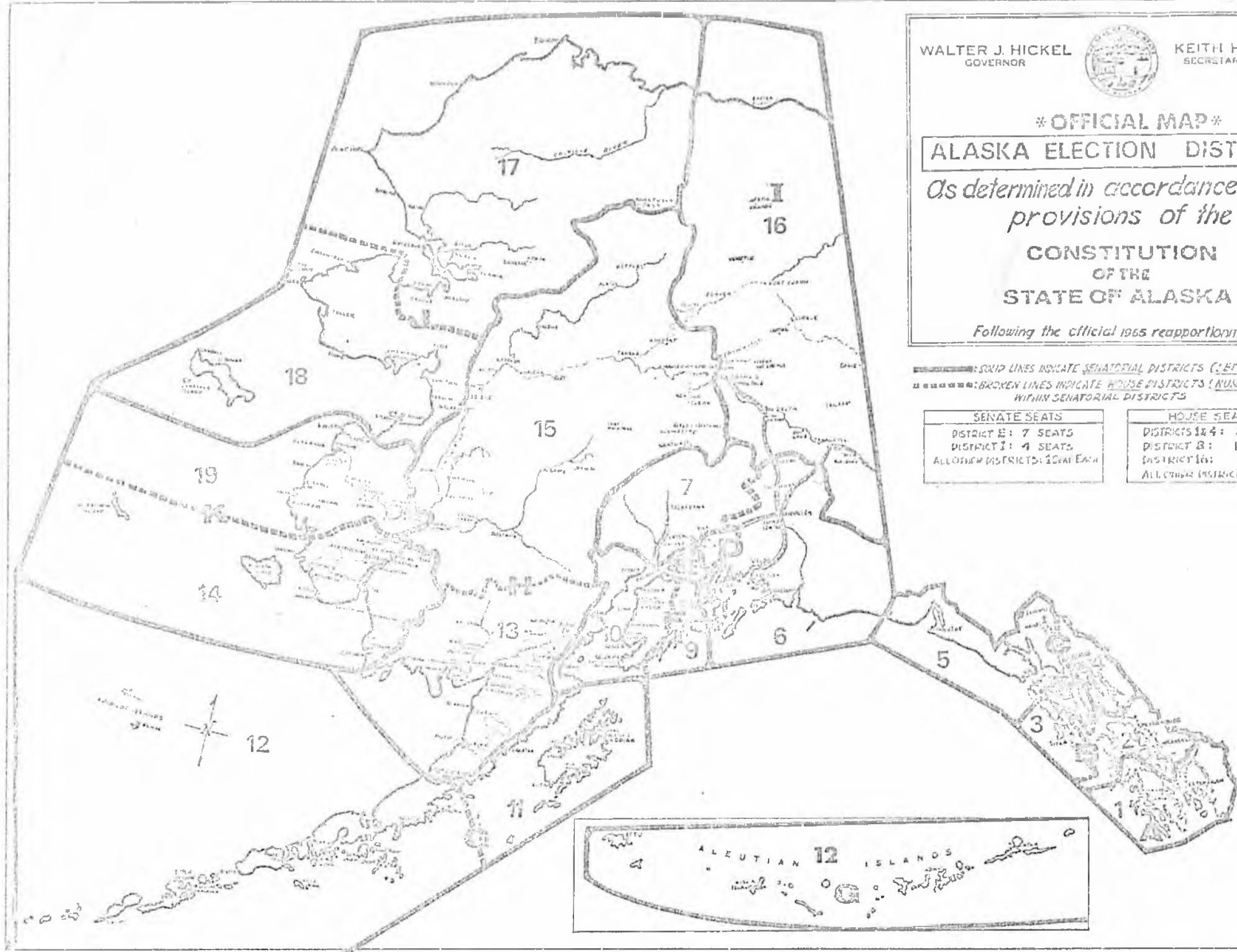

Sec. 14.17.051 Instructional unit allotment. The instructional unit allotment for each school district is as follows:

(1) If the school district is in that part of the state lying within the boundaries of election districts 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 9, and 10 the district shall receive the base instructional unit allotment.

(2) If the school district is in election district 6 and 11 and that part of the state lying south of the Arctic circle in election districts 15 and 16 east of 152° west ^{longitude} the district shall receive 105 per cent of the base allotment.

(3) If the school district is in that part of the state lying within the boundaries of election districts 12, 13, 14, 17, 18, 19 and that part of election districts 15 and 16 north of the Arctic circle the district shall be entitled to 110 per cent of base allotment.

(4) The instructional unit allotment as determined by (1) - (3) of this section for any school district which does not have access to Anchorage, Ketchikan, or Fairbanks, by road, railroad, or ferry, shall be increased by a total of five per cent.

HOUSE BILL NO. 106 am

- 1) HOUSE BILL NO. 106 as introduced was given the effective date of July 16, 1971. This is to allow the salary increase to take effect on the first full pay period of the new fiscal year. The amended version would have the act take effect on July 1, 1971, causing a pay change to occur in mid-pay period. Whatever version is passed should have the July 16 effective date.

- 2) The Administration again has stressed that the implementation of swing and grave yard shift differentials cannot be accomplished immediately. Myrt Charney says they will require at least six months lead time to implement the provisions of the shift differential. This would put the effective date for that portion of the bill, should it survive, at January 16, 1972.

Sec. 39.27.025. SWING AND GRAVEYARD SHIFT DIFFERENTIALS. (a)

Classified and partially exempt state employees who work a "swing" shift (4:00 p.m. - 12:00 midnight or two hours either side of the basic 4:00 p.m. - 12:00 midnight shift) are entitled to a five per cent increase over their normal pay established by this chapter.

(b) Classified and partially exempt state employees who work a "graveyard" shift (12:00 midnight - 8:00 a.m. or two hours either side of the basic 12:00 midnight - 8:00 a.m. shift) are entitled to a 10 per cent increase over their normal pay established by this chapter.

* Sec. 4. It is the intent of the legislature that all permanent employees of the legislative branch of the government shall receive pay increments as comparable as possible to those provided the classified and partially exempt employees in secs. 10 - 20 of this chapter.

* Sec. 5. This Act takes effect July 1, 1971.

Mr. Speaker:

To insure a clear understanding of committee intent, I wish to briefly explain the amendment to HB 106 offered by the House State Affairs Committee.

Section 1 provides for approximately an 8% pay increase, or 3% over the salary survey recommendation. Because of the lag between data accumulation and implementation, a 5% increase will not fully compensate for inflationary losses to real income. An additional upgrading is required to secure the state a favored market position in retaining and attracting quality staffing.

To insure constant technique, the amended table was computed in coordination with the Division of Personnel. This schedule, then, is fully integrated through Range 25. As presently exists, however, Ranges 26 through 28 provide for a 3.75% differential both vertically and horizontally. Recognizing that pecuniary incentives are of lesser importance at these top management ranges, the needed increase, for realizing full integration, of two and three times the average raise is not presently equitable. This amendment then, Mr. Speaker, provides for an 8% increase at all levels.

Section 2 limits statutory redundancy while continuing to provide for the step differentials computed in the original bill. To avoid distortion, we again coordinated drafting with the Division of Personnel.

Section 3 establishes swing and graveyard shift differentials. Long precedent for this principle in the private sector dictates that we adopt similar incentives to remain competitive.

Section 4 finally brings into the fold permanent legislative employees, thus recognizing their contribution as at least par to other state functions.

Sec. 1900010. Liquor tax. Every brewer, distiller, bottler, jobber, retailer, wholesaler, or manufacturer who sells intoxicating liquors in the state or who consigns shipments of intoxicating liquors to the state whether or not the liquors are brewed, distilled, bottled or manufactured in the state, shall pay on all malt beverages (alcoholic content of 12 1/2 per cent or more by volume), wines, and hard or distilled liquors, the following taxes: (1) malt beverages at the rate of 25 cents a gallon, or fraction of a gallon; (2) wine or other liquor of 21 per cent alcohol by volume or less, at the rate of 30 cents a gallon, or fraction of a gallon; and (3) other liquors having a content of more than 21 per cent alcohol by volume at the rate of four dollars a gallon. (§ 35-1-31 ACIA 1949; am § 1 ch 72 SLA 1950; am § 1 ch 61 SLA 1951)

The clear wording of this section leaves little room for interpretation. 1960 Op. Atty. Gen. No. 3.

Taxation and regulation of liquor stores on military reservations.—Alaska can tax retail liquor stores and beverage dispensaries located within military reservations if they do not fall within the exemptions set forth in 2 USC 107. 1960 Op. Atty. Gen. No. 10.

The Alcoholic Beverage Control Board may regulate the sale of intoxicating beverages on military reservations by businesses which are not instrumentalities of the federal government, may require such businesses to obtain retail store or beverage dispensary licenses, may inspect them to determine if they are operating in compliance with the liquor laws of Alaska (subject to restrictions for security reasons), and may take any action authorized by Alaska liquor statutes if they are not doing business in compliance with state liquor laws and regulations. 1960 Op. Atty. Gen. No. 10.

Status of national guard members.

—Members of the national guard of Alaska enjoy no different status than other civilian residents of Alaska as far as Alaska liquor laws are concerned unless they or their units shall have been called into the active service of the United States. 1960 Op. Atty. Gen. No. 10.

Seller at national guard encampment must be licensed.—Intoxicating beverages may only be sold or dispensed at a national guard encampment or installation in Alaska by a licensed beverage dispensary or licensed retail liquor store. 1960 Op. Atty. Gen., No. 10.

Civilian clubs are subject to state liquor laws and regulations and are subject to state revenue laws. 1960 Op. Atty. Gen., No. 10.

Substance of statute determines whether incidence of tax is on Federal instrumentality.—In determining whether a tax is really levied upon the United States or its property in violation of the federal government's constitutional immunity, the United States Supreme Court has looked to the substance

the claimant shall certify in the monthly statement as to the truthfulness of the invoice and quantities upon which the claim or the credit is based. State may not tax instrumentalities of federal government.—It is supervene of the powers of the federal government, and repayment to its paramount authority in this field, for a state to attempt to lay a tax upon the instrumentalities of the federal government. 1960 Op. Atty. Gen., No. 2.

Tax cases which are indirect or remote in their impact are not objectionable. 1960 Op. Atty. Gen., No. 2.

A tax on the instrumentalities of the federal government is not objectionable unless it is a direct and substantial burden on the government or upon the exercise of its legitimate functions. 1960 Op. Atty. Gen., No. 3.

Exemption for sales to federal instrumentalities.—The exemption from the tax on sales to federal instrumentalities in AS 4830.030 is not subject to the 1970 amendment to this section nor be removed without approval of having the amendment declared invalid as contrary to tax of 25 to 30 percent of the total federal government. 1960 Op. Atty. Gen., No. 2.

Construction of "instrumentality" in this section.—The legislature intended instrumentalities of the federal government authorized by laws of Congress and did not intend to include all stores and dispensaries which happen to be located within military reservations. 1960 Op. Atty. Gen., No. 16.

Sec. 4830.030. Delinquency. In the case of a failure to make and file a return and remit the tax within the time prescribed by law or prescribed by the department according to law, unless the failure is due to reasonable cause and not due to wilful neglect, there is added to the tax five per cent for each 30 days or fraction of 30 days during which the failure continues, not exceeding 25 per cent in the aggregate. The amount added to the tax shall be collected at the same time, in the same manner, and as a part of the tax. If the tax has been paid before the discovery of the neglect, the amount added shall be collected in the same manner as the tax. In all cases of delinquency the legal rate of interest shall be assessed. (§ 85-4-32 AOLA 1949; am § 1 ch 70 SLA 1951; § 1 ch 79 SLA 1953; am § 1 ch 42 SLA 1957)

Sec. 4830.040. Administration and enforcement of tax. (a) Each brewer, distiller, bottler, jobber, wholesaler, or manufacturer is primarily liable for the payment of the excise taxes on liquors sold, and shall furnish a good and sufficient surety bond of \$25,000 payable to the Department of Revenue and approved by the Department of Law. If a wholesaler fails to pay the tax to the state he forfeits the bond and his license shall be revoked. The department, in its discretion, may issue permits in place of bonds to resident holders of wholesale, malt beverage, and wine licenses doing business wholly in the state who pay the tax before shipment.
