Dear Bob:

At your request we have reviewed the terms of House Bill No. 518. This bill would amend each of the two retirement systems with respect to the post-retirement pension adjustment. The post-retirement pension adjustment in each case would be amended in two ways:

- (1) The increase would be made automatic rather than the current discretionary provision, and
- (2) The adjustment in incomes would be equal to the percentage increase in the Consumer Price Index developed by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, without limit.

My comments on this bill are as follows:

- (1) The index to be used is that index "which will most accurately reflect the actual cost-of-living rises in the State." The Bureau of Labor Statistics develops an index with respect to each of four separate local areas in the State. Each of these areas is different from the others in terms of the size and nature of the local economy. Thus, it may be extremely difficult to identify one index which accurately reflects the changes in the cost of living in Alaska.
- (2) The elimination of discretion with respect to application of post-retirement pension adjustment in each system will require that we attempt to anticipate future cost-of-living rises in the employer contribution rates. The effect of such a projection, based on the assumption of a long-term increase in the cost of living of 3% annually are as follows:
 - (a) The employer-State rate for the Teachers' Retirement System will increase by 4.2% of covered pay. Thus, with no other changes in that system, the employer-State rate will increase from 11.22% of covered pay to 15.42% of covered pay.



- (b) The consolidated rate for the Public Employees' Retirement System will increase from 4.79% to 7.06% of covered pay. The past service rate for the State would increase from a $-.52\%$ to a $-.05\%$ of covered pay. Thus, the total State contribution rate would increase from 4.27% of covered pay to 7.01% of covered pay. The employer contribution rate with respect to other participating employers would depend on the effect of such a change on the past service rate of such employer.
