

III. ANALYSIS (See Fiscal Note Preparation Instructions, Section III)

The provision in this bill that would constitute a change in what is already allowed under the Village Safe Water Act, is the provision that a VSW facility must be financially self-sufficient within 10 years of its completion.

Contained in the bill is the statement "The Commissioner may not construct a facility unless the village governing body submits a plan whereby the facility to be constructed will become financially self-sufficient within 10 years of completion of construction." In virtually no village can a facility of the type stipulated by the Village Safe Water Act (or any other type of utility system for that matter) become self-sufficient without setting prohibitively high use fees. Hence HB 796 would effectively curtail VSW construction.

This bill will have a large impact on the Village Safe Water Program. Although most of the provisions of this bill already exist in law, the requirement for each facility to become self-sufficient in ten years will essentially cancel the Village Safe Water Construction Program. It is suggested that few if any villages are capable of becoming self-sufficient in this area with no help from either the federal or state government or other entities.

If the foregoing assumption is true, then some very rough assumptions can be made regarding the budgeting implications of this bill. Current expenditures for the Village Safe Water Program fall into three main categories:

1. Departmental Operating Budget - In FY 76 these costs are about \$103,700, they cover program administration, construction project contract, monitoring and inspection.
2. Construction grant funds - currently bond fund and general fund balance is \$2,657,308 and over the past 2½ years has been expended at the rate of \$935,677 average per year.
3. Operation and Maintenance funds - currently budgeted at \$289,000 per year.

Assuming construction activity is severely curtailed as a result of this bill the following effects on our budget are probable.

1. The operating budget would be reduced somewhat as a reflection of the lessened construction activity and purely maintenance level effort. Possible savings amount to about \$55,700 estimated.
2. The stoppage or severe curtailment of construction activity would eventually save most or all of \$900,000 in Capital Construction costs per year on the average.
3. The operation and maintenance cost would probably stabilize at some reduced level to cover only those facilities already constructed. Some savings is anticipated as a result of having "worked the bugs out" of existing facilities. A rough guess at possible savings is about \$50,000 per year.

Therefore, this bill might essentially stop the Village Safe Water Program at a potential savings of \$1,041,400 per year, over the current yearly average cost.

Based upon the above approach costs for the study appear to be about \$57,000. It must be pointed out that water consumption rates are effected by many factors other than rate of water use by waste disposal fixtures. III. ANALYSIS (See Fiscal Note Preparation Instructions, Section III)

CS HB 797 requires the Department to determine the feasibility and desirability of utilizing low water sanitary facilities throughout Alaska. Due to the relatively short study period (1½ years) the work will be accomplished under contract rather than by hiring additional permanent staff. Contract costs were computed as three man years plus support costs. Two man years in FY 77 and one in FY 78.






