

Dear Commissioner Lind:

You have asked this office for an opinion on the procedure the Department of Education should follow in calculating the funds to be distributed under AS 43.18.100. Specifically, you have asked whether your department in determining the sum which the state will share with the school districts under this section should deduct payments made under AS 43.18.100 for the second prior fiscal year in the same manner that funds from any state or federal source are deducted. It is our opinion that such a deduction should not be made.

AS 43.18.100(a) states as follows:

"During each fiscal year the state shall allocate to an organized borough or a city which is a school district one-half of the following sums, exclusive of any funds received from the state or federal sources for school construction costs:

(1) payments made by the borough or city during the fiscal year two years prior for the retirement of principal and interest on bonds, notes, or other indebtedness incurred to pay costs of school construction;

(2) the amount of payments that would have been expended by a borough or city two years prior for retirement of principal and interest on bonds, notes, or other indebtedness incurred to pay costs of school construction had the borough or city issued bonds, notes or other indebtedness of 10 years duration bearing interest at the rate of six per cent a year to finance the costs rather than paying those costs through taxes or other local sources."  
(emphasis added)

This section should be read as indicating that the State shall allocate one-half of the net payments made by the local school district. The legislature clearly intended to reimburse a locality only for monies which that locality raised through local efforts either through bonds or "taxes or other local sources" incurred or received by the locality in lieu of bonds. There is no intent to reimburse a locality for money which it receives gratuitously from the state or federal government.

Furthermore, once state and federal "funds" have been excluded, the legislature has indicated that one-half of the remaining sums will be reimbursable (subject to the limitation in AS 43.18.100(c)). If reimbursable funds under AS 43.18.100(a) are considered in later years to be included in the funds that must be excluded under the terms of the statute when determining the allocation of state reimbursement, the result would inevitably be that less than one-half of the actual local effort expended would be reimbursed by the state. This result would be in direct contradiction to the legislative intent expressed clearly in the statute that one-half of the actual local effort should be reimbursed.

2. Clarification of legislative intent that AS 43.18.100 provide reimbursement to cities and boroughs for one-half of school construction debt remaining after funding received from other state sources; and
3. "Leveling out" of annual payments received from year to year.

Finance Committee Report on SB 114 states that "Both the Department of Education and the Legislative Auditor have requested this legislation".

I would like to clarify the position of the Legislative Auditor. Legislative Audit in its audit report recommended that the Department of Education introduce legislation to clarify the provision of law (AS 43.18.100) that deals with school construction debt. We did not recommend or endorse any specific piece of legislation.


Computing the amount of state funds that will be distributed to school districts for school construction debt expense is subject to different interpretations and is confusing. SB 114 provides one way of clarifying the situation. There are others (as evidenced by four other bills introduced regarding the same matter). Each can have different financial implications.

The Division of Legislative Audit has made it policy in the past not to endorse specific bills, feeling that this would be an intrusion into the law-making area of responsibility and could create problems.

We do, however, whole-heartedly endorse the attempt to clarify a confusing statute and hope that one of the bills introduced will pass the legislature.

I am available to discuss any aspect of any of the bills introduced on school construction debt should you so desire.

"State Aid for Retirement of School Construction Debt"

SENATE BILL NO. 114, as amended, makes technical corrections to the "State Aid for Retirement of School Construction Debt" program. Both the Department of Education and the Legislative Auditor have requested this legislation.

This legislation will provide:

1. Clarification of computation methods;
2. Clarification of legislative intent that AS 43.18.100 provide reimbursement to cities and boroughs for one-half of school construction debt remaining after funding received from other state sources; and
3. "Leveling out" of annual payments received from year to year.

Finance Committee Report on SB 114 states that "Both the Department of Education and the Legislative Auditor have requested this legislation".

I would like to clarify the position of the Legislative Auditor. Legislative Audit in its audit report recommended that the Department of Education introduce legislation to clarify the provision of law (AS 43.18.100) that deals with school construction debt. We did not recommend or endorse any specific piece of legislation.


Computing the amount of state funds that will be distributed to school districts for school construction debt expense is subject to different interpretations and is confusing. SB 114 provides one way of clarifying the situation. There are others (as evidenced by four other bills introduced regarding the same matter). Each can have different financial implications.

The Division of Legislative Audit has made it policy in the past not to endorse specific bills, feeling that this would be an intrusion into the law-making area of responsibility and could create problems.

We do, however, whole-heartedly endorse the attempt to clarify a confusing statute and hope that one of the bills introduced will pass the legislature.

Checking with Pat Hunt, it appears that a limited number of employees serving in permanent part-time positions are not now receiving the full amount of fringe benefits to which they are entitled. The reason for this is, generally, that these employees are paid on an hourly basis and apparently the administrative machinery for making their payments is not programmed to include their fringe benefits.

A system in which some employees of a given class receive benefits and others do not could subject the state to an embarrassing suit. It would seem advisable to "tidy up" this situation either through changes in administrative policy or appropriate statutes.

3. Ketchikan, Fisheries Biologist III, salary \$15,192; benefits: \$3,038; desk: \$170; chair: \$70. file cabinet: \$100; calculator: \$400. Travel - instate: \$2,280; out of state: \$300. Contractual: \$1,500 household goods. Commodities: \$600.

4. Juneau, Fisheries Biologist III, salary \$15,192, benefits: \$3,038; desk: \$170; chair: \$70; filing cabinet: \$100; calculator \$400. Travel: instate: \$2,280, out of state: \$300. Contractual: \$1,500 household goods. Commodities: \$600.

5. Juneau, Fish and Game Tech III, salary: \$10, benefits: \$2,102; desk: \$170; chair: \$70. Travel instate: \$2,280; commodities: \$600.

6. Juneau, Administrative Assistant I, salary: \$9,708, benefits: \$1954; Desk: \$183; chair: \$46; Typewriter: \$510.

In FY 73, two additional stream improvement (debris and log removal) crews (8 fish and game techs) are provided for as follows: Line 100: \$22,700; Travel: \$500; vessel and aircraft charter: \$20,600; commodities: \$4,700; Equipment: \$400. Extensive travel is planned for mid-April through June (and continuing in FY 74) to conduct reconnaissance surveys for stream improvement sites (laddering and clearance), investigation of lake systems for enhancement or rehab. Five men will be on travel status for approximately 60 days during this period with the bulk of line 200 to be expended on scheduled flights and per diem. Most of the balance of line 300 funds will be used for air charter on above surveys. The balance in line 500 would be for engineering and biological equipment, both field and office, needed to initiate the program.

The basis for estimate on funding from FY 73 through FY 78 is the estimated revenues derived from timber sales on National Forest Lands as appears in Revenue Sources, Alaska, Fiscal Years 1972-78.

A total of \$3,500 is budgeted for 1973 for reconnaissance surveys in the Chugach Forest to investigate possible stream improvement sites (fishways and stream clearance). In this area, a total of \$16,400 is budgeted for surveys and limited stream clearance in FY 74.

Plans (and budgeting) from 1975-1978 may be subject to revision depending upon what develops following the first full year (FY 74) of investigative work.

#### IV. ATTACHMENTS

##### Additional Fiscal Information.

Two or more fish pass installations in the Tongass National Forest are planned for FY 74, line 300 - \$120,000, and for each remaining FY through 1978, based on the assumption that suitable sites will be found.

Charter of two vessels is planned annually beginning in FY 74 on a six month basis each to provide logistic support for fish way installation and for surveys to investigate possible stream improvement sites. They will also be used in transportation of heavy equipment. FY 74 - 360 days @ 250/day = \$90,000.

Heavy equipment rental for stream improvement in S.E. Alaska is requested for FY 74, line 300, - \$30,000.

Rental of a barge, bull dozer and front end loader is planned beginning in FY 75 to use in fish pass installation at greater distances from the beach and for removal of log jams where chain saws with winch attachments are inadequate to perform the job.

FY 75, line 300, rental of above equipment will amount to 38.7, including insurance, fuel and maintenance. Two temporary heavy equipment operators would be employed, 6 months each, at a cost of \$12,108.

#### IV. ATTACHMENTS

##### Suggested revision.

According to U.S. Forest Service estimates, there are 22 million acres of land within the two National Forest boundaries in Alaska, Tongass and Chugach. Of this amount approximately 5,230,000 acres are commercial forest lands. Some of the timber is presently inaccessible due to the high altitude of location but as more sophisticated logging techniques are developed, it is anticipated that this timber will be available for harvesting.

At present, approximately 1,000,000 acres have been cut and by 1978 about 100,000 more acres will have been harvested. Of the 1,000,000 acre estimate, only 3,116 acres have been logged in the Chugach National Forest. The total amounts to about 1/5 of the existing commercial stands.

The wording of the bill restricts activities to logged areas and correspondingly limits the scope of the Division's activities. There are other areas, within the National Forests, which eventually will be logged, where fish passes could be utilized, wind-thrown trees removed and other enhancement or rehabilitation projects carried out.

It is respectfully suggested that the wording be changed to allow projects to be carried out in both logged and currently unlogged areas within National Forest boundaries.
