

21 normal increases, he may by proclamation declare the area an emergency
22 development impact area. The proclamation shall define the area to
23 which the declaration applies.





* Sec. 2. The sum of \$175,000 is appropriated from the general fund to the Bristol Bay Regional Development Council, Office of the Governor for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1975.

* Sec. 3. This Act takes effect on the day after its passage and approval or on the day it becomes law without approval.

AN ACT

Relating to the Bristol Bay Regional Development Council; and providing for an effective date.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

* Section 1. The legislature recognizes that circumstances and events beyond state or local control have thrust the Bristol Bay regional population into a desperate plight and that the direct and proximate cause of this human distress is the destruction of the Bristol Bay red salmon fishery caused in part by Japanese high-seas fishing sanctioned by the federal government. Because of this distressed situation caused by federal action, the legislature recognizes that economic alternatives are needed to complement rehabilitation of the traditional fishery by the state. Therefore, it is the purpose of this Act to provide for the orderly consideration of the severe economic distress of the Bristol Bay region and to make possible the development of programs to resolve the problems of the region.

* Sec. 2. There is established in the Office of the Governor the Bristol Bay Regional Development Council. The council consists of the commissioner of economic development who is chairman, the commissioner of community and regional affairs, the commissioner of fish and game, and six public members appointed by the governor. Members receive no compensation but are entitled to per diem and travel allowances established for state boards and commissions. The public members may not be state officers or employees. The public members shall be chosen from the Bristol Bay region and shall represent a cross section of the economic interests of the region.

* Sec. 3. The Bristol Bay Regional Development Council may
(1) hire staff and consultants to carry out its responsibilities under this Act;

Chapter 4

(2) promulgate regulations under the Administrative Procedure Act (AS 44.62) that it considers necessary to carry out its responsibilities under this Act;

(3) hold meetings and public hearings in the Bristol Bay region.

* Sec. 4. The Bristol Bay Regional Development Council has the authority and responsibility to

(1) explore the short-term and long-term economic factors and federal and state programs and policies affecting the Bristol Bay region with a view toward producing a long-term economic and social development program for the region consistent with the living patterns of the resident population and integrating natural resources development with the environmental concerns of the region;

(2) present to the governor before the convening of the First Session, Ninth Legislature its proposed long-term economic and social development program for the region.

* Sec. 5. All state departments and agencies shall cooperate with the Bristol Bay Regional Development Council by furnishing all necessary material not prohibited by law.

* Sec. 6. This Act expires June 30, 1975.

* Sec. 7. This Act takes effect on the day after its passage and approval or on the day it becomes law without approval.



Minutes of Meeting Approval

Minutes of the September 7, 1974, meeting were approved as written.

OLD BUSINESS

Revised Contract Proposal with Bristol Bay Area Development Corporation

As the meeting began later than scheduled, due to unforeseen circumstances, the visitors were invited to make their presentations first in the event they had other commitments to meet. Mr. Robert Swetnam, of Phillips Petroleum, reported two geophysical crews were exploring in the prospective Native regional and village lands during the summer. One ceased operations in early September and the other was shut down for conversion from helicopter to all terrain vehicle operations. A surface geology field party also operated during the summer. Data is being presented to Native officials for use in land selections.

If interim land management control is gained promptly, the company plans to bring exploratory drilling next year as part of a five-year minimum program of activity. Speaking for the Regional Corporation, Mr. Schroeder said there are no other formal exploration agreements on the Native lands.

Commissioner Brooks introduced Mr. Bob Roys, Fisheries Development Director, who reported on the Department's plans for restoration and enhancement of the salmon production in the Bay region. Various possibilities for the red salmon decline are being examined, including predators, nourishment, disease and biological degradation of the species, Mr. Roys stated. Work is continuing on a Snake Lake hatchery/nursery and various other lake systems are being studied in preparation for other similar projects. Commissioner Brooks explained that restoration is the first objective of the program with enhancement of non-productive lake systems as a long-range objective.

Council member Delkettie mentioned two problems in the upper Kvichak system. He said the females in the past season's escapement were dying in substantial numbers before spawning out and that young fish were detected dying in Lake Clark. Also, road culverts that had been set too high were blocking returning fish in two previously productive streams. Commissioner Brooks said the exceptionally dry summer may have been a factor in the former instance and said he will investigate the latter situation. Both fishery experts said studies to date offer little cause for optimism that either an alternate offshore fishery or a fresh water fishery can be developed on an economic scale in the near future.

Mr. Bob Pavitt, Director of Planning and Research, then made a presentation and offered the suggestion that the Inupiat people to the north be invited to harvest the Beluga whales that are considered a serious salmon predator.

Mr. Pavitt praised the concept of the Council as the proper way to go about solving the problem and briefed the group on the regional profile his office is preparing for Bristol Bay.

Discussion began on the work proposal of the Area Development Corporation, presented by Mr. Don Nielsen.

Commissioner Mallott raised a question as to whether an item in the timetable listed as "short term goals and programs" referred to a required report to the Governor. Mr. Nielsen said that it did. Commissioner Mallott withdrew from the meeting during discussion of the proposal but informed the Chairman in writing of his approval of the offer, prior to departure.

MOTION

There being no further questions, Commissioner Brooks moved to accept the proposal as submitted and have it converted into a contract agreement as soon as possible. The motion stipulated that budget items in the contract could be amended by mutual agreement of the Council and the Corporation. The stipulation required approval of the Council chairman for changes up to a reasonable limit but not to exceed \$75,000 for the total contract. Larger amounts would require approval of a majority of the Council. Mr. Schroeder seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

NEW BUSINESS

A portion of a letter from G & G Consultants to the Council chairman, expressing interest in doing contract work on the project was read to the Council.

Mr. Tom Armour, a principal in the firm and writer of the letter, was present as an observer at the meeting. It was the expressed consensus of the Council and the Corporation's representative that the Corporation should act as a prime contractor and make proposals to the Council on any additional consulting work that might be required. Mr. Armour indicated that such was agreeable, that he simply wanted to know who to approach on the matter.

Chairman Edmondson then gave a brief report on a meeting of State officials with the regional director of the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration which immediately preceded the council meeting. He reported that the FDAA official offered little hope that any federal fund would be forthcoming in the near future for assistance in a long-range planning project under the Title V provision of the Disaster Act.

He also reported on a talk given the previous week to the Alaska Rural Development Council which prompted Department of Agriculture Representative Walter L. Kubley to offer his assistance in seeking financial help from the Department of Agriculture. The Council approved informally the suggestion of the chairman that he prepare a letter to Mr. Kubley outlining the proposed program and including a request for a specific amount.

Commissioner Brooks then stated that the Council should follow through on the planning effort, regardless of any federal action, and request further funding from the next Legislature. Mr. Pavitt, who remained at the meeting as an observer, offered his concurrence with Commissioner Brook's views.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Minutes of Meeting Approval

Minutes of the September 7 and February 6 meetings will be read for approval at the March 12, 1975 meeting to be held in Anchorage.

The third meeting of the Bristol Bay Regional Development Council was held at 1:45 PM, February 6 in the Conference Room of the Department of Economic Development. The Council formally received the draft report of the disaster area needs survey from its contract consultant, the Bristol Bay Area Development Corporation.

Mr. Trefon Angason, Jr., presented the document on behalf of the contractor and explained that the corporation has merged with and become a subsidiary of the Bristol Bay Native Association.

The only criticism of the draft came from Fish and Game Commissioner, James Brooks, who objected to a description of Chignik as an economic disaster community. Commissioner Brooks stated that the community, located on the southern side of the Alaska Peninsula, is reliant on a generally healthy salmon fishery which does not appear subject to much further major improvement. Because the community is not primarily dependent on the Bristol Bay fishery for its economic base, it was agreed to delete the disaster reference prior to final printing of the report.

In further discussion, it was concluded that printing and binding work of the final draft could be completed in Anchorage by approximately the end of February. Discussion then ensued on whether, in the interest of time, the report should be submitted to the Governor for possible transmittal to the Legislature in typewritten form.

Commissioner Lee McNerney, of Community & Regional Affairs, then moved the report be submitted to the Governor's office as a "final draft" accompanied by an explanatory memorandum and draft letters for transmittal by the Governor to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House.

Mr. Gregory seconded the motion and after a brief discussion, it was passed unanimously.

Commissioner Brooks moved that the Division of Policy Development Planning be invited to work with the council and name an ex officio member to the body if the director so desires. Commissioner Brooks proposal reads as follows:

I request the Chairman of the Council contact Dr. Weeden and propose to him that the Division of Policy Development Planning be invited to participate in the work of the Council, and if Dr. Weeden agrees he or his representative be invited to subsequent meetings and be supplied with materials generated.

Commissioner McNerney seconded the motion and it was passed unanimously on a voice vote.

Discussion then ensued on the nature and mechanics of producing the second phase of the Council's legislative assignment, that of producing a comprehensive economic development plan for the affected area. After some discussion it was agreed that the main thrust of the plan would be

restoration of the fishery with such supplementary economic ventures as would accommodate themselves to the existing life style of the region. The plan will be prepared by consultants retained by the Bristol Bay Native Association contractor. Personnel of the Department of Community and Regional Affairs and the Division of Policy Development Planning will be requested to work with the Bristol Bay Native Association personnel on the project as much as possible.

The next meeting of the Council was scheduled for 1:30 PM, March 12, in Room 515 of the Community and Regional Affairs office in Anchorage.

There being no further business, the meeting was then adjourned at 3:00 PM.

The next meeting of the Council is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 22, at the Department of Economic Development's conference room on the ninth floor of the State Office Building, here in Juneau.

As requested in the last Council meeting, a letter was sent to the Governor seeking \$100,000 of additional funds for the next fiscal year. The request was refused and it was recommended that the Council operate within the original budget. The Governor's Office felt that the purpose of the council would be largely fulfilled upon the expenditure of the remaining budget. Additionally, it was felt that the program was not expected to be an on-going project.

Please find enclosed minutes of the last meeting and a report of the current financial status of the Bristol Bay Council.

Mr. Kevin Haring, of the Department of Community and Regional Affairs, and Mr. Jim Deagen, of this Department, have gone over the proposal to the Bristol Bay Native Association by Alaska Consultants, Inc., (ACI). They recommend that priority consideration be given by the Council to the following items of the proposed development program.

- 1) That ACI assist the BBNA in a survey of the public infrastructure now existing in the region and an additional survey of residents to determine developmental goals.
- 2) That specific items of the proposal receive immediate attention:
 - a) Catalysts to development, including transportation, communications, electric power, public utilities:
 - Establish a system of priorities;
 - Assess long-range feasibility and financial requirements;
 - Identify individual projects and develop costs;
 - and
 - Program projects for construction.

- b) Potential sectors for economic growth:
- Fisheries development and rehabilitation;
 - Boat building and repair;

This is in reference to the contract of September 16, 1974, between the Bristol Bay Regional Development Council and the Bristol Bay Area Development Corporation. In accordance with paragraph 9 of that contract, the following mutually agreeable amendments are incorporated into the contract.

Paragraph 5 is amended to read as follows:

5. Compensation. The Council agrees to pay the Contractor the total sum of up to \$58,724.00 for the satisfactory performance of services in the completion of the work program described in this Contract.

Travel required in completion of this Contract will be reimbursed at the rate of thirty-five dollars (\$35.00), a per diem allowance instead of actual expenses for subsistence, and the actual cost of transportation, or a sum of sixteen cents (\$0.16) per mile if travel is performed by privately owned automobile. The Contractor agrees to keep a record of expenses for travel and subsistence, which shall be open to inspection by the Council.

Paragraph 6 is amended to read as follows:

6. Method of Payment. The Council will pay to the Contractor the amount or amounts set forth in paragraph 5, which shall constitute full and complete compensation for the Contractor's services hereunder. Such sum will be paid in the following manner, in every case, subject to receipt of a requisition for payment and a progress report from the Contractor specifying that he has performed the work under this Contract and that he is entitled to receive the amount requisitioned. All expenditures incurred against the Contract must have recorded documentation and such documentation shall be made available to the Council upon request.

The Contractor shall submit a monthly progress report and certified billing to the Council. The progress report shall contain a summary of the contractual services provided under the project in comparison to the project scope of services.

The billing shall reflect the total contractual services provided to date. Payment to the Contractor will be made on a reimbursable basis for services provided in comparison to the project's scope of services and estimated budget, as described in Appendix A.

In order to expedite the Contractor's performance, the Council may make advance payment of up to \$5,000.00, which amount shall serve as payment for the first \$5,000.00 in billed services. The Contractor shall be liable for return of any part of this advance payment for which the Council is not billed under terms of this contract.

It is expressly understood and agreed that in no event will the total compensation on the part of the Council to be paid to the Contractor hereunder exceed the maximum sum of \$58,724.00.

Paragraph 16 is amended to read as follows:

16. Identification of Documents. All reports, maps and other documents completed as a part of this Contract, other than documents exclusively for internal use within the Council, shall carry the following notation on the front cover or title page (or in the case of maps, in the same block) containing the name of the Council:

The preparation of this report, document, etc., was financed through a grant from the Bristol Bay Regional Development Council, State of Alaska.

Appendix A, Scope of Services and Estimated Project Budget, is amended to read as follows:

Appendix A
Scope of Services

Background. In the wake of the Bristol Bay fisheries disaster of 1974, the Alaska State Legislature established and funded the Bristol Bay Rural Development Council. The Council was directed by the Legislature to:

1. Explore the short-term and long-term economic factors and federal and state programs and policies affecting the Bristol Bay region with a view toward producing a long-term economic and social development program for the region consistent with the living patterns of the resident population and

integrating natural resources development with the environmental concerns of the region.

2. Present to the Governor before the convening of the first session, Ninth Legislature, its proposed long-term economic and social development program for the region.

The Council and the Bristol Bay Area Development Corporation are mutually concerned to see that this legislative mandate is fulfilled, with maximum participation in policy-making by residents of the Bristol Bay region. To this end, the Council desires to contract with the Bristol Bay Area Development Corporation to prepare certain special studies as part of the program to implement this mandate.

The Bristol Bay area has been subject to numerous studies and research of socio-economic importance in recent years, especially those relevant to the resources of oil and the Bristol Bay fisheries. The University of Alaska has compiled an intensive study of the Bristol Bay region tabulating resource data gathered from the 1970 Census Statistics which was published by the Institute of Social, Economic and Government Research in 1974. This research was part of a report entitled The Bristol Bay Environment - a Background Study of Available Knowledge prepared for the Army Corps of Engineers which the University of Alaska compiled as background information in environmental impact statements regarding the petroleum development in Bristol Bay. Two notable publications on the salmon industry have been presented from the ecological conservation point of view on a national and worldwide scale. They are The Pacific Salmon Fisheries by James A. Crutchfield and Giulio Pontecorvo and The Salmon - Their Fight for Survival by Anthony Nelby. The research program of the Fisheries Research Institute of the University of Washington publishes studies of the Alaska salmon with financial support from Alaskan Salmon Packers and the U.S. Bureau of Commercial Fisheries. Balancing conservation and economic development is the thrust of the Alaska fisheries policy study published by ISEGR in 1972. These various programs have probed the Bristol Bay area from outside the region with profiles mainly for policy determinations of state and federal agencies directed into the Bristol Bay.

The socio-economic infrastructure of the Bristol Bay area has been displayed in these various studies as being static in nature with dynamic characteristics exhibited on a year-to-year basis or whenever the study happened to be published, e.g., Bristol Bay area socio-economic scenario - 1974. To a large extent, the most important socio-economic variable, the Bristol Bay residents, has been relegated to the role of statistics, static in nature and actually of secondary importance to the natural resources of the area.

Scope of Services

Under contract to the Bristol Bay Regional Development Council, the Bristol Bay Area Development Corporation agrees to perform the following studies, making maximum use of available existing data:

1. Prepare a summary review of the 1974 season Bristol Bay commercial and subsistence fisheries economy and a forecast of 1975 fisheries season.

5. On the basis of the above information and studies, prepare a statement of social and economic development goals and policy alternatives, with recommendations for long-range policies and programs for social and economic development and fisheries management in Bristol Bay region.

If House Bill 483 had been effective for the 1974 General Election, the only free recount would have been for the Governor's Race. All other candidates were elected by more than 1 percent of the total vote.
