12 \* Section 1. For the purpose of paying the cost of capital improvements  
13 under AS 43.18.300 for civic, convention and community recreation centers,  
14 general obligation bonds of the state in the principal amount of not more  
15 than \$11,500,000 shall be issued and sold. The full faith, credit and  
16 resources of the state are pledged to the payment of the principal of and  
17 interest and redemption premium, if any, on these bonds. These bonds  
18 shall be issued under the provisions of AS 37.15 as those provisions read  
19 at the time of issuance.

20 \* Sec. 2. If the issuance of these bonds is authorized by the qualified

and subtracted from the total value of the project and the balance will be equally divided between the State and the local government unit.

The estimated State share for the cost of construction of the community facilities is based on my informal conversation with the communities preparing studies and their engineering/architectural contractors, except for Anchorage, whose study we currently possess. These figures may or may not be valid at some future time when an application for construction is actually submitted by a community. Inflation in construction costs and changes in local priorities may dictate that a community abandon or substantially alter its project. In fact, no community is obligated to proceed with actual construction even though the project is found to be feasible. Further, I believe that some communities whose projects are found to be feasible may not proceed to construction for two or three years.

In light of the foregoing, it would seem prudent that the proposed bond issue be established at \$11.5 million at this time and that, contingent on future interest in the program, a subsequent issue be considered at a later date, if the need should arise."

Under the provisions of AS 42.16.300, Civic, Convention and Community Recreation Centers, applications from 11 communities for State aid toward feasibility studies were approved. The specifics are as follows:

To date only the City of Anchorage has completed its feasibility study. Funds amounting to \$39,300 have been disbursed by the department thus far (Anchorage, \$33,300; Kodiak, \$6,000). Funding provided by the Legislature for the feasibility study phase of this program was set at \$200,000.

Contract completion dates for feasibility studies have been extended to March 3, 1973, on every community except Kotzebue, whose original contract expires on June 30, 1973. Completion dates on these contracts may be extended by mutual agreement of the State and the local government unit.

Based on present estimates, the funding necessary for the construction phase under the Civic, Convention and Community Recreation Center program is as follows:

It appears at this point in time that the funding level of \$11,500,000 proposed by H.B. No. 8 will be sufficient to pay the costs of the land acquisition, planning and construction phase of the Civic, Convention and Community Recreation Center Program for the foreseeable future.

Although the projected costs indicated in this memorandum reflect an overall State participation of \$14,597,000 in this program, I would like to point out several factors which affect that projection.

First, I have assumed that no community will receive Federal assistance for its project (which they are required by statute to pursue). I have assumed this because it is impossible to determine the extent of Federal aid, if any, which will be available for these projects at this point in time. If Federal funding is available for any given community, the value of that assistance will be ascertained

ANALYSIS

The Department of Commerce is not aware of any specific projects which would be undertaken if SB 63 were passed and approved by the voters. The attached listing indicates the populations of boroughs and first-class and home rule cities shown in the 1970 census as well as those used by the Department of Community and Regional Affairs in making their distribution of fiscal 1972 municipal revenue sharing funds. Populations for home rule cities have been included even though they are not specifically stated as eligible in AS 43.18.400-460. At \$50 per person the indicated cost calculated based upon a population of 218,317 would be \$10,915,850; however, this does not take into consideration anticipated population increases prior to the application deadline of June 30, 1974, and the fact that the military bases are not included in the population estimates.

Until actual grant applications are available, it is impossible to project when the sale of the bonds would be required. If the bonds are issued for 20 years at 6%, a payment of \$86.54 per thousand per year would be required. If all bonds are issued, the yearly payment would be \$995,210 per year, or a total over the 20-year period of \$19,904,200.

Administrative costs related to the program would be minimal and additional funding would be required only for travel for plan review and inspection. Cost determinations and other construction-related costs can be considered part of the project cost and paid by the municipality.

By insisting, as "#3" does, that individuals go to the dentist once each year in order to have the co-insurance percentage advance, the most expensive treatment, i.e. correction of the resultant neglect, will be completed during the lowest payment phase of the plan. As correction is completed, the covered individuals will gradually advance to the position that only routine maintenance such as annual cleanings, and occasional fillings, are required. This substantially reduces the amount of expense that will be incurred when the 100% level is reached.

This will have the twin result of gradually improving coverage over a stated period of time, but at the same time maintaining some control over future costs.

The reasoning behind recommending "#2" as the second alternative, but without the increase in schedule, is two fold. The first is that if it is assumed that by increasing the schedule 25% the the schedule amounts represent "reasonable and customary" charges in Alaska, and you are at the same time paying 100% of those charges, then there is no room for future improvement in benefit. Secondly, you open yourself to the possibility of substantial deficits in early years during the time when employees are correcting the ravages of neglect. This could create substantial instability in rates.

We supervise several plans that are virtually identical to "#1" and we have found them to be very difficult to administer and confusing to the employees. The upper limits of charges are not controlled in that the plan recognizes the full "reasonable and customary" which too often can be arbitrarily adjusted by the dentist. This leads to abuses that are detrimental.

We should also repeat one further requirement that any underwriter will place on a dental plan. This is that 100% employee participation must be guaranteed through full payment of the employee's cost by the employer. It will be a firm requirement that a minimum of 75% of all dependents of covered employees must be covered. While the foregoing infers it, let me state positively that adverse selection in dental coverage is probable, and that therefore these two requirements will be minimum standard. In fact, most underwriters require payment of the total cost by the employer.



SUBJECT: Employee Benefits

I have checked the fiscal notes on SB's 70 and 101 as you requested. SB 70 contains \$105,900 for the University, of which 89.5% or \$94,800 is state general funds. SB 101 contains \$86,400 all state general funds. The usual procedure on such payments is to divide the appropriation in spring. If for some reason you need the money earlier, please request it and unless somebody objects we should be able to make the transfers now.

Several other matters regarding benefits have come to my attention recently and I would appreciate your help in resolving them. First I heard that you have not been able to get the additional insurance funded by SB 70 into effect. If that is the case, please let me know what portion of the fiscal year passed without such coverage so that the SB 70 funds can be prorated accordingly.

Second I understand that your PERS contribution rate changed from 9.33% to 5.23% as of 1 July 73. Please let us know what the budgetary impact of this change will be so that we can reserve the appropriate amounts.

Finally, we have never based the University of Alaska budgeted benefits percentage on a written analysis in the past. Please include a thorough analysis in the FY 75 submission.

As correction is completed, the covered individuals will gradually advance to the position that only routine maintenance such as annual cleanings, and occasional fillings, are required. This substantially reduces the amount of expense that will be incurred when the 100% level is reached.

This will have the twin result of gradually improving coverage over a stated period of time, but at the same time maintaining some control over future costs.

The reasoning behind recommending "#2" as the second alternative, but without the increase in schedule, is two fold. The first is that if it is assumed that by increasing the schedule 25% the schedule amounts represent "reasonable and customary" charges in Alaska, and you are at the same time paying 100% of those charges, then there is no room for future improvement in benefit. Secondly, you open yourself to the possibility of substantial deficits in early years during the time when employees are correcting the ravages of neglect. This could create substantial instability in rates.

We supervise several plans that are virtually identical to "#1" and we have found them to be very difficult to administer and confusing to the employees. The upper limits of charges are not controlled in that the plan recognizes the full "reasonable and customary" which too often can be arbitrarily adjusted by the dentist. This leads to abuses that are detrimental.

We should also repeat one further requirement that any underwriter will place on a dental plan. This is that 100% employee participation must be guaranteed through full payment of the employee's cost by the employer. It will be a firm requirement that a minimum of 75% of all dependents of covered employees must be covered. While the foregoing infers it, let me state positively that adverse selection in dental coverage is probable, and that therefore these two requirements will be minimum standard. In fact, most underwriters require payment of the total cost by the employer.

The legends and the historical facts on "Ma" Pullen are an important part of the story of Alaska. Harriet Pullen has long been accepted as one of the most colorful, as well as significant women of the Territorial period. At the beginning of the Klondike Strike, in September 1897, this 37-year-old Wisconsin farm widow, mother of four small children, arrived at the booming tent-port of Skagway - gateway to the Yukon - with less than \$10.00 in her pocket. "Ma's" energies matched Alaska's mountains. She worked and drove herself as hard as any of the thousands of men who mined the region. Speedily, "Ma" pyramided the baking of tasty home-made pies into an empire of horse-drawn transportation. Then with the profits from this, she built the largest and most elaborate hostelry that Alaska - at the turn of the century and for many years after - would know. Skagway's famed Pullen House offered more than the basic comforts of good food, fine drinks, and warm beds to sourdoughs, dog-dirty men in from the digs, Cardsharps and V.I.P.'s. It was more than a home in the frigid wilderness of the far North, indeed it was a palace outpost of civilization. Mrs. Pullen, was, foremost, a mother raising her own family; a friend to the homesick; a good guide to tenderfeet and Cheechakos and a dedicated Alaskan, in tune with her time and place.

As the hard-gotten yellow wealth of the frozen Klondike moved through the frenzied port of Skagway, "Ma" Pullen became one of the few whose fortune did not reverse with the turn of the dice or the petering-out of a seemingly inexhaustible gold lode. She gave equal concern to the building of Skagway - houses, churches, saloons and salons; the vital tram-way over the rugged almost impossible pass and the indomitable White Pass and Yukon narrow gage railroad - one of the engineering marvels of the day. She believed in religion, good grace, and good citizenship. But her tolerance embraced all races and creeds. Mrs. Pullen was a pillar of the respectable, work-oriented society of a raw frontier; yet she showed an empathy and friendship even with the sordid "other world" of notorious "Soapy" Smith, gunman, bordellos and booze. As such Mrs. Pullen served as a bridge between the outlaws, the outcasts and the hordes of gunman killers - always attracted to the quick wealth of a gold strike. For the Klondike was the last of the greatest; most publicized and romanticized of them all, was peopled, too, by men and women who lived by the law of the jugular.

As Skagway grew from a raw mud-flat tent-camp to Alaska's metropolis - Pullen House entertained potentates and pirates, poets and peasants, people from all corners of the globe. "Ma" Pullen's pride in Alaska would allow nothing but the best. Her cut-glass, silver and crystal came from Tiffanys, Marshall Fields, London, Paris and Rome - as did stationary, objects of Art, commodes and furniture. Her magnificent grand pianos, at least three, came from the finest factories in the world. Some of her furniture was exquisite and all of it expensive - (after the logistical extravagance and hazards of bringing it, intact, to the greatest city of the far North in the world). The back-bar of the Pullen House was comparable to that of the St. Francis in San Francisco, after the Rush of '49.

And so it came to be, at the turn of the 20th Century, that one of the most unorthodox frontier places on earth began to possess cultural treasures, usually equaled only to the most sophisticated centers of world commerce and society.
