FISCAL ANALYSIS

The funding for House Bill 18 and Senate Bill 27 is based on an estimate prepared for 1970. Estimated costs for 1971 would be as follows:

1. Construction	\$1,100,000
2. Equipment & Furnishings	80,000
3. Design	88,000
4. Design-Div. of Buildings	8,000
5. Travel	5,000
6. Inspection	40,000
7. Contingency	44,000
	<u>\$1,365,000</u>

The total project under House Bill No. 18 and Senate Bill No. 27 adds approximately 17,000 square feet of space to the existing structure. By the addition of the 17,000 square feet, the total complex, as designed, would be complete. This funding does not include the managerial residence, as proposed by the schematic phase of the Fairbanks Pioneer's Home, nor does it include equipment allowances. Equipment would include beds, other furniture, linens, dishes, portable x-ray equipment, etc.

House Bill No. 24 provides for funding the amount of \$2,000,000. It is believed, though, without verifications that the difference between the funding required and construction that the excess would be for equipment.





SUBJECT: Senate Bill 82

My staff and I have reviewed Senate Bill 82 and have determined that this legislation will not result in direct obligation or expenditure of state funds.

Boroughs and cities which possibly would undertake the exercise of public transit authority could avail themselves of per capita revenue sharing (\$5/capita) under AS 43.18.010(6).

Apparently, the primary purpose of this bill is to provide for first class city authority in regard to transit operations there- by enabling second class organized boroughs to acquire this function on an areawide basis. Organized boroughs of the first and second class are restricted to the areawide and non-areawide exercise of powers accorded to first class cities.

The Greater Anchorage Area Borough has recently begun investi- gations on the adoption of transit authority on an areawide basis and Senate Bill 82 is the initial step in the process.

We have also consulted the catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance and have determined that federal Urban Mass Transportation Capital Improvement Grants are available to local governments which apply with a matching ratio of two-thirds local and one- third federal with no requirement for state support.
