This letter will serve as a reply to a telephone request from a member of your staff regarding House Bill 218. One point of easy reference regarding this particular bill is to be found on page 298 and 299 of the House Journal for February 23, 1971. Upon receiving this bill for introduction the Honorable Speaker Gene Guess had inserted in the record a letter from the Governor to the Speaker of the House regarding House Bill 218.

As I know you are aware, House Bill 218 has as its intent the lapsing into the general fund of a total of \$29,925,575 in appropriations made last year for state building projects. The bulk of these projects were subsequently funded through the issuance of Alaska State Housing Authority Bonds. A correctional facility planned for Anchorage has also been financed through general obligation bonds approved by the voters. Of the \$32,986,800 appropriated for all of the projects, five projects would remain to be funded. These are:

Barrow Combined Facilities	\$ 450,000
Kalsin Bay Highway Maintenance Shop	204,000
Kotzebue Combined Facilities	323,200
Nome District Highway Complex	1,800,000
Trim Highway Maintenance Shop	284,025

The passage of House Bill 218 would thus return \$29,925,575 to the general fund for other purposes.

The committee on Finance has had House Bill 218 under consideration and a majority of the members of the committee have recommended that it do pass. However, the chair wishes to make a brief statement regarding the progress of the record.

When the project starts, the last session of the legislature appropriated some \$33 million from the general fund to serve as "alternate" financing for 15 state building projects. According to the Governor, \$29,925,575 of this appropriation, representing projects funded through state and from general obligation bond sales, is no longer required. Thus, the amount is lapsed and made available for subsequent appropriation.

The \$3,061,225 remaining from the original appropriation is to be used in accordance with intent expressed in House Journal Supplement No. 20, June 7, 1970, as repeated here:

House Bill 219, if enacted, will appropriate monies from various bond construction funds pursuant to general obligation bond issues approved in the November 1970 General Election. Among these funds is \$10,000,000 for trunk and secondary airport construction. These general obligation bond funds for airport construction will also be matched with Federal aid to airport funds of approximately \$7,683,000. However, these Federal matching funds have not been included for appropriation in any appropriation bill currently before the Legislature.

It has also come to our attention that the Anchorage International Airport Maintenance Complex project, for which funding is requested in House Bill No. 70, was inadvertently included for funding in House Bill No. 58, the General Appropriation Bill, in the amount of \$300,000 Federal funds and \$200,000 International Airport Revenue funds.

It is respectfully requested that Section 9 of House Bill No. 58 be amended to reflect appropriation of \$7,683,000 in Federal funds to the Department of Public Works for trunk and secondary airport projects, and to reflect deletion of the Anchorage International Maintenance Complex project. This would reduce the appropriation for International Airport projects from \$4,012,000 to \$3,512,000, and increase the sub-total for all airport projects from \$4,329,500 to \$11,512,500. The total appropriation to the Department of Public Works under Section 9 would be increased from \$8,676,000 to \$15,859,000. Funding from Federal program receipts to the Department of Public Works would be increased from \$1,122,500 to \$8,505,500.

Your assistance in incorporating these changes into your final version of the General Appropriation's Bill will be sincerely appreciated. Please contact the Division of Budget and Management in this Department if you have any questions concerning this matter.

SUBJECT: Capital Improvements Included in the 1970 Bond Referendum

In programming the school projects in the bond referendum for \$203,000,000, the following factors were considered:

*20,300,000*

1. growth of pupil enrollments at specific locations;
2. replacement of obsolete or inadequate facilities, especially in logging areas;
3. need for space to house special functions such as school lunch programs, physical education, school administration, etc.;
4. increasing the capacity of existing secondary schools to permit more pupils from outlying areas to attend high schools in the State, on a boarding basis;
5. the need to provide new secondary schools for those communities which can support a local high school.

A number of the listed projects have also been submitted to the Bureau of Indian Affairs for funding. In the event the BIA or other funding materializes, additional projects not now programmed would be substituted.

Planning

Planning for Capital Improvements within the Department of Education must, at best, be a difficult undertaking. There are so many communities which require new or improved facilities. The planning must become engulfed in a merit of demands which have built over years of insufficient fundings. How can a priority be set when all projects are needed with the same degree of urgency? This is compounded with land and transportation difficulties, weather, and high costs. From this is required a plan for Capital Improvements - a course of action for the State. This, too, takes great effort as the frantic conditions of the community must be translated into fiscal terms. Hopefully, as money becomes available, the overwhelming nature of the planning will dissipate.

I have completed my review of the submitted portion of your Capital Improvements Plan. It is good to know that the need of so many areas will be met. My awareness of your future plans will be greatly enhanced if I receive some certification. I have carefully reviewed your past and present Capital Improvements Plan and would like to pose the following questions:

1. The Governor's Budget Review Committee completed bond proposals for your Department (based on your Capital Improvement Plan) with subsequent legislative and voter approval. The current list of facilities to be built or improved using the bond issue funds is highly different from the one requested. The original and new lists are compared below:

- a. In reviewing your old Capital Improvements Plan, I find no mention of any of the added projects. May I ask why they were not included and why they now have priority?
  - b. Several projects were dropped from the original list and do not appear in your plan as future projects. May I ask why they are no longer considered and why they at one time had priority?
  - c. Why are we now paying the federal portion of the Galena Elementary School Project? Your September 9 memo to John Beard lists the entire amount which makes the bond total the precise amount. Your 01-200 leaves the State share at \$200,000 which would reduce the bond total by \$800,000.
  - d. There appears to be two separate projects (besides the Bethel-St. Mary's Regional School Project) for the Bethel Regional School, one listed under State Operated Schools. Could they have been combined? Does the State Operated School Division include the Bethel Regional School? If not, did you accomplish transfer of funds?
  - e. The amount assigned to several projects at the time they were reviewed last year has now doubled, or nearly so. May I have an explanation regarding that? The Anchorage addition, for example, went from \$1,000,000 to \$2,025,000.
2. The Legislature increased the General Fund appropriations for Capital Improvements by \$6,296,900 (over twice as much). The new list of projects raises three questions:

November 30, 1970

- a. In reviewing your old Capital Improvement Plan, I find only two of the added projects listed, and one was noted as all federal. May I ask why the new projects were not included and why they now have priority? Why did we lose St. Paul's Federal money?
- b. The Delta Sewage System, The Healy Classroom, and The Amber Elementary School addition were dropped from the projects approved for general funds. They do not appear as future projects, though the Healy Project may be included in the bond issue. Please explain why they are not considered and why they, at one time, had priority.
- c. The relocatable classrooms listed in the Old Capital Improvements Plan and added to the General Fund appropriation do not seem to be included in your general funds projects. Do the relocatables added to the bond issue cover the ones originally meant for general funds? If so, was the extra money transferred to other projects?

Thank you very much for assisting me with this information. With it I can present any recommendations to the Governor's Review Committee in a much more knowledgeable way. Please review the instructions for the preparation of your Capital Improvements Budget and Plan. This will greatly assist future analysis. Thank you again.
