SUBJECT: Request for FY 75
Supplemental Appropriation

The Department of Military Affairs requests a supplemental appropriation in the amount of \$31,250 in the Military Preparedness Program. \$12,500 for the State Armory program and \$18,750 in the Armory Construction area.

The original FY 75 request for the State Armories program in the utilities area was \$45,500. During the budget review a cut of 12,500 was made stating that inflation was overstated. A review of the first four months of operation in FY 75 indicate funds expended for utilities in the amount of \$14,300 with the darker months still ahead. Based on current costs allotted funds will be expended in mid April. We request \$12,500 to adequately provide utility service to the ten State Armories.

An emergency situation occurred recently at the CSMS (Combined Support Maintenance Shop) in Anchorage described in inclosure #1. Funds to cover this situation are being utilized from the Armory Construction appropriation. In order to complete all armory projects as initially programmed we request \$18,750 to restore the funds transferred to the CSMS emergency project.

Your favorable concurrence to this supplemental appropriation is requested.





It is the intent of the Senate Health, Education and Social Services Committee, in passing out Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 71, to strengthen the scholarship loan program for Alaskans.

The amount of money available to students has been increased and the scope of use of the loans has been expanded.

Also, a new formula for forgiveness has been included. A student who works in Alaska will receive one year of forgiveness for every year of prompt payment. This will increase the forgiveness from 40% to 50% and help to insure that the repayment to the State is timely.





BACKGROUND

[Currently, the Department of Education operates a boarding program for secondary students not having access to a resident secondary school system in the unorganized borough, thus affording those students with the opportunity to attend such a program.] Costs of such program is borne fully by the State.

Three borough school districts (Kodiak, Kenai, and North Slope) also operate boarding programs for secondary students, however, costs of such programs are borne by the local districts with no State participation since the Department has no authority to provide boarding home services or financial assistance to offset boarding home costs in local districts.

PROPOSED LEGISLATIVE CHANGE: SB# 73 - 85 and 74

[The proposed legislation would amend A.S. 14.07.030(5) to include the school districts, thus allowing the Department to share in the costs of a boarding program operated by districts.] SB# 74 would provide for 50% State participation assuming an annual cost of \$2500 per student with an estimated 140 students participating.

SPECIAL PROBLEMS

[No special problems are anticipated, since the Department would reimburse local districts on submission of documentation showing student costs and participation.] However, reimbursement of 50% of the boarding costs sustained by local districts would mean that the city and borough districts would have to absorb the other 50% of the costs from local sources or the Public School Foundation Program. This would mean utilizing some of the funds available for instruction to absorb domiciliary costs, while costs of domiciling students from the unorganized borough would be treated as wholly supplementary to the instructional program.

BACKGROUND

[Currently, the Department of Education operates a boarding program for secondary students not having access to a resident secondary school system in the unorganized borough, thus affording those students with the opportunity to attend such a program.] Costs of such program is borne fully by the State.

Three borough school districts (Kodiak, Kenai, and North Slope) also operate boarding programs for secondary students, however, costs of such programs are borne by the local districts with no State participation since the Department has no authority to provide boarding home services or financial assistance to offset boarding home costs in local districts.

PROPOSED LEGISLATIVE CHANGE: SB# 73 - 85 and 74

[The proposed legislation would amend A.S. 14.07.030(5) to include the school districts, thus allowing the Department to share in the costs of a boarding program operated by districts.] SB# 74 would provide for 50% State participation assuming an annual cost of \$2500 per student with an estimated 140 students participating.

SPECIAL PROBLEMS

[No special problems are anticipated, since the Department would reimburse local districts on submission of documentation showing student costs and participation.] However, reimbursement of 50% of the boarding costs sustained by local districts would mean that the city and borough districts would have to absorb the other 50% of the costs from local sources or the Public School Foundation Program. This would mean utilizing some of the funds available for instruction to absorb domiciliary costs, while costs of domiciling students from the unorganized borough would be treated as wholly supplementary to the instructional program.

RECOMMENDATION

[Since the Department contracts and pays the full costs of operating a boarding program for students in the unorganized borough at the present time, it is suggested, in the interests of equal treatment, that the Department may contract with districts in a like manner.] Responsibility for illustrating that the establishment of a residential educational program is unsound for economic or educational reasons would lie with the local district. Such conditions would be a prerequisite, before the department would enter into a contractual arrangement with local districts.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Three years of previous EPDA 553 funding has developed a foundation for statewide leadership development in Vocational Education for the State of Alaska.

During fiscal 1973 "A Five Year Needs Assessment For Vocational Instructors In Alaska's Secondary Schools" was completed by the Statewide Coordinator for Vocational Teacher Education, Dr. Richard L. Spaziani (Present Director of Career and Vocational Education). This study showed that the number of vocational teachers needed in Alaska would more than double by 1978. (During 1975 there were 75 more instructors than in 1974) It also showed that the existing State University programs could not meet the demand.

During fiscal 1974, three studies were completed: "Common Professional Education Competencies Needed By Alaska's Vocational Secondary School Teachers"; "A Model For Professional Staff Development In Vocational Education"; and "A Proposed Program Of Leadership Development For Vocational Administrators In The State Of Alaska". At the same time the University of Alaska, under the direction of Dr. Wendell Wolfe, Dean of the Anchorage Senior College, was developing the two-plus-two Bachelor of Technology degree.

During October 1974, the Division of Career and Vocational Education called together a panel of experts on two-plus-two programs, competency based teacher education programs, technical competency testing, and competency based center administration. Their task was to combine the knowledge of the previous four studies, study various delivery systems, and develop "A Plan For Vocational Education Professional Staff Development In Alaska". (Appendix A)

The plan recommended that the Division of Career and Vocational Education in consortium with the University of Alaska develop a "Center" for Competency Based Vocational Teacher Education. The "Center" was to be located physically in Southcentral Alaska, preferably at the University of Alaska Anchorage Senior College. In January 1975, the Statewide Coordinator contacted the Dean of the Anchorage Senior College to present the developed plan. It just so happened that on that very day the University had approved the Bachelor of Technology degree. It was observable that the two plans were ready to present to the Statewide Instructional Council for implementation. On February 22, 1975, the Director of Career and Vocational Education, the Statewide Coordinator for Vocational Education, and the Dean of the Senior College University of Alaska Anchorage presented the plan for a "Center" for leadership development to the Statewide Instructional

Council. The Council approved the "Center" plan, and instructed the Dean of the Senior College to prepare "A Proposal To Establish A Center For Vocational Teacher Education at the University of Alaska Anchorage Senior College" (Attached Appendix B). On March 7, 1975, the Plan was approved by the Division of Career and Vocational Education, with a tentative starting date of July 1, 1975. (Letter of intent attached Appendix C).

OBJECTIVES AND NEED FOR EPDA 553 ASSISTANCE

The competency-based model being proposed provides a delivery system for leadership development which can produce adequate numbers of personnel to fill the job demands of Alaska's vocational, adult and community college programs. The delivery system will be flexible enough to handle both the in-service needs of teachers and administrators in rural as well as urban settings.

At present, Alaska has a rare opportunity to provide prospective and practicing vocational educators with a contemporary and unique type of program which will meet the needs of the state. The purpose of the Center will be to coordinate and administer staff development at all levels of the Career ladder in vocational teacher education.

It is recommended that the funding for the initial contract cover at least a five-year period. By the sixth year of operation, the project will become self-sustaining under the budgetary system of the university and become totally integrated within the university structure. A close cooperative relationship between the Center and the State Department of Education is programmed to be continued indefinitely.

PRIORITY I

The direction for the initial planning and staffing of the Center will be done cooperatively between the Anchorage Senior College and the Division of Career and Vocational Education. The initial staffing for the Center includes four(4) vocational teacher educators, along with supporting clerical staff. The suggested delivery system for leadership preparation is through individualized learning modules which contain built-in performance assessments. Research evidence associated with the clustering of competency elements suggests that a series of minicourses should be utilized as the vehicle for the instructional program. Simply stated the first priority is: The implementation of the Center and the development of minicourses.

PRIORITY II

During fiscal 1976, approximately 155 statewide vocational projects will identify their in-service needs to the Division through their annual plans of service. It will be the responsibility of the Statewide Coordinator in consortium with the Center personnel to prioritize these needs. The Center will also be responsible for conducting an in-service program for teachers and administrators, in the field to upgrade their teaching skills and to update them in their respective occupational areas. At the same time, it will assist in the identifying of competencies and the development of evaluation devices for the granting of credit, and for certification.

PRIORITY III

The plan also identifies, that the "Center" personnel will be able to accomplish their goals only as fast as support systems can produce materials. (individualized learning packages) to be used in the field. In the Statewide needs assessment it was identified that Alaska needs 49 vocational administrators. Under the present 552 program it will take 20 years to meet our present needs.

The Center personnel and the Statewide Coordinator will be doing the necessary research and proposal writing to establish a Curriculum Development Laboratory to act as a support service for the Center. It is proposed that the state develop a system of selecting E.P.D.A. 552 candidates which allows 1) the prospective candidates to work one year in the Center prior to going outside for advanced degree training, 2) the EPDA 552 awardee doing his intern training in cooperation with the Center, and 3) providing the vehicle for graduates of the EPDA 552 program to obtain employment upon their return from outside. The Center would entertain all EPDA 552 enrollees from other states to participate in Center activities.

The overall budget for Vocational Leadership Development is attached to show the linkages of State and Federal funding for fiscal 1976, also showing the impact that is created by EPDA 553 funds. The category Other Federal will include Title VI B. Adult Basic Education, and 90-576 funds. This shows that the Center concept is expanding to cooperate with other areas of Education as it relates to Leadership Development throughout the state. These other funds will be used to support Center field activities or support services that do not generate Student Credit Hours at the university.
