Enclosed is draft legislation relating to eligibility for inclusion in the State Employees' Group Life and Health Insurance Plan.

AS 39.30.090(9) presently provides that only a person actually receiving retirement benefits may obtain major medical and life insurance under the state employee insurance plan. Judges and justices are eligible to receive retirement benefits at age 55 or after having served 20 years on the bench. If a judge or justice retires under the age of 60, he may wish to defer receipt of retirement benefits until age 60. During that period he would be neither an employee nor "receiving benefits under AS 22.25" and would not be eligible for inclusion in the insurance plan. The enclosed draft legislation would allow for inclusion in the State Employees' Group Health and Life Insurance Plan those judges who retire from the bench at a time when they would be eligible to receive retirement benefits but elect to defer receipt of those benefits until age 60.

Your help in having this legislation introduced would be greatly appreciated.

I am responding to your request for the cost impact of House Bill 810. This letter is being sent to you in lieu of a fiscal note.

It is difficult to estimate the potential cost impact of this piece of legislation. Apparently the intent of this bill is to extend group insurance coverage to those persons who have attained a vested right under one of the state retirement systems, however, are not yet receiving a benefit check. To provide such coverage would substantially increase the administrative costs of our group insurance program in as much as we would have to collect the monthly premium involved from each participating individual. The only way it is possible to efficiently administer a group insurance plan is where you have a payroll from which to make monthly insurance deductions. To rely on an individual to submit a check each month in a timely manner would create chaos when attempting to determine eligibility. The receipt of a late payment would necessarily drop the individual from the eligibility listing and this is certain to create substantial correspondence between ourselves and the claimants.

We feel that the "conversion privilege" which is presently granted to anyone who terminates prior to receiving a benefit is extremely fair and a reasonable approach to be taken. Admittedly, it is more expensive to convert to an individual policy, however, the employee is not denied coverage due to health reasons providing he converts on a timely basis. The following is an example of what could occur if this bill is passed: A 20 year old individual could work for the State for five years at which time he would have a vested benefit under the Public Employees' Retirement System. At age 25 this individual could terminate and continue to be covered under the state group insurance plan until he reaches age 60. To provide group coverage and be responsible for the collection of monthly premiums for a period of 35 years would have an extremely high administrative cost impact to the State. This would be especially true as the number of vested members increase in the future. I know of no other private or public employer who would jeopardize the loss experience of their group insurance plan by allowing non-active



employees to participate. The only exception to this would be for retired persons receiving a monthly paycheck from which deductions can be made.

There is no question that there is a large segment of our retired employees who cannot participate under the existing group insurance plan. Under the statutes AS 39.30.090 (13), coverage is only extended to those persons who are eligible or were eligible for coverage under that section at the time they were actively employed. Consideration could be given to leaving subsection (9) intact and repealing (13). If this were done it would extend the availability of group health and life insurance coverage to all retired persons receiving benefits from a state retirement system regardless of whether or not the employee had participated in the state group insurance plan at the time the individual was actively employed. This type of legislation would fill a gap in our present health insurance coverage and in my opinion would be a substantial improvement in our insurance program for all retired persons. Taking this approach there would be no additional cost to the State in as much as the retired people are required to pay for the full cost of their insurance. In other words, their future rates are dependent on loss experience of their own group.

If you have any further questions on this matter I would appreciate hearing from you.

Base data provided by the Department of Administration was used in arriving at the potential impact of \$7,207,818 (FY 75); \$8,759,944 (FY 76); and \$7,526,748 (FY 77). A number of additional units was computed for each of the fiscal years involved, based upon 26.5% of "Dependents" and "Labor Force" and 50.6% applied to "Dependents" only.

If the base data holds up and is consistent with national averages pertaining to ratio of children to "Dependents" - "Labor Force," 7,793 school age children can be expected in FY 75; 9,472 in FY 76; 8,147 in FY 77.

While the data may be statistically correct, the actual increase in pupils related to pipeline impact could be far different (less) depending upon the number of Alaskan's employed, policies in respect to housing for dependents - labor force, etc.

The status of land over which the pipeline is installed and where other pipeline activities take place, could have considerable effect on State and District revenue under P.L. 874. If the Federal Government has or retains an interest in the land involved, a substantial number of any school children will be "Federally connected," and the districts (mainly) will receive payments in lieu of taxes. On the other hand, if much of the land involved is "State land," the State will incur greater liability for payments to districts under the provisions of AS 14.17.215 State Aid to Districts Affected by State Activities.

Unfortunately, there is no meaningful way of assessing the effect of these two programs at the present time.

This responds to your request for a Fiscal Note on HB 826.


The passage of House Bill 826 will not increase the budgets of the Division of Mental Health or the Division of Medical Assistance. The additional groups for whom the Division requested coverage are groups whose care is currently being paid for out of the General Fund monies. The Mental Health option, if passed, would mean that through our accounting procedures the Division of Mental Health could claim 50% reimbursement for the services rendered to these groups. This would mean that the State treasury would be reimbursed approximately \$110,000 per fiscal year. Please note that the monies would go to the State's General Fund, not to the program.

Current payment for meeting costs for wards of the State are met by the General Relief Medical program. We are currently paying \$35,000 for care of these children out of the General Relief Medical program. Transferring them to the Title XIX program would then result in a savings of \$17,500 to the General Fund.

The other proposed changes in the statutes have no fiscal impact, but bring our current statutes into compliance with Public Law 92.603.

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

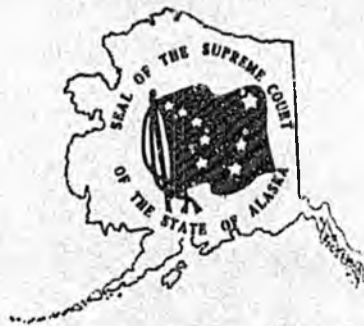

The need for temporary employees and staff overtime is caused by the fact that the voter registration form of each voter must be pulled from the file, marked with the new district and/or precinct and refiled. This must be done so that the proper information is shown on the forms when the Canvass Board uses the files to check absentee and questioned ballots.

The professional fees and services figure included is based on an estimate submitted for modification and description of boundaries for all precincts in Alaska. Lack of proper maps and descriptions presented serious and time-consuming problems at the 1972 reapportionment. When funding for professional service is approved, there will be complete, correct sets of statewide precinct maps available to all elections offices and the larger cities and boroughs in the State. The total cost of the mapping and preparation of descriptions is estimated at \$45,000.

Dear Representative Fischer:

Mr. Snowden has asked me to bring to your attention House Bill 810, which has been referred to your committee. This bill relates to eligibility for inclusion in the State Employees' Group Life and Health Insurance Plan. The bill proposes to amend AS 39.30.090(9) by providing that persons who are eligible to receive retirement benefits as well as persons who are actually receiving such benefits may obtain major medical and life insurance under the State Employees' Group Life and Health Insurance Plan.


AS 39.30.090(9) presently provides that only a person actually receiving retirement benefits may obtain major medical and life insurance under the state employee insurance plan. Judges and justices are eligible to receive retirement benefits at age 55 or after having served 20 years on the bench. If a judge or justice retires under the age of 60, he may wish to defer receipt of retirement benefits until age 60 in order to avoid an actuarial reduction in benefits. During that period he would be neither an employee nor "receiving benefits under AS 22.25" and would not be eligible for inclusion in the insurance plan. If enacted, House Bill 810 would allow for inclusion in the State Employees' Group Life and Health Insurance Plan those judges who retire from the bench at a time when they would be eligible to receive retirement benefits but elect to defer receipt of those benefits until age 60.
