

2. A stratified random sample by area will be made of firms considered to be included in the tourist industry. The number of firms to be sampled will be based on a specific level of "precision" for a single parameter and a confidence level of .95. The survey will be directed toward such questions as (a) 1975 gross revenues, (b) the number and type of employees, (c) the areas from which the firm purchases its goods and services, and (d) the taxes paid by type to State and local governments.

### Work Plan

To complete the study, four major elements need to be addressed.

1. Define more fully the scope of the work needed. This involves (a) more careful understanding and preparation of the questions to be addressed, (b) refinement of desired data, and (c) problems associated with alternative sampling techniques, interview methodology, and questionnaire development.

The anticipated cost of performance in item 1 is approximately \$5,000 in-house.

2. Sampling, interviewing and compiling questionnaires from visitors entering Alaska. The number of visitors entering Alaska in 1976 is expected to be 328.0 thousand. The required sample size is anticipated to be approximately two percent.

The anticipated cost of performance in item 2 is approximately \$65,000 of which the majority will be contracted through competitive bid.

3. Sampling, interview and compiling questionnaires to visitor-related firms and government units. It is estimated primarily visitor-related firms in Alaska number 800. Because they are so widely scattered and diverse in nature it is expected that nearly half may need to be surveyed.

The anticipated cost of performance in item 3 is approximately \$40,000 of which the majority will be contracted through competitive bid.

4. Preparation of papers and reports. Three reports are anticipated from this effort: (a) a method by which reliable visitor counts can be obtained for a continued effort by State agency personnel, (b) a simple analysis of the compiled data for general public reading, and (c) a technical treatise concerned with the economic impact of tourism on the State and regional economies.

The anticipated cost of performance in item 4 is approximately \$25,000 - half contractual - half in-house.

Private consultants will accomplish major portions of the work plan under close supervision of the Division of Economic Enterprise.

## Problem Statement

Traditionally, State Administrations and members of the Legislature have viewed tourism as a substantial contributor to the overall Alaskan economy. The fostering of tourism has been viewed since Statehood as a means of economic development of the state as a whole. A particularly attractive feature of tourism development from the standpoint of state policy is that the industry is essentially non-extractive and non-polluting. Tourism will remain an important segment of the Alaska economy when other extractive industries have attained their development peaks.

The "visitor industry" is an amalgam of many individual industries. In fact, it would be better to speak of "tourism sector." However, the term "visitor industry" is useful as a point of reference, bearing in mind that it is comprised of segments of the transportation industry (air carriers; railroads; motorcoaches; cars, campers and motorhomes; cruiseship and ferryliners, etc.); the food and beverage industry (restaurants, etc.); the sightseeing industry (local points of visitor interest); the entertainment industry (shows, theater presentations, nightclubs, etc.); the convenience service industry (gift shops, etc.); and the recreation industry (sportfishing lodges; wilderness camps; state and federal parks, campgrounds etc.).

Many states have commissioned studies in recent years to evaluate the economic benefit of tourism to the state. Most studies have concluded that tourism promotion is in the best interests of the state, although opinions vary depending on the degree of development of the tourism "plant" within any given state, ability of a state to absorb visitors, and other factors.

Two studies, undertaken under State of Alaska auspice, one in 1963-64 and one in 1968-69, have examined the economic worth of tourism. However, since the 1968-69 period, the size of the visitor industry, in terms of the number of annual visitors, has more than doubled. Hence, economic baselines developed in these previous studies are now considerably out of date and the composition of the visitor market (relative percentages of visitors arriving in Alaska via air, highway and sea) have shifted dramatically. The State is today no longer dealing with the "industry" as it existed in the 1968-69 period.

It is generally felt that a comprehensive new study should be undertaken to evaluate the economic benefit of tourism and to aid in policy planning for the posture which the state should best adopt with regard to the tourist industry. Specific answers should be sought to the following questions, viz:

1. In-state revenues generated by the visitor industry.
2. Employment, both permanent and seasonal, in the industry.

3. Secondary income and employment created in other Alaska industries.
4. Revenues to local and State Government generated from activities in the visitor industry.

Representative Duncan from Juneau recently introduced into the House of the Alaska State Legislature, House Bills 730 and 731. This legislation was referred to the House Commerce and Finance Committees. At the date of this letter, I believe the two bills are scheduled for consideration in the House Commerce Committee on Monday, March 8, 1976.

I write to you today on these two bills for the purpose of informing you that this particular legislation is, in the opinion of Alaskans for Travel, the single most important special authorization and funding legislation that deals with the Alaska visitor industry.

This particular bill seeks to accomplish the establishment of a data collection system and to conduct that survey for the first time. Research in any area of endeavor is crucial for good planning and development. Research and data is important for anyone who wishes to analyze the worth and value of an activity. Research and data is valuable on any subject that has significant impact upon our economy and our lives.

The Alaska travel business, in its various forms and facets, is a major economic factor of our lives. The problem is that we do not know how big it is, where it is concentrated, where it comes from, or who benefits and how much. ## Issue Statement

Generally, tourism has been considered a substantial contributor to the Alaskan economy, and a potential source of perpetual economic activity that might be more fully developed. At least two studies have been made to assess the potential for increasing the economic activity in the tourist industry: 1) Cresap, McCormick, Paget Alaska Tourism Study of 1968, 2) More recently, the Alaska tourism industry has been criticized for being a "drain" on the economy, 3) Another study made for the states of Idaho, Oregon and Washington criticized the tourist industry for its seasonality and lack of potential upward mobility for its employees. None of the studies addressed all the questions of considerable significance:

1. Revenues generated at a specific time in the tourist industry.
2. Employment, both permanent and seasonal, in the industry.
3. Secondary income and employment created in other Alaskan industries as a result of that in the tourist industry.
4. Revenues to local and State Government generated from activity in the tourist industry.
5. State costs associated with providing special services to the tourist industry - advertising, ferry system, parks, campground, etc.
6. The number of tourist that visit Alaska and the regions they tour.
7. The method of travel to Alaska.

## Objectives

The objectives of this study are to assess the present day contributions of the tourist industry to Alaska and its regional economies and the costs and revenues to the respective governments. Hopefully, the study will provide an indication as to whether the industry should be promoted with public funds and to what extent, which is an even more difficult problem. As a result of the study the Division of Tourism may want to modify its promotional efforts to achieve a greater gain to the citizens of Alaska.

## Methodology

The proposal is addressed to the problem of collecting detailed data on tourist expenditures through direct contact of firms in the tourist industry, state and local revenues obtained from the industry, state costs associated with encouraging tourism, and the general characteristics of tourists to Alaska. To obtain answers to these questions, two surveys will have to be conducted, as well as an analysis of public data:

1. A systematic survey will be made of firms considered to be included in the tourist industry which is defined to include segments of transportation and transportation services, gasoline service stations, eating and drinking establishments, lodging places, and amusement and recreation services. The survey will be directed toward such questions as: (a) 1975 gross revenues, (b) number and type of employees, (c) the areas from which the firms purchase their goods and services, and (d) the taxes paid by type to State and local governments.
2. Stratified random sample will be conducted of persons entering Alaska by mode of travel. The questionnaire will ask such questions as: (a) the purpose of their trip, (b) their origin and destination, (c) points in Alaska to be visited, (d) number in the party, and (e) expected expenditures in Alaska.

A comprehensive perusal of data publicly available and on file with State agencies should provide: (a) additional information to test individual hypothesis and, (b) a method by which to determine the reliability of the results obtained from the questionnaires.

The study will attempt to measure the contribution of the tourist industry to the Alaskan economy. Likewise, the costs and potential and benefits from the State's promotional activities will be measured at one point in time. No attempt will be made to determine the long-run growth potential of tourism in Alaska.
