8 WHEREAS, under the proposed federal budget, drastic cuts in federal funds
9 for educational purposes would be lost to Alaska if the budget were to be
10 adopted; and

11 WHEREAS the cutback in P.L. 874 funds to the state alone would approxi-
12 mate \$6 million; and

13 WHEREAS these funds are provided the state in lieu of taxes which would
14 have been levied but for the fact they are received to alleviate the cost
15 of education of all children of federal workers in the state who are not
16 living and working on a military base or other federal installation; and

17 WHEREAS, under the President's proposed budget, the state would have
18 to fund the \$1.2 million cost of children who live off of a federal installa-
19 tion but go to a school run by the State-Operated School System; and

20 WHEREAS the remaining \$4.8 million loss in federal funding would have
21 to be borne by local governments to pay the cost of children going to
22 locally run schools and whose parents live outside a federal installation;
23 and

24 WHEREAS this additional financial burden which would face the state
25 and local governments of Alaska would be an intolerable burden for the
26 people of Alaska;

27 BE IT RESOLVED by the Alaska Legislature that the President of the
28 United States is urgently requested to direct the Office of Management and
29 Budget to immediately restore all cuts in the proposed federal impact

1 funding under P.L. 874 in order to prevent financial disaster in our state
2 and its local communities.

4 Nixon, President of the United States; the Honorable Roy L. Ash, Director

You have asked for a Fiscal Note on Senate Bill 405 which is identical to House Bill 696. These Bills are companion pieces of legislation to accompany House Concurrent Resolution 59, which likewise is identical to Senate Concurrent Resolution 25.

The Fiscal Note then, covers in affect, all four pieces of legislation since there were not fiscal implications in either House Bill 696 or Senate Bill 405, but rather they were merely implementing statutes which cleaned up some terminology and provided some additional definitions and terminology.

The Fiscal Note then, for Senate Concurrent Resolution 25 also serves for House Concurrent Resolution 59, since they are identical.

ATTACHMENT "A" to Fiscal Note on SCR-25

ASSUMPTION NO. 1:

The military base schools will be funded through the Foundation Program Payments to the operating school districts, with a supplemental amount paid directly to the districts on behalf of each child from an appropriation to the Department of Education for that purpose.

ASSUMPTION NO. 2:

The supplemental amount to be appropriated to the Department of Education and distributed to the districts is intended to cover the full cost of education of a child when added to the foundation support for that child.

ASSUMPTION NO. 3:

The appropriate supplemental amount per child is arrived at by deducting from the tuition computations those funds paid by the district for debt service since there is no debt service connected with operation of the military base schools. The supplemental amounts, then, that result from this recomputation are \$260.68 for Anchorage and \$356.49 for Fairbanks.

ASSUMPTION NO. 4:

The State-Operated Schools appropriation would be reduced by the amount of funds which would have been allocated for the operation of Ft. Richardson, Elemendorf, Ft. Wainwright, and Eielson Base Schools.

ASSUMPTION NO. 5:

Pupil Transportation Funds in the State-Operated Schools appropriation for military schools would be reduced by the amount of their contracts and added to the Pupil Transportation Fund in the Financial Support Programs BRU.

ASSUMPTION NO. 6:

The Anchorage Central Office Administration of the State-Operated School System would be proportionately reduced as a consequence of less administrative overhead. The amount or ratio of military to rural services has not been determined, but for purposes of this computation is assumed to be 70% devoted to rural schools and 30% devoted to military school operation.

ASSUMPTION NO. 7:

The Foundation Support Unit is computed at its present level of \$20,250.

ASSUMPTION NO. 8:

The required local share, i.e., roughly 10% would not apply, and 100% of basic need would be used.

ASSUMPTION NO. 9:

Inflation and impact costs will increase at the rate of 15% per year.

ASSUMPTION NO. 11:

Increased district administration costs due to the increase in support services, i.e., purchasing, etc., might require a portion of the savings from reductions in the S.O.S. Central Office, therefore reducing the net overall saving estimated for '75.

(Schools on Military Reservations)

As it emerged from the Senate, CSSB 122 (Finance) amended would have dissolved the State-Operated School System by creating educational service areas in the unorganized borough and by requiring that military reservations that comprised an educational service area, or areas, contract with an adjacent city or borough school district for the operation of the on-base schools.

In its present form, however, House CS for CSSB 122 makes only those changes in the Education (AS 14) and Municipal (AS 29) Codes essential to facilitate the consumation of a contract for the operation of on-base schools by a city or borough school district at the direction of the Department of Education, and with the consent of the contracting district governing body. It is a necessary companion measure to House CS for Senate Concurrent Resolution 25 which expresses legislative endorsement of contractual operation of the on-base schools by a city or borough school district and sets out the elements of any such contract that the legislature thinks desirable.

Under legislation enacted in 1973 (ch. 32, SLA 1973) that permitted cities and boroughs to annex military reservations, language was included in both the Education and Municipal Codes which provided that although military reservations were included within the territorial boundaries of an organized borough, these reservations did not become a part of the borough school district until the military reservation status terminated and until inclusion of that territory in the borough school district was approved by the Department of Education. In preparing a contract for the operation of on-base schools by a city or borough school district it might be argued that no contract could be effective because there had been no change in the base's status as a military reservation. It is also true that almost invariably a base's military reservation status never changes; however, the military mission or operation may change or cease. Thus, Sections 1, 6 and 7 of the bill revise the language of AS 14.12.020(a), 29.33.050 and 29.41.010(a) to provide that military reservations remain outside the borough school district until the military mission is terminated or so long as management and control of the on-base schools by the state-operated schools is approved by the Department of Education. Language also is added to clarify a potential distinction that might be made between "management and control" and "operation" on the on-base schools. Thus, operation of the on-base schools by a city or a borough school district may be directed by the Department of Education if the contracting district governing body consents.

Section 2 makes clear the power of the Department of Education to prescribe the terms of a contract entered into under its general authorization under AS 14.14.110 to require cooperation between school districts, or with the state-operated schools or the Bureau of Indian Affairs "when necessary to provide more efficient or more economical educational services."

Section 3 clarifies provisions of present law establishing advisory boards in communities served by the state-operated school system by providing that advisory boards also exist on military reservations and will continue to exist if the on-base schools are operated by contract by a city or borough school district. Section 4 stipulates that the on-base advisory school board may be advisory to the governing body of the school district that operates the on-base schools. Together with Section 10 of the bill, Section 4 sets the date of election for on-base advisory school board members where these schools are operated under contract, as the same as that for the regular municipal election at which city or borough school district board members are elected. The terms of the present-on base advisory school board members are continued through the transitional period until the next regular municipal election.

Section 5 of the bill repeals a provision of present law that limits participation in on-base advisory school board elections, as voters or candidates, to parents of children attending the on-base schools, thus excluding single persons or those without dependent children from participation. Outside military reservations, voters who are unmarried or who have no children in the public school system are not prohibited from voting, or being candidates, for school board.

Under legislation enacted in 1973 authorizing the annexation of Elmendorf AFB, Ft. Richardson and Ft. Wainwright to the Greater Anchorage Area and Fairbanks-North Star Boroughs by virtue of their annexation to the cities of Anchorage and Fairbanks, respectively, certain language of the Mandatory Borough Act (sec. 3(d), ch. 52, SLA 1963) was repealed. (sec. 4, ch. 41, SLA 1973) Inasmuch as AS 29.68.020 was enacted (sec. 1, ch. 32, SLA 1973) setting out the exclusive procedure whereby annexation of military reservations to cities or boroughs takes place, the exclusionary language contained in the Mandatory Borough Act no longer is required and might prove an additional inhibition to the effectiveness of a contract consummated under AS 14.14.110. Hence, Sections 8 and 11 of the bill, together, repeal the potentially restrictive, clearly obsolete, exclusionary language in the Mandatory Borough Act and delete the cross-reference to it in the present Municipal Code.

Section 9 of the bill abrogates the term of office of a member of the Board of Directors of the State-Operated Schools who is a resident of a military reservation whose schools are operated by a city or borough school district under contract. This section, however, does not preclude a military reservation resident from serving on the SOS board so long as the schools are operated under the SOS system.

Section 12 sets an immediate effective date for the legislation.

Department of Education officials have assured the Finance Committee that there will be no additional cost to the State if this version of the legislation is adopted. Present funding levels for the State-Operated Schools, On-Base Schools and a portion of the State-Operated Schools Central Office funds will be adequate to cover the costs of city or borough school district contracts. Also, the present PL 874 federal aid preferential rate will not be jeopardized by this committee substitute.

ATTACHMENT "A" to Fiscal Note on SCR-25

ASSUMPTION NO. 1:

The military base schools will be funded through the Foundation Program Payments to the operating school districts, with a supplemental amount paid directly to the districts on behalf of each child from an appropriation to the Department of Education for that purpose.

ASSUMPTION NO. 2:

The supplemental amount to be appropriated to the Department of Education and distributed to the districts is intended to cover the full cost of education of a child when added to the foundation support for that child.

ASSUMPTION NO. 3:

The appropriate supplemental amount per child is arrived at by deducting from the tuition computations those funds paid by the district for debt service since there is no debt service connected with operation of the military base schools. The supplemental amounts, then, that result from this recomputation are \$260.68 for Anchorage and \$356.49 for Fairbanks.

ASSUMPTION NO. 4:

The State-Operated Schools appropriation would be reduced by the amount of funds which would have been allocated for the operation of Ft. Richardson, Elemendorf, Ft. Wainwright, and Eielson Base Schools.

ASSUMPTION NO. 5:

Pupil Transportation Funds in the State-Operated Schools appropriation for military schools would be reduced by the amount of their contracts and added to the Pupil Transportation Fund in the Financial Support Programs BRU.

ASSUMPTION NO. 6:

The Anchorage Central Office Administration of the State-Operated School System would be proportionately reduced as a consequence of less administrative overhead. The amount or ratio of military to rural services has not been determined, but for purposes of this computation is assumed to be 70% devoted to rural schools and 30% devoted to military school operation.

ASSUMPTION NO. 7:

The Foundation Support Unit is computed at its present level of \$20,250.

ASSUMPTION NO. 8.

The required local share, i.e., roughly 10% would not apply, and 100% of basic need would be used.

ASSUMPTION NO. 9:

Inflation and impact costs will increase at the rate of 15% per year.

ASSUMPTION NO. 11:

Increased district administration costs due to the increase in support services, i.e., purchasing, etc., might require a portion of the savings from reductions in the S.O.S. Central Office, therefore reducing the net overall saving estimated for '75.



Dear Mr. President:

Pursuant to the Uniform Rules of the Legislature I am transmitting a proposed concurrent resolution which would authorize the Alaska State Housing Authority to build office and court space and related parking space which would meet the needs of the State of Alaska through 1985.

Last year the Department of Administration, which is statutorily responsible for apportioning State-owned office space among the agencies of government and for leasing privately-owned space, completed a detailed analysis of the requirements of the executive and judicial branches of State government in various locations in Alaska. The need for sixteen structures to meet varying combined and individual department needs in six communities of the State was identified. Five of these structures were approved by House Concurrent Resolution No. 4 of the 1972 Alaska State Legislature.

The plan proposed by the accompanying resolution and summarized in the attached charts, covers those buildings not authorized last year with some slight modifications of occupancy, together with necessary parking structures not heretofore included. Likewise included are court and office structures for Valdez and Palmer. They will allow for a greater degree of coordination among State agencies and for better service to the Alaskan public.

As I indicated last year, rental rates in leased structures are rapidly increasing. The State's need for space is continuous and expanding. Many of the available privately-owned leased quarters, and a few State-owned facilities, are inadequate.

Projecting the amount of money the State shall have to pay for the lease of private facilities through 1985 and comparing that outlay to the cost of State ownership, it is evident that for nearly the same

amount of money, State functions can be in first class buildings designed for State purposes - buildings in which through the payment of rent to the Alaska State Housing Authority the State each year develops an increasing equity. At the conclusion of the debt service amortization the State would become the fee simple owner of these structures, and realize at that time a dramatic decrease in the amount of State dollars expended on space requirements.

In order to avoid the inevitable inflation in the construction industry which will occur at the height of trans-Alaska oil pipeline construction, contracts for the facilities described in the resolution should be awarded at the earliest possible time. The immediate commencement of at least some of these structures, while serving an urgent State need, will help to keep our general economic prosperity at a high level.

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

PLANNING FOR SCHOOL FINANCE STUDY

Senate Concurrent Resolution 36 calling for CNER to design a school finance study has been introduced at the second session of the Eighth Legislature. The resolution calling for a re-study of Alaska's public school foundation programs cited numerous reasons - social and economic changes, the need for periodic study, and recognition of the need by several state-level organizations.

A state-wide study of this magnitude and importance should be well planned. A time schedule of significant events as well as technical and financial needs must be identified for legislative consideration before the study begins. The products of this planning phase should include:

1. A brief description and analysis of Alaska's current systems of financing elementary and secondary education.
2. Identification and description of educational finance issues in Alaska.
3. Identification of national trends in school finance and school law including recent court decisions bearing on financing of education and how they may apply to Alaska.
4. Identification of state and national participants for the study.
5. Development of an annotated bibliography of school finance resource materials.

6. Development of a plan of work for the study, including costs parameters, time schedules, and alternative procedures.
7. Identification of funding sources for the study.

This planning phase could be completed by December, 1973 and a printed report would be available for presentation to the first session of the Ninth Legislature. CNER staff, with limited outside technical assistance, would be responsible for completing the plan for the study. Costs of the planning phase are estimated as follows:

Printing	<u>3,000.00</u>

Tentative events of the school finance study itself might be as follows:

- 1) April, 1975 - the study begins
- 2) January - February, 1976 - study results will be available for legislative action.
- 3) March, 1976 until June 30, 1977 - preparation for installation of new finance system.
- 4) July 1, 1977 - new school finance system become effective.
