SUBJECT: SB 488, Merger and Consolidation
 of Corporations



I have reviewed SB 488 at your request in order to determine any effects that it might have on Treasury or on the administration of our state taxes. The language simply amends Title 10 of the Alaska Statutes in order to provide a more liberal basis for merging corporations under Alaska Statutes. It does not appear that this additional provision would have any effect on the application of our tax statutes since such mergers and consolidations of corporations are permitted under the Internal Revenue Code.

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Section 3 of the bill corrects an additional flaw in the oil and gas property tax statute (AS 43.56). During the 1973 Special Session of the Free Conference Committee concluded that the municipalities alone should be authorized to assess, levy and collect the property tax, and levy and collect the sales tax, on pipeline construction equipment, or as it was frequently stated during debate on the measure, "to chase the pickup trucks." Accordingly, throughout the bill the phrase "erection, construction," was deleted from the text, except, due to an oversight in drafting, in one subparagraph. The amendment the committee now recommends would conform the statute to the clearly stated legislative intent and is essential to ensure that AS 43.56 will be administered in the manner the legislature desired. See paragraph 10, Free Conference Committee Report, Senate Journal, November 11, 1973, p. 126.

Section 4 of the bill adds a definition of "municipality" to AS 43.56. Some doubt has been expressed that the limitations imposed on municipal property taxing powers with respect to oil and gas properties under AS 43.56, AS 29.53.045 and 29.53.050(b) are applicable to home rule municipalities. Although it is clear from AS 29.33.100(22) that the provisions of the Municipal Code governing city and borough property taxation powers (AS 29.53.010 - 29.53.350, 29.53.400) are applicable to home rule municipalities (thus including AS 29.53.045, a new section, within the ambit of the above-cited inclusive section numbers), the addition of an explicit definition of "municipality" that includes home rule entities should resolve any lingering doubts.

Sections 5 and 6 of the bill cause it to go into immediate effect and make its provisions retroactive to January 1, 1974, which was the effective date of the oil and gas exploration, production and pipeline transportation property tax (sec. 6, ch. 1, FSSLA 1973).



As Requested

Currently the Division of Medical Assistance is projecting a deficit of \$1,578,000 in the Medicaid program for which it will need a supplement budget allocation. Of this, \$789,000 would be the State general fund portion and \$789,000 would come from federal receipts. Federal law mandates coverage of the basic services Alaska provides. Additionally the Legislature last year extended coverage to include the optimal intermediate care service, a less intensive and thus less expensive form of nursing home care. Also by Federal law we must provide these services to any eligible individual who needs them. There is no mandatory ceiling in the federal Medicaid budget, thus if the Legislature allocates more Medicaid funds, the Federal share will be forthcoming.

Several factors contribute to need for additional funding. The first of these is the increased caseload, particularly in Aid to the Disabled. In FY 73, the average monthly number of recipients of Adult Public Assistance rose 8.4% over FY 72 and in the first six months of FY 74 they rose 6 1/2% over FY 73. Aid to the Disabled rose 16% in FY 73 over FY 72 and 14% in the first six months of FY 74 over FY 73. This is significant since in the 10 months of Medicaid operation, September through June of FY 73, Disabled persons accounted for nearly 39% of all Medicaid expenditures (not including transportation or Early Child Screening costs). They also accounted for 38% of non-nursing home service costs, but only 8% of all those eligible for Medicaid.

The second factor is the rise in nursing home costs. From FY 70 through the first half of FY 74 the average monthly Adult Public Assistance caseload rose 330% while average monthly nursing home patients rose 50%. Average cost per month for these patients rose 225% over 4 1/2 years. The first six months of FY 74 saw an average monthly cost of \$255,835, a 6% increase over FY 73. Again the disabled are the most costly group at an average \$951 per month in skilled nursing facilities as opposed to an aged patient's cost of \$847. In intermediate care facilities, they cost \$688 per month while an aged patient costs \$629. The number of disabled persons in nursing homes has risen 80% from FY 70 through the first half of FY 74 with an 8 1/2% increase in the six months of FY 74 over the entire year of FY 73. The four largest Medicaid certified nursing homes have requested rate increases from the Cost of Living Council for the remainder of the year in excess of 6% (one has requested an increase of 39%). The Division will have to abide by the Council's decision on these rate increases.

Proposed Medicaid Supplement

The third reason is increased utilization of all major Medicaid services by eligible recipients. An example of this is the greatly accelerated rate of expenditures for physician's services. By June 30, 1973, \$605,267 had been expended in this category for 10 months Medicaid coverage. By January 21, 1974, \$562,591 had been paid for 7 months services. This is in part due to increased usage of Medicaid services by Natives (about a 75% increase over last year). Concurrent with this is expanded non-Native usage as awareness of the Medicaid program has spread. Average monthly in-patient hospital services thus far in FY 74 are 21% higher than for FY 73 as of June 30, 1973. Additionally, dental coverage has been extended to children in dependent children families cases as is required by Federal law.

Finally there is an additional \$500,000 (\$250,000 State fund portion) in cost settling payments to be made to cover FY 73 full cost of care to nursing homes and hospitals. This is a Federal requirement. The \$500,000 is an estimate from Blue Cross, the auditor-intermediary for Medicare and Medicaid, based on preliminary audit findings.

Despite the projected \$1,578,000 deficit (\$789,000 State general fund portion) due to rising caseloads and especially Aid to the Disabled, rising costs, increased program usage by all eligibles, and cost settling, the advent of Medicaid continues to bring savings to the State. In addition to the Federal share of Medicaid there is increased Federal match rate in categorical aid programs. For FY 73, \$1,866,594.98 were claimed as the Federal Medicaid portion and for six months FY 74, another \$1,790,645.11 has been claimed (total = \$3,657,240.09). Increased categorical grant match (including categorically related foster care children) for FY 73 was \$2,510,000 and \$1,384,000 for six months in FY 74 (total = \$3,894,000). Having the intermediate care option for nursing care not only costs 29% less per day than skilled nursing care, but also provides 50% Federal Medicaid matching for intermediate care people. These patients would otherwise have to be paid for out of 100% General Relief Medical funds (a Federal share savings of \$372,758.70 first six months in FY 74 alone). In addition, the Division uses the Medicare profiles to determine the level of reimbursement for physician's services. The Medicare fee profile, medical review of nursing home patients to determine proper level of placement, and pre-authorizations for initial nursing home patients are the areas where the Division of Medical Assistance can and does hold medical costs down to effect program savings.

The added costs of this bill are \$10,000 annually in salary plus approximately \$1,000 annually in additional benefits cost. The total increase thus is \$11,000 annually from the General Fund.

SUBJECT: Proposed CS for Senate Bill 479 (Pioneers' Homes and Nursing
Homes General Obligation Bonds)

In reviewing the attached legislation it has been suggested that the combining of these two types of institutions in a single general obligation bond authorization measure might violate the "single subject" rule set forth in the Alaska Constitution (art. II, sec. 13).

While qualified bond counsel may differ with our conclusion, we think that the custodial, convalescent, and other health care services offered by these institutions are essentially so similar as to be virtually indistinguishable, thus, but for a distinction in nomenclature and traditional usage of the term "Pioneer's Home" in Alaska, there is no present reason to believe that the subject matter of the bill is in violation of the above cited provision of the Alaska Constitution.

The appropriation reflects two new professional and one additional clerical position--one Local Government Specialist II, one Local Government Specialist I, and one Clerk-Typist III.

Their principal responsibility will be the dissemination of information about municipal government as a means to effect local control of education by residents of the unorganized borough through reclassification of cities or incorporation of boroughs.

Staff positions would be field-oriented with particular responsibility for knowledge of current statutes relating to municipal government structure, function, and finances and ability to communicate with residents of areas interested in local government incorporation and operation. Adequate travel and per diem funds are requested supportive of field travel, particularly to communities of the northwest and southwest quadrants of the State. Equipment and supplies for the staff position are requested. ANALYSIS OF SENATE BILL 499

The sum specified is requested contingent upon adoption of AS 43.18.510, the unincorporated communities services account. The statutory reference is to be found in each of two bills, CSHB 404 and SB 495.

Attached is a copy of our initial analysis treating with HB 784, a companion to HB 404 wherein the sum of \$10 per capita or \$1000 per community was authorized. SB 495 increases the index to \$15 per capita or \$1500 per community, an increase of 50%. For the reasons stated in the initial note to the House Finance Committee, and subject to the limitations discussed in the accompanying letter, the estimate offered in the note addressing HB 784 may properly be increased by 50% to \$332,505.

At the instance of Commissioner Mallott, the House Community and Regional Affairs Committee added the words "or group of communities" in CSHB 404. The language appears also in SB 495. As groups of communities--including, presumably, one or more incorporated cities--may be assisted, the sum required should be increased to include populations of incorporated municipalities of the unorganized borough as well. Using 1970 census figures, we would compute the amount necessary to cover requests involving groups of incorporated communities brought pursuant to SB 495 at \$612,375. The sum, we suggest, would be in addition to the \$332,505 projected by the increase by 50% of the note prepared for HB 404 for unincorporated places.

Assuming municipalities may qualify within the category of "groups of communities," it appears that the total amount required to fund SB 495, subject to the same assumptions and conditions described in our note to HB 404, is \$944,880.

An appropriation of \$700,000 would require proration, which rate should be not less than 74.08% ($\$700,000 \div \$944,880$) in the event all 99 municipalities of the unorganized borough and unincorporated places named in worksheets accompanying this note qualify as recipients, either as individual communities or as elements of one or another "group of communities." The proration factor would, of course, be greater if fewer communities or groups of communities applied.

HB 784, offered by the Community and Regional Affairs Committee, would provide \$100,000 to fund the unincorporated communities services account. The bill is a companion to HB 404 (as offered, presently CSHB 404) wherein the Department of Community and Regional Affairs would be authorized to pay to unincorporated communities an annual entitlement--the greater of either \$1,000 per community or \$10 per capita--for purposes of planning for future community development.

Of the nearly 140 communities which may potentially qualify, I am unable to determine which might complete and transmit in proper and timely manner the necessary certificate that the recipient is a corporation or association "open to and broadly representative of all residents," Sec. 43.18.500(b). The requirement being minimal, one must assume that nearly all communities could qualify. In subsequent years, the reporting requirement, Sec. 43.18.500(e), may serve to disqualify several recipients of previous years; the reporting burden not being onerous, however, I would suggest that nearly all could meet that burden, too.

The range of communities which might be eligible derives from three sources:

- 1) those unincorporated places of 25 permanent residents or more recognized as eligible villages pursuant to the Claims Settlement Act;

2) those unincorporated places, with presumably 25 or more permanent residents, whose eligibility is presently subject to appellate review by the Alaska Native Claims Appeals Board, or which have chosen to receive reservation land and forego other Act benefits;

3) unincorporated places having a population of 25 or more, generally predominantly non-Native, wherein may be found a BIA or SOS school.

The list is not exclusive. There may be other places which qualify, of which we have no knowledge, though their cumulative claim for funds would be relatively small.

To fully fund the program, I would estimate an appropriation of \$221,670 would be required. An appropriation of \$100,000 would, assuming all villages named herein qualified, require a proration of 45.11%, resulting in a minimum entitlement of approximately \$451.00 per community. The rate would, of course, be higher if a lesser number of communities took the initiative to complete the necessary applications.

It is understood also that, as the number of communities seeking to incorporate as cities increases, a smaller appropriation would be required to sustain the unincorporated communities fund.

Worksheets more specifically identifying unincorporated communities and their projected entitlements are enclosed.

ANALYSIS OF SENATE BILL 499

The sum specified is requested contingent upon adoption of AS 43.18.510, the unincorporated communities services account. The statutory reference is to be found in each of two bills, CSHB 404 and SB 495.

Attached is a copy of our initial analysis treating with HB 784, a companion to HB 404 wherein the sum of \$10 per capita or \$1000 per community was authorized. SB 495 increases the index to \$15 per capita or \$1500 per community, an increase of 50%. For the reasons stated in the initial note to the House Finance Committee, and subject to the limitations discussed in the accompanying letter, the estimate offered in the note addressing HB 784 may properly be increased by 50% to \$332,505.

At the instance of Commissioner Mallott, the House Community and Regional Affairs Committee added the words "or group of communities" in CSHB 404. The language appears also in SB 495. As groups of communities--including, presumably, one or more incorporated cities--may be assisted, the sum required should be increased to include populations of incorporated municipalities of the unorganized borough as well. Using 1970 census figures, we would compute the amount necessary to cover requests involving groups of incorporated communities brought pursuant to SB 495 at \$612,375. The sum, we suggest, would be in addition to the \$332,505 projected by the increase by 50% of the note prepared for HB 404 for unincorporated places.

Assuming municipalities may qualify within the category of "groups of communities," it appears that the total amount required to fund SB 495, subject to the same assumptions and conditions described in our note to HB 404, is \$944,880.

An appropriation of \$700,000 would require proration, which rate should be not less than 74.08% ($\$700,000 \div \$944,880$) in the event all 99 municipalities of the unorganized borough and unincorporated places named in worksheets accompanying this note qualify as recipients, either as individual communities or as elements of one or another "group of communities." The proration factor would, of course, be greater if fewer communities or groups of communities applied.

HB 784, offered by the Community and Regional Affairs Committee, would provide \$100,000 to fund the unincorporated communities services account. The bill is a companion to HB 404 (as offered, presently CSHB 404) wherein the Department of Community and Regional Affairs would be authorized to pay to unincorporated communities an annual entitlement--the greater of either \$1,000 per community or \$10 per capita--for purposes of planning for future community development.

Of the nearly 140 communities which may potentially qualify, I am unable to determine which might complete and transmit in proper and timely manner the necessary certificate that the recipient is a corporation or association "open to and broadly representative of all residents," Sec. 43.18.500(b). The requirement being minimal, one must assume that nearly all communities could qualify. In subsequent years, the reporting requirement, Sec. 43.18.500(e), may serve to disqualify several recipients of previous years; the reporting burden not being onerous, however, I would suggest that nearly all could meet that burden, too.

The range of communities which might be eligible derives from three sources:

- 1) those unincorporated places of 25 permanent residents or more recognized as eligible villages pursuant to the Claims Settlement Act;

2) those unincorporated places, with presumably 25 or more permanent residents, whose eligibility is presently subject to appellate review by the Alaska Native Claims Appeals Board, or which have chosen to receive reservation land and forego other Act benefits;

3) unincorporated places having a population of 25 or more, generally predominantly non-Native, wherein may be found a BIA or SOS school.

The list is not exclusive. There may be other places which qualify, of which we have no knowledge, though their cumulative claim for funds would be relatively small.

To fully fund the program, I would estimate an appropriation of \$221,670 would be required. An appropriation of \$100,000 would, assuming all villages named herein qualified, require a proration of 45.11%, resulting in a minimum entitlement of approximately \$451.00 per community. The rate would, of course, be higher if a lesser number of communities took the initiative to complete the necessary applications.

It is understood also that, as the number of communities seeking to incorporate as cities increases, a smaller appropriation would be required to sustain the unincorporated communities fund.

Worksheets more specifically identifying unincorporated communities and their projected entitlements are enclosed.
