

# MORANDUM

SUBJECT: Report on effect and

The election supervisors from the four areas met with the director and myself in Anchorage January 7 and 8, 1972. The aim of this meeting was to provide the office of the Governor with information concerning the handling of reapportionment in the elections offices and the estimated additional cost.

The following conclusions were reached and agreed upon by the six who were in attendance:

1. In the process of reapportionment there will be approximately 100,000 voter registration cards to be handled. Statewide originals will be handled by the Juneau office. The district copies will be handled in the respective supervisor's offices. Much of the work of transferring from one district and precinct to a new district and precinct can be handled by the computer, but changing original, district, and precinct numbers on the forms will have to be done manually and in a given short period of time. This will necessitate additional temporary help and in some cases, additional space to work.
2. The Anchorage supervisor's area consists of densely populated districts and the work load of that office should be relieved somewhat and shared by an additional full time employee, working as an Administrative Assistant I and located in Kodiak to serve the new districts 13 and 14. This employee would report to the Anchorage supervisor as mail communications are established on a good schedule through the Anchorage area. A part time employee hired June 1 through November 30 would be located in Billingham to serve the Bristol Bay area. This employee would serve as a Clerk I and work only the above dates in election years. She would also report to the Anchorage supervisor.
3. The Northwest supervisor's area would be increased to include the old district 14 and it was decided that a part time employee for Bethel, to serve as the above described for Billingham, would be an asset and helpful to the Northwest supervisor. This employee would be hired as a Clerk I.

4. The Southeast area could be served on the same basis with Clerk I located in Sitka and one in Ketchikan to serve outlying areas in the district during the period June 1 to November 30 in election years.
5. Printing cost will include provisions for voter acknowledgement cards and envelopes, plus a cover letter of explanation to go out with reissued cards. Postage for mailing the new registration cards will be necessary. A supply of maps showing the reapportionment boundaries must also be available in this office.

The mailing of supplies, etc., during an election year are monumental and it was agreed that the establishment of the suboffices would almost pay for themselves in freight and postage alone, notwithstanding relieving the heavy work load of each supervisor.

A map designating the areas of responsibility of the supervisors is submitted in support of the plan. Included is a mail schedule from the Aleutian Chain area to Anchorage. The total estimated additional cost for reapportionment is \$90,000. This averages 90¢ apiece to handle the 100,000 forms.



SUBJECT: Report on effect and additional cost to Division of Elections as a result of reapportionment.

The election supervisors from the four areas met with the director and myself in Anchorage January 7 and 8, 1972. The aim of this meeting was to provide the office of the Governor with information concerning the handling of reapportionment in the elections offices and the estimated additional cost.

The following conclusions were reached and agreed upon by the six who were in attendance:

1. In the process of reapportionment there will be approximately 100,000 voter registration cards to be handled. Statewide originals will be handled by the Juneau office. The district copies will be handled in the respective supervisor's offices. Much of the work of transferring from one district and precinct to a new district and precinct can be handled by the computer, but changing original, district, and precinct numbers on the forms will have to be done manually and in a given short period of time. This will necessitate additional temporary help and in some cases, additional space to work.
2. The Anchorage supervisor's area consists of densely populated districts and the work load of that office should be relieved somewhat and shared by an additional full time employee, working as an Administrative Assistant I and located in Kodiak to serve the new districts 13 and 14. This employee would report to the Anchorage supervisor as mail communications are established on a good schedule through the Anchorage area. A part time employee hired June 1 through November 30 would be located in Dillingham to serve the Bristol Bay area. This employee would serve as a Clerk I and work only the above dates in election years. She would also report to the Anchorage supervisor.
3. The Northwest supervisor's area would be increased to include the old district 14 and it was decided that a part time employee for Bethel, to serve as the above described for Dillingham, would be an asset and helpful to the Northwest supervisor. This employee would be hired as a Clerk I.

4. The Southeast area could be served on the same basis with Clerk I located in Sitka and one in Ketchikan to serve outlying areas in the district during the period June 1 to November 30 in election years.
5. Printing cost will include provisions for voter acknowledgement cards and envelopes, plus a cover letter of explanation to go out with reissued cards. Postage for mailing the new registration cards will be necessary. A supply of maps showing the reapportionment boundaries must also be available in this office.

The mailing of supplies, etc., during an election year are monumental and it was agreed that the establishment of the suboffices would almost pay for themselves in freight and postage alone, notwithstanding relieving the heavy work load of each supervisor.

A map designating the areas of responsibility of the supervisors is submitted in support of the plan. Included is a mail schedule from the Aleutian Chain area to Anchorage. The total estimated additional cost for reapportionment is \$90,000. This averages 90¢ apiece to handle the 100,000 forms.
