



CONTRACT for SERVICES

DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION

This contract, entered into the 2nd day of July 19 74 and effective as of the 1st day of July, 19 74, between the State of Alaska, Department of Environmental Conservation, (hereinafter called the "State"), and Ken Roberts, (hereinafter called the "Contractor").

WITNESSETH that:

Whereas, the State is entering into this contract by direct negotiation and not by competitive bids because this is a contract for professional services;

Whereas, the Contractor is willing to undertake the performance of this contract under the terms of this contract;

Whereas, the Department of Environmental Conservation has the authority to enter into this contract by legislative intent as shown in State Legislative Finance committee meeting minutes of April 24, 1974.

NOW THEREFORE, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

Article I. The Service to be Performed.

Photographic documentation of the pipeline as follows:

1. Construction

Show in detail the actual construction of roads, camps, bridges, pump stations, air strips and other ancillary projects with special emphasis on engineering, actual laying of pipe, its burial and elevation.

2. Environmental Impact

Record the physical impact of pipeline construction, sites singled out by the State as environmentally significant. Show the measures taken in order to insure compliance with environmental standards set by State or federal agencies.

3. Sociological Impact

Record the construction-maturity-relocation cycle of camps and the environmental impact on camps, villages and cities of the great influx of people.

All photos, films and negatives will be the property of the State of Alaska and will be transmitted to the Pipeline Coordinator's office at frequent intervals or upon request of the Pipeline Coordinator. The Pipeline Coordinator will administer the contract, review and approve progress reports and invoices prior to payment, request specific areas of interest to be documented, and retain control of all pipeline documentation resulting from this contract. The Pipeline Coordinator will have final approval of all duplication and distribution of film, photos, etc. The Pipeline Coordinator will receive a log kept in log binders containing all negatives made, a contact proof of all negatives and a written text detailing the time, place and circumstances of the exposures shown on each contact proof sheet. Tape recorded interviews will be included where they are especially appropriate. The coordinator may request as many prints of any negatives, work prints of 16 mm movie film and final prints insofar as funds permit.

Article II. The Period for Performance.

The period of performance under this contract shall commence on July 1, 19 74, and expire on June 30, 19 75.

Performance may be extended for additional periods by the mutual written agreement of the parties.

Article III. Consideration.

In full consideration of the Contractor's performance hereunder, the State shall pay the Contractor \$35,000.00 in eleven monthly installments of \$2917 and one of \$2913. The contractor will submit an invoice each month to the Pipeline Coordinator giving a brief statement of progress and transmitting any completed film, negatives, etc. After approval the Office of the Pipeline Coordinator will forward the invoice to Environmental Conservation for payment.

Article IV. Additional Contract Provisions.

This contract is subject to all applicable laws of the State of Alaska.

Appendix A attached hereto and made a part hereof sets forth additional general contract provisions of this contract.

for

ALASKA PIPELINE BCOM

DOCUMENTATION PROJECT

This is a proposal to document the boom expected in Alaska in connection with the construction of the Alaska Pipeline, for the benefit of historians, sociologists, economists and other scholars. There is no known previous planned attempt to document a boom as it happens, and experience gained should be of value to others who need to record major socio-economic events.

Principal characteristics of the project are:

1. Planning. An attempt is made to ascertain which specific kinds of information are needed, in what form they will exist, and where they may be obtained.

2. Aggressive collection. There will be no reliance on chance, no assumption that the information will be available at a later date. Instead, data will be actively sought.

3. Comprehensive indexing. Materials collected will be indexed so as to permit retrieval by discipline, geographic area, ethnic group and information source.

This is a four-year project beginning in the spring of 1974.

Project director: H. Theodore Ryberg, Director of Libraries, University of Alaska.

Background

In the fall of 1959 the State of Alaska sold oil lease rights in the Prudhoe Bay area to a number of oil companies. The size of the oil field is indicated by the fact that the oil companies paid about \$900,000,000 for the leases. The oil is, however, located in a remote region with no railroads, roads, or navigable waterways, and the companies immediately began research to find the best way to get the oil to market. One highly publicized experiment was that in which the tanker Manhattan tested the feasibility of a northwest passage through the Arctic ice.

End result of the experiments was a decision to build an 800-mile long pipeline from the Prudhoe Bay area to Valdez, the only ice-free port on the south coast of Alaska. Tankers are to pick up the oil in Valdez and transport it to West Coast ports. Eager to begin recouping their investment, the oil companies formed a consortium to build the pipeline, made tentative commitments to contractors, and began shipping in pipe. Construction was to begin in 1970, but suits filed by environmentalist organizations forced repeated postponement of the \$2,500,000,000 project.

Recent developments in the international oil market, combined with fuel oil shortages in some areas of the United States during the winter of 1972-73 and gasoline shortages in 1973, brought about Congressional realization that action was imperative. A bill to exempt the pipeline from provisions of the environmental impact law has passed both houses of Congress and all indications are that pipeline construction will begin in 1974.

Alaska expected an influx of out-of-state oil workers as the pipeline got underway, and experience in the summer of 1970 confirmed this expectation. For a short time oil field equipment firms opened expediting offices in Fairbanks, high-level/company executives rented suites of offices in Anchorage, and construction workers and college students from all over the country began arriving and looking for work. (One group of college students from New England even bought an old bus which they drove all the way to Fairbanks.)

Unemployment is high in Alaska in the winter. In the summer a short, highly intensive construction season, tourist business, and some mining combine to reduce the rate of unemployment among permanent residents and afford jobs to some out-of-state transients. The normal job market in the summer of 1970 was far from being able to handle the throngs of job-seekers. As it became clear that the environmentalist challenge to the pipeline was not an easily-solved problem most of the newcomers left, and so far few have returned. There is little doubt that Congressional approval of the pipeline and the resulting construction will bring them back.

Predictions

Alaska is in for a boom. Unscrupulous "overseas employment" firms, advertising "high-paying jobs in Alaska," exaggerated word-of-mouth accounts of roughnecks earning \$20,000 a year, the romantic aura of the Last Frontier, and even the simple unadorned truth about Alaska will combine to bring a flood of job-seekers, small businessmen, adventurers, drifters and gamblers into the state.

If past experience is any guide many will fly up (some in luxurious first-class comfort), others will put a camper on a pickup truck and drive the Alaska Highway, and probably a few families will load all of their belongings on a converted school bus or 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ -ton van and creep slowly over the 4,000-5,000 miles between home and Alaska. Almost certainly college students will crowd into elderly cars or hitchhike up the Alaska Highway.

Housing will be scarce, schools overcrowded, community services strained. Alaska residents will in some cases feel that the outsiders are depriving them of the better jobs, local businessmen will resent competition from newcomers, there will be sharp controversy as to whether the transients are paying their fair share of the tax burden, and accusations of price gouging will fill the air.

How long will the boom last? No one is quite sure, and estimates depend to some extent on guesses as to the amount of local construction which will be postponed until maximum pipeline impact is over, the number and kind of subsidiary enterprises (including refineries) which the pipeline will attract, whether a natural gas pipeline is also built, and the proportion of jobs falling to permanent Alaska residents. The best estimates at this date indicate a leveling-off about four years from the time pipeline construction begins.

Seldom in American history has there been as much clear forewarning of a boom. The California and Klondike gold rushes, the Oklahoma land rush, even the Miami boom of the 1920's simply exploded. Delay of the Alaska pipeline by environmentalist suits, however, has made it possible not only to predict that there will be a boom but also to tell with some certainty when it will start and about how long it will last.

Documentation of previous booms was unplanned and spotty. Newspapers started and folded (or moved on to the next strike), diaries were kept--and often lost or thrown away on the death of the diarist, broadsides and handbills were preserved accidentally, if at all, and memoirs appearing in later years were often colored by self-justification or showed that memories are fallible. Modern electronic recording technology did not exist. In the absence of a project such as this, documentation of this boom will follow a similar pattern.

General

This is a proposal to document the Alaska pipeline boom as it happens, so that future historians and other scholars may have the primary source materials so necessary for their work--and which too often are sorely lacking. Documentation to be sought will include all printed ephemera: handbills, broadsides, signs, mimeographed newsletters and bulletins; photographs, both commercial and amateur; menus, timetables, manuscript diaries, journals and letters. Clipping files from newspapers and magazines will furnish continuity and give coverage of broader scope.

Much of what happens never gets into print. In order to record non-print facets of the boom there will be a series of interviews, recorded on audio tape or film. This will not be the "oral history" kind of recording currently popular, since tapes made years after the event have the same weaknesses as described above for memoirs. Rather, interviewees will be reporting their current observations, hopes and fears, and the same person interviewed at the beginning, middle, and end of the boom may produce three quite different stories. Film will also be used to record such matters as life in construction camps, supply flights to the oil fields, strikes, and temporary encampments.

Plan

The project plan calls for an aggressive collection effort. Members of the History Department, University of Alaska at Fairbanks, will establish collection guidelines. The Director of Collections will then, in consultation with the Project Director, Assistant Directors, and two librarians on the project staff, prepare specific instructions as to the kinds of materials to be collected and the geographical areas of collection. Conferences between these individuals and History Department professors will be utilized to iron out any differences and ensure that all concerned are operating on the same premises.

As presently envisioned, the Director of Collections, two librarians, secretary and student assistants will work in the Elmer E. Rasmuson Library, University of Alaska at Fairbanks. This will also be the home base for two collectors and two interviewer/photographers.

The pipeline impact area will be divided into two sectors: northern sector, Fairbanks-North Pole to Prudhoe Bay area; and southern sector, everything south of North Pole. A team of one collector and one interviewer/photographer will be assigned to each sector and will make repeated trips in it. It is anticipated that much of the time in the first few trips will be devoted to establishing a network of volunteer informants and collectors who will furnish information and gather materials for the team.

Upon return from a trip the team will turn in its collections, be debriefed, and be briefed for the next trip. Materials collected will be cataloged and filed by one of the two librarians, with the aid of student assistants. Cataloging will follow usual Library of Congress procedures, except that there will always be a geographic location index card. (Geographic indexing will also aid the Director of Collections to ensure that no significant areas are left unreported.)

The other librarian on the project will be responsible for the newspaper and magazine clipping files. Student assistants will do the actual clipping and filing under the librarian's supervision. The indexing system used will be identical with that used for the other materials, so that everything pertaining to a specific subject or geographical location may be drawn together.

Upon completion of the project all materials and files will be housed in the Elmer E. Rasmuson Library of the University of Alaska at Fairbanks. The collection will be available for use by researchers. Microfilms of printed and written materials and copies of films and tapes will be sold at cost to any library or other non-profit agency.

Personnel

The project will be directed by the Director of Libraries of the University of Alaska, H. Theodore Nyberg.* Assistant directors will be Paul H. McCarthy, Jr., University Archivist and Curator of Manuscripts; and Charles H. Parr, Arctic Bibliographer. Professors William Hunt, Claus Maske, Orlando Miller, James Foster, and Herman Slotnick of the History Department, University of Alaska at Fairbanks, will prepare the guidelines for the collection effort and act as an advisory board for the duration of the project.


Dear Mr. Palmer:

All photos, slides, 16 mm films, negatives and tape recordings will be the property of the State of Alaska and will be transmitted to the Division of State Libraries at frequent intervals or upon request. The Department of Environmental Conservation will administer the contract, review and approve progress reports and invoices prior to payment, request in cooperation with the Division of State Libraries specific areas of interest to be documented, the Division of State Libraries shall retain control of all pipeline documentation resulting from this contract. The Division of State Libraries will have final approval of all duplication and distribution of film, photos, etc. The Contractor shall maintain a log kept in log binders containing all slides, negatives made, a contact proof of all negatives and a written text detailing the time, place and circumstances of the exposures shown on each contact proof sheet. Tape recorded interviews will be included where they are especially appropriate.

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



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

Dear Senator Ray:

The City and Borough of Sitka would appreciate your support of HB 170. We have been informed the enactment of HB 170 would cost the State of Alaska \$600,000, which we do not agree with. For starters, I do not believe the State has taken into consideration the costs of the administrative staff required to make collections.

If HB 170 is not enacted, I am convinced that political subdivisions will commence filing State charges instead of municipal for most offenses in which case the State is solely responsible for all costs of the court. In addition, it then becomes the responsibility of the State to prosecute all such cases which will require the services of another district attorney. The State would also pay for the public defender and jury costs, which are now paid for by the political subdivisions. Of course the State would be entitled to all fines and forfeitures if State instead of municipal charges are filed, but I hardly think the State is in a position to provide and pay for the additional services required for the sum of \$20,000 which represents a year's receipts of fines and forfeitures. Based on the aforesaid, I am sure you must agree the State is not going to lose \$600,000.

AS Sec. 22.15.270 as now reads, is extremely unfair to political subdivisions in that we are required to pay for a service over which we have no control. I personally believe the Sitka court is overstaffed, and judges throughout Alaska are overpaid. To make my point on the overstaffing, I enclose a copy of a letter addressed to yourself from Chief Justice Boochever, dated March 3, 1976. I have underlined Chief Justice Boochever's statement, "There was not enough work for two judges at Sitka". Nothing has changed; there is still not sufficient work for two judges in Sitka, but the court still retains the same number of clerks and supportative services for which we are demanded to pay a percentage of the costs.

The municipality of Sitka does not enjoy the luxury of overstaffing and overpaying within the municipal government, and we do resent the fact the State has legislated us into condoning and paying for same for the State.



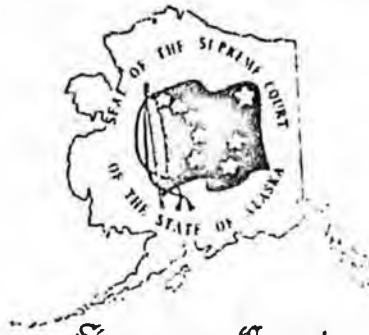

Dear Senator Ray:

I am in receipt of a letter from Senator Ziegler advising me that you were under the impression that I do not favor SB 670 which would create a new superior court position for the First Judicial District. The purpose of the legislation, as you know, is to authorize the appointment of a superior court judge to reside at Sitka in place of the district court judge now authorized.

When Judge Carlson received the appointment to the Third Judicial District and applications were solicited for his replacement, some members of the Sitka bar and municipal government advocated the location of a superior court judge at Sitka in addition to the district court judge residing there. This would, in effect, place the third Southeastern superior court judge at Sitka in the same manner that was attempted when Judge Carlson was initially appointed. There just was not enough work for two judges at Sitka, and there was urgent work for an additional superior court judge at Juneau and assisting in other areas of the state. I therefore did not support the concept of the third superior court judge residing at Sitka in addition to a district court judge resident there.

Subsequently, the suggestion was made to have a superior court judge at Sitka in lieu of the district court judge and as an additional superior court judge for the



First Judicial District. The Judicial Council held well attended hearings in Sitka on this matter, and the proposal was strongly endorsed by practically everybody attending the meeting. The Judicial Council endorsed the concept of an additional First Judicial District superior court judge to reside at Sitka with the elimination of the district court position there. This position was also endorsed by the Supreme Court with Justice Erwin dissenting.

I firmly believe that the additional superior court judge for the First Judicial District to reside at Sitka will result in improved judicial service and should either involve little additional expense to the state or possibly even result in a savings. A savings may be possible by elimination of a clerical position at Sitka which was required when two judges were serving the City coupled with the elimination of the travel time of the superior court judges who resided elsewhere and were required to travel to Sitka at regular intervals.

I hope that this letter clarifies my position on the matter, and I regret if there has been any confusion based on the prior history. Thank you for your consideration of the request for an additional superior court judge.

Gentlemen:

I am writing to ask each of you to support H.B. 170, the effect of which is to eliminate the charge to cities for services provided by the court system. As I understand the new arrangement between the court system and the various municipalities, the court system is required to keep detailed time records of the time spent on municipal cases and bill the city according to the time spent. This, of course, requires the personnel in the Clerk's office as well as the District Judges to attempt to keep some kind of records on the amount of time spent on these city misdemeanor cases. For the amount of money realized out of the effort, and I do not believe the court system really knows how much the State gets, the extra time and effort involved seems to be counter-productive. Further, it seems odd to me that we provide for a unified court system and require the municipalities to use the court system and then charge them for the service.



FISCAL NOTE - HB 170

House Bill 170 repeals the requirement that political subdivisions pay the State for judicial services provided to them by the Alaska Court System. Under the provisions of HB 170, therefore, the Alaska Court System would process municipal ordinance violations, local traffic tickets and other municipal criminal cases at no expense to the political subdivisions. Since the Court System is already processing these cases no additional expenditures would be incurred. However, the State would lose the revenue that it presently is receiving as payment for services from the political subdivisions.

The estimated revenue loss for the next five years would be as follows:
