



It is felt that the professional engineer or licensed architect mentioned on page two, line 14, should also be registered in the State of Alaska.

It is also noted that House Bill Number 429, introduced April 15, 1975 and referred to Finance makes reference to life cycle engineering which would include energy consumption and conservation.





an average cost of \$346 per trip for transportation and per diem; 2 trips out of state by the Investigator at \$550 per trip; two administrative trips by the Prosecutor and one by the Investigator at \$300 per trip; one trip each by the prosecutor and investigator for instate meetings at \$300 per trip; and one trip out of state by the prosecutor at \$600 per trip.

Contractual Services - Department of Law offices in Anchorage are fully occupied; additional space will have to be acquired for the prosecutor and staff. Witness fees are budgeted 60% above the present average per prosecutor in the Anchorage District Attorney office; we anticipate fish and game cases will involve more out of state citizens than encountered in other offenses therefore the costs of witness transportation will be higher. Other items of expenditure are averaged from the present costs of operation.

The Judiciary Committee has recommended that both HB 370 and HB 371 do pass. This recommendation is made on the basis of the amount appropriated in HB 371 as funding for HB 370 and not on the basis of the attached fiscal note. It is the understanding of the Judiciary Committee that there presently is someone in the Attorney General's Office who is handling fish and game matters exclusively. The attached fiscal note should therefore be reduced by the amount already being spent by the Office in providing fish and game protection services. Judiciary recommends that HB 370 be funded in the amount of HB 371 (\$75,000) or less.

House Bill 307 is a housekeeping measure designed to eliminate from the Alaska Net Income Tax Act those references to credits provided at the Federal level through the Internal Revenue Code which do not have any applicability at State level or which duplicate other provisions at the State level.

The first credit eliminated is a credit on interest earned on certain U. S. Government obligations. This credit is provided by the Federal government since the Federal Government does tax interest earned on its own securities. The State, however, is prohibited by Federal law from taxing that interest, hence it does not make sense to allow a credit in our statute.

The second credit eliminated is a credit allowed by the Federal government for Federal taxes paid on gasoline which is then used for off-highway purposes. For the sake of administrative convenience the Federal system allows a claim for such refund to be made on the income tax return and the credit applied against income tax liability. Obviously, the State is not interested in refunding Federal gasoline taxes. We have a different procedure by which we refund State gasoline taxes paid for gasoline which is used for off-highway purposes. This provision would eliminate an unnecessary, irrelevant and possibly costly provision in the Federal code which is presently adopted by Alaska through our piggy-back mechanism.

The credit for political contributions allowed by the Federal system in Internal Revenue Code Section 41 is a duplication of the full \$50 credit against Alaska taxes provided by AS 43.20.010 (c) (10). The elimination of this credit is also included in House Bill 212. Since these bills were drafted independently, however, it was included in this miscellaneous clean-up bill as it obviously is a duplication and does not make sense when applied at the State level.

We do not have any estimates on the effect of these bills on the State Treasury since the information is not included in our data base. We are developing statistics on the political campaign contributions credit as allowed under AS 43.20.010 (c) (10), but will not have that information available until later this year since this is the first year in which the credit applies. The Treasury effect of this provision would be a \$4.00 for every \$50.00 contribution.

There are no administrative problems connected with this bill.



For an Act entitled: "An Act relating to economic impacted areas and extraordinary state services; and providing for an effective date."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

\* Section 1. AS 44.33 is amended by adding new sections to read:

Sec. 44.33.285. ACTION BY GOVERNOR. The governor may, upon recommendation of the commissioner of commerce and economic development, designate by proclamation an area as an area impacted by an economic disaster. When an area is so designated, assistance grants shall be made by the Department of Commerce and Economic Development as provided in AS 37.11.100 and the governor may recommend in his budget submission that capital projects planned for the area be accelerated and that new projects be funded for the area. The proclamation may provide that waivers of capital projects requirements, as authorized in sec. 300 of this chapter, become effective only to the extent set out in the proclamation.

Sec. 44.33.290. EMPLOYMENT PREFERENCE. (a) In the performance of contracts awarded by the state in an area impacted by an economic disaster, residents of the area shall be employed where they are available and qualified so that the economic effects of alleviating the failure will be maximized. If resident labor is not available, the contractor shall inform the Department of Labor of the number of additional workers needed, the positions to be filled, and the efforts made at recruitment in the area. If the Department of Labor is satisfied that a good faith

effort has been made by the contractor to hire residents of the area, it may issue a certificate allowing other hire for designated positions. A clause requiring these provisions shall be part of each state contract awarded.

(b) Wages paid for employment under this section shall be in conformance with the minimum rates of pay schedule published by the Department of Labor in accordance with AS 36.05.030.

Sec. 44.33.295. CONTRACTORS' PREFERENCE. If the department determines that there are contractors in an area designated as an area impacted by an economic disaster and who are qualified to perform a contract, preference to the extent feasible shall be given to those contractors under regulations adopted by the council.

Sec. 44.33.300. WAIVER OF CERTAIN PROVISIONS. When the governor has by proclamation declared an area impacted by an economic disaster, the following provisions regarding public contracts may be waived to the extent specified in the proclamation:

(1) the requirement of a contractor's bond as prescribed in AS 36.25.010 may be waived if the contract amount does not exceed \$100,000;

(2) the public bid requirements as contained in AS 19.10.170, 19.10.190, 19.30.191(b), and AS 35.15.010 - 35.15.030 may be waived if the contract is to be performed by a contractor whose principal office is in the designated area and the contract amount does not exceed \$50,000;

(3) the general policy to require all construction to be under bid contract as contained in AS 35.15.010 may be waived if the contract is to be performed by the state, another governmental entity, or a nonprofit entity.

Sec. 44.33.305. REGULATIONS. The department, after consultation

with the Department of Labor, may adopt regulations to implement secs. 250 - 310 of this chapter.

Sec. 44.33.310. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter,

(1) "base period" means any 10 years after 1950, not necessarily continuous, and if the economic disaster is caused by a fisheries failure the period shall consist of years during which a fishery produced at economically representative levels as determined by the Department of Fish and Game;

(2) "department" means the Department of Commerce and Economic Development,

(3) "economic disaster" means that the annual income to workers in the designated area dropped below the average annual income for the base period for workers in the designated area and the drop in income is of such magnitude that the average family income of all residents of the designated area as determined by the department is below the Federal Social Security Administration Poverty Guideline, adjusted by the council to reflect subsistence economic patterns and appropriate cost-of-living differentials; the availability of alternate employment shall be considered in determining whether an economic disaster has occurred under this paragraph.

\* Sec. 2. AS 19.10.170 is amended to read:

Sec. 19.10.170. CONSTRUCTION BY DEPARTMENT. Except as provided in AS 44.33.300, it [IT] shall be the general policy of the department to require the construction of all highways under bid contract. However, when the estimated cost of a construction project is less than \$20,000 or when it appears to be in the best interests of the state, the department may perform the work notwithstanding any other provisions of law.

Whenever any proposed construction contract is for a sum less than \$20,000, it shall be discretionary with the department whether the contract shall be advertised and awarded in accordance with secs. 200 and 210 of this chapter. In all events the department shall request informal bids from as many contractors as can be requested conveniently.

## FISCAL NOTE NARRATIVE

HB 374

### Fish Creek

The Spenard Service area is very densely populated, particularly in the vicinity of Fish Creek. Housing approximately 19 percent of the total population of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough, Spenard is the third largest community in Alaska, ranking only behind the cities of Anchorage and Fairbanks. Yet Spenard residents suffer from neglect by their local and state governments in regard to the provision of community programs and improvements in their area. An example of this neglect lies in the field of open space and recreational needs. According to the Spenard Service area plan of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough Parks and Recreation Department, Spenard is far lacking in the amount of parkland needed for the population that exists. Efforts are being made to correct this deficiency, but in a highly developed area as Spenard, land costs are high and therefore land acquisition is slow.

Fish creek is the only body of water flowing through Spenard. It is overgrown and polluted from both garbage and leaking sewer pipes which run parallel to its banks. Although pollution exists and it is no longer an anadromous stream, wildlife still exist in it's waters. Beaver, muskrat, and ducks reside in Fish Creek. Since it serves as a recreational area, of which the Borough has acquired 12 1/2 acres and has plans to acquire 7 1/2 more, the creek desperately needs restoration. The water is currently not a health hazard, but deep stagnant pools and steep banks are physical hazards which exist and threaten the small children who use the area. The creek bed and waters need cleaning and the channel needs to be improved to eliminate stagnant pools. The banks must be graded to avoid steep areas and some grating must be done to improve the areas where sewer manholes are found.


There are currently no development funds for Fish Creek from the Borough. Acquisition is their top priority ~~now~~ and development will proceed when acquisition is complete. ~~The~~ Greater Anchorage Area Borough Parks and Recreation Department ~~has~~ a proposed development plan which includes bike and ski trails, picnic areas, play fields, tennis courts, footbridges, and a walkway to open up a passageway for school children to their neighborhood school. The Public Works Department of the Borough will be charged with the responsibility of maintaining this recreational area, but there are currently no funds available to restore it.

The amount requested in the Fiscal note is the best cost estimate available from the G.A.A.B. Department of Parks and Recreation. It is proposed that these monies will clean the creek for approximately 1 3/4 miles from tidewater. The proposed project is not just a matter of aesthetics, but one of improving a current recreation area so it

will be free from physical hazards, resulting in a safe play area for the children of Spenard.

It is the hope of Spenard residents that the Fish Creek Linear Park, as proposed by the Borough, will one day be expanded to include the area north to the inlet and south to Spenard Road. Attempts now to restore Fish Creek and it's environs and make it a safe recreational area are important so that Fish Creek can be better utilized by the residents and the needs for expansion can be better assessed.
