



You have asked for an analysis of the fiscal consequences with respect to each of the above bills.

HB 444: We would estimate the Fiscal Year 1975 cost to be \$416.6. The analysis was completed for those communities qualifying for Fiscal Year 1974 entitlements plus communities expected to qualify by July 1, 1974, with population figures adjusted for anticipated growth. Population increases attributable to the trans-Alaska pipeline were not included.

CSHB 157: We have estimated the fiscal impact in Fiscal Year 1975 of CSHB 157 to be \$630.7, the computation of which is more clearly explained in our fiscal note of March 17, 1973, and which has been substantially verified by independent computation predicated on Fiscal Year 1974 entitlements.

CSSB 428 am: The bill broadens the scope of AS 29.53.035 by reducing the gross annual income restriction from 25 percent to ten percent, providing the averaging of income



over a three-year period and extending the payback of taxes, otherwise taxable, from two to seven years with interest. Five of the eleven organized boroughs will be especially affected. From current information available, we suggest the net effect of the loss to be \$114.0, which sum should be appropriated to meet reimbursements payable under subsection (e) of the bill. No appropriation is requested to meet costs associated with administration of the program.

There are four principal amendments added by the Senate to COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR HOUSE BILL 157. They are as follows:

1. Immediately following (a) on line 10, the new material requires that receipt of a cost-of-living differential requires the receiving municipality to expend at least the amount received for each specific service on each specific service. In other words, the amendment requires that the cost-of-living differential be paid only to those municipalities that spend revenue sharing for the specific purposes for which it is granted.
2. Amendments to lines 13, 17 and 19 do essentially one thing; they add cost-of-living coverage of volunteer fire departments in the unorganized borough.
3. The language on lines 21 through 23 provides that the cost-of-living differential shall not result in distributions lower than the base allocation. In other words, there shall be no negative cost-of-living differential.
4. Sub-paragraph (c) places the requirement on the cost-of-living differential consistent with the first amendment requiring that amounts received under the cost-of-living differential be expended for the specific purpose for which granted.

An additional note -- HOUSE BILL 157 is funded with \$630,700 from the General Fund in the "New Legislation" section of the appropriation bill. Checking with the Department of Community and Regional Affairs as late as two or three days ago, the amount was considered to be adequate to fund the proposed legislation.




