

Dear Senator Butrovich:

CS for HB 553 contains two related but distinct parts. The first part specifies that the Department of Administration is responsible for risk management and loss prevention for state government. Current statutes place emphasis on purchase of insurance only. With the current state of the art and insurance markets being limited, broad risk management concepts should be recognized in the statutes.

The second part of the bill provides for a revolving fund to be administered by the Department of Administration. The fund has numerous purposes, some of which I will expand on.

The fund concept relies on charging individual agencies a premium equal to that paid out for pure insurance. With this money the State effects a program which combines the risks of all agencies and which is able to assume retentions, deductibles, and self-insurance which individual agencies are unable to withstand. In effect the State benefits from large scale economies and management of risks while the agencies are provided with a cost certain insurance program compatible with the State budgeting system.

Due to the geographic and numerical spread of risk the State is able to economically take advantage of insurance deductibles which fully contemplate assumption of normal and expected levels of loss. Taken separately, each department or BRU would be unable to individually take advantage of this economy because they lack the spread of risk essential to this program. The proposed legislation allows the State to take overall advantage of self-insurance and deductibles without creating an unreasonable uncertainty among the individual BRU's that make up the State risks.

The proposed fund is a revolving fund because the carry over from a good year will level out the losses in a bad year. In addition, losses are not always paid in the same year as incurred. To appropriate loss payments in the year paid rather than the year incurred, essentially puts us on an unfavorable claims made basis. The revolving fund provides current funding for the claims tail rather than on a claims made basis.

Our fund provides current year funds to cover current year losses rather than burdening future budgets or the general fund through special appropriation at a later date. Remember that had we purchased insurance, the insurance company would use current year premiums to pay losses over a period of several years. In this case, the State benefits from the cash flow generated by the fund.

The fund provides a vehicle for advance payments of insured losses which may take six months or a year to collect from insurance companies. Traditionally, a replacement cost insurance settlement is received too late to be used for rebuilding purposes. The fund could advance funds for immediate restoration of operations. The fund would then be reimbursed by the insurance recovery.

The fund provides a vehicle for agency protection from losses which are not economically insured on an overall basis. An example is a small barge cargo shipment which is uneconomical for an agency to self insure and uneconomical for the State to insure in the long run. The fund could charge the standard premium to an agency, relieving them of the risk, and still self insure the risk using the accumulated loss funds to pay any loss incurred.

The above reasons for a loss fund anticipate that insurance is available but not economical. We currently face the potential of forced self-insurance. If markets are unavailable to insure State risks, the fund gives us alternatives to being self insured without funding to pay losses. Establishment of the fund does not obligate us to self insure but it does give us the capability of responding to changing insurance markets and changing State exposures to risk.

Lastly, we have heard comments generally in opposition to revolving funds based on past practice of certain other funds. It is not our intention to hide costs and, in fact, we believe that this bill brings into the open the cost of State risks and insurance. Provision has been made for the legislature to audit the fund and the program to insure integrity and to avoid abuses. We have further considered these comments as a legislative request for more open and clearly defined allocation of premium and loss costs. Establishment of the fund will require a close accounting of expenditures and receipts which will clearly show the activities of the program and the allocated cost to each department.


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

Dear Mr. Speaker:

In accordance with AS 24.30.060(b) and the Uniform Rules of the Alaska State Legislature, I am transmitting a bill relating to risk management and loss prevention. The Department of Administration has requested this measure to allow it to deal more effectively with the insurance coverage demanded by State programs and institutions.

The approach sought here would allow the State to assume increasingly higher "deductibles" on insurance coverage if the State's loss experience allows the accumulation of funds in the risk management fund established by the bill. Since higher deductibles result in less insurance risk put out to bid, the result will be a savings to the State.

The fund concept is an alternative to a program, also with higher deductibles, in which the State "insures itself" and recoups unexpectedly high losses (as disaster situations) out of general fund appropriations.

A result of the approach proposed by the Department of Administration will be the elimination of the need for individual agencies to absorb deductibles out of their own program funds; it also will allow the State to replace lost facilities before settlement of insured claims.

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

Dear Mr. Speaker:

In accordance with AS 24.30.060(b) and the Uniform Rules of the Alaska State Legislature, I am transmitting a bill relating to utilities and State rights-of-way. The bill is designed to clarify the jurisdiction of the Department of Highways in situations where State highways would intersect a utility facility or run together with it. There have been instances of confusion both over what constitutes a utility for purposes of AS 19.25.020 and the manner in which replacement costs for utility relocation should be calculated. The bill would also clarify the rights and duties both of the State and the utility in those situations.

In particular, the bill would make it clear that once a utility's facilities have been relocated due to highway construction, it will retain the same rights (primarily, the right to reimbursement) for any subsequent relocation necessitated by highway construction.

Dear Chairman Malone:

I am writing in regard to House Bill No. 557 entitled "An act relating to utilities and state rights-of-way; and providing for an effective date." The Alaska Electric Light and Power Company is in favor of this bill in concept, however, it has a problem with Sec. 19, 25, 020(A). This section requires that a utility will move its facilities in accordance with an order from the Highway Department. The order shall provide a reasonable period of time for compliance. Unfortunately, investor owned utilities do not have the right to "take" an easement or right-of-way and settle on the price at a later date through the courts. An investor owned utility must exercise the right of eminent domain which may take two to three years if the proceedings are contested by the owner. I believe this section should be amended to provide some protection for the investor of the utility against being placed in a time-squeeze by the Highway Department and the court system.

This bill would clarify and strengthen existing legislation regarding relocation of utilities incident to highway construction. Briefly, the aspect and scope of Alaska Statute modification follows:

AS 19.05.130(4), "cost of change, relocation or removal" is amended and broadened to provide that a replacement facility will be functionally equal to the existing facility less any cost of improvements and any salvage derived from the old facility.

AS 19.05.130(12), "Utility" is amended and broadened to identify the types of facilities to be identified as a utility. This listing parallels Federal Highway Administration usage and definitions as well as those used by the Alaska Public Service Commission. APUC commented on the proposed legislation to the extent that CATV or Cable TV was omitted and should be included.

AS 19.25.010, Use of Highways for Utilities, is amended to eliminate from the listing of utilities the words "other structures". The definition of "other structures" is very broad. It is felt that a structure, other than a utility facility as defined by AS 19.05.130 should be considered as an encroachment and fall within the parameter of AS 19.25.200-250, Encroachments in Highways. This will eliminate confusion between utility facilities and other type of structure encroachments.

AS 19.25.020, Relocation of Utilities Incident Federal-Aid Highway Projects, is repealed to be re-enacted to provide and accomplish the following:

(a) Reference to Federal-aid has been eliminated from the title, and references to the primary, secondary interstate system have been eliminated amending the section to include utilities "within states right-of-way" incident to highway construction. The change will clarify the intent of the statute and simply include utilities within the Department's right-of-way without regard to classification of system status.

(b) Is a new... stated. The... strength and means to... utilities to... in a more timely manner. If... should fail to... or relocate... in a timely manner in accordance with... amendment will provide the Department with the authority to declare the un-relocated facilities encroachments, collect liquidated damages, and further, the owner of the encroaching facility shall be required to pay the state any amount the state may be liable to a contractor due to the utility facility encroachments.

(c) This section provides for reimbursement to utility companies for costs incurred for relocation.

We recommend the following changes in the Bill as written:

On line 17 of page 1, after facility place a semicolon and strike the balance of the underlined. The formula for expired service life is a Federal Highway Administration requirement and should appear as a regulation in the Administrative Code where the limitation and requirements may be more readily modified than as a provision in a statute.

On line 2 of page 3, strike everything after the word state and insert "in accordance with AS 19.05.130(4)". With this change the State would qualify for Federal-Aid on Federal projects where facilities to be relocated are now under permits obligating the State for a second adjustment. Presently, it is unclear when the State would qualify for Federal-Aid.

Delete paragraph (d) on page 3. If the recommended change in the above paragraph is incorporated, paragraph (d) is unnecessary.

These recommended changes are shown on a marked up version of the Bill attached.

The Department feels the proposed legislation will effectively eliminate many problems that have been encountered between the Department and the utility industry with regard to the interpretation of the existing statutes. It also will modify the existing statutes to reflect a position slowly developed by Attorney General Opinions over the years and a similar opinion taken and expressed by the utility industry after the passage of Chapter 57, SIA 1961, with increased emphasis each year. The legislation will provide legal authority for the state to recognize a utility's land interest and to reimburse the utility for a second or
