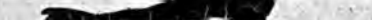

11 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

12 * Section 1. For the purpose of paying the cost of acquiring, construc-
13 ting and equipping library facilities, general obligation bonds of the
14 state in the principal amount of not more than \$7,900,000 shall be issued
15 and sold. The full faith, credit and resources of the state are pledged to
16 the payment of the principal of and interest and redemption premium, if
17 any, on these bonds. These bonds shall be issued under the provisions of
18 AS 37.15 as those provisions read at the time of issuance.

19 * Sec. 2. If the issuance of these bonds is authorized by the qualified
20 voters of the state, a special fund of the state to be known as the "1974
21 Library Construction Bond Fund" shall be established, to which shall be
22 credited the proceeds of the sale of the bonds described in sec. 1 of this
23 Act except for the accrued interest and premiums. There is appropriated
24 from the "1974 Library Construction Bond Fund" to the Department of Educa-
25 tion the sum of \$7,900,000. The proceeds of these bonds shall be allocated
26 as follows:

11 shall be reimbursed to the general fund from the proceeds of the sale of

AN ACT

Providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$7,900,000 for the purpose of paying the cost of acquisition of, construction of, and equipment for library facilities in the state; and providing for an effective date.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

* Section 1. For the purpose of paying the cost of acquiring, constructing and equipping library facilities, general obligation bonds of the state in the principal amount of not more than \$7,900,000 shall be issued and sold. The full faith, credit and resources of the state are pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest and redemption premium, if any, on these bonds. These bonds shall be issued under the provisions of AS 37.15 as those provisions read at the time of issuance.

* Sec. 2. If the issuance of these bonds is authorized by the qualified voters of the state, a special fund of the state to be known as the "1974 Library Construction Bond Fund" shall be established, to which shall be credited the proceeds of the sale of the bonds described in sec. 1 of this Act except for the accrued interest and premiums. There is appropriated from the "1974 Library Construction Bond Fund" to the Department of Education the sum of \$7,900,000. The proceeds of these bonds shall be allocated as follows:

(1) \$4,900,000 - Library Resource Centers
(AS 14.56.065) - Land, buildings, equipment and furniture, as follows:

(A) \$2,900,000 - Anchorage

(B) \$2,000,000 - Fairbanks

(2) \$3,000,000 - Community Libraries
(AS 14.56.200 - 14.56.240) - Land, buildings including but not limited to shared facilities, equipment, furniture and basic library collection.

* Sec. 3. If the issuance of these bonds is authorized by the qualified voters of the state, the amount of \$22,750 or as much of that amount as is found necessary is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the state bond committee to carry out the provisions of this Act and to pay expenses incident to the sale and issuance of the bonds authorized in this Act. The amounts expended from the appropriation authorized by this section shall be reimbursed to the general fund from the proceeds of the sale of the bonds authorized by this Act.

* Sec. 4. The question whether the bonds authorized in this Act are to be issued shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the state at the next state general election and shall read substantially as follows:

I. Documentation of Need

Comparison of library facilities in Alaska with minimum national standards indicates that at least 25,000 square feet of additional space is needed. This disregards the quality of existing facilities in an estimated 62,000 sq. ft.. Many existing facilities are not capable of rehabilitation. Twenty-two communities of 300 or more have no local library outlet for general public use. Statistical evidence in Alaska as elsewhere indicates new facilities increase both local use and local support for library services. See attached "space needs" Summary.

II. Analysis Impact on Operational Expense

Operational expense is debt service estimated at 7% per year (\$135.7)
No increase in personnel expense is anticipated except to local jurisdictions.

III. Documentation of Estimated Capital Cost.

This is a grant program. For communities under 1,000 population costs were estimated on the basis of utilizing a component "Instant Library" or sharing facilities in a new school or community center. "Instant Libraries have been developed and used specifically in West Virginia. The cost was doubled to cover transportation and increase weather protection so that the 800 square foot unit is estimated at \$40,000 and the 1200 square foot one at \$55,000. Furniture and equipment, including minimal audio-visual equipment adds \$10,000. It is proposed to include as part of each package a basic library materials collection composed of 1,500 books, 200 cassettes, 150 records and tapes, approximately 75 reels of microfilm, periodicals and other media. The cost of this collection is approximately \$20,000. The cost in shared facilities exclusive of basic building costs is \$30,000 with \$10,000 for furniture and equipment and \$20,000 for library materials.

There are 12 communities from 300 to 999 population needing new facilities and 18 communities under 299 population. This plan assumes that one half of the structures will commence within the two year period and that 1/3 of these will be in shared facilities.

IV. Identification of Alternatives considered and Reasons Rejected.

- A. Do not continue or improve program of assisting in library facility construction
 1. Contrary to statute and educational aims of state
 2. Few local communities have resources to commit to both a facility and service program.
- B. Continue serving local individuals through monthly mail service.
 1. Present rate of increase in requests for mail service has already diverted personnel from other regular operations and will require additional personnel and resources by next year.

However, under existing law a building on a state airport may be transferred to a borough without special legislation, at least where the state airport interests are advanced by the transfer.

In appropriate circumstances AS 02.15-.020(a) and AS 02.15.070 provide the authority needed.

AS 02.15.020 gives the Department of Public Works general authority to "perform acts" consistent with development and operation of a state system of airports.

AS 02.15.070(a) provides for property acquisition. Subsection (b) then provides for property disposition in the following terms:

(b) The department may, by sale, lease, or otherwise, dispose of any such property, airport, air navigation facility, or portion of them or interest in them. The proceeds of any such disposition shall be used for the purposes set out in this chapter.

There may be additional code sections to look to, depending upon factual circumstances, but initially it appears that a transfer would not require additional legislation.

The pressure of the number of applications may increase slightly over the present rate. But we already have that situation and additional personnel is needed now to properly service the loans. In our regular budget we did request an additional person in our accounting section to adut and adjust the reserve accounts for taxes and insurance. This position is sorely needed and is considered essential in even smaller lending agencies than Veterans' Affairs. We are presently servicing more than \$30 million in loans and expect the figure to exceed \$40 million by early FY1975. Increasing the amounts of loans would make the reserve requirements more acute.

KACHEMAK BAY BIOLOGICAL RESEARCH
PROGRAM PROPOSAL

I. IMMEDIATE ACTIONS

Application of available knowledge on marine flora - biota - hydrocarbon interactions towards formulation of permit specifications prior to initial exploratory drilling operations.

A. Literature Search of Bio-Hydrocarbon Interactions

A voluminous literature exists which discusses many facets of scientific, technical and engineering aspects of hydrocarbon geo-chemistries, dispersal and behavior in marine environments. This literature must, however, be carefully scrutinized and evaluated to assure its biological applicability and relevance to the formulation of ecosystem protection and mitigation measures. Therefore, review of the literature must center upon biological impacts arising from:

1. Well-head liquid and gaseous discharge constituents, such as gases, gas-hydrocarbon emulsions and liquid crude.
2. Hydro-geo-biochemistry of hydrocarbons, gases and brines introduced to the marine environment.
3. Physical-chemical properties, behavior, and geo-biochemistries of drilling by products, muds and discards.

B. Compilation of data to determine the importance and uniqueness of Kachemak Bay

In addition to documenting commercial importance of fisheries resources within the Bay, all information extant must be assembled to determine the possibly critical relationship of the Bay to commercial stocks harvested elsewhere in lower Cook Inlet, the open coastal area south of the Kenai Peninsula and in Shelikof Strait.

II. FUTURE ACTIONS

Assess and document the potential impacts of oil and gas exploitation, development and production upon the flora and fauna of Kachemak Bay, with prime emphasis upon gathering only biological information that will be directly applicable to formulation of environmental controls that must be imposed to protect the high quality and productivity of the biological resources of the area.

A. Biological Baseline Assessment

Update and refine knowledge of faunistic and floral community composition and diversity, and reproductive, migratory and behavioral habits of carefully selected marine and marine-dependent fauna, and assess levels of hydrocarbon components in selected biological indicator species. Primary emphasis to be placed upon information relating to methods of entry of hydrocarbons into biological systems.

1. Marine Flora

- a. Macrophytes - Seasonal investigations of selected transects for species diversity with careful differentiation in diversity and composition between red, brown and green algae.
- b. Angiosperms - Location and extent of eel grass beds.

2. Marine Fauna

- a. Intertidal and Subtidal Zone - Determine species diversity and composition along carefully selected transects exhibiting wide environmental differences. Prime emphasis upon differentiating between filter, detrital and "mud" ingesters. The information to be aimed at establishing indices of "bioconcentration" and "deuration" for dissolved, emulsified and suspended hydrocarbon components. Provide seasonal time of onset of reproductive maturity and spawning of various forms.
- b. Major Benthic Assemblages - Bottom sampling (anchor dredges, bottom grabs) to define species composition and diversity on carefully selected transects exhibiting wide variety of environmental differences. Main emphasis to be placed on feeding habits and reproductive cycles.
- c. Economically Important Fauna - Continue faunistic, population behavior and dynamics, and assessment of reproductive and migratory habits as they relate to the overall fisheries management program for the area. Gather specific information on feeding mechanisms, habits and food sources. Refine information on reproductive, larval and juvenile cycles and provide information on feeding habits and source of foods for larvae and juveniles.

- d. Marine Mammals and Birds - Refine and update existing information on numbers, concentrations and migratory habits of various species. Differentiate between shore and diving birds. Refine information on feeding habits and food sources.

B Background Hydrocarbon Levels

Carefully select filter, detrital, "mud ingestor" and predatory feeding specimens from intertidal, subtidal, benthic and pelagic environments and analyze background hydrocarbon components and levels. Conducts similar measurements in marine mammals and birds.

C. Bioassay Studies

The primary emphasis should be to define the pathways and quantify the rates of uptake, bioconcentration, depuration and physiological impacts of hydrocarbon components upon key biological systems.

1. Uptake, Retention and Depuration

Primary emphasis to be placed upon carefully selected intertidal, subtidal and bottom dwelling sedentary and semi-sedentary forms (eg. scallops) as such forms will integrate cumulative inputs of pollutants over long periods of time. Uptake, retention and depuration will be measured for forms with varied feeding habits (filter, detrital, and predatory). The number of samples required for study need not be large, but the experiment should be confined to a few carefully selected species with specific feeding habits.

2. Acute and Chronic Toxicities

A combined program for acute-chronic toxicities assessment of dissolved, emulsified and suspended hydrocarbon components should be conducted on early life histories of four crustaceans whose life stages are most sensitive to various levels of pollution. The four organisms recommended are the eggs and larvae of tanner crab, pink shrimp, side-striped shrimp and king crab.

Acute and chronic toxicity measurements on pink shrimp are most essential, as they exhibit a male to female sex reversal during their life cycle. Emphasis should be placed upon toxicological and/or hormone blocking or inhibiting effects of various hydrocarbon fractions upon specimens exhibiting the sex reversal phase and on eggs and larvae of the newly created females. Hormonal interference by hydrocarbon fractions, such as shedding of limbs by tanner crabs during molting processes, should be carefully investigated.

3. Behavioral Interference

Effects of various dissolved and emulsified concentrations of hydrocarbons upon behavioral patterns during mating of crustaceans or avoidance of "oily" waters by salmon fry would be conducted.

D. Transport And Dispersal Patterns

Knowledge of transport and dispersal patterns, and fate of discharges and discards from drilling operations and wellheads is essential for environmental control stipulations and spill containment and clean-up. Some of this information for Kachemak Bay is available but it is insufficient to predict the transport and dispersal characteristics of dissolved, suspended or emulsified wellhead discharges or byproducts from drilling operations. To determine these characteristics an investigation program should include the aspects of:

1. Surface Transport - Determination of lagrangian (trajectories of water parcels) aspects of transport by means of time-series measurements with drift cards, drift poles, current drogues, patterns of occurrence of natural slicks and transport of naturally occurring turbidity for various stages of tidal and meteorological regimes.
2. Subsurface Transport - Water parcel trajectories in relation to main vertical density stratification as measured with current drogues.
3. Bottom Transport - As measured with bottom drifters and current drogues.
4. Patterns of drifts and concentrations of planktonic larvae.
