5 A BILL

6 For an Act entitled: "An Act relating to historic preservation."

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

8 \* Section 1. AS 41 is amended by adding a new chapter to read:

9 CHAPTER 35. ALASKA HISTORIC PRESERVATION ACT.

10 Sec. 41.35.010. DECLARATION OF PURPOSE. The legislature is  
11 concerned about the fact that the most recent past has seen the neglect,  
12 desecration, loss and destruction of the historic, prehistoric and  
13 archeological resources of Alaska with a resulting loss to the people  
14 of the state of knowledge concerning their heritage. The legislature  
15 determines that the public has an interest in the preservation of all  
16 historic, prehistoric and archeological resources for their scientific  
17 and historical information and value and that the public has a right  
18 to the knowledge to be derived from the study of these resources.  
19 The legislature finds and declares that the historic, prehistoric and  
20 archeological resources of the state are properly the subject of con-  
21 certed and coordinated efforts exercised on behalf of the general  
22 welfare of the public in order that these resources may be located,  
23 preserved, studied, exhibited and evaluated.

24 Sec. 41.35.020. TITLE TO HISTORIC, PREHISTORIC AND ARCHEOLOGICAL  
25 RESOURCES; LOCAL DISPLAY. (a) The State of Alaska reserves to itself  
26 title to all historic, prehistoric and archeological resources situated  
27 on land owned or controlled by the state, including tidelands and sub-  
28 merged lands, and reserves to itself the exclusive right of field  
29 archeology on state-owned or controlled lands. However, nothing in

1 this chapter diminishes the cultural rights and responsibilities of  
2 persons of aboriginal descent or infringes upon their right of posses-  
3 sion and use of those resources which may be considered of historic,  
4 prehistoric or archeological value.

5 (b) Although title to historic, prehistoric and archeological  
6 resources is in the State of Alaska, local cultural groups may obtain  
7 from the state, or retain, for study or display, artifacts and other  
8 items of these resources from their respective cultures or areas if  
9 the advisory committee created in sec. 110 of this chapter finds that  
10 (1) the group has a durable building with weatherproof and fireproof  
11 construction and humidity control and other factors necessary to serve  
12 as a museum which will assure safe preservation of the items, (2) the  
13 item sought to be obtained is not one for which there is an undue risk  
14 of damage during transportation, and (3) the item sought to be obtained  
15 or retained is not one requiring special treatment or care beyond the  
16 ability or means of the group requesting it. A group retaining such  
17 an item or obtaining one from the state shall house it in the museum  
18 building and shall make every reasonable effort to assure its safe  
19 preservation. If the advisory committee finds that a local cultural  
20 group is not properly taking care of an item the group shall return it  
21 to the department.

22 Sec. 41.35.030. DESIGNATION OF MONUMENTS AND HISTORIC SITES. Upon  
23 the recommendation of the Historic Sites Advisory Committee, the gover-  
24 nor may declare by public order any particular historic, prehistoric  
25 or archeological structure, deposit, site or other object of scientific  
26 or historic interest that is situated on land owned or controlled by  
27 the state to be a state monument or historic site and he may designate  
28 as a part of the monument or site as much land as is considered  
29 necessary for the proper access, care and management of the object or

1 site to be protected. When an object or site is situated on land held  
2 in private ownership, it may be declared a state monument or historic  
3 site in the same manner, with the written consent of the owner.

4 Sec. 41.35.040. ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCIAL SUPPORT OF MONUMENTS  
5 AND HISTORIC SITES. State-owned monuments, sites and other historic,  
6 prehistoric or archeological properties owned or purchased by the state  
7 are under the control of the Department of Natural Resources and their  
8 maintenance shall be covered in the appropriations made to that depart-  
9 ment. Privately-owned state monuments or historic sites are eligible  
10 to receive state support for their maintenance if they are kept acces-  
11 sible to the general public and application for support is made in  
12 conformity with regulations adopted by the commissioner of natural  
13 resources.

14 Sec. 41.35.050. REGULATIONS. The commissioner of natural resources  
15 shall adopt regulations to carry out the purposes of this chapter.

16 Sec. 41.35.060. POWER TO ACQUIRE HISTORIC, PREHISTORIC, OR  
17 ARCHEOLOGICAL PROPERTIES. (a) The department, with the recommendation  
18 of the Historic Sites Advisory Committee, may acquire real and personal  
19 properties that have statewide historic, prehistoric, or archeological  
20 significance by gift, purchase, devise or bequest. The department  
21 shall preserve and administer property so acquired. The department  
22 may acquire property adjacent to the property having historic, pre-  
23 historic or archeological significance when it is determined to be  
24 necessary for the proper use and administration of the significant  
25 property.

26 (b) If an historic, prehistoric or archeological property which  
27 has been found by the department, upon the recommendation of the  
28 Historic Sites Advisory Committee, to be important for state ownership  
29 is in danger of being sold or used so that its historic, prehistoric

1 or archeological value will be destroyed or seriously impaired, or is  
2 otherwise in danger of destruction or serious impairment, the department  
3 may establish the use of the property in a manner necessary to preserve  
4 its historic, prehistoric or archeological character or value. If the  
5 owner of the property does not wish to follow the restrictions of the  
6 department, the department may acquire the property by eminent domain  
7 under AS 09.55.240 - 09.55.460.

8 Sec. 41.35.070. PRESERVATION OF HISTORIC, PREHISTORIC AND  
9 ARCHEOLOGICAL RESOURCES THREATENED BY PUBLIC CONSTRUCTION. (a) The  
10 department in cooperation with the state archeologist shall locate,  
11 identify and preserve in suitable records information regarding historic  
12 prehistoric and archeological sites, locations and remains. The infor-  
13 mation shall be submitted to the heads of the executive departments of  
14 the state.

15 (b) Before any public construction or public improvement of any  
16 nature is undertaken by the state, or a governmental agency of the  
17 state or by a private person under contract with or licensed by the  
18 state or governmental agency of the state, the information required  
19 under (a) of this section shall be consulted by the appropriate agency  
20 or person to determine if the area to be affected by the public con-  
21 struction or improvement contains listed historic, prehistoric or  
22 archeological sites, locations or remains. If the affected area con-  
23 tains listed sites, locations or remains, the proposed public construc-  
24 tion or improvement may not be commenced, or, in the event it has  
25 already begun, continued, until the Department of Natural Resources  
26 and the state archeologist are advised of the construction or improve-  
27 ment and the concurrence of the department in the project is secured.

28 (c) If the department does not concur because the listed site,  
29 location or remains will be adversely affected by the public construction

1 or improvement, it shall perform the necessary investigation, recording  
2 and salvage of the site, location or remains.

3 (d) If in the course of performing public construction or improve-  
4 ments, historic, prehistoric or archeological sites, locations, remains  
5 or objects are discovered, the department and the state archeologist  
6 shall be notified and the concurrence of the department shall be  
7 requested in continuing the construction or improvement. Upon receipt  
8 of this notice, the department and the state archeologist shall survey  
9 the area to determine whether the area contains historic, prehistoric  
10 or archeological data which should be preserved in the public interest.  
11 The survey shall be conducted as expeditiously as possible. If, as  
12 a result of the survey, it is determined that (1) such data exists  
13 in the area, (2) the data has exceptional historic, prehistoric or  
14 archeological significance, and should be collected and preserved in  
15 the public interest, and (3) it is feasible to collect and preserve  
16 the data, the department shall perform the necessary work to collect  
17 and preserve the data. This work shall be performed as expeditiously  
18 as possible.

19 (e) If the concurrence of the department, required under (b),  
20 (c) and (d) of this section, is not obtained after 90 days from the  
21 filing of a request for concurrence of the department to proceed with  
22 the project, the agency or person performing the construction or  
23 improvement may apply to the governor for permission to proceed without  
24 the concurrence of the department and the governor may take the action  
25 he considers best in overruling or sustaining the department.

26 Sec. 41.35.080. NOTICE REQUIRED BY PRIVATE PERSON. Before any  
27 construction, alteration or improvement of any nature is undertaken on  
28 a privately-owned, officially designated state monument or historic  
29 site by any person, he shall give the department and the state

1 archeologist three months notice of intention to construct on, alter or  
2 improve it. Before the expiration of the three-month notification  
3 period, the department shall either begin eminent domain proceedings  
4 under sec. 50(b) of this chapter or undertake or permit the recording  
5 and salvaging of any historic, prehistoric or archeological information  
6 considered necessary.

7 Sec. 41.35.090. PERMITS. The commissioner, with the advice and  
8 recommendation of the state archeologist, may issue a permit for the  
9 investigation, excavation, gathering or removal from the natural state,  
10 of any historic, prehistoric or archeological resources of the state.  
11 A permit may be issued only to persons or organizations qualified to  
12 make the investigations, excavations, gatherings or removals and only  
13 if the results of these authorized activities will be made available to  
14 the general public through institutions and museums interested in  
15 disseminating knowledge on the subjects involved. If the historic,  
16 prehistoric or archeological resource involved is one which is, or is  
17 located on a site which is, sacred, holy or of religious significance  
18 to a cultural group, the consent of that cultural group must be obtained  
19 before a permit may be issued under this section.

20 Sec. 41.35.100. EXCAVATION AND REMOVAL OF HISTORIC, PREHISTORIC  
21 OR ARCHEOLOGICAL REMAINS ON PRIVATE LANDS. Before any historic, pre-  
22 historic or archeological remains are excavated or removed from private  
23 lands by the department or the state archeologist, the written approval  
24 of the owner shall first be secured. When the value of the private  
25 land is diminished by the excavation or removal, the owner of the land  
26 shall be compensated for the loss at a monetary sum mutually agreed on  
27 by the department and the owner or at a monetary sum set by the court.

28 Sec. 41.35.110. HISTORIC SITES ADVISORY COMMITTEE. There is  
29 created in the Department of Natural Resources the Historic Sites

1 Advisory Committee.

2 Sec. 41.35.120. COMPOSITION OF COMMITTEE. The committee consists  
3 of the following persons:

4 (1) one representative from the Alaska State Museum;

5 (2) one representative from the University of Alaska Museum;

6 (3) the state archeologist;

7 (4) four persons with professionally relevant backgrounds  
8 appointed to represent each of the following fields: history, archi-  
9 tecture, geology and natural history;

10 (5) one representative of the Alaska Historical Society;

11 (6) the commissioner of natural resources;

12 (7) the state liaison officer appointed under the National  
13 Historic Preservation Act of 1966, Public Law 89-665, as an ex officio  
14 member without vote; and

15 (8) five persons appointed to represent each of the following  
16 cultural groups: Aleut, Athapaskan, Northern Eskimo, Southern Eskimo,  
17 and Southeastern Alaskan Indian.

18 Sec. 41.35.130. APPOINTMENT OF MEMBERS. Members of the committee  
19 are appointed by the governor and confirmed by the legislature meeting  
20 in joint session.

21 Sec. 41.35.140. TERM OF MEMBERSHIP. The term of office for a  
22 member of the committee is three years, except for those who are members  
23 by virtue of their positions with the state. They serve for as  
24 long as they remain in the position by virtue of which they are members  
25 of the committee. A member appointed to fill a vacancy serves for the  
26 unexpired term of the member he succeeds. Of those members listed under  
27 sec. 120(1), (2), (4) and (5), upon initial appointment, two shall  
28 serve for one year, three for two years, and two for three years.

29 Sec. 41.35.150. COMPENSATION. The members of the committee serve

1 without compensation but are entitled to per diem and travel expenses  
2 authorized by law for other boards and commissions.

3 Sec. 41.35.160. OFFICERS. At the first meeting of each year,  
4 the committee shall elect a chairman from among its members.

5 Sec. 41.35.170. MEETINGS AND QUORUM. The committee shall meet  
6 at least twice a year. Additional meetings may be called by the chair-  
7 man or by petition of at least five members. Five members of the com-  
8 mittee constitute a quorum.

8 \* Section 1. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS. The legislature finds that

9 (1) there is a need to build public response to the problems con-  
10 fronting Alaska's population, specifically young people, so that maximum  
11 community and human resources are mobilized to provide services for youth and  
12 to assure them their full rights as human beings;

13 (2) there exists a demand within the state for development oppor-  
14 tunities for children and lay and expert opinions hold that the availability  
15 of child development experience can be a significant and positive factor in  
16 the development of adult personality, talent and character;

17 (3) too little is known about the optimum type and content of this  
18 experience and in fact realizes that there may be no optimum, but rather a  
19 need for a variety of programs tailored to fit the needs of children from  
20 diverse backgrounds;

21 (4) because Alaska is geographically remote from major United States  
22 population centers where much existing research is in process in the field  
23 of child development, it is vital that Alaska provide various diverse models  
24 for child development and that there needs to be established a clearinghouse  
25 for the exchange of information and ideas, and periodic state conferences on  
26 child development, and that progress be made toward periodic evaluation of  
27 model projects in this field; and

28 (5) availability of child development programs will permit more  
29 parents to participate in the economic life of the community, will thus make

1 available new talent in our economic life, and will relieve some households  
2 from a cycle of economic dependency upon government.

4 CHAPTER 45. OFFICE OF CHILD ADVOCACY.

5 Sec. 47.45.010. OFFICE OF CHILD ADVOCACY. There is created in the  
6 Office of the Governor the Office of Child Advocacy to act as a coordin-  
7 ating body for services for children from prenatal to age 18. The Office  
8 of Child Advocacy is administered by a director appointed by the board of  
9 directors with the approval of the governor. Staff may be employed in  
10 accordance with appropriate budgets.

11 Sec. 47.45.020. BOARD OF DIRECTORS FOR THE OFFICE OF CHILD  
12 ADVOCACY. There is created a board of directors for the Office of Child  
13 Advocacy. The board consists of the Alaska State Council on the Coordin-  
14 ation of Community Child Care plus four members not more than 18 years  
15 of age appointed by the governor for a term of two years each, or until  
16 the youthful member attains the age of 19 years.

17 Sec. 47.45.030. POWERS AND DUTIES OF BOARD AND DIRECTOR. (a) The  
18 board of directors for the Office of Child Advocacy shall determine policy  
19 and establish program priorities, and shall serve as a child advocacy  
20 agency in the state. The board shall

21 (1) coordinate public and private programs and priorities  
22 which affect children and child development;

23 (2) develop guidelines to improve children and child develop-  
24 ment services throughout the state, including the development of program  
25 standards, training for paraprofessionals and professional personnel and  
26 and monitoring and evaluation procedures;

27 (3) assist local communities in the initiation of children and  
28 child development programs including information about pertinent legisla-  
29 tion and funding and consultant resources;

1 (4) identify, coordinate and develop a comprehensive plan for  
2 the use of public and private resources, including the services of  
3 volunteers;

4 (5) provide leadership in recommending legislative change  
5 which affects the provision of children and child development services;  
6 review existing state policies as they relate to, and affect the legal  
7 status and well-being of children;

8 (6) develop innovative approaches for involving parent-  
9 consumers on both the state and local level in program planning and  
10 policy making.

11 (b) The director shall carry out the policies and programs set out  
12 by the board of directors.

13 Sec. 47.45.040. COMPENSATION AND EXPENSES. Members of the board  
14 or directors for the Office of Child Advocacy receive no salary, but are  
15 entitled to per diem and travel expenses authorized by law for other  
16 boards and commissions.

17 Sec. 47.45.045. AUTHORITY TO ADMINISTER FUNDS.

18 The Office of Child Advocacy may administer grants the legislature  
19 may from time to time appropriate for educational or day care programs  
20 not otherwise funded by the state, and has the authority to act as an  
21 agency for disbursing federal funds for educational or day care programs.  
22 Nothing in this section shall be construed to be in derogation of the  
23 provisions of Chapter 95, SLA 1971.

24 Sec. 47.45.050. DEPARTMENTS TO ASSIST OFFICE OF CHILD ADVOCACY. The  
25 Department of Health and Social Services, the Department of Education,  
26 the Department of Labor and all other departments and agencies of the  
27 state which have programs or services pertaining to children shall coop-  
28 erate with the Office of Child Advocacy and shall furnish technical  
29 assistance and personnel, if available, upon request.



The Department of Education has requested authorization to reallocate funds between appropriations, receive and expend program receipts of \$30,700 and establish two PFT positions for the Professional Teaching Practices Commission (PTPC).

The PTPC plans to exercise its authority (granted by Chapter <sup>77</sup>~~72~~, SLA 1972 - AS 14.20.470) to appoint an executive secretary. To cover the additional costs of a professional staff and permanent office, the Commission has increased teacher certification fees from \$10 to \$30 and \$5 to \$10. This has increased the total anticipated FY 74 receipts from Teachers' certificates from \$14,300 to \$45,000. The Department proposes to establish a new budget unit for the PTPC, funded by \$14,300 transferred from the Executive Administration (Advisory Commissions) appropriation and \$30,700 of new program receipts.





1. The total funding of two new positions, office support, and anticipated PTPC activities is from annual teacher certification fees of \$45,000.
2. The \$45,000 will fund the PTPC for six months only during FY 74. The new positions will be deleted December 31, 1973 unless new funds become available.
3. FY 75 projections anticipate that an additional \$45,000 in general funds will be required to operate the program on a 12-month budget of \$90,000.
4. The House Finance Committee Report on SB 126, which became Ch. 77, SLA 1972, stated that "any increase in appropriations required to fund this program be covered by an increase in fees for teacher certification."
5. The fiscal note for SB 126 indicated that the total annual cost of adding the Executive Secretary office would be \$51,900. This increased cost was to be totally covered by \$52,500 in receipts due to the \$25 additional cost per certificate for 2,100 certificates.

Based upon this information, it appears that RP 74-7 does not comply with the legislative fiscal intent attached to the authorizing legislation.



Chapter 98 SLA 1966 created a Professional Teaching Practices Commission to be funded by members of the profession, including an increase in teacher certification fees (AS 14.20.370-510). Chapter 77 SLA 1972 gave the commission the power to appoint an executive secretary (AS 14.20.470).

The Department of Education, through the Administrative Procedures Act, has increased teacher certification fees from \$10 to \$30 for regular five-year certificates and from \$5.00 to \$10 for other types of certificates. This change in fees is estimated to bring a total of \$45,000 into the Department for Professional Teaching Practices Commission activities. The FY-74 Department budget has a program receipt based on teacher certification fees of \$14,300, leaving an additional \$30,700 as new program receipts.

June 6, 1973 the Professional Teaching Practices Commission took action to establish an office and staff with an executive secretary. The purpose of this revised program request is to adjust the Executive Administration BRU downward by \$14,300 and establish a new unit for PTPC at \$45,000 total for an increase of \$30,700 based on new receipts.
