IN THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA

NINTH LEGISLATURE - SECOND SESSION

A BILL

For an Act entitled: "An Act relating to selection of architects, engineers, and surveyors for state projects; and providing for an effective date."

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

House Bill 646 creates an independent board to monitor the process by which professional firms are selected for project-related architectural, engineering or land surveying services.

The Board's duties will include:

(a) The establishment of formal criteria on which selections will be based;

(b) The monitoring of the selection process to ensure that State agencies conform with established practice when awarding contracts.

The Bill was drafted in consultation with the professional societies involved and has been endorsed by American Institute of Architects, Alaska Society of Professional Engineers, and Professional Engineers in Private Practice. It is based on model legislation proposed by the National Institute of Architecture to correct various informalities and irregularities historically evident in the selection process.

The model legislation differed from HB 646 in one important respect, i.e. the model legislation proposed a Selection Board while HB 646 proposes a Review Board.

This variation was adopted for two reasons:

(a) The professionals and the State agreed that the normal business of contracting services should rest with the civil servants in the contracting agencies and their superiors, not with an outside entity.

(b) Since there are few, if any, firms in Alaska who do not rely on public work, it would be virtually impossible to find appointees for a selection board who could afford to disqualify themselves for the period of appointment. On the other hand, it was not considered necessary to require appointees to disqualify themselves from accepting State work when their function is not to select firms, but to monitor the process.

SECTIONAL ANALYSIS

Section 1.

Sec. 35.30.010 creates the Board which is composed of seven members as outlined, and provides that the Board shall be administratively supported by the Department of Public Works. It was originally to be supported by the Department of Commerce. However, the Commissioner of Commerce pointed out that since Public Works would be the prime user of the Board, and since the Board's functions would be of a technical nature, then Department of Public Works should provide the administrative and fiscal support.

Sec. 35.30.020, page 2, is self-explanatory.

Sec. 35.30.030, page 2, lays out the powers and duties of the Board.

Sec. 35.30.040, page 3, is self-explanatory.

Sec. 35.30.050, page 3, is self-explanatory.

Sec. 35.30.060 (a), (b), (c), (d), (e), (f), and (g), pages 4 and 5, set up the mechanics by which firms shall be selected. Each contracting agency shall appoint a three-member selection committee. For projects involving user agencies as well as contracting agencies, the committee shall have one member appointed by the Department head of the user Agency. The Committee will publicly announce proposed projects in detail, shall examine and evaluate all applications, shall apply the criteria outlined in the bill, as well as additional criteria promigated by the Review Board, and shall select for each project from three of the most highly qualified firms considered to be capable of performing the required services. The Committee shall prepare public reports for submission to the Review Board outlining its actions.

Sec. 35.30.070, page 6. The contracting agency shall conduct negotiations with and award contracts to firms recommended by its committee and shall report to the Board the results of its negotiations with all necessary documentation.

Sec. 35.30.080, page 6. The Review Board shall review design and contracts and issue an annual report summarizing contracts awarded during the year. The report shall include details of grievances processed.

Sec. 35.30.090, page 7, provides for a prohibition against contingent fees.

Sec. 35.30.100, page 7, delineates the administrative support to be provided for the Board by the Department of Public Works.

Sec. 35.30.110, page 7, provides that contracts less than \$20,000 shall be exempt from the requirements of this Chapter. The amount contained in this section was determined by the various State agencies and the professional societies. A fee of \$20,000 would normally provide for the design of a construction contract of approximately \$300,000. Such small contracts will not usually be subject to informal influence. It was therefore felt that no purpose would be served by including them within the provisions of this Chapter. Additionally, since there are dozens of these small contracts awarded annually, the inclusion of contracts for less than \$20,000 within the provision of the Chapter would magnify the work load far beyond any useful benefit. This section also provides that emergency projects may be exempted by the Board.

10 * Section 1. AS 35 is amended by adding a new chapter to read:

11 CHAPTER 30. STATE SELECTION OF ARCHITECTS,
12 ENGINEERS, AND SURVEYORS.

13 Sec. 35.30.010. SELECTION REVIEW BOARD. (a) There is in the
14 Department of Public Works an Architects, Engineers, and Land Surveyors
15 Selection Review Board.

16 (b) The board is composed of seven members, appointed by the
17 governor and subject to confirmation by the legislature in joint session
18 Members shall be appointed as follows:

19 (1) two members must be registered architects appointed by
20 the governor from a list of at least four names submitted by the Alaska
21 chapter of the American Institute of Architects;

22 (2) two members must be registered engineers appointed by the
23 governor from a list of at least four names submitted by the Alaska
24 Society of Professional Engineers;

25 (3) two members shall be appointed by the governor from the
26 general public, neither of whom may be an architect or an engineer or a
27 land surveyor; the public members must possess, due to their education,
28 experience, or vocation, an understanding of and sensitivity to project
29 design or construction;

1 (4) one member must be a registered land surveyor appointed
2 by the governor from names submitted by the Alaska chapter of the
3 American Society of Professional Land Surveyors.

4 (c) The term of office of board members is two years. Initial
5 appointments within each classification in (b)(1)-(3) of this section
6 shall specify one-year and two-year terms so as to assure the staggering
7 of terms within each classification. If a vacancy occurs on the board,
8 the governor shall appoint a person qualified under the applicable
9 provision in (b) of this section to serve the unexpired term.

10 (d) No member of the board or of a firm or joint venture with
11 which he is associated, or in which he has a financial interest, may be
12 barred, because of his board membership, from contracting to serve as an
13 architect, engineer, or land surveyor for a project or from otherwise
14 participating as a consultant or employee on a project.

15 (e) No member of the board may vote on a grievance matter brought
16 by or against him or by or against a firm or joint venture with which he
17 is associated or in which he has a financial interest.

18 Sec. 35.30.020. ORGANIZATION AND MEETINGS OF BOARD. At the first
19 meeting of the members of the board, the board shall elect a chairman.
20 The board shall also elect other officers it considers necessary for the
21 conduct of its affairs. It shall adopt rules governing its operations
22 and the conduct of its meetings. The rules shall provide for the term
23 of the chairman and other officers if any. The board shall meet at
24 least once every six months. In addition, in accordance with AS 44.62.-
25 310 - 44.62.312 the board may take official action by mail votes or
26 votes during conference telephone calls on reasonable notice to the
27 public and to all members. Four members constitute a quorum.

28 Sec. 35.30.030. DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE BOARD. The board shall

29 (1) adopt regulations under the Administrative Procedure Act

1 (AS 44.62) that it finds appropriate to supplement the procedure estab-
2 lished by this chapter for architect, engineer, and land surveyor
3 selection;

4 (2) review all selection procedures on a periodic basis;

5 (3) review any grievance related to the selection process
6 and recommend appropriate action to the governor; the board's recom-
7 mendations on grievances are public information;

8 (4) prepare an annual report on architect, engineer, and land
9 surveyor selection and selection grievances.

10 Sec. 35.30.040. COMPENSATION, PER DIEM, AND EXPENSES. Members of
11 the board are entitled to per diem, reimbursement for travel and other
12 expenses authorized by law for other boards.

13 Sec. 35.30.050. REQUIREMENTS FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES. (a) Each
14 agency shall make public on at least an annual basis its known present
15 and future construction and planning programs, and its anticipated
16 requirements for professional services for at least the following 12-
17 month period.

18 (b) When professional services are required for a specific pro-
19 ject, the chief executive officer of the contracting agency shall submit
20 a written notice to the board. The notice shall include a description
21 of the proposed project, its location, the scope of services required,
22 the proposed completion date, and a description of any special require-
23 ments or unique features of the proposed project.

24 Sec. 35.30.060. QUALIFICATION OF ARCHITECTURAL, ENGINEERING, AND
25 SURVEYING FIRMS; SELECTION COMMITTEES. (a) The Department of Public
26 Works shall encourage firms engaged in the lawful practice of archi-
27 tecture, engineering, or land surveying to submit at least annually a
28 statement of qualifications. The department shall maintain an up-to-
29 date listing of qualified firms and shall make it available to selection

1 committees formed under this section. The department shall maintain a
2 complete file of all qualified firms who have submitted a statement
3 within the previous two years.

4 (b) When an agency of the state expects to enter into a contract
5 for architectural, engineering, or land surveying services, the chief
6 executive officer of that contracting agency shall appoint two persons
7 from that agency to a three-member selection committee. The chief
8 executive officer of the user agency for the proposed project shall
9 appoint a person from the user agency as the third member of the com-
10 mittee. If it is anticipated that there will be more than one user
11 agency, then the third committee member shall be appointed by the
12 commissioner of administration. Committee members appointed from the
13 Department of Public Works must be employees in the classified service
14 under AS 39.25. The members shall elect a chairman.

15 (c) The committee, upon its appointment, shall make a public
16 announcement of the proposed project which includes a description of the
17 proposed project, its location, the scope of service required, the
18 proposed completion date, and a description of any special requirements
19 or unique features. The announcement shall invite firms to submit to
20 the committee an application to perform services for the project which
21 may include supplemental descriptions of their firms and statements of
22 qualifications with supporting data as it relates to the proposed pro-
23 ject.

24 (d) The committee shall examine all applications from interested
25 firms and certify those firms qualified to perform the services for the
26 project under consideration. Among the factors to be considered in
27 making this finding are the capability, adequacy of personnel, past
28 record, and experience of the firm.

29 (e) In evaluating the firms certified under (d) of this section,

1 the committee shall apply the following criteria, along with other
2 criteria established by administrative regulations of the department if
3 any:

4 (1) specialized experience and design and technical compe-
5 tence of the firm, including a joint venture or association, regarding
6 the type of service required;

7 (2) capability of the firm to perform the work, including any
8 specialized services, within the time limitations;

9 (3) past record of performance on contracts with government
10 agencies and private industry with respect to such factors as control of
11 costs, quality of work, and ability to meet schedules;

12 (4) proximity to and familiarity with the area in which the
13 project is located; and

14 (5) the desirability of selecting the most highly qualified
15 firm; however, the volume of work previously awarded to the firm by the
16 state shall also be considered, with the object of effecting an equi-
17 table distribution of contracts among qualified firms and of assuring
18 that the interest of the public in having available a substantial number
19 of qualified firms is protected.

20 (f) After making this review and technical evaluation, the com-
21 mittee shall hold discussions with not less than three of the most
22 highly qualified firms regarding their capability and methods of ap-
23 proach for furnishing the required services. Professional compensation
24 may not be considered in these discussions.

25 (g) The committee shall prepare a public report for submission to
26 the board, recommending, in order of highest qualification, no less than
27 three firms that are considered most highly qualified to perform the
28 required services. This report shall include a statement of the extent
29 of the evaluation and review and the considerations upon which the

1 recommendations were based. If the committee has found under (d) of
2 this section that less than three firms are qualified to perform the
3 services, it shall include in its report the reasons for qualifying less
4 than three. The report shall be made within 45 days after the committee
5 is appointed.

6 Sec. 35.30.070. NEGOTIATIONS. (a) The contracting agency shall
7 conduct negotiations on scope of work and professional compensation
8 initially with the highest ranked firm. If a mutually satisfactory
9 contract cannot be negotiated with that firm, the agency head shall
10 formally terminate the negotiations and notify the firm. Negotiations
11 then shall be initiated with the second-ranked firm and this procedure
12 shall be continued until a mutually satisfactory contract has been
13 negotiated. If negotiations fail with the listed firms, the names of
14 additional firms shall be selected and ranked by the committee and
15 negotiations shall continue in the manner described in this subsection.

16 (b) Upon successfully negotiating a contract with a firm, the
17 agency shall promptly report to the board the results of its negotia-
18 tions, with documentation of the factors affecting any unsuccessful
19 negotiations with higher ranked firms.

20 Sec. 35.30.080. PUBLIC REPORTS. The selection committee estab-
21 lished under sec. 60 of this chapter shall select the firm to design
22 each proposed project, shall make a public announcement of the selected
23 firm and shall provide prompt notification to each selected firm. The
24 board shall review each design contract awarded under this section and
25 shall issue an annual report summarizing the projects processed during
26 the year and the firms selected to design them. The annual report also
27 shall list each grievance received, give the board's recommendation on
28 the grievance, and state what action was taken in response to the
29 board's recommendation.

1 Sec. 35.30.090. PROHIBITION AGAINST CONTINGENT FEES; MISDEMEANOR.

2 (a) Each contract entered into by an agency for professional services
3 shall contain a prohibition against contingent fees as follows: "The
4 contractor providing professional services warrants that he has not
5 employed or retained any person whose fee, commission, percentage, gift,
6 or any other consideration is contingent upon or results from the award
7 or making of this agreement." For a violation of this provision, the
8 agency may terminate the agreement without liability and, in its dis-
9 cretion, may deduct from the contract price, or otherwise recover, the
10 full amount of the fee, commission, percentage, gift or consideration.

11 (b) A public official or other person who offers, agrees, or
12 contracts to solicit or secure a state agency contract for professional
13 services for any other person for a fee, commission, percentage, gift or
14 other consideration contingent upon or resulting from, the award or the
15 making of a contract for professional services, is guilty of a misde-
16 meanor.

17 (c) An architect, engineer, land surveyor, or other person who
18 offers or pays or otherwise furnishes any consideration prohibited in
19 (b) of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor.

20 Sec. 35.30.100. OFFICE, STAFF, AND RECORDS. The Department of
21 Public Works shall provide the board a suitable place to hold meetings
22 and keep records. The commissioner of public works shall designate an
23 employee of the department to serve as executive secretary to the board
24 who shall devote the time necessary to promote the expeditious conduct
25 of the board's duties and responsibilities.

26 Sec. 35.30.110. EXEMPTIONS. (a) Contracts where compensation to
27 be paid under the contract is less than \$20,000 are exempt from the
28 requirements of this chapter.

29 (b) The board may, on a case-by-case basis, exempt emergency

1 projects from the selection process. A brief statement of the emergency
2 that caused the exemption of any project shall be included in the
3 board's annual report made under sec. 80 of this chapter.

4 Sec. 35.30.120. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter, unless the context
5 requires otherwise,

6 (1) "agency" means all officials, departments, and agencies
7 of the state government, including the University of Alaska and the
8 Alaska State Housing Authority;

9 (2) "architect, engineer, or land surveyor" means an archi-
10 tect, engineer, or land surveyor registered to practice under AS 08.48;

11 (3) "board" means the Architects, Engineers, and Land Sur-
12 veyors Selection Review Board;

13 (4) "contracting agency" means the agency administering a
14 contract for architectural, engineering, or land surveying services;

15 (5) "committee" means a selection committee established under
16 sec. 60 of this chapter;

17 (6) "firm" means an architect, engineer, or land surveyor, or
18 a partnership, association, or corporation comprised primarily of
19 architects or engineers or land surveyors registered to practice under
20 AS 08.48;

21 (7) "professional service" means architectural, engineering,

23 (8) "project" means a construction project using professional

2 (9) "user agency" means the agency which will occupy or use
3 the product of the professional service.

4 * Sec. 2. AS 39.50.200(9) is amended by adding a new subparagraph to read:

5 (LL) Architects, Engineers and Land Surveyors Selection

7 * Sec. 3. Nothing in this Act affects the validity or effect of any
8 contract in existence on January 1, 1977.

9 * Sec. 4. AS 35.30.030(2), (3), and (4), 35.30.050, and 35.30.060 -
10 35.30.080, enacted in sec. 1 of this Act, take effect January 1, 1977. All
11 other provisions of this Act take effect immediately in accordance with

Dear Mr. Speaker:

In accordance with AS 24.30.060(b) and the Uniform Rules of the Alaska State Legislature, I am transmitting a bill relating to selection of architects, engineers and surveyors for state projects.

The purpose of the bill is to assure a fair and open procedure for securing the contract services of these professionals when they are needed for construction projects. By an attachment to this transmittal letter, the objectives of the bill are summarized.

The bill provides for a selection review board composed of two architects, two engineers, one land surveyor and two public members, with appointments of members to be made by the Governor, subject to legislative confirmation. The professional members are to be selected from persons nominated by the affected professional societies.

By the terms of the bill the board would oversee the selection process by:

(1) adopting regulations to supplement selection procedures set out in the bill;

(2) reviewing selection procedures periodically;

(3) reviewing and making a public recommendation to the Governor on any grievance in the selection process; and;

(4) making an annual report covering (a) the professional selections made, and (b) any grievances processed, with recommendations made as to those grievances and a statement of the action taken on the recommendations.

The bill requires that the need for professional services be advertised. It also establishes procedures for qualifying firms that apply, selecting the best qualified, and reporting on the entire process to the selection review board which then would make a public announcement of the selection and notify the competing firms.

Both offering and accepting a fee contingent upon successfully securing a professional-services contract are made misdemeanors.

By regulation, the board may eliminate small contracts from the selection procedure. Emergency projects also may be exempted from the selection procedure, but a report on the exemption must be included in the board's annual report.


The House Finance Committee on February 11, 1976 reported out with an unanimous do pass recommendation House Finance Committee Substitute for HB 647. The only change in the Committee Substitute is to raise the appropriation amount to the Office of the Governor, Athletic Commission, from \$75,000 to \$98,300.

The purpose of the appropriation is to pay 75 percent of the \$131,000 in travel costs for transporting 232 Alaskan athletes to the Fourth Arctic Winter Games to be held in Schefferville, Quebec this March 21 through 28. This year the greater distance involved for Alaskan competitors in this biennial event (the three prior Arctic Winter Games were held in Yellowknife, Northwest Territories, Whitehorse, and Anchorage) has raised the cost of travel for the Alaska teams and coaches. Included in the total travel cost is airfare to bring competitors from the bush and Southeast Alaska to departure points for the primary charter.

Young and adult Alaskans from twenty-five Alaskan communities will compete with athletes from Arctic Quebec, the Yukon, and Northwest Territories in the following thirteen events: badminton, basketball, volleyball, hockey, curling, table tennis, cross-country skiing, shooting, wrestling, figure skating, snowshoeing, judo, and arctic sports. The latter event, arctic sports, includes some of those unique competitions held in Alaska's Eskimo Olympics such as the one and two leg high kick and the ear pull.

Much time, money, and effort by the Alaskan competitors, coaches, and local sponsors has gone into supporting and equipping the Alaska teams in these thirteen events.

The Committee is pleased to urge passage of CSHB 647 which will help promote wider participation by Alaskans from all over the State in this healthy and exciting experience of a lifetime.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

It is anticipated that a full contingent of 232 persons will travel from Alaska to Schefferville, Quebec to compete in the 1976 Arctic Winter Games, March 21 - 28. Included will be 226 athletes and coaches in 13 sports and a 6 person coordinating staff (Mission).

A contract is in effect with Canadian Pacific Airlines to transport 201 persons between Anchorage and Montreal. Two other contracts with Nordair provide for transportation of 226 persons between Montreal and Schefferville. As the primary charter with CP Air can only accommodate 201 persons, the additional 25 persons will travel on a group rate between Anchorage and Montreal, via Seattle and Vancouver. These 25 can be accommodated on the Nordair charters from Montreal to Schefferville. (CP Air - Nordair were selected based on their interest and substantially low bid.)

It will be therefore necessary for the 6 remaining persons of the 232 to travel separately from the charters.

In addition to the travel between Anchorage and Schefferville it is anticipated that 65 persons will travel from Fairbanks to Anchorage and 15 persons will be traveling to Fairbanks or Anchorage from remote areas of the State. Those persons representing Southeastern Alaska will travel directly to Seattle from Juneau or Ketchikan, the savings in air fare from Anchorage to Seattle offset by overnight expenses. (It is necessary to overnight in Seattle to connect with the overflow group schedule connecting eventually with the Nordair charters.)

Exact remote travel costs cannot be determined until final selection of all teams is completed by February 15.

A deposit of \$10,500 consisting of loans from Junior Ramos and Alan Olson of \$2,500 and \$8,000 respectively was paid January 19, 1976 to CP Air and Nordair. The contracts signed with CP Air and Nordair require the remaining \$94,131.66, which covers the primary charters to Schefferville, to be paid by February 20. Other costs relating to travel to Anchorage from throughout Alaska and for the overflow group travel must be paid to the respective airlines by March 10.

The deadline for registration is February 15 in order to comply with requirements set forth by the Arctic Winter Games Corporation. Individual payment for transportation costs of approximately \$550 is required at registration. If any funding becomes available to the Alaska team, individual costs will be reduced proportionately. Consequently, receipt of funding prior to February 15 will make it possible for those persons who qualify, but can't afford the full cost of transportation, to be included. Otherwise, alternates who can afford the cost of transportation will be selected as of February 15.

* A Scheutzen Butt Plate is any butt or butt plate designed with a curved surface against the shoulder of the shooter (or with a knob or knobs or prong or prongs giving the effect of a curved surface) in which the depth of the curve when measured from a straight line drawn from the top to the bottom of the butt plate exceeds 1/2 inch; or any butt or butt plate having a hook or stud engaging in a hole or receptacle in the shoulder of the shooting coat or shirt.

** A palm rest is any attachment or extension below the fore-end which aids the normal grip and support of the piece by the left hand and arm (or in the case of left handed shooter by the right hand and arm).
