staff than by a committee structure. It should be noted that the Rural Development Council has a housing committee, and that committee has recently drafted an informational publication that describes briefly the range of available private, state and federal housing development programs.

The options we would suggest for consideration are as follows:

- (1) a committee structure as indicated in the present draft of House Concurrent Resolution #54,
- (2) a committee with support staff,
- (3) staff assigned to work in the Department of Community and Regional Affairs, Division of Community Planning.

Of these options, the committee structure could be expected to do the following:

- (1) characterize housing needs on a community and regional basis;
- (2) collection and dissemination of information;
- (3) generation of policy recommendations.

It can be predicted that these activities would have an indirect effect on the development of housing for rural communities. If such a committee were created, the Department suggests that it be composed as follows:

- (1) Representation from 5 general regions in the state, as follows:
 - a. Southeast
 - b. Aleutian Chain
 - c. Southwest portion of the State, centered around the Bethel region
 - d. Northwest portion of the State
 - e. Interior
- (2) Three individuals representing the following areas of expertise:
 - a. familiarity with the financial community within Alaska, plus experience in financing of housing projects
 - b. knowledge of state and federal housing resources and programs; including those of the Department of Housing and Urban Development, Department of Agriculture, BIA, the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation, and the ASHA.

The second option, combining a committee approach with staff, would have significantly better capability than a committee alone. Staff would provide the capability for direct assistance to communities requesting help, including the following activities:

- (1) assist communities in carefully analyzing their housing needs and the repayment capabilities of the families needing assistance;
- (2) from information thus derived, ascertain the most appropriate of the various possible housing assistance programs, and explain these carefully to the community people;
- (3) assist the community in making necessary agency contacts;

- (4) assist the communities in completing the necessary paperwork to make formal applications for housing assistance;
- (5) assist the communities in dealing with any extraordinary problems that may arise;
- (6) assist in obtaining planning funds for the community whenever important and possible;
- (7) provide monitoring and follow up support until project commitments have been obtained from financing agencies.

The third option, providing for a staff without the committee to work in the Department of Community and Regional Affairs, Division of Community Planning, should be seriously considered. This option would shift the emphasis from information gathering and dissemination to direct assistance to requesting communities in collaboration with funding agencies. There are housing development specialists who have already expert knowledge of the whole range of available housing programs, and it would seem to make the best sense to put money into making such expertise directly available to requesting communities, through a Department with extensive statewide contacts and with already established community planning capability. A staff of two housing specialists plus secretarial support and sufficient travel budget to provide direct assistance to communities would be ideal. The funding of one staff person would be very valuable, creating some capability to respond to community requests, and demonstrating the kind of effect that such staff can have.

The creation of a committee without a staff would frankly render the committee little more than an advisory group meeting periodically, and place a burden on the Department as the committee sought to use staff already overburdened with work and without expert housing knowledge.

8 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

9 WHEREAS the completion of the Copper River and Northwest Railway in the
10 early 1900's provided land transportation between the communities of Cordova,
11 Chitina, and McCarthy; and

12 WHEREAS since the closure of the Copper River and Northwest Railway in
13 1939 the residents of these communities have had to rely on personal land
14 transportation over the railway roadbed; and

15 WHEREAS the residents of these communities and the surrounding areas
16 have the right to safe, efficient trafficways on which to operate their
17 personal land vehicles commensurate with trafficways developed for other
18 citizens of the State of Alaska; and

19 WHEREAS the various responsible road agencies have periodically main-
20 tained all or portions of the subject highways for public use since closure
21 of the railway; and

22 WHEREAS the United States of America is in need of developing mineral
23 resources within the country to lessen dependence on foreign mineral sources;
24 and the State of Alaska and particularly the areas that could be served by
25 the proposed highways are rich in mineral resources; and

26 WHEREAS one of the major restraints to development of these mineral
27 resources is lack of an adequate land transportation system; and present
28 transportation means for seafood products from Cordova is more costly and
29 time consuming than a land transportation route via the subject and existing

1 highways; and

2 WHEREAS tourism is one of the major sources of economic growth in the
3 State of Alaska, and modern designed roadways can be built to provide motor
4 vehicle access to the scenic areas surrounding Cordova, Chitina and McCarthy
5 with little or no damage to the scenic beauty; and

6 WHEREAS modern mining methods likewise permit the extraction of minerals
7 without despoiling the natural surroundings, and land use controls by the
8 United States Government and the State of Alaska will limit and control any
9 man-made development in the area in order to maintain an optimum balance
10 between development and nature;

11 BE IT RESOLVED by the Alaska State Legislature that the reconstruction
12 of the Copper River Highway between Cordova and the Richardson Highway and
13 the Chitina-McCarthy Highway in its entirety is of vital importance to the
14 social and economic well-being of the State of Alaska; and be it

15 FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governor is respectfully requested to direct
16 the Department of Highways to reconstruct the Copper River Highway between
17 Cordova and the Richardson Highway and the Chitina-McCarthy Highway in its
18 entirety; and be it

11 WHEREAS at that time the State of Alaska considered the reindeer
12 industry as an agricultural pursuit and an integral segment of the red meat
13 industry in the state and recognized the necessity of state direction for
14 any program's success and viability; and

15 WHEREAS in 1969 the state made a reindeer program proposal to the
16 federal government for a federal-state coordinated program and to date this
17 proposal has not been accepted or even recognized by the federal government;
18 and

19 WHEREAS the myriad problems of the reindeer industry continue to exist
20 and, in fact, are multiplying since neither the federal government nor the
21 state has taken active steps to revitalize the industry; and

22 WHEREAS it is vital to the continued existence and development of the
23 reindeer industry in Alaska that the state take immediate and strong action
24 to develop a viable reindeer program;

25 BE IT RESOLVED by the Legislature that the Governor is respectfully
26 requested to direct the Departments of Commerce, Economic Development,
27 Natural Resources, and Fish and Game to immediately undertake a coordinated
28 planning effort designed to aid the reindeer industry in Alaska and to
29 outline a firm state reindeer development program plan; and be it

1 FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governor instruct all appropriate departments
2 of the state to immediately compile and forward to the Legislative Council
3 all reports concerning any facet of the reindeer industry in Alaska that

7 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

8 WHEREAS the educational needs of children residing on military reserva-
9 tions contrast markedly from those of children who attend school in the rural
10 areas of the state; and

11 WHEREAS, under present law, the Board of Directors for State-Operated
12 Schools manages and controls not only schools in the rural areas (or the
13 unorganized borough) but also the schools located on military reservations,
14 thus frequently confronting the board with conflicting policies and programs
15 proposed by teachers and parents from these two jurisdictions; and

16 WHEREAS it is unrealistic to assume that any one school board can meet,
17 efficiently and economically, the different goals and objectives required by
18 two sharply contrasting educational environments; and

19 WHEREAS, although military reservations within organized boroughs are
20 not part of the borough school district, the educational needs of children
21 who reside on military reservations tend to be similar to the educational
22 needs of children who attend school in adjacent urban areas whose schools
23 are under the management and control of a borough school district; and, in
24 fact, at present, secondary school pupils who are residents of military
25 reservations in the Anchorage area attend junior high and high schools oper-
26 ated by the Greater Anchorage Area Borough School District on a tuition basis,
27 secondary school pupils who are residents of Fort Wainwright attend high
28 schools operated by the Fairbanks North Star Borough on a tuition basis, and
29 the Kodiak Island Borough School District operates schools on the Kodiak

1 U. S. Coast Guard station by contract, and those on-base schools have been
2 so operated for many years; and

3 WHEREAS, under AS 14.14.110, the Department of Education may require
4 that cooperative agreements be entered into between school districts to
5 promote more efficient or more economical educational services;

6 BE IT RESOLVED by the Alaska State Legislature that the State Board of
7 Education and the Department of Education, acting through the Commissioner
8 of Education, are respectfully requested to develop appropriate cooperative
9 arrangements and to require that contracts be entered into between the State-
10 Operated School System and the several borough school districts that
11 encompass military reservations under which (1) schools on Elmendorf Air
12 Force Base and Fort Richardson would be operated by the Greater Anchorage
13 Area School District, (2) schools on Eielson Air Force Base and Fort Wain-
14 wright would be operated by the Fairbanks North Star Borough School District,
15 and (3) schools on the remaining military reservations in the state would
16 be operated by contract with a city or borough school district that may
17 exist at present or may be organized in the future, or in some other manner
18 determined educationally and financially sound by the Department of Education
19 under AS 14.14.110; and be it

20 FURTHER RESOLVED that it is the sense of the Alaska State Legislature
21 that these contracts between the State-Operated School System and the
22 borough school districts should provide for: (1) representation for the
23 residents of military reservations advisory to the contracting city or
24 borough school district board; (2) a level of funding comparable to Public
25 School Foundation Act support plus a differential determined by the Department
26 of Education that will assure that no additional tax revenues of the city
27 or borough school district will be required for the operation of the schools
28 on the military reservations; (3) an annual report to the legislature and
29 to the governor concerning the operation of the military reservation schools;

1 and (4) those other transitional measures or features that may be required,
2 including but not limited to, teacher and administrator tenure and teacher
3 and administrator salary schedules.

4 COPIES of this resolution shall be sent to Dr. Marshall L. Lind, Com-
5 missioner of Education and to the members of the State Board of Education;
6 to Mr. Stanley H. Friese, Superintendent of the State-Operated School System
7 and to the members of the Board of Directors for State-Operated Schools; to
8 Mr. Joe Montgomery, Superintendent of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough
9 School District and to the members of the Board of that district; to
10 Mr. Elmer C. Smith, Superintendent of the Fairbanks North Star Borough School
11 District and to the members of the board of that district; and to Lieutenant

You have asked for a Fiscal Note on Senate Bill 405 which is identical to House Bill 696. These Bills are companion pieces of legislation to accompany House Concurrent Resolution 59, which likewise is identical to Senate Concurrent Resolution 25.

The Fiscal Note then, covers in affect, all four pieces of legislation since there were not fiscal implications in either House Bill 696 or Senate Bill 405, but rather they were merely implementing statutes which cleaned up some terminology and provided some additional definitions and terminology.

The Fiscal Note then, for Senate Concurrent Resolution 25 also serves for House Concurrent Resolution 59, since they are identical.

ATTACHMENT "A" to Fiscal Note on SCR-25

ASSUMPTION NO. 1:

The military base schools will be funded through the Foundation Program Payments to the operating school districts, with a supplemental amount paid directly to the districts on behalf of each child from an appropriation to the Department of Education for that purpose.

ASSUMPTION NO. 2:

The supplemental amount to be appropriated to the Department of Education and distributed to the districts is intended to cover the full cost of education of a child when added to the foundation support for that child.

ASSUMPTION NO. 3:

The appropriate supplemental amount per child is arrived at by deducting from the tuition computations those funds paid by the district for debt service since there is no debt service connected with operation of the military base schools. The supplemental amounts, then, that result from this recomputation are \$260.68 for Anchorage and \$356.49 for Fairbanks.

ASSUMPTION NO. 4:

The State-Operated Schools appropriation would be reduced by the amount of funds which would have been allocated for the operation of Ft. Richardson, Elemendorf, Ft. Wainwright, and Eielson Base Schools.

ASSUMPTION NO. 5:

Pupil Transportation Funds in the State-Operated Schools appropriation for military schools would be reduced by the amount of their contracts and added to the Pupil Transportation Fund in the Financial Support Programs BRU.

ASSUMPTION NO. 6:

The Anchorage Central Office Administration of the State-Operated School System would be proportionately reduced as a consequence of less administrative overhead. The amount or ratio of military to rural services has not been determined, but for purposes of this computation is assumed to be 70% devoted to rural schools and 30% devoted to military school operation.

ASSUMPTION NO. 7:

The Foundation Support Unit is computed at its present level of \$20,250.

ASSUMPTION NO. 8:

The required local share, i.e., roughly 10% would not apply, and 100% of basic need would be used.

ASSUMPTION NO. 9:

Inflation and impact costs will increase at the rate of 15% per year.

ASSUMPTION NO. 11:

Increased district administration costs due to the increase in support services, i.e., purchasing, etc., might require a portion of the savings from reductions in the S.O.S. Central Office, therefore reducing the net overall saving estimated for '75.

Dear Jay:

At your request I am providing you with information concerning the cost implications of House Concurrent Resolution 67. It is virtually impossible to provide precise cost information relating to the provisions of this resolution.

In the past we have given consideration to the establishment of an office in Anchorage. In view of the increase in staff and administrative costs associated with such an office and the questionable benefits accruing to the members, it was not felt to be a viable approach. This decision was based on the following reasons:

1. Both the PERS and TRS are administered by the same staff. Approximately 50 percent of a persons time is devoted to each system, however, during a given day or week the amount of time devoted to one system or the other may vary considerably depending on the workload. To establish a branch facility in Anchorage would necessitate the hiring of additional personnel to provide the necessary services.
2. If a field representative was permanently placed in Anchorage it would necessitate a duplicate set of members records. Clerical and accounting personnel to support the field representatives would also be necessary otherwise there would be little if any benefit accruing to the members.
3. It would require the rental of office space and the costs associated with maintaining a permanent facility. Unless a full service operation was established, it would require continuous communication via the telephone or otherwise in order to provide the representatives with the information needed to resolve questions and problems.

April 18, 1974

The alternative approach which is now in effect is to have a field representative in Anchorage at least one week out of every six. The various school districts and public employers are apprised of these visits and encouraged to have individual teachers meet with the representatives to discuss any individual problems they may have. In my opinion this practice is working out extremely well and avoids the necessity of maintaining a separate office. If the volume of inquiries were to increase significantly I would recommend that additional travel funds be made available so a field representative can travel to the Anchorage area on a more frequent basis.

The language included in HCR 67 specifically provides for the creation of an office for the Teachers' Retirement System only and to establish such an office would necessitate incurring substantial costs in proportion to the service rendered. Without preparing a detailed budget, I would estimate that the costs of such an office could run as high as increasing our present budget by 50 percent for the Teachers' Retirement System.

I will be happy to provide you with any additional information that you may desire on this subject.
