8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

9 \* Section 1. AS 43.50.190(a) is amended to read:

10 (a) There is levied an excise tax of three [ONE] and one-half  
11 mills on each cigarette imported or acquired in this state.

12 \* Sec. 2. TRANSITIONAL CIGARETTE INVENTORY TAX. (a) There is levied a  
13 tax of three and one-half mills on all cigarettes which on July 1, 1972 are  
14 in the possession, control, or inventories of licensees and retailers who  
15 are not licensees. A credit shall be given for taxes previously paid under  
16 AS 43.50.190(a) on cigarettes subject to the tax imposed by this section.

17 (b) Each licensee or retailer within 20 days after July 1, 1972 shall  
18 file a report with the department, in such form as the department may  
19 prescribe, showing the amount of cigarettes in his possession, control or  
20 inventories on July 1, 1972 and the amount of tax due thereon.

21 (c) The tax imposed by this section shall be due and payable within 20  
22 days after July 1, 1972. The penalties established in AS 43.50 apply to

Dear Mr. President:

Pursuant to the Uniform Rules of the Legislature,  
I am submitting a bill which increases the cigarette  
tax from eight cents to twelve cents per pack. The  
increase will yield an estimated \$1,809,300 for the  
general fund for Fiscal Year 1973.

We have studied the taxation of cigarettes in other  
states and find that seventeen states tax at a rate  
higher than twelve cents per pack and twenty-five  
states tax at a rate of twelve cents or more. The  
proposed legislation would bring us up to the median  
for all states.

SUBJECT: Senate Bill No. 275, amended  
 Cigarette Tax

At present there are two excise tax levies on cigarettes as follows:

1. A 2-1/2 mill tax on each cigarette imported or acquired in the State (equivalent to 5¢ per package). This tax imposition is provided for under AS 43.50.090 (a) and has been in effect since 1955 (Chapter 187, SLA 1955). Proceeds from this portion of the cigarette tax are paid into the "School Fund" for rehabilitation, construction, repair of the State's school facilities, and for costs of insurance on buildings comprising school facilities during the rehabilitation, construction, and repair, and for the life of the buildings.
2. A 1-1/2 mill tax on each cigarette imported or acquired in the State (equivalent to 3¢ per package). This tax imposition is provided for under AS 43.50.190 (a) and has been in effect since 1961 (Chapter 53, SLA 1961). Proceeds from this portion of the cigarette tax are paid into the General Fund.

Accordingly, the State of Alaska, at present, imposes a total tax on cigarettes imported or acquired in the State of 4 mills per cigarette (equivalent to 8¢ per package). This 8¢ per package tax has been in effect, without change, since 1961.

Senate Bill No. 275, amended, provides for an increase in the levy on that portion of the tax that is paid into the General Fund. By amending AS 43.50.190 (a) to read 3-1/2 mills on each cigarette imported or acquired in the State from the present 1-1/2 mill rate, the additional two mill tax will equate to a 4¢ per package increase, or a new total tax of 12¢ per package, with the increased revenue being paid into the General Fund.

Attached is a schedule that indicates the estimated additional revenues to be received and paid into the General Fund with the additional 4¢ per package increase provided for in Senate Bill No. 275, amended, for the fiscal years 1973 through 1977. Such information is underlined on the schedule and captioned "Code 102--4¢ additional tax--General Fund."

There is also attached a chart showing State cigarette tax rates, discount rates allowed wholesalers, and monetary value of discount allowed wholesalers on case of 600 packs. The information was transcribed from the publications of the Tobacco Merchants Association of the United States as of September 1, 1971.

Such chart will indicate that if Alaska's cigarette tax were raised from the present 8¢ per package rate to 12¢ per package that 26 states including Alaska would have a cigarette tax rate of 12¢ or more per package--and that 17 states would have a higher cigarette tax rate than would Alaska at 12¢ per package. Senate Bill No. 275, amended, would bring Alaska to about the median for all states as concerns taxation of cigarettes.

Since the bill, as amended, passed the Senate on February 16, 1972, I have received correspondence from attorneys representing the Alaska wholesalers and have had inquiries from other Alaska wholesalers on apparent inequities and/or omissions in the present bill.

I shall pass on to you and the members of your committee in a summary form for consideration as committee amendments the two items of concern to the Alaska wholesalers of cigarettes:

1. The general rule for filing returns and paying the tax is found in AS 43.50.080 (a). A special rule, provided by AS 43.50.080 (b) applies to certain wholesaler-distributors who pay the tax when the cigarettes are sold rather than upon acquisition or importation into Alaska. Logically, Senate Bill No. 275, amended, imposes a transitional cigarette inventory tax to collect the additional two mills from all persons who have cigarettes for sale in their possession on July 1, 1972--however, Senate Bill No. 275, amended, fails to consider the plight of those persons (wholesaler-distributors) who report and pay the tax under AS 43.50.080 (b) on the sales basis.

In this case, the wholesaler-distributor who pays the tax on a sales basis rather than upon acquisition or importation has a valid argument against the imposition of the transitional cigarette inventory tax for the reason that all cigarettes sold by him on or after the effective date of the Act will be sold at the new rate of 12¢ per package and tax paid accordingly.

In order to correct this apparent inequity, the following proposed amendment is offered for consideration by your committee--under Sec. 2 TRANSITIONAL CIGARETTE INVENTORY TAX add

- (d) This transitional cigarette inventory tax is not applicable to those persons holding a wholesaler distributor license under AS 43.50.035 who file monthly returns and pay the cigarette taxes based on the number of cigarettes sold as provided for in AS 43.50.080 (b).

For your information, the Transitional Cigarette Inventory Tax commonly called a floor stock tax is employed consistently by other states at the time when an increase in the tax rate is effected. This prohibits the wholesaler or retailer from profiteering at the time of the increase. This was not done in 1961 when the tax rate was changed from 5¢ to 8¢ per package with the result that in general retailers loaded up on cigarette inventories before the increase at the old tax rate--then sold same with increased prices after the effective date and pocketed the difference.

2. Several wholesalers who contacted the writer stated that they were not in opposition to the bill as the tax raise would be passed on to the retailers and to the ultimate consumers. They did, however, indicate in reviewing the charts of State tax rates and discount rates allowed wholesalers and monetary discounts allowed wholesalers that while it was obvious that a great number of cigarette tax rate increases had occurred in the past 15 years by almost all states--that correspondingly the states imposing the tax increases had in general allowed the wholesalers higher discount rates in the collection of the taxes, due in general to higher costs of doing business in the past 15 years.

It was pointed out by the Alaska wholesalers that when the Cigarette Tax Act was created by the passage of Chapter 187, SLA 1955 the cigarette tax rate was 5¢ per package and that the wholesalers were allowed to deduct 1% of the total tax due each month which was to be retained by the wholesaler to cover his expense of accounting and filing returns. Prior to 1955 the cigarette tax was collected at the retail level and caused the then Territory no end of problems in auditing and collecting from every drug store, grocery store, vendor and the like. Since 1955 the bulk of the tax collections are received from the Alaska wholesalers who collect the tax from similarly the drug stores, retailers and vendors and remit same to the State.

It was pointed out that in 1961 when the cigarette tax rate was increased from 5¢ to 8¢ per package no increase was made in the discount allowed the wholesalers and that today the discount rate is still 1%. The Alaskan wholesalers indicated that if the tax rate were to be further increased to 12¢ per package that their business costs would increase as their inventories on an acquired basis of paying the tax would increase in value and that their accounts receivable with retailers would increase in value. The wholesalers indicated that a 3% discount rate would be more in line with discounts allowed wholesalers in other states, considering the cost of doing business in Alaska.

The present discount rate allowed wholesalers for in essence collecting and paying the tax is provided in AS 43.50.090 (a) and is the same as it was originally in 1955 at one per cent.

10 \* Section 1. AS 43 is amended by adding a new chapter to read:

11 CHAPTER 56. OIL AND GAS TRANSPORTATION PROPERTY TAX.

12 Sec. 43.56.010. LEVY OF TAX. (a) An annual tax of 20 mills is  
13 levied each tax year beginning January 1, 1973 on the full and true  
14 value of taxable real and tangible personal property used or designed  
15 for use in the transportation of unrefined oil and gas.

16 (b) Property taxable under this chapter does not include property  
17 employed in the construction of facilities taxable under this chapter  
18 as distinct from the facilities themselves; however, with respect to  
19 pipelines and other facilities taxable under this chapter which may  
20 be under construction or awaiting construction, full and true value

20          Sec. 43.56.050. STATE ASSESSMENT REVIEW BOARD. The governor  
21 shall appoint at least five qualified persons to serve at his

23 except that, upon initial appointment, two members serve for one year,  
24 two members serve for two years, and one member serves for three  
25 years. A member appointed by the governor to fill a vacancy serves

In order to stay within the \$10,200 requested in S.B. 307 for maintenance of the Minchumina Airport in FY 72, Personal Services, Code 100, is based on one temporary AEO II at 75 hours per month for five months. Only 2,500 feet of unlighted runway on the airport would be maintained. FY 73-77 provides for an AEO II, Full-time, for eight months to maintain the runway full length and width.

FY 73-77, Codes 100, 300, and 400, reflects a 5.5 percent inflationary factor. Large increases in Code 500, Equipment, in FY 73 allows for three new pieces of equipment consisting of a T-3 Snowblower, \$50,000, a motor grader, \$32,000, and a small Cat such as a John Deere 450, \$20,000, and miscellaneous shop equipment, \$5,000,; a new 4X4 pickup in FY 74; and a truck equipped with a snow plow in FY 76.

Minchumina Airport would be maintained at its present level with the exception of field lighting. Lighting is not provided for in the budget figures due to the low aircraft usage of the airport. If the field is required to be lighted, this would increase Code 300, Contractual Services, by approximately one-third. The job will require an Auto Equipment Operator II, permanent-part-time, Range 13, salary for eight months \$9,760, Benefits at \$1,659, plus other related codes as shown in Section II. All funding would be from the General Fund.

Re: CSSB 411

I thought I should explain the origin and reason for Senate Bill 411 which, I understand, is presently in your committee.

Senator Ed Merdes approached me some time ago and told me that he wanted to introduce such legislation, and asked if I had any objection. I told him that I would not object, but that I did not think it would be appropriate for me to lobby for its passage.

Ed Merdes sent me a copy of the original SB 411. Some time later I received in the mail a copy of the Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 411. In my opinion the committee substitute bill is probably unconstitutional as being special legislation. Art. II, Sec. 19 of the Alaska Constitution, reads in relevant part as follows:

The legislature shall pass no local or special act if a general act can be made applicable. Whether a general act can be made applicable shall be subject to judicial determination.

Ed Merdes told me that the reason for the substitute bill was because the members of the Senate Finance Committee were fearful that the original bill could invite a flood of early retirements that were not bona fide. When I talked to him, the committee substitute bill was on the Senate calendar and he did not wish to have it taken off. I informed him of my doubts as to the constitutionality, and he said that if a general act had to be drawn, this could be done in a house committee.

May 10, 1972

He suggested that I prepare what I considered to be an adequate House committee substitute bill, which would satisfy constitutional requirements and would not open the door to unjustified retirements. Attached is a suggested draft which I have prepared.

Whether a judge's incapacity was caused by his work could be left to decision by either the executive or judicial branches of government. For example, it could be provided that the Governor would appoint a board to make the necessary investigation and recommendation.

I have suggested the supreme court as the body to perform that function, because I am confident it would not approve unjustified applications, because the members of the court are familiar with the nature of the work involved in being a judge, and because they are by training and experience qualified to sort out facts and get at the truth.

As to my case, which I would have to establish by competent evidence if any such bill were passed, I am convinced, as are the physicians who attended me, that the major contributing factor to the deterioration of my health was the stress of my judicial duties. I was told by my physicians that I simply had to resign from my job, and that if I did not, more serious consequences would probably follow. They were serious enough as it was, as revealed by the pathology discovered during an exploratory operation performed on me in Seattle in June of last year.

For your information I enclose a copy of a letter from Dr. C. Gordon Hale to Senator Merdes. I had authorized Dr. Hale to make this information available. Ed Merdes has told me on the telephone that he has received additional, more detailed reports from Dr. Hale, but I have not seen them. I believe you could obtain them from either Ed Merdes or John Butrovich.

I have not talked to any legislator about this bill with the exception of Senator Merdes, and now you, through this letter. It is not, to the best of my knowledge, a court system bill. I have not discussed it with Mr. Reeves, and so far as I am aware he is not promoting its passage.

The reason I am writing to you is because Ed Merdes suggested I do so. I am well enough aware of the legislative process to realize that it will be your decision whether the bill, in a new committee substitute form, is taken up by your committee. I would be appreciative if you could see your way clear to do this.

I had been on the supreme court for a little over 12 years. One physician in Seattle told me that because of my nature and concern for persons who come before the courts, in those 12 years I had done about 40 years of work. It is questionable whether I shall ever regain my health completely. I mention these things so that you will know that it is possible for dedication to duty to have injurious effects for some people and that there is merit in the proposed legislation.

I leave the matter in your hands. If you wish to discuss the matter with me, you can reach me by telephone in Douglas at 364-3325.
