

SENATE BILL 357 am will allow the continuation of unemploy-
ment insurance benefits for a three month period, with 50%
of the cost being paid by the federal government.

The Department of Labor estimates 1000 people will be
eligible for an extension of benefits under SB357am at
a cost of \$176,000. Most of this will be paid from the
employer-employee financed Unemployment Insurance fund.
This additional cost will not be significant enough to
require any change in contribution rates.

There will be some State expense associated with this bill
because benefits for API, Harborview, and University of
Alaska employees are paid directly from the General Fund.
The Department of Labor estimates this will amount to no
more than \$2500.

SUBJECT: Sharp-tailed Grouse Rearing

Enclosed are comprehensive cost estimates for development of a sharp-tailed grouse rearing program. Because an egg source for this species is non-existent we are bound to both a breeding and hatching-rearing program. To maximize chances for success, breeding stock should be trapped in Alaska. Our cost estimates do not include acquisition of breeding stock. This will be a major expense since capture techniques for Alaskan sharp-tails have not been developed (perhaps a rough figure of \$10,000 for salaries, equipment, travel, etc.).

To reiterate what Dr. McKnight told the Senate Resource Committee on February 27, stocking is not a good way to improve natural populations of native upland game birds. In addition, this program is too expensive to be justified on a "put and take" basis. If an increased population of game birds is the major objective of this program, time and money can be best spent on habitat improvement and enhancement. Although we know very little about the Alaskan sharp-tailed grouse, it appears that openings are critical to these birds. The high densities of this species occurring in the 1930's resulted from openings created by uncontrolled fires occurring in the early 1900's. Several states (Michigan and Wisconsin) have successfully used fire and herbicides to maintain openings and enhance sharp-tail habitat. Fire suppression activities have probably worked to the disadvantage of both ruffed and sharp-tailed grouse populations.

In order to increase sharp-tailed grouse numbers I recommend an experimental habitat improvement project as an alternative to the stocking program. Initial investigations should concentrate on determining the habitat requirements of Alaskan sharp-tails and development of census techniques. Possibly this could be accomplished in three years on an annual budget of \$10,000. In view of findings of habitat studies an enhancement program would be developed. Conceivably, this could involve herbicides, fire and small food plantations. How an enhancement program would influence normal population fluctuations is unknown, but this provides an opportunity to learn something along these lines.
