Re: Potter Point Shooting Range - IIE 361

Representative Lisa Rudd has requested a clarification from my department concerning funding sources and amounts required for the purchase of Potter Point Shooting Range. Some confusion arose, and to a certain extent remains, over the availability of federal aid matching funds on a three (federal) to one (state) basis. These are the so-called Pittman-Robertson funds that form the bulk of the Game Division's budget. It is now my best estimate that funds will be available and I recommend that the sum of \$50,000 be appropriated from the general fund for matching with \$150,000 of federal aid monies to purchase and improve the Potter Point Shooting Range.







We strongly support HB 362 and urge its prompt consideration and passage. In a year when lawmakers are finally recognizing officially the importance of early childhood years to the future of Alaska, this bill would expose the children of ten more villages to the great benefits of the Head Start experience, which includes health and nutrition programs as well as providing the children with the basic fundamentals needed to operate in the modern world. Head Start is especially valuable since local parents are an integral part of program and training.

Federal money is still the activating force behind this program. The State and local share is small. This small percentage of Alaskan dollars is expended five fold by the Federal Government, but the benefits to young Alaskan citizens is far greater still. Please don't let this opportunity for utilizing Federal funds for the benefit of Alaskans pass without your due consideration.

## REQUEST FOR STATE FUNDING FOR HEAD START

Head Start is a nationwide effort sponsored and funded by the Federal Department of Health, Education and Welfare to help prepare children of less fortunate families from three to six years old for school. It represents the drawing together of all resources--family, community, non-professional and professional--which can contribute to the child's total development.

Head Start attempts to teach pre-school children how to respond to other children and adults in group situations. The program exposes children to the basic fundam... needed to operate in the modern world. Beginning with l... development, socialization, and motor development, the program... experiences in punctuality, sanitary habits, personal grooming, ... nding to questions with words instead of gestures, and listen... to others speak.

Among Head Start's most important goals are to provide an orientation to school, as well as provide health and nutrition in the program. The Head Start program also seeks to develop in the child a good self image and to help him develop into an emotionally well adjusted individual.

Equally important, Head Start seeks parent involvement through a Policy Committee and volunteer work and provides career development training for its staff members.

Head Start funds are appropriated to communities in Alaska and in other states with the requirement that the local community match the federal funds with twenty percent local effort. In Alaska, there are presently 20 rural Head Start programs serving approximately 600 children, two centers in Anchorage serving approximately 100 children, one Head Start program in Fairbanks serving approximately 100 children, and a center in the Yukon/Chena River serving 30 children. In addition, two Parent Child center demonstration projects directly funded by the Office of Child Development in Washington, D.C. serve approximately 20 children in Bethel and Intermountain. All of the programs have greatly exceeded the twenty percent requirement for local effort; most programs have done so by arranging for in-kind contributions of building, or arranging volunteer efforts, donating food, equipment, supplies etc., all of which are counted as "in-kind" share and are assigned a dollar value.

In other states, such as Massachusetts and Washington, the state provides general funds to match the federal money which comes into the state for Head Start programs. This has allowed a great expansion of the federal dollar. The Rural Alaska Community Action Program, the Greater Fairbanks Head Start Association and Chugiak Children's Services, all have been operating with essentially the same amount of federal funding that they received in 1967, when the federal program first began. Because of inflation, what has resulted in a number of cases is a reduction in the number of children served, some standard salary scales, and a yearly budget battle to try to continue the same level of services to children and families. Rural CAP, for example, initially operated more than 60 Head Start programs when funding first began for the program, and, because of inflation, has had to cut this number to 30 villages.

At present, Federal funding for Head Start and Parent Child centers in Alaska comes to a total of \$1,404,000.00. If the State were to match these funds with twenty percent general funds, the total cost to the State treasury would be approximately \$281,000.00. These additional funds would allow expansion of the Head Start and Parent Child center programs into additional rural areas, and would allow urban programs such as Anchorage, Chugiak and Fairbanks to increase the number of children served.

Presently, Washington administers its matching share program through the Washington State Office of Child Development. In Alaska, the funds could be passed through the Department of Community and Regional Affairs.

The present cost per child for Head Start in Alaska averages approximately \$1,400 per year. At this rate, State funding would allow expansion of Head Start services to an additional 190 children.

However, since the \$1,400 per child figure includes administrative costs, it is more than likely that the additional number of children to be served would be considerably higher.

At the minimum, however, the program could be expanded as follows:

<u>Area</u>	<u>Share of State Funding (Based on Present Federal Funding Level)</u>	<u>Additional Children to be Served</u>
Anchorage (including Chugiak)	\$47,000	30
Fairbanks	34,000	25
Rural Areas and other major cities (sites to be selected on basis of need)	205,000	145

Except for areas like K... and Hoona, most village Head Start programs serve all the school children in the community.

The \$205,000 earmarked for "rural areas" would allow the development of Head Start programs in approximately 10 new sites in Alaska, serving a total of approximately 145 additional children.

The success of Head Start programs across the State has been demonstrated not only by comments from school principals, parents and kindergarten teachers, but by the numerous requests for Head Start programs from communities throughout the State.

Anchorage, which now serves 100 children in three Head Start centers, has a waiting list of more than 100 eligible children. Fairbanks has a similar list.

The following villages have applied for Head Start programs for FY 76. At present, none of them have Head Start. The asterisk indicates that the community meets all of the eligibility requirements for Head Start (at least 15 eligible children, has a building, and a group of parents who are interested in forming a Policy Committee etc.):


On Friday, April 4, I phoned you from Barrow to ask about HB 362. This bill had been mentioned to me by Roger Mooney of RURAL ALASKA COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM in Anchorage. Roger thought that you or Brenda Itta might be able to send us a copy of the bill and let us know if this bill could help our early childhood education program.

Head Start had such limited funds that it was unable to start up this fall, in Barrow. The North Slope Borough School District decided to pick up the program for 3 and 4 year old children. We were able to get a Title I grant through the State Education Department for \$60,000 and a split off grant from a Title I grant for \$4,000 toward our 6 month budget of \$115,000. The Barrow Early Childhood Education Program has been in operation since January 15, 1975 with an enrollment of 85 children and an average daily attendance of 50 children. We are operating with two teachers and seven teacher aides, five days each week from 7:30 am until 5:30 pm. We plan to operate through the summer (on a twelve months basis).

For the 1975 - 1976 school year, we are planning to increase our enrollment by providing a program for 2 year old children. For this we will need a portable classroom set close to the present classroom. Through the generosity of the Alaska National Guard, we are now using the Barrow Armory for our 3 and 4 year old program. Our projected enrollment for next year, with 2, 3 and 4 year old children, is one hundred twenty children. We will need one teacher coordinator with an K.A. in E.C.E., three teachers and no less than seven teacher aides. Our estimated budget for the twelve month period beginning July first, 1975 is \$310,000. There is active community interest and participation in this program through our Parent Advisory Council and through parent participation and volunteer work. Also there is a growing feeling that this program should be extended into the evening to provide reliable child care for parents who are participating in the growing number of evening educational, cultural and community activities in Barrow. This would add \$40,000 to the budget bringing the annual budget to \$350,000 for a twelve month, five day one week, seventeen hour per day program for an estimated enrollment of 120 children.

We will very much appreciate any advice and assistance that you are able to give us on the development of a program to meet the educational and child care needs of our children.

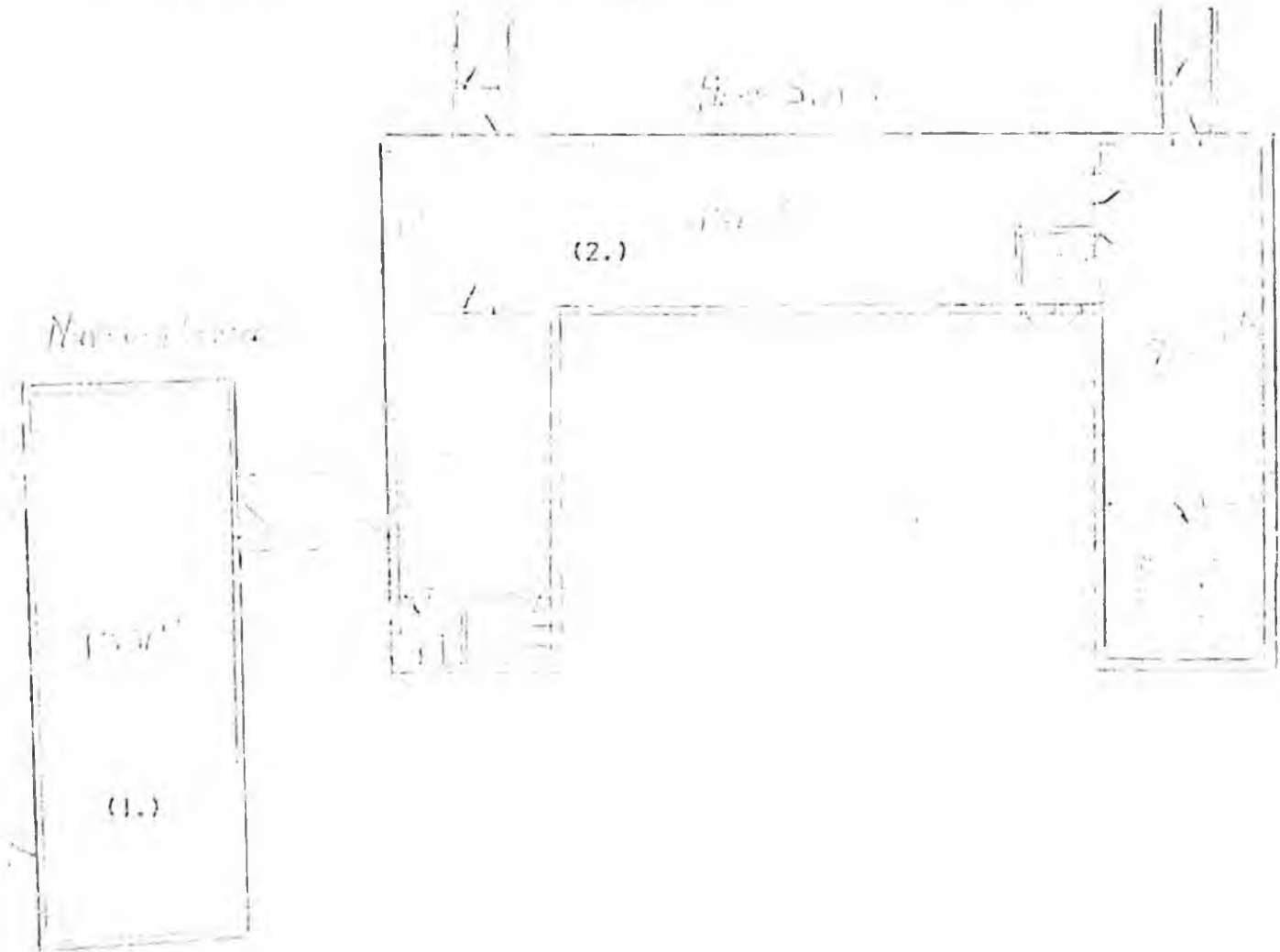

Building number (1.) above is the probable classroom which will be needed if we are to have classroom space next year (1975-76) to include 2 year old children in our Early Childhood Program.






On Friday, April 4, I phoned you from Barrow to ask about HB 362. This bill had been mentioned to me by Roger Mooney of RURAL ALASKA COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM in Anchorage. Roger thought that you or Brenda Iida might be able to send us a copy of the bill and let us know if this bill could help our early childhood education program.

Head Start had such limited funds that it was unable to start up this fall, in Barrow. The North Slope Borough School District decided to pick up the program for 3 and 4 year old children. We were able to get a Title I grant through the State Education Department for \$60,000 and a spin off grant from Rural CAP for \$4,000 toward our 6 month budget of \$115,000. The Barrow Early Childhood Education Program has been in operation since January 15, 1975 with an enrollment of 85 children and an average daily attendance of 50 children. We are operating with two teachers and seven teacher aides, five days each week from 7:30 am until 5:30 pm. We plan to operate through the summer (on a twelve months basis).

For the 1975 - 1976 school year, we are planning to increase our enrollment by providing a program for 2 year old children. For this we will need a portable classroom set close to the present classroom. Through the generosity of the Alaska National Guard, we are now using the Barrow Armory for our 3 and 4 year old program. Our projected enrollment for next year, with 2, 3 and 4 year old children, is one hundred twenty children. We will need one teacher coordinator with an M.A. in E.C.E., three teachers and no less than seven teacher aides. Our estimated budget for the twelve month period beginning July first, 1975 is \$310,000. There is active community interest and participation in this program through our Parents Advisory Council and through parent participation as volunteer work. Also there is a growing feeling that this program should be extended into the evening to provide reliable child care for parents who are participating in the growing number of evening educational, cultural and community activities in Barrow. This would add \$40,000 to the budget bringing the annual budget to \$350,000 for a twelve month, five day per week, seventeen hour per day program for an estimated enrollment of 120 children.

We will very much appreciate any advice and assistance that you are able to give us on the development of a program to meet the educational and child care needs of our children.

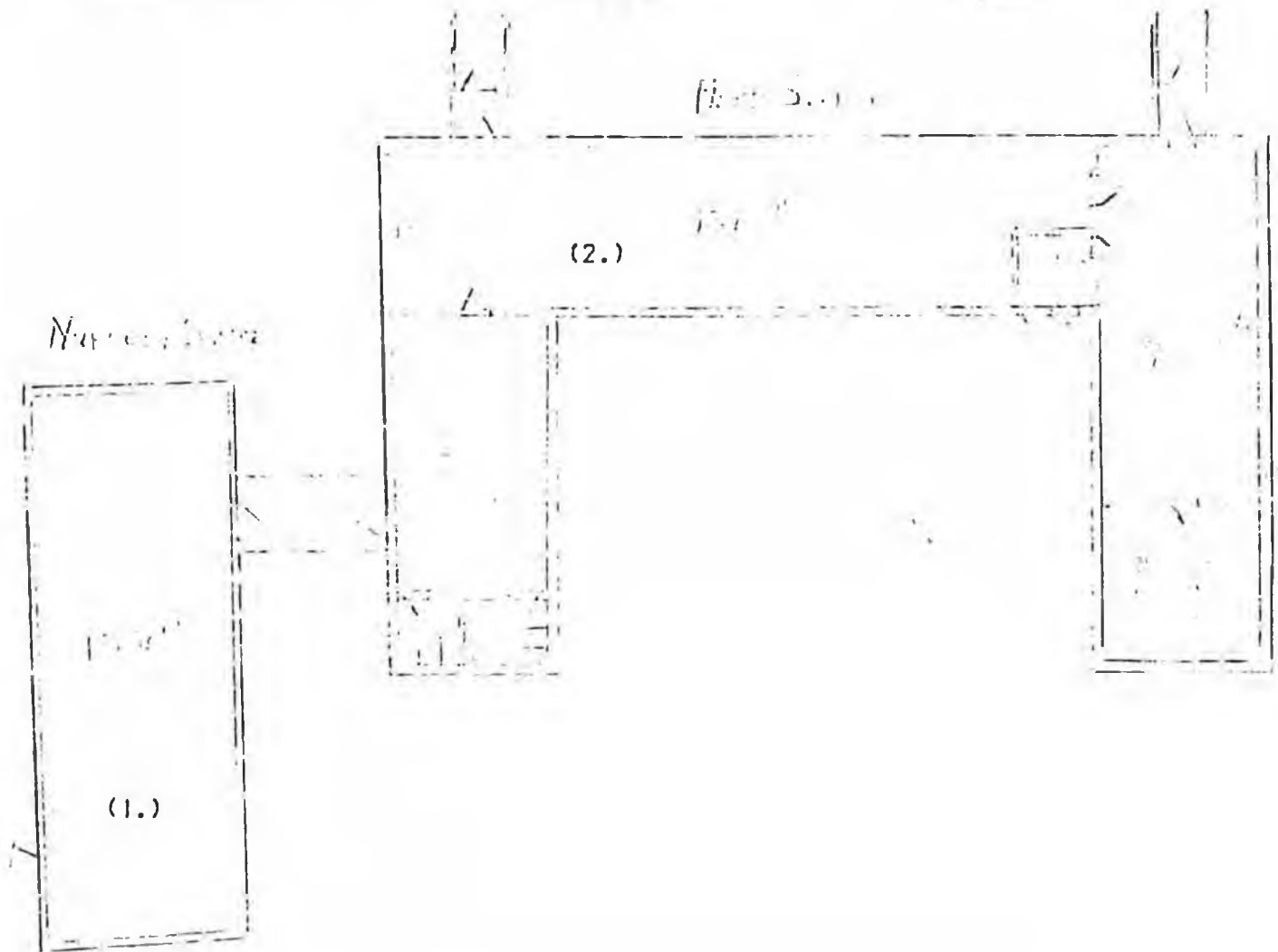

## REQUEST FOR STATE FUNDING FOR HEAD START

Head Start is a nationwide effort sponsored and funded by the Federal Department of Health, Education and Welfare to help prepare children of less fortunate families from three to six years old for school. It represents the drawing together of all resources--family, community, non-professional and professional--which can contribute to the child's total development.

Head Start attempts to teach pre-school children how to respond to other children and adults in group situations. The program exposes children to the basic fundamentals needed to operate in the modern world. Beginning with language development, socialization, and motor development, the program provides experiences in punctuality, sanitary habits, personal grooming, and responding to questions with words instead of gestures, and listening to others speak.

Among Head Start's most important goals are to provide an orientation to school, as well as provide health and nutrition in the program. The Head Start program also seeks to develop in the child a good self image and to help him develop into an emotionally well adjusted individual.

Equally important, Head Start seeks parent involvement through a Policy Committee and volunteer work and provides career development training for its staff members.

Head Start funds are appropriated to communities in Alaska and in other states with the requirement that the local community match the Federal funds with twenty percent local effort. In Alaska, there are presently 30 rural Head Start programs serving approximately 600 children, three centers in Anchorage serving approximately 160 children, one Head Start program in Fairbanks serving approximately 100 children, and a center in Chugiak/Engle River serving 30 children. In addition, two Parent Child centers, demonstration projects directly funded by the Office of Child Development in Washington, D.C., serve approximately 50 families in Bethel and Kotzebue. All of these programs have greatly exceeded the twenty percent requirement for local effort; most programs have done so by arranging for free rental of buildings, organizing volunteer efforts, donating foods, equipment, supplies etc., all of which are counted as "in-kind" share and are assigned a dollar value.

In other states, such as Massachusetts and Washington, the state provides general funds to match the federal money which comes into the state for Head Start programs. This has allowed a great expansion of the federal dollar. The Rural Alaska Community Action Program, the Greater Fairbanks Head Start Association and Chugiak Children's Services all have been operating with essentially the same amount of Federal funding that they received in 1967, when the Federal program first began. Because of inflation, what has resulted in a number of cases is a reduction in the number of children served, some standard salary scales, and a yearly budget battle to try to continue the same level of services to children and families. Rural CAP, for example, initially operated more than 60 Head Start programs when funding first began for the program, and, because of inflation, has had to cut this number to 30 villages.

At present, Federal funding for Head Start and Parent Child centers in Alaska comes to a total of \$1,404,000.00. If the State were to match these funds with twenty percent general funds, the total cost to the State treasury would be approximately \$281,000.00. These additional funds would allow expansion of the Head Start and Parent Child center programs into additional rural areas, and would allow urban programs such as Anchorage, Chugiak and Fairbanks to increase the number of children served.

Presently, Washington administers its matching share program through the Washington State Office of Child Development. In Alaska, the funds could be passed through the Department of Community and Regional Affairs.

The present cost per child for Head Start in Alaska averages approximately \$1,400 per year. At this rate, State funding would allow expansion of Head Start services to an additional 190 children.

However, since the \$1,400 per child figure includes administrative costs, it is more than likely that the additional number of children to be served would be considerably higher.

At the minimum, however, the program could be expanded as follows:

Anchorage (including Chugiak)	\$42,000	30
Fairbanks	34,000	25
Rural Areas and other major cities (sites to be selected on basis of need)	205,000	145

Except for areas like K... and Hoonah, most village Head Start programs serve all the school children in the community.

The \$205,000 earmarked for "rural areas" would allow the development of Head Start programs in approximately 10 new sites in Alaska, serving a total of approximately 145 additional children.

The success of Head Start programs across the State has been demonstrated not only by comments from school principals, parents and kindergarten teachers, but by the numerous requests for Head Start programs from communities throughout the State.

Anchorage, which now serves 100 children in three Head Start centers, has a waiting list of more than 100 eligible children. Fairbanks has a similar list.

The asterisk indicates that the community meets all of the eligibility requirements for Head Start (at least 15 eligible children, has a building, and a group of parents who are interested in forming a Policy Committee, etc.):


In reference to House Bill 362 which would authorize State of Alaska matching funds for the Headstart Program from the Federal Government.
