17 lands of the Department of Natural Resources (AS 40.15.075); and

18 WHEREAS, in order to prevent irreparable damage to the environment by
19 "strip developments" that have become a major source of urban blight along
20 streets, roads and highways in and adjacent to many cities and towns through-
21 out the United States, it is imperative that a study of land use controls for
22 the rural areas of Alaska outside the cities and organized boroughs be under-
23 taken at the earliest possible date and recommendations be made to the
24 Legislature which, under Alaska law (Alaska Constitution, art. X, sec. 6),
25 is the assembly for the unorganized borough;

SUBJECT: House Concurrent Resolution No. 38

The following is our analysis of the proposed House Resolution No. 38, "requesting the authorization of adequate funds for the placement of an information specialist in the Alaska Division of Tourism in Anchorage."

It has long been evident that the Division of Tourism needed representation within the communities of Southcentral and Interior Alaska. The job of conforming programs to meet community needs, the exchange of ideas and the input of information and data of a regional nature are difficult to coordinate from the Juneau office. The employee would be able to act as our consultant in the field as well as supervise the functions of our matching grant and information center programs in the Southcentral Region.

We would suggest, however, that this position be called the "Community Tourism Specialist" rather than the proposed Information Specialist. In the past this title and that of Information Officer have been used for positions involved with the promotional aspects of tourism, such as writing travel stories, news releases, and public relations activities. As discussed, the duties expected of the Anchorage position would not be of this nature.

This position would provide new and varied services not presently being supplied to communities by the Division of Tourism. These services have been requested by the communities previously but because of work-load levels and travel cost they have not been consistently supplied.

24 Aviation Administration's specifications, Reeve Aleutian Airways has promised
25 to provide the islanders with regular air service;

III. Analysis

A. Assumptions

1. Implementing Legislation, if passed, will be effective July 1, 1974 (FY-75).
2. The Trans-Alaska Pipeline construction will increase airline and passenger traffic at existing airports and will create a need for additional airport expansion at the north slope and the terminal Port of Valdez.
3. The Governor will delegate the plan and legislation formulation to the Department of Health and Social Services.
4. All airports in the state (250) are considered.

B. Program Summary

Based on the assumption that CSHCR 43 is passed by the legislature and that the Governor designates the Department of Health and Social Services, Emergency Medical Services Program to develop the plan and proposed legislation called for in the resolution, a study will be required to locate appropriate public buildings adjacent to airports, determine the owner, and compute the cost, if any, to utilize these buildings; determine the number of stretchers required at each airport, at other state buildings within boroughs and municipalities, hospitals, and other public buildings within the boundaries of boroughs and municipalities; and compute the cost of procurement and installation of the stretchers.

Due to limited staffing of the Emergency Medical Services Program, i.e., one planner and one clerk typist, this study would have to be contracted out due to the extensive amount of travel involved within a limited time frame. Total cost of the study is computed to be \$11,100. This is based on a salary of \$8,800; which is equivalent to a Range 20A state employee plus travel in the amount of \$2,300 (see attached airline rates).

Dear Cliff:

During the 1972 State Legislature, \$556,000 was appropriated for a Southcentral Alaska Educational Television station. However, restriction on expenditure of this sum stated that it must be matched by "at least 35% federal funds."

Earlier Legislatures had appropriated large sums of money for establishment of an ETV station at College, Alaska and Bethel, Alaska, with no such federal matching restrictions. There are no matching federal funds available at this time, or in the foreseeable future. However, once a station is operating, it is possible to acquire certain federal and other funds for ongoing programming and special projects to help support its operation.

There are many hours per week of very excellent educational, instructional and cultural programming available to ETV stations, and many of these programs are now regularly scheduled on KUAC-TV, College, Alaska. They could be forwarded to Anchorage for use in this area, thereby creating a programming economy for both stations.

The area to be served by the proposed ETV station represents the University of Alaska's southcentral region, the Community College, AMU, the Anchorage Borough School District, the Matanuska-Susitna Borough and the Kenai Borough School Districts. The population it would serve is by far the largest in the state. The sum of \$556,000 is still available. It would represent no increase in the 1973-74 budget and no added appropriations to establish the station.

Imposition of the 35% federal matching restriction is unprecedented. It represents a very discriminatory condition on southcentral Alaskan residents who should receive the benefit of this fine programming. Please consider this letter a personal request that the 1973 Legislature remove the 35% federal matching restriction and free the entire \$556,000 for construction of an ETV station so badly needed in our region. If this is done immediately, the station could be operational by late 1973 or early 1974.

There are three categories of proposed additions which together total \$677,300. The largest (\$556,000) is for the establishment of an educational television station in Anchorage to serve about 140,000 persons in three boroughs. These funds would allow full planning, station construction, part-year operations, and equipment eligible for federal matching funds of \$540,000. Two radio station start-up budgets are proposed (50,000 each); \$11,000 of each budget is for equipment - eligible for \$33,000 in federal funds. Translators to extend service from Fairbanks and Bethel ETV stations are proposed; only the \$21,300 needed to obtain up to \$63,700 in federal matching funds.

NOTE: This is the page from the FY 73 budget requesting ETV capital expenditures. It is this request, with reference to "eligibility" for federal funding, that was approved by the Free Conference Committee last year. The reference to 35% federal funding was an approximation.

COMMENTS: This bill has been referred to you for your review and research and eventual presentation to the committee for their consideration.

Fiscal Note - Analysis- HCR 48

HCR 48 requests the Governor to direct the Department of Health and Social Services to conduct an interim study during 1973, of the various types of soles used on shoes sold in Alaska, which may have dangerous and unsafe surfaces under conditions of ice and snow, and which, therefore, might best be prohibited for intra-state sale.

It is recommended that this survey be continued for a minimum of four years to allow for the gathering of statistics during severe and more mild winters throughout the State.

The individuals performing this survey must become conversant with such information as: 1) materials now available for shoe soles and shoe heels since these are often made of different materials on the same shoe; 2) effects of varying weather on shoe sole and heel materials; 3) effectiveness and cost of shoe cleats for slippery weather; 4) laws governing the construction and sale of shoes; and 5) physical discomfort and cost involved in medical costs, loss of time at work, and additional related costs.

At the completion of such a study, we will have statistics on which to base recommendations. It will remain to work with the U.S. Department of Commerce to regulate the sale of shoes in Alaska and develop an educational program on proper foot gear for ice and snow.

11 authorization and funding of mass transit systems in Alaskan cities; and

12 WHEREAS many local communities have carried out or are planning to

It will be necessary to add a member to the staff to establish eligibility, issue identification certificates and maintain current information. This would be the only tangible increase in expenses. The loss in revenue due to reduced fares would be countered by the greater number of persons being transported. It is recommended that the reduced rates not apply to vehicles, staterooms or meals and that the elderly person not be placed on a space available basis. In practice, it would not appear realistic to put an elderly person ashore because space became unavailable sometime during the trip. It would actually be easier to administer and cause no real problems since the vessels, other than the M.V. Bartlett seldom reach their passenger capacity.

Analysis and Recommendations

The need for rural housing development and repair assistance has been demonstrated in many ways to be one of the most serious concerns of rural Alaskans. Housing emerged as the issue most often cited as a problem by the CPC Conferences¹ in 1973 and 1974. The President's National Indian Housing Program, as announced by Senator Ted Stevens in the Spring of 1971, was to construct some 6,000 homes for Alaska Natives during a five-year period. Nearly every rural community in the State was promised housing through this program, which subsequently floundered due to problems of financial feasibility. Only the Tlingit-Haida Housing Authority has been able to construct homes under this program. Other housing resources and programs remain largely unused, notably those of the Farmers Home Administration. Recently published statistics show that Alaska utilizes less housing money for low and moderate income families from this agency than any other state. There are in addition other housing development and repair resources which are used only to a minor extent and which could be more fully developed for low and moderate income Alaskan families. State government clearly has an opportunity to provide a valuable service to its people by providing communities with accurate information regarding the whole range of available resources, and by providing technical assistance in getting housing programs and projects underway.

Other states have recognized this need and responsibility by creating special state housing assistance agencies or state housing development corporations, which provide not only financing assistance (as does the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation), but broad-spectrum planning and technical assistance as well, through which low-income families are provided information and assistance regarding the full range of possible state, federal and private programs available for housing development and repair. This is generally done in such a way so as not to compete with private industry.

Our experience with communities indicates that the impediments to housing development go far beyond lack of information. When communities contact agencies inquiring about possible housing programs, what they usually get back is an informational bulletin or other form materials giving brief descriptions of program capabilities, and possibly some application forms. Most communities are unable to act on this kind of information, requiring more direct contact and assistance. Even if a housing project is clearly feasible, it may never get off the ground if there is not someone available to help the community make the necessary agency contacts, develop information the agency may require, and generally help walk the project through until the necessary commitments have been made. One has to ask whether a committee can best provide this kind of assistance, requiring establishment of working relationships with communities and agencies with sufficient continuity to actually lead to the development of housing projects. This kind of work is generally much more effectively handled by

1] The CPC (Citizens Participation Committee) Conference is a program funded by the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) and sponsored by the Department of Community and Regional Affairs, through the Division of State Economic Opportunity. This program brings approximately 30 low-income participants from every region of the State into Juneau twice during the Legislative session. Participants learn about the legislative process, list priority community and regional needs and concerns, and communicate these to the Governor, agency heads and the Legislature.
