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
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

11 * Section 1. AS 16.05.335 is amended to read:

12 Sec. 16.05.335. COMPLIMENTARY LICENSES. The commissioner [OF
13 REVENUE] shall annually, at the request of the governor, provide him
14 with not to exceed 50 complimentary fishing and hunting licenses and
15 appropriate big game tags which the governor may distribute to distin-
16 guished visitors to Alaska at his discretion for their use in any one
17 season during their visits to the state. The complimentary license
18 for sport fishing or hunting or both shall be inscribed by the governor
19 with the inclusive dates for its authorized use. The governor shall
20 advise the Department of Fish and Game on any complimentary issuances,
21 which information shall be available to the public.

22 * Sec. 2. AS 16.05.340(c) is amended to read:

23 (c) The commissioner [OF REVENUE] may issue a duplicate license
24 or a duplicate tag as a replacement for a license or tag issued under
25 (a) of this section. A fee of \$2 shall be charged for each duplicate
