

Senate CS for House Bill No. 120

The Senate Finance Committee recommends that House Bill No. 120 be replaced with Senate Committee Substitute for House Bill No. 120 and that SCS HB 120 do pass. The Committee Substitute provides for Medicaid reimbursement to a needy individual for the cost of purchasing eyeglasses prescribed by a physician skilled in diseases of the eye or by an optometrist as well as the cost of refractions and eye examinations by ophthalmologists or optometrists for which the original bill provides. Currently, only refractions or eye examinations by an ophthalmologist are covered by Medicaid except that children may receive such services by an optometrist as well and also be covered for eyeglasses under the Early Screening program.

The Department of Health and Social Services estimates that an additional 1,100 refractions or examinations would be covered at an average cost of \$39 in FY 77 under HB 120. The additional cost incorporated in SCS HB 120 is estimated at \$30,000 based on the purchase of 1,000 eyeglasses at an average cost of \$30.

"An act relating to eye examinations for needy persons; and providing for an effective date."

Passage of bill would make it possible for persons to go to an optometrist or an ophthalmologist whereas before they were limited to services provided by an ophthalmologist. In as much as ophthalmologist services are not available in every community, passage of House Bill 120 would make eye exams and refractions easily obtainable by more needy persons.

It is expected that the approximate number of persons using optometric services provided under this bill would be 1150.

Funding for optometric services was not included in budget considerations; therefore the increases indicated on the Fiscal Note of last year plus a ten percent increase due to cost of living would have to be included in the budget.

The department supports the bill with the fiscal considerations recommended above.

Dear Mr. Speaker:

Pursuant to the Uniform Rules of the Legislature, I am transmitting a bill relating to the public school foundation program. This bill represents the first step toward this Administration's goal of providing local school districts with full funding for the basic costs of their educational programs. I recognize, as do all the citizens of our State, that until pipeline revenues begin to flow into the State's treasury, the State is simply not in a financial position to implement completely that full funding goal.

I propose, therefore, to move toward full funding over the next three or four years by immediately increasing for the upcoming fiscal year the level of State support of basic need under the foundation program from 90 to 93 percent and also by increasing the value of the instructional unit from \$21,750 to \$23,500. Additionally, I propose to correct immediately certain inequities which the Department of Education has found to exist under the current provisions of the foundation program. These are:

1. Changing the basis for computation of the instructional units for special education for which a school district qualifies to qualify equivalents, as vocational education instructional units are presently computed, and reworking the aid entitlement formula for special education to compensate properly for the change in the computational basis and provide adequate funding for special education needs. Experience has shown that the present method does not adequately fund the districts' special education expenses.
2. Altering the method of computing additional instructional unit allotments for school districts because of cost differentials in various parts of the State by using as a basis for determining the applicable cost differential

the percentage factor, by election district, incorporated in the State's bargaining agreement with the Alaska Public Employees Association. Experience has shown that the present method is inefficient to compensate school districts in the more remote areas of the State for their higher costs of operation.

3. Repealing the additional allotment provision of AS 14.17.215. The National School Finance Study has concluded that the federal counterpart of this allotment procedure (P.L. 81-874) actually encourages inequality of education in the United States. The Department believes, similarly, that AS 14.17.215 is not accomplishing the purpose for which it was enacted in 1969, prior to establishment of the present foundation program and that as 100 percent financing by the State is achieved, the disqualifying effect of this statute will be magnified.

For the longer haul, I believe the entire approach to determining a local school district's "basic need" must be re-evaluated and, if necessary, re-structured. This means looking at the foundation program as a whole, as well as looking at the program's various segments. I think I am correct in stating that neither the Legislature nor this Administration is convinced that the present foundation program truly measures a school district's basic costs for providing education. A review of the foundation program and of alternative methods for funding education will be conducted by the Department of Education in conjunction with the Center for Northern Educational Research. As their findings and conclusions are developed over the next year or so, I would hope to be able to incorporate them into new legislation which would make possible true provision by the State of full funding of the basic costs of education by fiscal year 1978 or 1979.

ATTACHMENT NO. 1

Rationale for changing Special Education funding from a separate to a supplemental program.

The present funding system for special education requires that the special education ADM be subtracted from the total regular ADM. The end result of this method is a reduction in the basic education allocation. The basic education cost is the same for all students. Special programs such as handicapped and vocational which supplement the basic program require costs over and above the basic education cost. The present system only provides 2/3 of the necessary costs for special education students. Making this program a supplemental rather than basic will provide the basic 1/3 which is not now provided.
