For an Act entitled: "An act relating to revenue anticipation notes issued by cities and boroughs."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

Section 1. AS 29.59.010 is amended as follows:

A municipality of the state which is authorized to incur indebtedness may borrow money [in a fiscal year] to meet appropriations for [that] any fiscal year in anticipation of the collection of [taxes and estimated] the revenues for [the fiscal] that year but all debt so contracted shall be paid before the end of the next fiscal year [and may issue its] Revenue anticipation notes may be issued as evidence of the borrowing.

Section 2. AS 29.58.020 is amended to read as follows:

The governing body of a municipality may by ordinance or resolution, authorize the issuance of revenue anticipation notes and prescribe the form and details of the notes and the manner of their execution. The governing body of the municipality may delegate to its chief fiscal officer the power to issue the notes from time to time under the terms and conditions of the ordinance or resolution which provides for the manner of their sale. [Revenue anticipation notes and notes issued to renew notes previously issued mature not later than the end of the fiscal year in which they are issued.]

Section 3. AS 29.58.030 is repealed.

*In reviewing these amendments we do not find any legal problems. It does not appear to conflict with the state Constitution or other statutes of the state.*



Reference is made to SB 476 and SB 518.

Senate Bill 476 would repeal language in AS 29.58 defining those instances wherein a municipality might issue revenue anticipation notes. We are persuaded that Article IX, section 10 of the State's Constitution constitutes a reasonable self-executing limitation on the State's political subdivisions such that additional restrictions presently found in AS 29.58 are not warranted. Only to the extent that the State purchases notes issued by its political subdivisions which are not repaid until the subsequent fiscal year would State general fund monies be affected.

Senate Bill 518 amends AS 29.53.025, itself modified during the 1973 Special Session, by allowing all municipalities not levying taxes against oil and gas property subject to municipal taxation to exempt or exclude by referendum individual property of a value in excess of \$10,000. I foresee no additional expense to the State directly attributable to election of exemptions exceeding \$10,000 by qualifying municipalities.
