Due to the existing development of Harding Lake and the fear that additional development may be detrimental, I would like to propose that the camping facilities for the handicapped proposed for Harding Lake (HB-221), be moved to a site in the Chena River Recreation Area. I believe a simple amendment of the title of the bill to Chena River Recreation Area would be sufficient. I have enclosed a map in this packet which will show the area to be developed on Chena River. I have also enclosed the proposed amendment for your perusal.

The Department of Parks is very much in favor of this amendment, and has in fact encouraged it. Contacted in Fairbanks on the proposed change were Ms. Gwen Smith, Residential Director of the Fairbanks Rehabilitation Assoc., and Ms. Nancy Johnson, Director of the Arctic Association for Retarded Children. Both were favorable to the change, feeling that the site has good accessibility for their programs.

An additional amendment offered by the Parks Department to all three bills is to delete the word "federal" from the phrase "anticipated federal receipts" and further on in the bills the phrase "federal receipts". The purpose for this amendment is that the Parks Department feels we should not limit ourselves to strictly federal funds, which are scarce and highly competitive, but leave the bill open so that possible grants could be obtained to assist these projects. I have enclosed copies of these amendments.

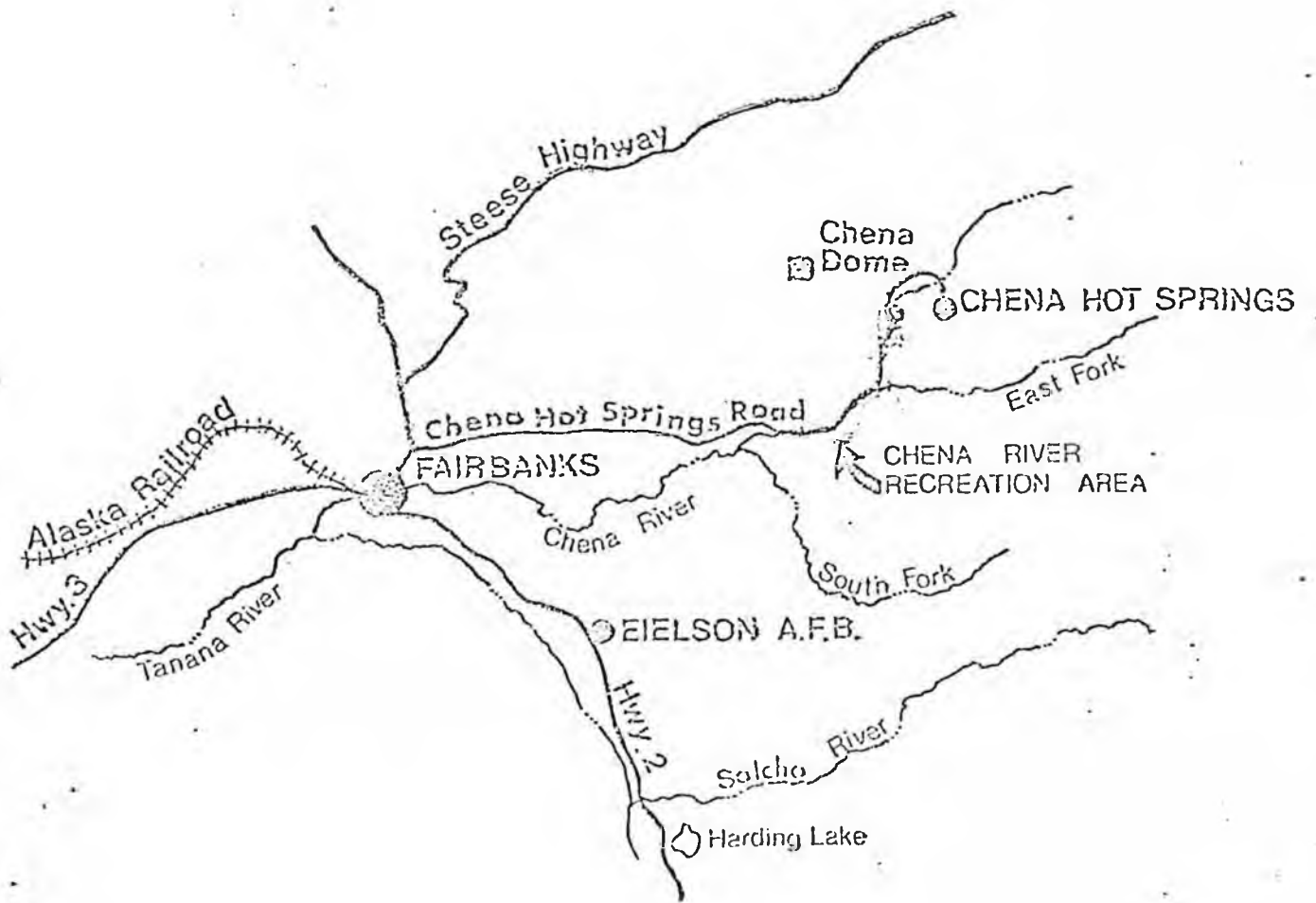

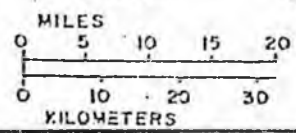

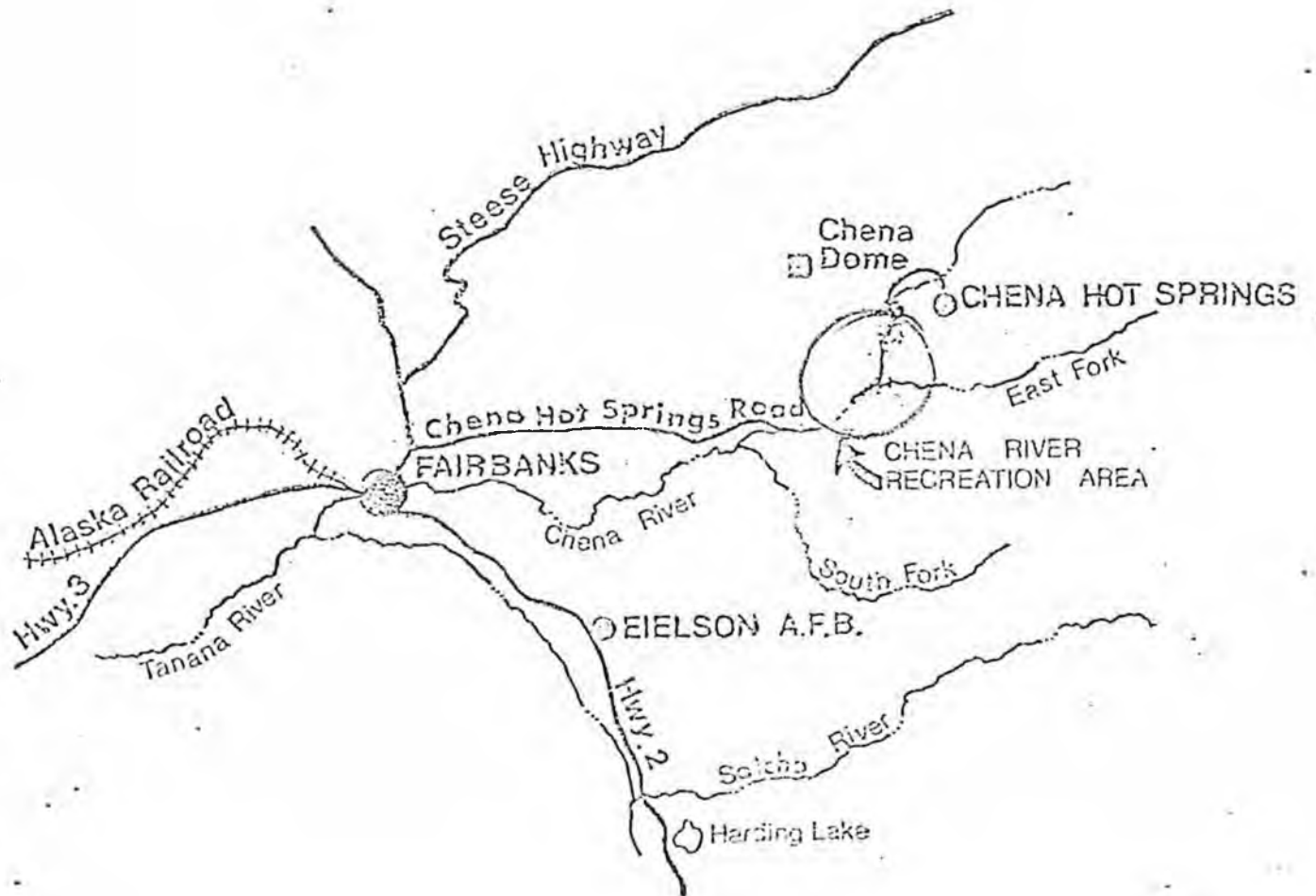


AREA MAP

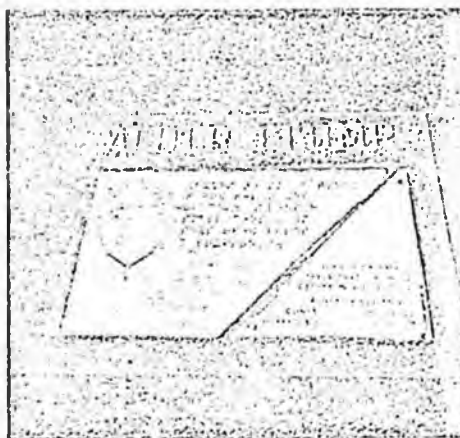
A Recreation Area for the Handicapped



In 1969, the Georgia Department of State Parks opened a special facility, Will-A-Way Recreation Area at Fort Yargo State Park in Winder.

The Will-A-Way facility is a segregated recreation area for the handicapped and their families. The Department chose to build a segregated facility because "Full integration of an individual into society, however, has two prerequisites which all too frequently go unmet. First, it requires that an individual be able and willing to accept his own abilities and limitations. The self-acceptance process is frequently a long and trying period in the rehabilitative process. . . . There are the individuals whose physical, social and outdoor recreational opportunities suffer the most. Because of their self-consciousness they withdraw from taking full advantage of their recreational opportunities.

"The second prerequisite of the ultimate goal is that society be willing and able to accept the disabled person as a participat-



ing member, and grant him the opportunity and respect which he is due. . . .

"The intent of the separate facility for the handicapped, then, is to 'screen out' those large numbers of persons who, because of their physical and mental abilities, and because of their normal

human curiosity make our disabled participant feel more self-conscious, he will be more likely to take advantage of his opportunities to play, to fish, to swim, to bask in the sun, and to stretch his limbs and senses in the great out-of-doors."

The facility offers a group camp, a day use area and a family cottage area.

The group camp has a kitchen-dining hall with a capacity for over 250, cabins for 10 campers and 4 counselors, a staff cottage, a health lodge and program buildings with work tables for various activities. A utility building provides a place to wash clothing and an assembly building has a stage for various productions. All toilets, showers, etc., are accessible. The Group Camp's waterfront area has a pool designed to offer easy access, a beach, special boat docks and a fishing bridge. Special facilities for arts and nature and camping skill development have also been provided to complete the facilities offered by the group camp.

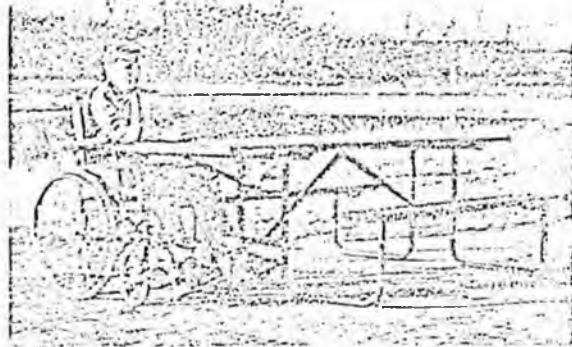
Nature Trails

Try making a short trail with few steep inclines, a few rest stops, and a variety of sensual experiences. If the surface is hard, make it about 4 feet wide and provide access from parking lots to make a multi-use trail for the handicapped and others as well.



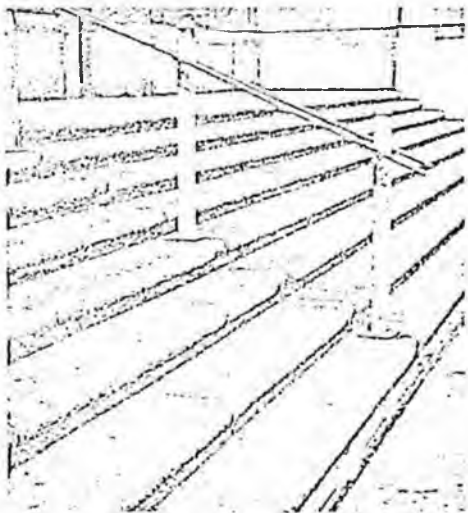
Campsites

Hard level terrain in the woods can serve as an ideal campsite for the handicapped. Shelters should be built level with the ground. Water and toilet facilities should be constructed to accommodate the needs of the handicapped.



Picnic Tables

Very little modification of picnic tables is required. Wheelchair bound people can easily sit at the head of the table if sufficient overhang is provided to bring the table to them. In some recreation areas, specially designed tables have been provided.

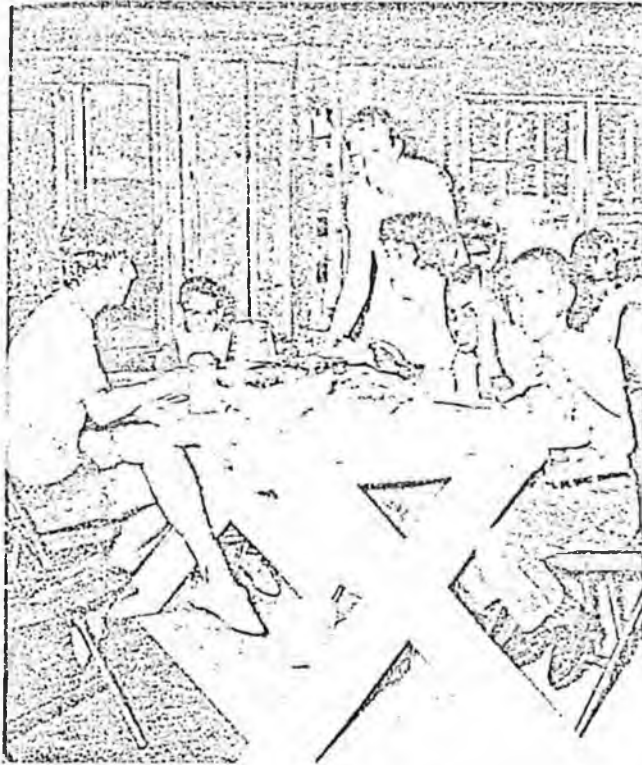


Steps

If steps must be used instead of a ramp, the rise should be 7 inches or less and the steps should not overhang the risers.

Flower and Vegetable Plots

Raised beds for cultivation by nature groups which would allow wheelchair bound people to enjoy the process of plant growth can be both attractive and easy to construct in brick, concrete block, stones, or railroad ties.

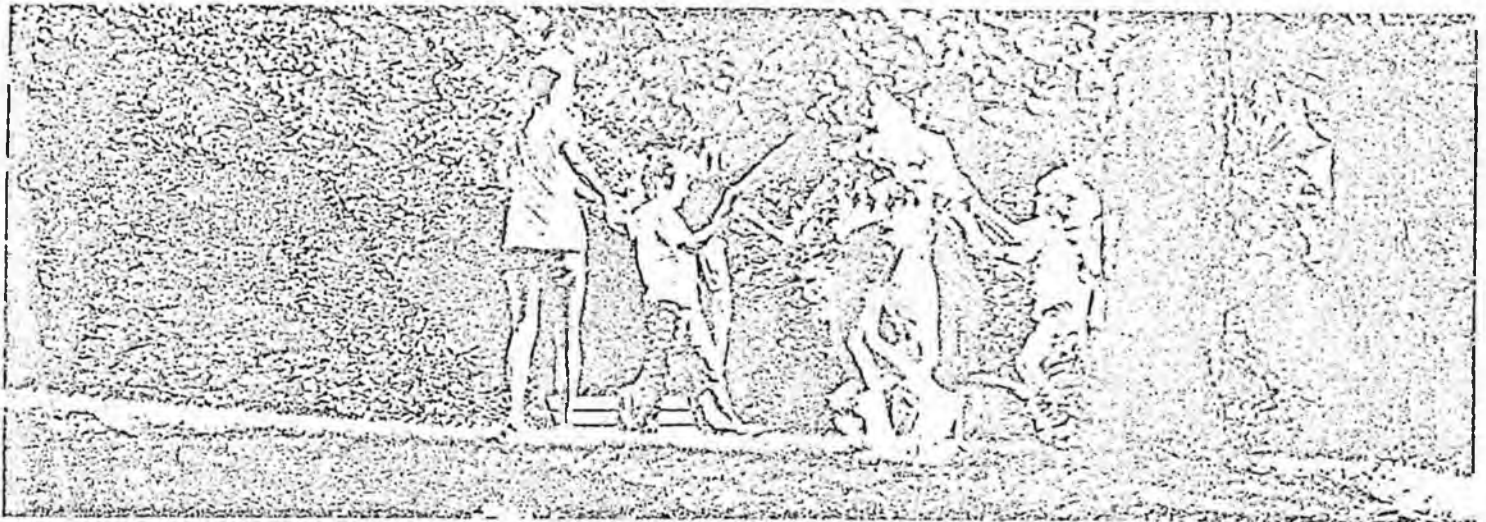

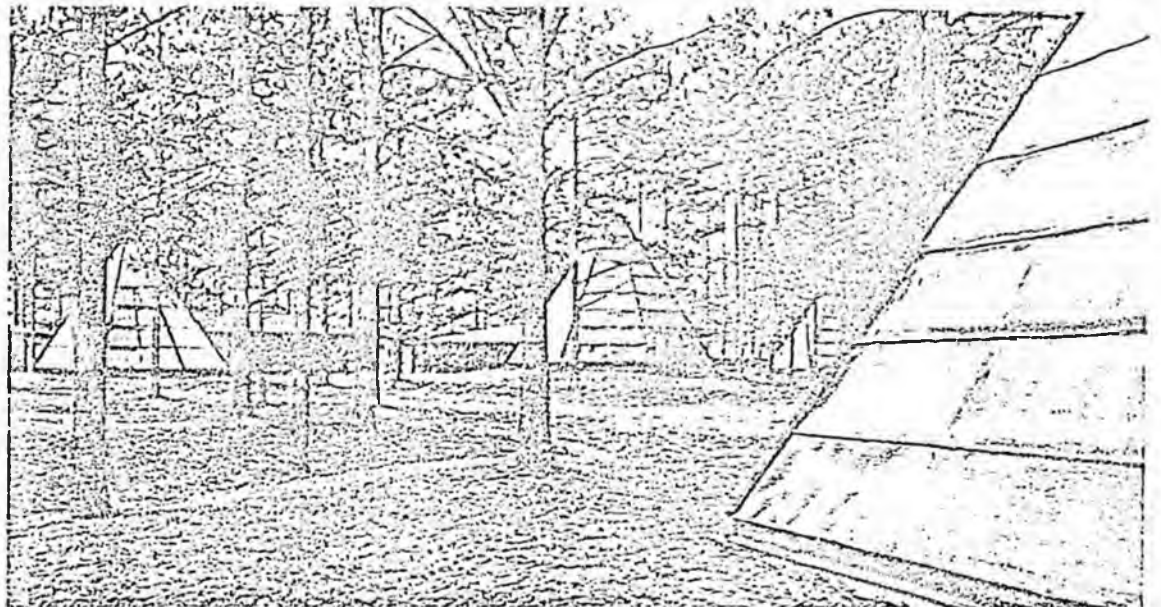
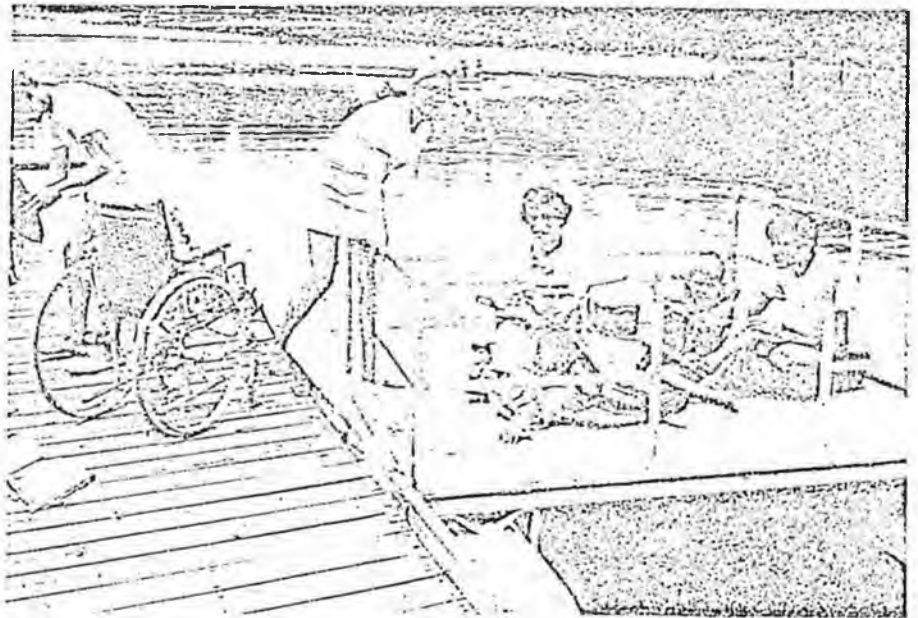


The Day Use Area

The Day Use Area has a visitor center offering food, drink, dressing rooms, first aid and equipment. A picnic area, a nature trail, and a fishing area comprise the facilities offered in the day use area.

The Cottage Area provides rental cottages of two bedrooms with a maximum sleeping capacity of seven persons. The cottages are within easy reach of all day-use facilities and are easily used by handicapped people.

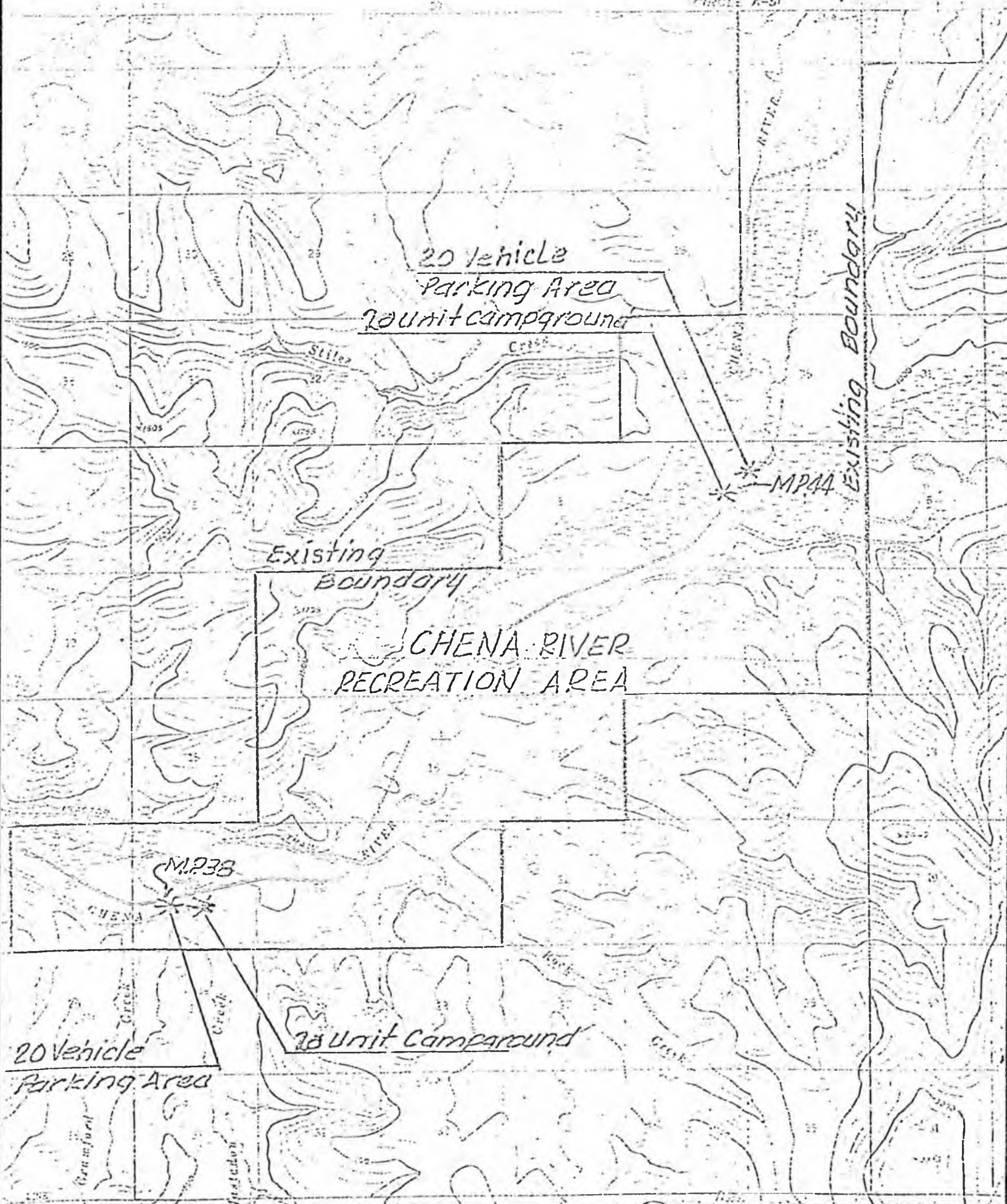

SPECIAL GROUP CAMP FACILITIES DEVELOPMENT - NANCY LAKE RECREATION AREA

The requested funds would be used to develop a group camp facility and an activity area for handicapped users within the Nancy Lake Recreation Area. It would be designed to be free of architectural barriers that generally prevent handicapped persons of all ages from having a near normal outdoor experience. The location of this group camp requires that it be near an all-weather road and have reasonable access to a hospital. Provision for communication must be included in the final camp development by the users. It must additionally have facility modification to permit residents to have a learning as well as an enjoyable experience. The care centers, as well as the handicapped persons resident, in communities of Anchorage, Fairbanks, and Seward probably will provide most of the participants, however space can be reserved for groups from a number of other areas around the state within the group camp concept and other levels of park users can reserve space as it is available.

The special facilities development will be necessary because of the nature of the persons who attend such camps. These will include physical handicapped persons in wheelchairs or on crutches as well as persons with muscular disorders or disorders that require limitation of physical activity. It will include mentally retarded persons who require counselor support. Such counselor assistance must be provided by groups like ARCA, Alaska Treatment Center or Hope Cottage. Deaf and blind campers will also find provisions here in the form of new ways to sense the outdoor experience and to teach them to feel independent in approaching true community living.

State park personnel will be available to assist in interpretation and to share in crafts knowledge in the same manner as they will serve general park users in the remainder of the recreation area. Counselors will accompany the groups as a matter of routine and will be employed by the organization sponsoring the group camp. Maintenance of the area will receive service from the state park personnel in the same manner as other camp areas in the park.

Major operational costs and maintenance costs will rest with the group camp sponsors, however garbage collection and general area maintenance will be a responsibility of the state park staff. Reservation of space will be coordinated by the district park office. The handicapped agencies estimate the use of such a facility based on present camp demand may be from 500 to 1,000 persons per summer. They would remain from 1 to 2 weeks and it is proposed to develop facilities for up to 100 at a time with the following estimated facilities and other cost figures: buildings (approximately 22,500 square feet) \$979,000.00, access road to site \$120,000.00, swim beach and boat launch \$30,000.00, utilities \$200,000.00, trails \$30,000.00, total \$1,359,000.00.

The Land and Water Conservation Fund will be used as a matching basis for a portion of these costs and it is estimated that 40% of the cost will be allowable. The state's share is estimated at \$820,000.00.

It is proposed the work will be done on a 6-year schedule due to the complexity and uniqueness of this kind of camp. The initial phase will include the access road, lake oriented facilities, 20 vehicle camp sites, potable water supply and solid and sanitary waste facilities. The second phase will consist of construction of structures to house one half of the anticipated non-ambulatory and ambulatory handicapped persons with required staff. This phase will also include the utility installation required for the anticipated total development, a multi-purpose structure for dining and recreation and the necessary facility for housing the staff personnel and providing medical care for the participants.

The third and last phase will consist of the construction of the remaining structures to house the anticipated non-ambulatory and ambulatory handicapped persons with the required additional staff. It will also include an arts and crafts structure, storage structure for the outdoor sports equipment, additional staff and therapy facilities, enlarged and improved outside recreation area, and the remainder of the utilities to complete the total facility.

It is estimated that the first phase construction cost will amount to \$400,000.00 and will commence in 1975. The second phase of this project will require funding of \$600,000.00 with construction estimated to start in 1977. The last and final phase will require the balance of the amount with total project completion anticipated in 1981. The cost estimate presented in this narrative is based on present constructing costs and should be adjusted accordingly as the program progresses.

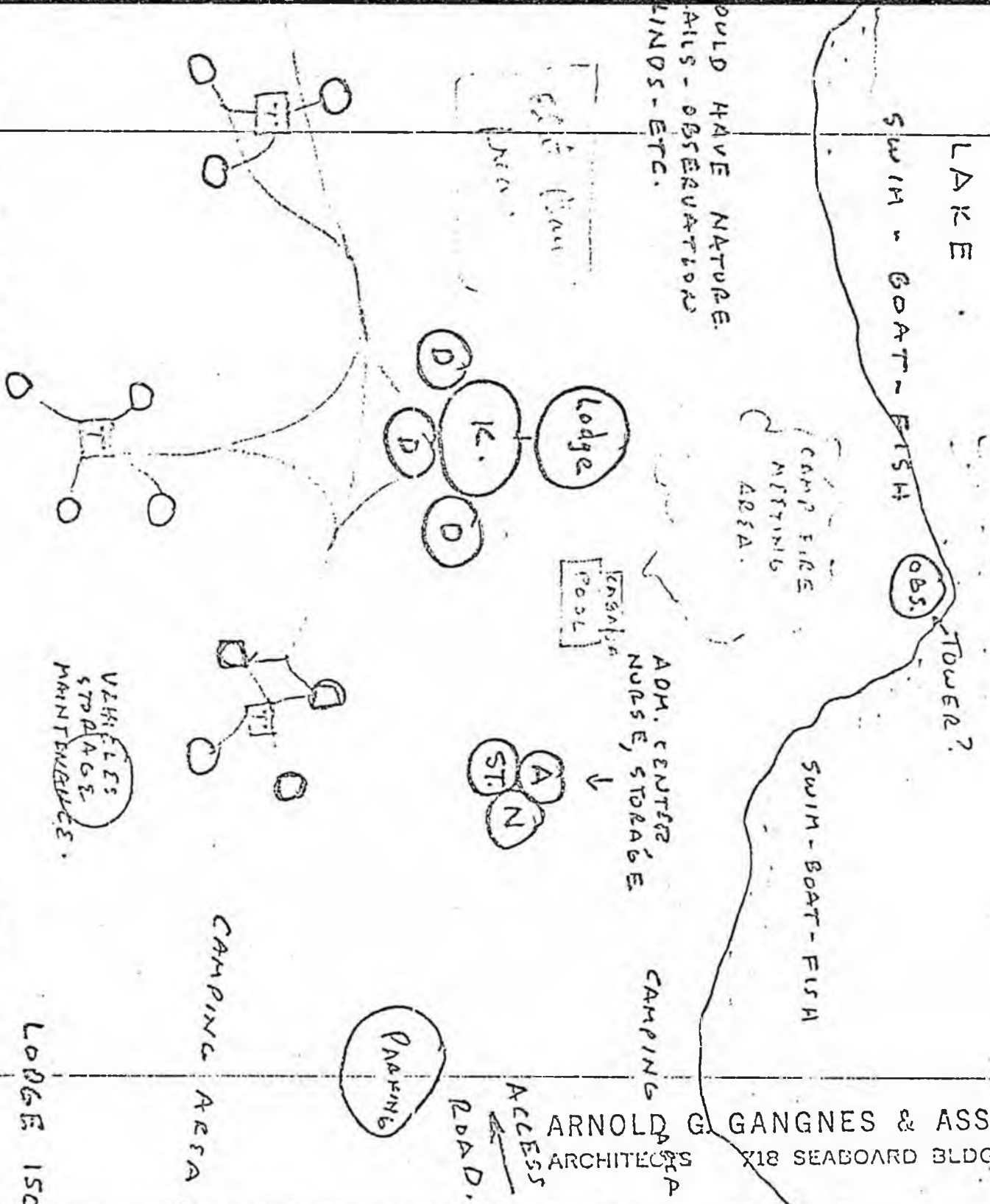

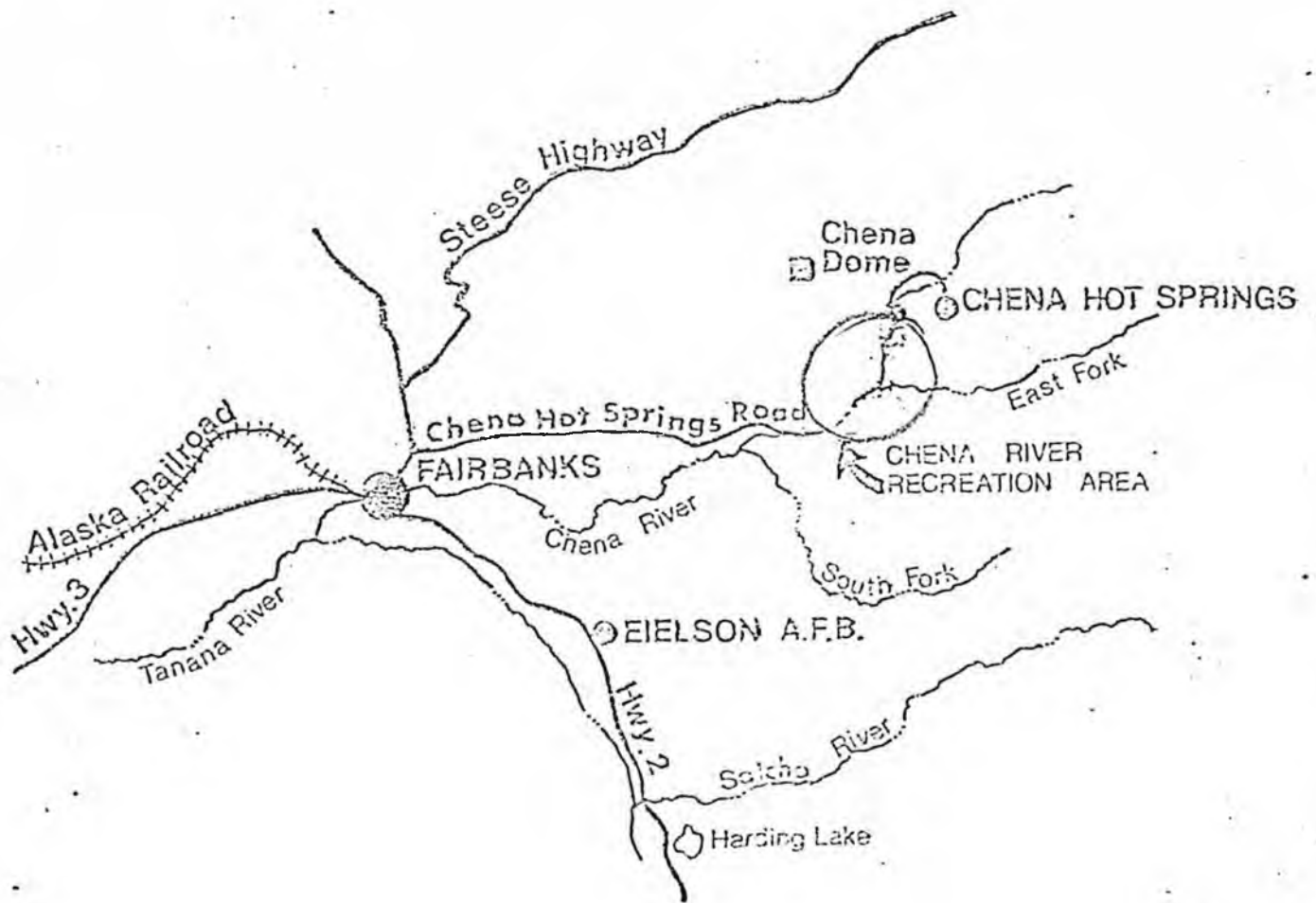


AREA MAP

CHENA RIVER RECREATION AREA

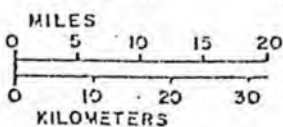


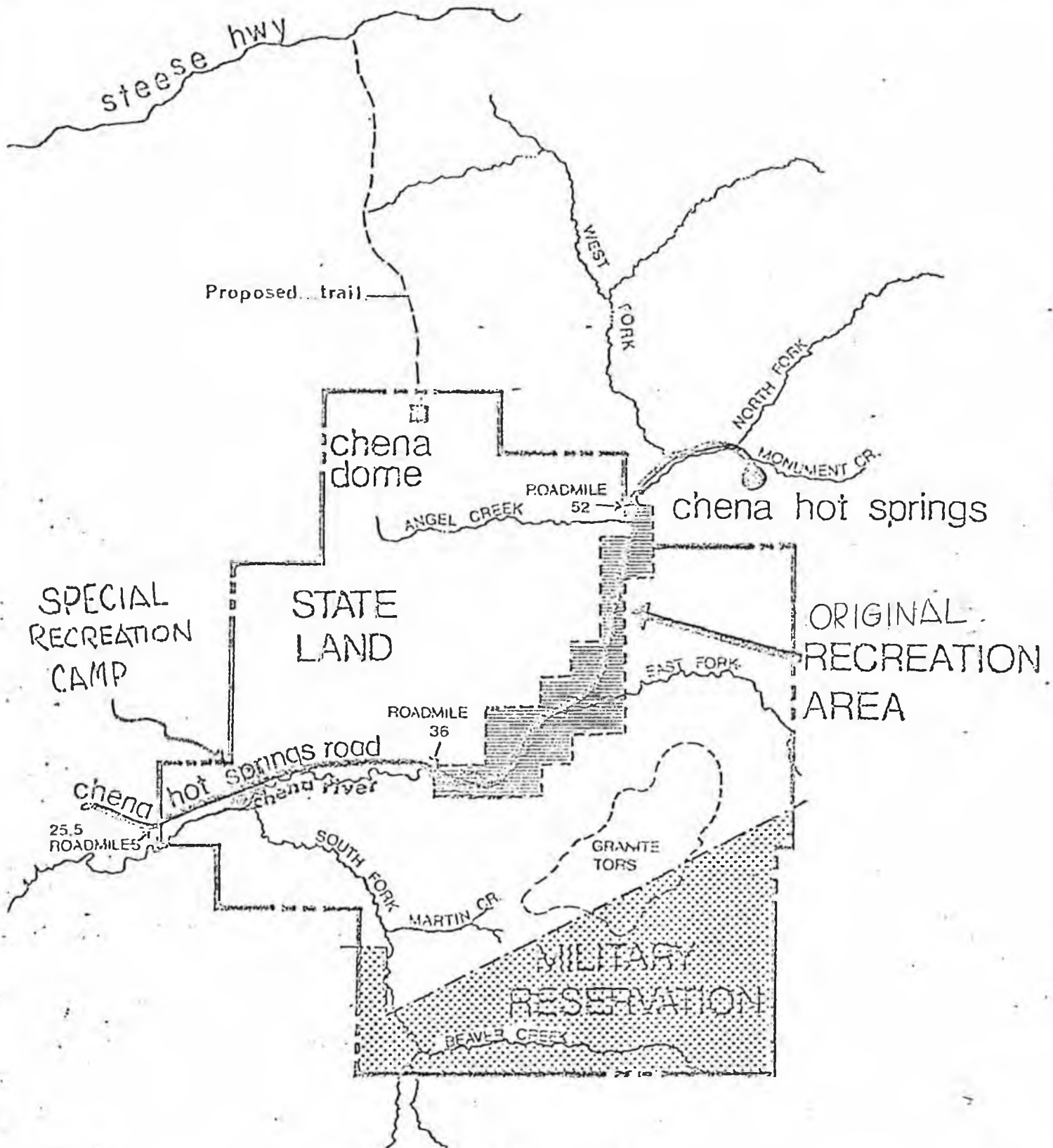

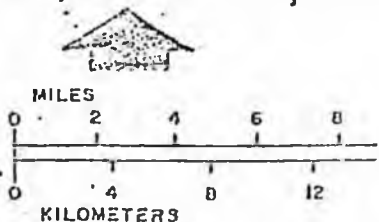

FIRST PHASE DEVELOPMENT

The expenditure of \$150,000 will provide the Interior district residents and tourists the following recreation activities.

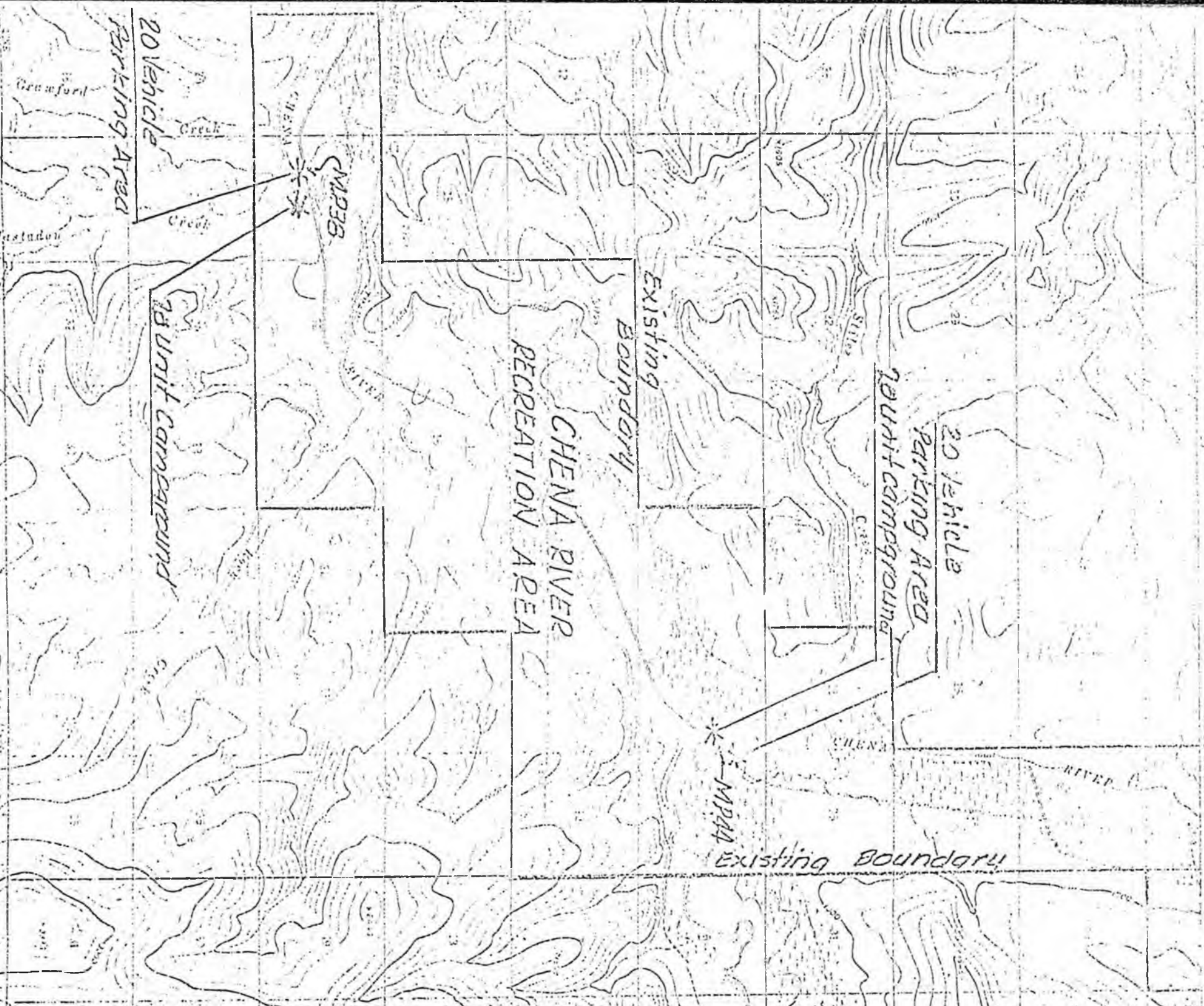
1. The development of trailheads at Mile Post 38 and Mile Post 44 will enable the canoe enthusiasts a place to launch their craft at Mile Post 44 and a take out point at Mile Post 38. These trail heads will also provide the fishing enthusiast a place to park his vehicle off of the highway.
2. The development of camp ground facilities at Mile Post 38 and Mile Post 44 will provide the recreationist a clean, orderly, controlled place to camp out and enjoy the fishing and trail oriented activities possible within the recreation area.

The estimated cost for constructing these facilities is itemized below:

For a total estimated cost of \$150,000.00.

It is anticipated that the survey and planning activities would commence at the beginning of FY 1977 and construction would be completed in 1978.



SPECIAL GROUP CAMP FACILITIES DEVELOPMENT - NANCY LAKE RECREATION AREA

The requested funds would be used to develop a group camp facility and an activity area for handicapped users within the Nancy Lake Recreation Area. It would be designed to be free of architectural barriers that generally prevent handicapped persons of all ages from having a near normal outdoor experience. The location of this group camp requires that it be near an all-weather road and have reasonable access to a hospital. Provision for communication must be included in the final camp development by the users. It must additionally have facility modification to permit residents to have a learning as well as an enjoyable experience. The care centers, as well as the handicapped persons resident, in communities of Anchorage, Fairbanks, and Seward probably will provide most of the participants, however space can be reserved for groups from a number of other areas around the state within the group camp concept and other levels of park users can reserve space as it is available.

The special facilities development will be necessary because of the nature of the persons who attend such camps. These will include physical handicapped persons in wheelchairs or on crutches as well as persons with muscular disorders or disorders that require limitation of physical activity. It will include mentally retarded persons who require counselor support. Such counselor assistance must be provided by groups like ARCA, Alaska Treatment Center or Hope Cottage. Deaf and blind campers will also find provisions here in the form of new ways to sense the outdoor experience and to teach them to feel independent in approaching true community living.

State park personnel will be available to assist in interpretation and to share in crafts knowledge in the same manner as they will serve general park users in the remainder of the recreation area. Counselors will accompany the groups as a matter of routine and will be employed by the organization sponsoring the group camp. Maintenance of the area will receive service from the state park personnel in the same manner as other camp areas in the park.

Major operational costs and maintenance costs will rest with the group camp sponsors, however garbage collection and general area maintenance will be a responsibility of the state park staff. Reservation of space will be coordinated by the district park office. The handicapped agencies estimate the use of such a facility based on present camp demand may be from 500 to 1,000 persons per summer. They would remain from 1 to 2 weeks and it is proposed to develop facilities for up to 100 at a time with the following estimated facilities and other cost figures: buildings (approximately 22,500 square feet) \$979,000.00, access road to site \$120,000.00, swim beach and boat launch \$30,000.00, utilities \$200,000.00, trails \$30,000.00, total \$1,359,000.00.

The Land and Water Conservation Fund will be used as a matching basis for a portion of these costs and it is estimated that 40% of the cost will be allowable. The state's share is estimated at \$820,000.00.

It is proposed the work will be done on a 6-year schedule due to the complexity and uniqueness of this kind of camp. The initial phase will include the access road, lake oriented facilities, 20 vehicle camp sites, potable water supply and solid and sanitary waste facilities. The second phase will consist of construction of structures to house one half of the anticipated non-ambulatory and ambulatory handicapped persons with required staff. This phase will also include the utility installation required for the anticipated total development, a multi-purpose structure for dining and recreation and the necessary facility for housing the staff personnel and providing medical care for the participants.

The third and last phase will consist of the construction of the remaining structures to house the anticipated non-ambulatory and ambulatory handicapped persons with the required additional staff. It will also include an arts and crafts structure, storage structure for the outdoor sports equipment, additional staff and therapy facilities, enlarged and improved outside recreation area, and the remainder of the utilities to complete the total facility.

It is estimated that the first phase construction cost will amount to \$400,000.00 and will commence in 1975. The second phase of this project will require funding of \$600,000.00 with construction estimated to start in 1977. The last and final phase will require the balance of the amount with total project completion anticipated in 1981. The cost estimate presented in this narrative is based on present constructing costs and should be adjusted accordingly as the program progresses.

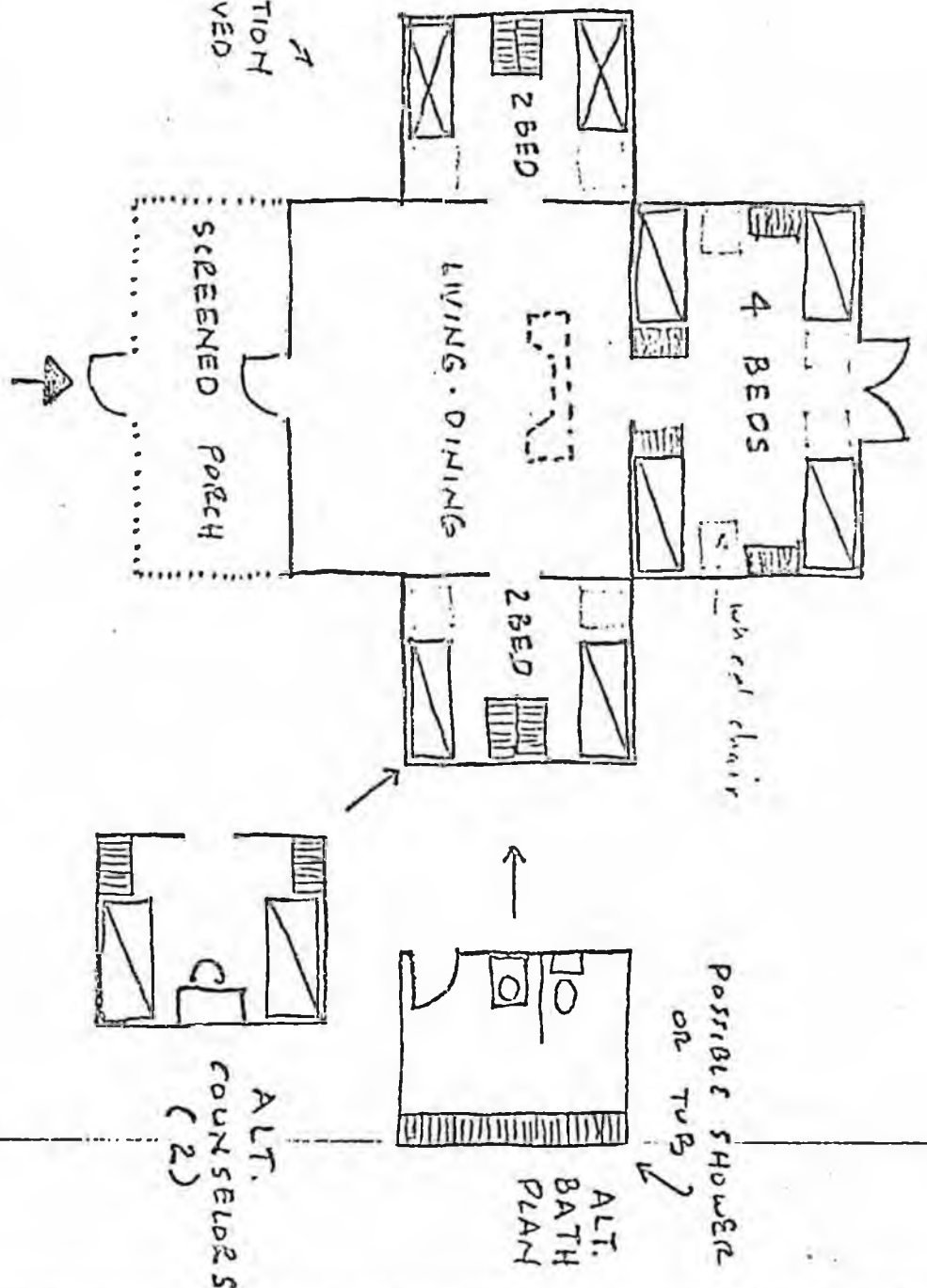

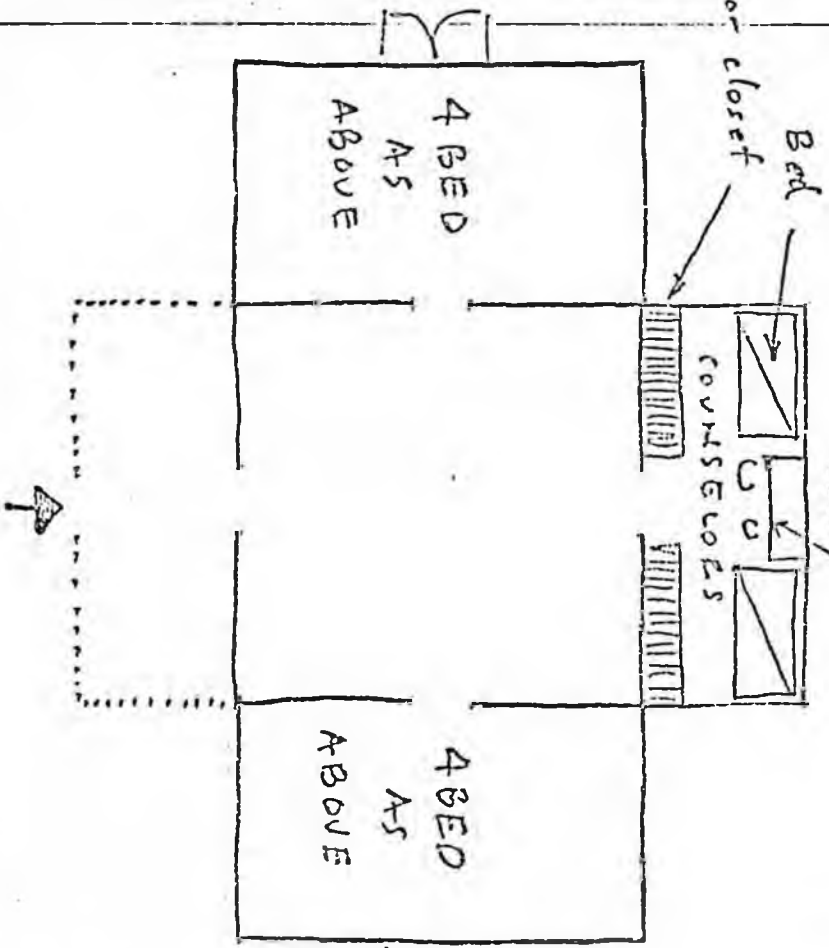

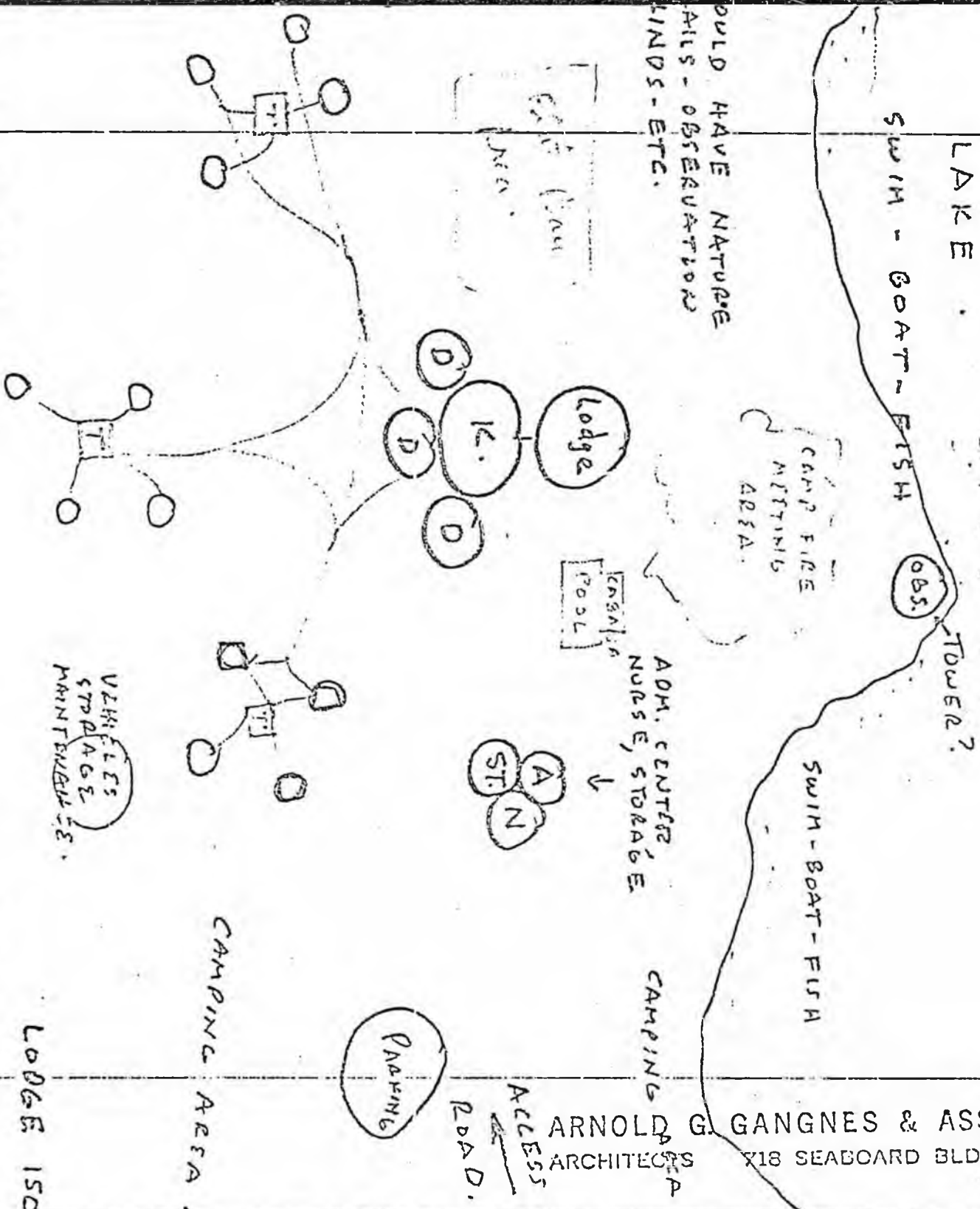
TYPICAL CABIN: FLEXIBILITY DEPENDING ON ABILITY.

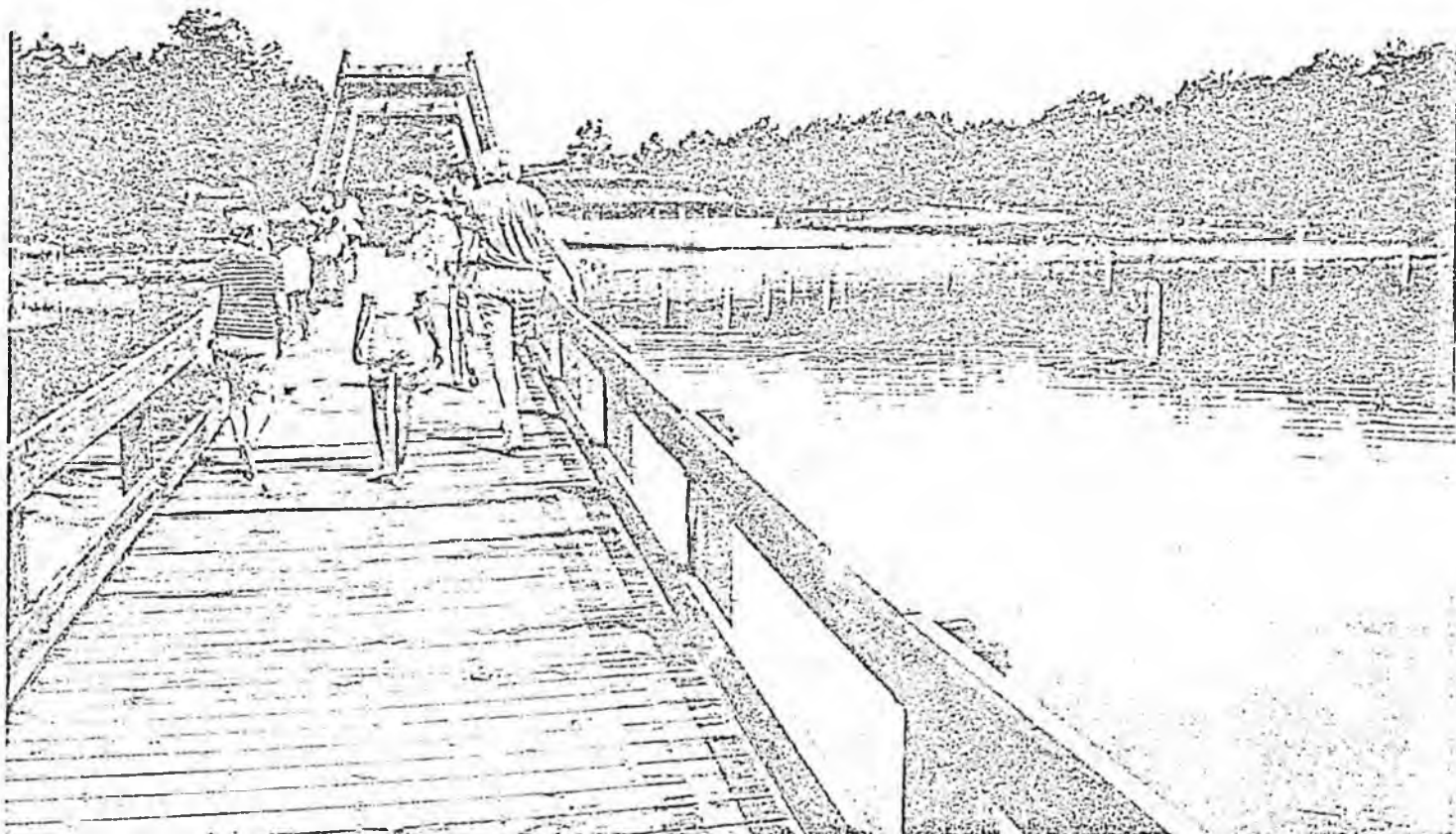

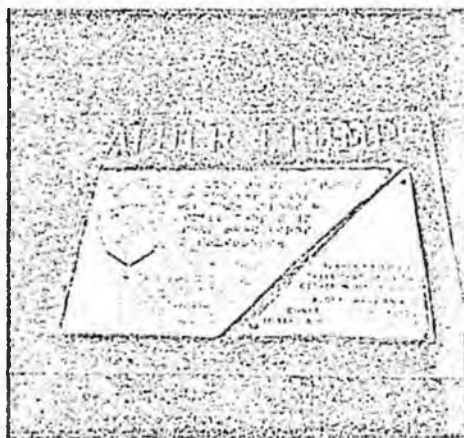
A Recreation Area for the Handicapped



In 1969, the Georgia Department of State Parks opened a special facility, Will-A-Way Recreation Area at Fort Yargo State Park in Winder.

The Will-A-Way facility is a segregated recreation area for the handicapped and their families. The Department chose to build a segregated facility because "Full integration of an individual into society, however, has two prerequisites which all too frequently go unmet. First, it requires that an individual be able and willing to accept his own abilities and limitations. The self-acceptance process is frequently a long and trying period in the rehabilitative process. . . There are the individuals whose physical, social and outdoor recreational opportunities suffer the most. Because of their self-consciousness they withdraw from taking full advantage of their recreational opportunities.

"The second prerequisite of the ultimate goal is that society be willing and able to accept the disabled person as a participat-



ing member, and grant him the opportunity and respect which he is due. . .

"The intent of the separate facility for the handicapped, then, is to 'screen out' those large numbers of persons who, because of their physical and mental abilities, and because of their normal

human curiosity make our disabled participant feel more self-conscious, he will be more likely to take advantage of his opportunities to play, to fish, to swim, to bask in the sun, and to stretch his limbs and senses in the great out-of-doors."

The facility offers a group camp, a day use area and a family cottage area.

The group camp has a kitchen-dining hall with a capacity for over 250, cabins for 10 campers and 4 counselors, a staff cottage, a health lodge and program buildings with work tables for various activities. A utility building provides a place to wash clothing and an assembly building has a stage for various productions. All toilets, showers, etc., are accessible. The Group Camp's waterfront area has a pool designed to offer easy access, a beach, special boat docks and a fishing bridge. Special facilities for arts and nature and camping skill development have also been provided to complete the facilities offered by the group camp.
