



Dear Senator Ray:

I have reviewed the provisions of HCS CSSB #547 and there are several recommendations which I would like to offer. On lines 11 and 21 the word "fractional" be changed to "partial year service". Also on line 22 the new language reading July 30, 1969 should be changed to July 1, 1969 otherwise there will be a one month gap in coverage. The reason for suggesting partial year service credit rather than fractional service credit is to more clearly reflect the intent of the law.

Dear Mr. President:

In accordance with AS 24.30.060(b) and the Uniform Rules of the Alaska State Legislature, I am transmitting a bill relating to participation by political subdivisions and public organizations in the Public Employees' Retirement System. The bill deletes provisions in two sections (AS 39.35.550 and 39.35.560) of the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) which presently require political subdivisions or public organizations desiring to participate in PERS to provide coverage for their employees under Title II of the federal Social Security Act, the Act providing for contributions under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA). The requirement is no longer needed and serves no public interest.

The requirement which would be deleted by this bill was originally imposed upon political subdivisions and public organizations in order to coordinate employee contributions to both FICA and PERS. Prior to 1968, employees participating in PERS contributed a fixed percentage of their earnings which was split between FICA and PERS. Ch. 143, SLA 1960. FICA contributions were deducted first, and the remainder went to PERS. In 1968, section 2, ch. 235, SLA 1968 altered the PERS and required a specified contributions by employees to PERS in addition to appropriate FICA contributions. The 1968 amendments thus eliminated the need for coordination between FICA and PERS contributions.

The requirements which would be deleted by this bill are not only unnecessary, but they also complicate participation in PERS. For example, after unification of the Anchorage borough and city governments, the Anchorage municipality as a new entity and employer no longer needs to maintain a FICA-contribution program. However, AS 39.35.550 as presently constituted requires such a contribution for participation in PERS. The bill would eliminate this prerequisite to PERS participation, and permit the municipality to freely choose FICA-participation. To require FICA-participation by the municipality would require it to conduct

referendum elections to determine whether FICA coverage was desired. 26 U.S.C. 3121. Voter disapproval of FICA participation would under present law prohibit the municipality from participating in PERS. This possibility is undesirable and would be eliminated by this bill.


We are calling to your attention the above bill which has been referred to your committee.

Dear Mr. President:

In accordance with AS 24.30.060(b) and the Uniform Rules of the Alaska State Legislature, I am transmitting a bill relating to the teachers' retirement system.

This bill modifies existing statutes concerning retirement age and termination of disability. It also adds new sections concerning correction of erroneous payments and legislative intent in later amendments.

Section 1 of the bill repeals and re-enacts AS 14.25.040, which presently limits membership in the teachers' retirement system to teachers who can meet minimum vesting requirements by their 65th birthday. The bill removes this limitation and requires that any teacher or member be a participant in the system. The amendment thereby removes a potential age discrimination clause and compels membership. If a teacher does not meet the minimum vesting requirements at the time of retirement, then he or she may recover any accrued employee contributions.

Section 2 of the bill is a technical amendment of AS 14.25.130(c). The bill deletes reference to examinations after a specific age (65) and, instead, requires examinations after the age of "normal retirement." The amendment also deletes reference to examination upon application for disability retirement salary. That reference merely reiterates the requirement implicit in AS 14.25.130(a). The words "or psychiatrist" are dropped because reference to "physician" includes psychiatrist (see AS 08.64.380(2)(B)).

Section 3 clarifies the date on which disability retirement benefits cease. The current termination date, set at "the first day of the month," has proved unsatisfactory as inviting an overly literal interpretation of the requirement. The intent has always been to relate the last check to the whole month in which the disabled teacher recovers. The amendment expresses this intent. Further, the amendment deletes reference to "age 55" for the same reasons as noted above for sections 1 and 2 of the bill.

Section 4 of this bill adds two new sections to AS 14.25. The first addition gives notice to participants of the methods of correcting errors in payment. The section requires that, upon discovery of an error (whether in overpayment or underpayment), the records or error shall be corrected, and payments to the recipient shall be adjusted. In making these adjustments, the administrator is to make adjustments to meet actuarial equivalents "as far as practicable." Thus, through the flexibility of an expanded repayment schedule, a recipient who through no fault of his own, for example, was paid too much is protected from a sudden decrease in payment. If no further payments are due, the recipient is still liable for repayment. This requirement is further notice of the State's right to collect erroneously paid funds under AS 37.10.090. On the other hand, if a person is underpaid, he or she (or a beneficiary) is entitled to the amount due even though benefit payments have ceased.

The second new section provides that all future amendments to the teachers' retirement system are to be prospective in effect only, unless the statutory amendment expressly declares otherwise. The Division of Retirement and Benefits has frequently presumed prospective effect only to face an argument that legislative intent, though not expressed in the statute itself, presumes retroactive effect. This section would cover subsequent amendments to benefits.

Section 5 repeals the compulsory retirement provisions in the Teachers' Retirement System for reasons of potential age discrimination. This section meshes with similar deletions in sections 1, 2, and 3 of this bill.


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

10 CHAPTER 55. RENEWABLE RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT BANK.

11 ARTICLE 1. CREATION AND ORGANIZATION.

12 Sec. 44.55.010. LEGISLATURE FINDING. The legislature determines
13 that:

14 (1) the achievement of stable long-term economic growth in
15 the state will depend in large part on the development of renewable
16 resource industry;

17 (2) the development of renewable resource industry will be
18 accelerated by the increased availability of financing for feasible
19 renewable resource projects;

20 (3) after completion of the Trans-Alaska Pipeline the state
21 will have available amounts from nonrenewable revenue resource sources
22 for financing renewable resource industry;

23 (4) the achievement of the goal of stable long-term economic
24 growth in the state will be facilitated by creation of an instrumentality
25 of the state with the powers provided in this chapter to assist in the
26 determination of feasibility of renewable resource projects and to
27 assist in the financing, with other sources, of such projects.

28 Sec. 44.55.020. CREATION OF BANK. There is created the Renewable
29 Resources Development Bank. The bank is a public corporation and

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1 government instrument in the Department of Commerce and Economic Develop-
2 ment but has legal existence independent of and separate from the state.
3 The exercise by the bank of the powers conferred by this chapter is con-
4 sidered an essential governmental function of the state.

5 Sec. 44.55.030. MEMBERSHIP. The bank is governed by a board of
6 directors consisting of the commissioner of commerce and economic
7 development and the commissioner of revenue as ex officio members with
8 power to vote, and seven members appointed by the governor. The appoint-
9 ment of each director is subject to confirmation by the legislature in
10 joint session. The members appointed shall be residents of the state
11 involved in banking, finance or in renewable resource industry. The
12 term of office of each director is four years except the initial term of
13 office of one of the directors is one year, the initial term of two of
14 the directors is two years, the initial term of two of the directors is
15 three years, and the initial term of two of the directors is four years.
16 Each director serves until his successor has been appointed and qualified

17 Sec. 44.55.040. OFFICERS, QUORUM, AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. The
18 directors shall elect a chairman from among their members, and other
19 officers as they determine desirable. The powers of the bank are vested
20 in the directors and five directors constitute a quorum. Action may be
21 taken by the bank at a meeting by the affirmative vote of at least five
22 directors. The board of directors may constitute an executive committee
23 to which it may delegate part of its powers. The executive committee
24 consists of the president and at least two other persons appointed by
25 the board from among the members.

27 Sec. 44.55.050. STAFF. The bank shall employ a president who may
28 with the approval of the directors employ additional officers and employ-
29 ees. Employees and officers of the bank are not in the classified
service under AS 39.25. In addition to its staff of employees and

1 officers, the bank may contract and engage the services of consultants,
2 experts, and counsel the bank considers necessary.

3 ARTICLE 2. PURPOSE AND POWERS.

4 Sec. 44.55.060. PURPOSE. The purpose of the bank is to assist in
5 the development of renewable resource industry in the state by assist-
6 ing, after determining the feasibility of specific projects, in the
7 financing of projects in conjunction with other sources.

8 Sec. 44.55.070. GENERAL POWERS. In carrying out its corpor-
9 ate purposes, the bank has power to:

10 (1) adopt, alter and use a corporate seal;
11 (2) prescribe, adopt, amend and repeal bylaws;
12 (3) sue and be sued in its own name;
13 (4) invest, in such form as it considers appropriate, includ-
14 ing, without limitation, by purchase of the capital stock of or the
15 lending of money to, renewable resource projects, provided, that any
16 investment in the capital stock of or other ownership interest in such
17 a project shall not exceed 50 per cent of the capital stock of, or other
18 ownership interest in, the project, and no loan or other investment in
19 the project by the bank shall exceed 90 per cent of the cost of the
20 project except where in the judgment of the bank additional amounts must
21 be loaned to protect the interests of the bank;

22 (5) borrow funds, and in that connection furnish such col-
23 lateral or other security as it determines;

24 (6) deposit its funds, or invest its funds in such obliga-

9 * Section 1. AS 44 is amended by adding a new chapter to read:

10 CHAPTER 55. RENEWABLE RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT BANK.

11 Sec. 44.55.010. PURPOSE. It is the purpose of this chapter to pro-
12 mote the development of Alaska's renewable resource industry as a means
13 of minimizing economic fluctuations and stabilizing employment oppor-
14 tunities by providing technical and financial assistance to development
15 production, processing, marketing and distribution of renewable resource
16 enterprises.

17 Sec. 44.55.020. RENEWABLE RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT BANK. There is
18 created the Renewable Resources Development Bank. The bank is a public
19 corporation and government instrument in the Department of Commerce and
20 Economic Development but has a legal existence independent of and sepa-
21 rate from the state. The exercise by the bank of the powers conferred
22 by this chapter is considered an essential governmental function of the
23 state.

24 Sec. 44.55.030. MEMBERSHIP AND VACANCIES. The bank is governed by
25 a board of directors consisting of 11 members. The commissioner of
26 commerce and economic development, the commissioner of natural resources,
27 one member of the senate appointed by the president of the senate and
28 one member of the house appointed by the speaker of the house are ex
29 officio members with power to vote. The ex officio members may not be

2 Sec. 44.55.070. PRESIDENT. There is a president of the bank

5 president is the chief executive officer of the bank, appoints and
6 removes bank personnel, is responsible to the board of directors for
7 all operations of the bank, and serves at the pleasure of the board.

17 as to the rank or priority of the bonds or notes with respect to a lien
18 or security, or as to the acceleration of the maturity of the bonds or

20 (9) provide for the replacement of lost, stolen, destroyed or

22 (10) covenant against extending the time for the payment of
23 bonds or notes or interest on the bonds or notes;

24 (11) covenant as to the redemption of bonds or notes and
25 privileges of their exchange for other bonds or notes of the authority;

26 (12) covenant to create or authorize the creation of special
27 funds of money to be held in pledge or otherwise for operation expenses
28 payment or redemption of bonds or notes, reserves or other purposes, and
29 as to use and disposition of the money held in the funds;

1 (13) establish the procedure, if any, by which the terms of
2 any contract or covenant with or for the benefit of the holders of bonds
3 or notes may be amended or abrogated, the amount of bonds or notes the
4 holders of which must consent to amendment or abrogation, and the manner
5 in which the consent may be given;

6 (14) covenant as to the custody of any of its properties or
7 investments, their safekeeping and insurance, and the use and disposit-
8 ion of insurance money;

9 (15) covenant as to the time or manner of enforcement or
10 restraint from enforcement of any rights of the bank arising by reason
11 of or with respect to nonpayment of principal or interest of any mort-
12 gage loans or construction loans;

13 (16) provide for the rights and liabilities, powers and duties
14 arising upon the breach of a covenant, condition or obligation, and to
15 prescribe the events of default and the terms and conditions upon which
16 any or all of the bonds, notes or other obligations of the bank become
17 or may be declared due and payable before maturity and the terms and
18 conditions upon which such a declaration and its consequences may be
19 waived;

20 (17) vest in a trustee or trustees inside or outside the state
21 property, rights, powers and duties in trust as the bank may determine,
22 which may include any or all of the rights, powers and duties of a
23 trustee appointed by the holders of bonds or notes, and to limit or
24 abrogate the right of the holders of bonds or notes of the bank to
25 appoint a trustee under this chapter or limit the rights, powers and
26 duties of the trustee;

27 (18) pay the costs or expenses incident to the enforcement of
28 the bonds or notes or of the provisions of the resolution or of a
29 covenant or agreement of the bank with the holders of its bonds or

2 (19) agree with a corporate trustee which may be a trust
3 company or bank having the powers of a trust company inside or outside
4 the state as to the pledging or assigning of revenues or funds to which
5 or in which the bank has any rights or interest; and further provide for
6 other rights and remedies exercisable by the trustee as may be proper
7 for the protection of the holders of any bonds or notes of the bank
8 and not otherwise in violation of law and may provide for the restric-

Fiscal Note Analysis

Year One

It is expected that upon passage of the Bill the first 90 days would be spent on recruiting and appointing the bank president and the initial support staff.

The immediate task of the staff will be to study, prepare and organize the office and bank structure.

Since the Resource Bank is the first of this type of agency in the State of Alaska it is believed that considerable study and thought will be required to prepare the structure of the organization, administrative procedures, regulations, the investment program and the financial handling of capital.

It is believed that the agency will require outside technical help by a bank consulting firm. This is the reason for the inclusion of \$50,000 the first year and an additional \$50,000 the second year for contractual services.

It is also adjudged that the agency will require consultant assistance the second year to prepare the report required by the Legislature under Section 44.55.080. Since there is no historical precedence or experience for compiling such a report it will require technical assistance beyond the agency staff's capability. As this report is critical to the bank's successful operation it is essential that it be competently done and in sufficient detail to give pointed direction to the bank's directors and staff. The above is the reason for the heavy contractual expenditures expected for the second year of operation.

The fiscal note analysis is not extended beyond the second year of operation as the detail of the agency's organization and program will be formulated by the staff and consultant studies performed in the first two years.

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

9 * Section 1. AS 44 is amended by adding a new chapter to read:

10 CHAPTER 55. RENEWABLE RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT BANK.

11 ARTICLE 1. CREATION AND ORGANIZATION.

12 Sec. 44.55.010. LEGISLATURE FINDING. The legislature determines
13 that:

14 (1) the achievement of stable long-term economic growth in
15 the state will depend in large part on the development of renewable
16 resource industry;

17 (2) the development of renewable resource industry will be
18 accelerated by the increased availability of financing for feasible
19 renewable resource projects;

20 (3) after completion of the Trans-Alaska Pipeline the state
21 will have available amounts from nonrenewable revenue resource sources
22 for financing renewable resource industry;

23 (4) the achievement of the goal of stable long-term economic
24 growth in the state will be facilitated by creation of an instrumentality
25 of the state with the powers provided in this chapter to assist in the
26 determination of feasibility of renewable resource projects and to
27 assist in the financing, with other sources, of such projects.

28 Sec. 44.55.020. CREATION OF BANK. There is created the Renewable
29 Resources Development Bank. The bank is a public corporation and

1 government instrument in the Department of Commerce and Economic Develop-
2 ment but has legal existence independent of and separate from the state.
3 The exercise by the bank of the powers conferred by this chapter is con-
4 sidered an essential governmental function of the state.

5 Sec. 44.55.030. MEMBERSHIP. The bank is governed by a board of
6 directors consisting of the commissioner of commerce and economic
7 development and the commissioner of revenue as ex officio members with
8 power to vote, and seven members appointed by the governor. The appoint-
9 ment of each director is subject to confirmation by the legislature in
10 joint session. The members appointed shall be residents of the state
11 involved in banking, finance or in renewable resource industry. The
12 term of office of each director is four years except the initial term of
13 office of one of the directors is one year, the initial term of two of
14 the directors is two years, the initial term of two of the directors is
15 three years, and the initial term of two of the directors is four years.
16 Each director serves until his successor has been appointed and qualified.

17 Sec. 44.55.040. OFFICERS, QUORUM, AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. The
18 directors shall elect a chairman from among their members, and other
19 officers as they determine desirable. The powers of the bank are vested
20 in the directors and five directors constitute a quorum. Action may be
21 taken by the bank at a meeting by the affirmative vote of at least five
22 directors. The board of directors may constitute an executive committee
23 to which it may delegate part of its powers. The executive committee
24 consists of the president and at least two other persons appointed by
25 the board from among the members.

26 Sec. 44.55.050. STAFF. The bank shall employ a president who may
27 with the approval of the directors employ additional officers and employ-
28 ees. Employees and officers of the bank are not in the classified
29 service under AS 39.25. In addition to its staff of employees and

1 officers, the bank may contract and engage the services of consultants,
2 experts, and counsel the bank considers necessary.

3 ARTICLE 2. PURPOSE AND POWERS.

4 Sec. 44.55.060. PURPOSE. The purpose of the bank is to assist in
5 the development of renewable resource industry in the state by assist-
6 ing, after determining the feasibility of specific projects, in the
7 financing of projects in conjunction with other sources.

8 Sec. 44.55.070. GENERAL POWERS. In carrying out its corpor-
9 ate purposes, the bank has power to:

- 10 (1) adopt, alter and use a corporate seal;
- 11 (2) prescribe, adopt, amend and repeal bylaws;
- 12 (3) sue and be sued in its own name;
- 13 (4) invest, in such form as it considers appropriate, includ-
14 ing, without limitation, by purchase of the capital stock of or the
15 lending of money to, renewable resource projects, provided, that any
16 investment in the capital stock of or other ownership interest in such
17 a project shall not exceed 50 per cent of the capital stock of, or other
18 ownership interest in, the project, and no loan or other investment in
19 the project by the bank shall exceed 90 per cent of the cost of the
20 project except where in the judgment of the bank additional amounts must
21 be loaned to protect the interests of the bank;
- 22 (5) borrow funds, and in that connection furnish such col-
23 lateral or other security as it determines;
- 24 (6) deposit its funds, or invest its funds in such obliga-
25 tions as it may determine;
- 26 (7) guarantee securities in which it invested in order to
27 facilitate their sale;
- 28 (8) buy and sell securities it has issued or guaranteed or in
29 which it has invested;
