Dear Bill:

The referenced Bill providing for capital improvements for the community colleges and extension centers of the University of Alaska leaves only the Tanana Valley Community College out of consideration. There are, of course, reasons for this, since our regular Fairbanks campus classrooms service TVCC adequately except for vocational-technical shop-type facilities which have never existed on the Fairbanks campus. Expecting to use cooperatively the Hutchison Adult Career Center facilities adjacent to the campus, no request was made for shop facilities when TVCC was established. However, lack of cooperation and extensive use of these facilities during the daytime period by the North Star School District has made the Career Center shops and classrooms unavailable for TVCC's use.

To solve this problem the Regents approved as a high priority item a shop, laboratory and classroom building for TVCC(\$6,650.0), but in meeting the Governor's reduced G. O. Bond project allowance the Regents had to choose between the Museum building and the TVCC shop building. For good reasons the Regents gave highest priority to the Museum building, and it is included in CS for HB 617. Thus, the TVCC major shop building has been eliminated. However, there is urgent need for a less costly and highly specialized facility - an Aviation Training Complex.

This facility would cost about \$1.0 million, and would thus be in line with the allocations made to other community colleges in the Bill. The attached information describes the project, the need for it in terms of student registrations and a breakdown of the anticipated costs of construction and equipment.

I respectfully request your consideration in adding this project to the Bill so that time will not be lost in a program designed to fill an important need in interior Alaska. The Board of Regents endorse this request.

AVIATION TRAINING COMPLEX


Tanana Valley Community College Aviation Department is presently offering two degree programs in Aviation Technology: Associate of Applied Science in Air Traffic Control and Associate of Applied Science in Professional Piloting.

It is the intent of the program to provide ground instruction and flight training to degree candidates in Aviation Technology. The Department is proposing an Aviation Training Complex to be built at Fairbanks International Airport. This Complex would consist of hangar space for four aircraft (three fixed wing and one rotor craft), and a maintenance facility to keep the aircraft operational and to comply with Federal Aviation Regulations. We would like to point out that the maintenance facility would only be for program aircraft and would in no way conflict with current Airframe and Power Plant programs in the community. In addition to hangar space, the Department is requesting at least three classrooms for ground instruction purposes, one flight simulator room, a flight ready room, reception area, office spaces, and a complete Aviation Library. The primary objective of the Complex would be to house the Flight Program; however, because of the nature of the Air Traffic Control curriculum, the building would also serve Air Traffic Control education.

The proposed training complex would only be used for those students enrolled in Aviation Technology through Tanana Valley Community College at the University of Alaska. The aircraft would be student-owned and purchased by the students through a Tanana Valley Community College Aviation Club. Since the aircraft would be student-owned, and the Aviation Department would only accept those students currently enrolled in the program, we feel the Aviation Department would not, in any way, be competing with private enterprise.

It is projected that general aviation and corporation flying is to be faced with a pilot shortage starting in approximately five years, both in fixed wing and rotor wing type aircraft. In view of these circumstances, we feel the Aviation Department could, indeed, help solve this problem and provide a potential work force, and therefore, the possibilities of additional revenue for Alaska residents, particularly those in interior Alaska.

Moreover, I believe this program can help fulfill an urgent community need in job placement opportunities, as well as provide the genesis for a comprehensive program in Aviation Safety.

It has been recognized in previous statutory amendments that "Fish and Game field biologists and technicians" are subjected to hazards of sufficient danger to warrant their inclusion in the police retirement system. The purpose of the amendment proposed in SB 590 is to provide this benefit to all departmental employees who are subject to the same hazards as the classifications included in the definitions of field biologist and technician. Past experience has shown that the mortality experienced by the field travel and hazardous working conditions of Fish and Game employees far exceeds that of any other employees covered by the police retirement system.

It is my position that the personnel in this department should be treated in the same way as personnel in the Department of Public Safety concerning their inclusion in the police retirement system. In the Department of Public Safety, only those persons who are commissioned officers are under police retirement. This includes the commissioner and deputy commissioner as well as those administrative people such as captains and majors who correspond in authority, experience, and exposure (both past and present) to hazards to our division directors, deputy directors, and regional supervisors.

In Fish and Game terms, then, "commissioned officer" would be comparable to any position which: (1) is subjected to the risks of field travel and hazardous working conditions, or (2) supervises those positions as a result of experience gained in working in a position with similar risk (e.g. majors, captains, commissioner, deputy commissioner, directors, deputy directors, regional supervisors).

Since most of the Department of Fish and Game is made up of personnel fitting one of the two descriptions above, I believe it would be easier to include all Fish and Game employees under the police system except those administrative classes which are specifically excluded. Discussions with Mel Personnett of the Department of Public Safety show that only temporary employees and strictly administrative positions in their department are not commissioned officers (e.g. clerical, radio dispatchers, information officers, administrative management, etc.). Based on this, I would propose that the following classes within the Department of Fish and Game be excluded from the police retirement system. This applies to permanent positions only; temporaries would not be included. In addition it is possible that some administrative classes listed below should be included in the police retirement system due to the nature of their work (e.g. information officers do a fair amount of field travel in performance of their duties). I may wish to nominate additional classes for inclusion based on further study. Conversely, further study may also indicate that some classes proposed for inclusion should be excluded from the police retirement system.

In accordance with AS 24.30.060(b) and the Uniform Rules of the Alaska State Legislature, I am transmitting a bill relating to the retirement, disability, and death benefits established by AS 39.35 for state employees, with particular reference to employees of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game (ADF&G).

AS 39.35 includes a number of special provisions for peace officers and firemen, allowing for exceptional benefits to police officers, firemen, and correctional personnel in both field and administrative capacities. In 1975, the definition of "peace officer and fireman" was expanded to include state employees occupying a position as a "fish and game field biologist and technician" (Ch 200 SLA 1975, amending AS 39.35.680(14)). The amendment reflected an apparent recognition on the part of the legislature that a large proportion of the personnel of the Department of Fish and Game encounter hazardous working conditions in the performance of their official duties, as do policemen, firemen, and correctional officers. Unfortunately, the wording used resulted in a series of questions as to precisely which ADF&G employees were to be entitled to special coverage.

The source of the controversy has centered on the meaning of "field" in AS 39.35.680(14). In contrast to the references in the same paragraph to "chief of police", "correctional superintendent", and "fire chief", there is no mention of "fish and game manager" or anything else which would indicate clearly that persons serving in administrative capacities are contemplated as falling within the definition; only fish and game "field" employees are listed. As a result, the Commissioner of Fish and Game and the Department of Law

independently reached the conclusion that a substantial proportion of the supervisors and administrators working for ADF&G could not be considered as a "peace officer and fireman" within the meaning of AS 39.35.680(14), and therefore must continue to receive the same benefits under AS 39.35 as do regular state employees. Moreover, any administrative attempt to otherwise construe paragraph (14) would be extremely strained, and could result in a rejection of a claim at some time in the future, bringing serious doubt to many ADF&G employees as to whether or not they were actually covered by the program.

While an expanded interpretation of paragraph (14) as it presently stands is not justifiable, coverage of ADF&G employees other than strictly field personnel is eminently warranted. Over half of the state employees killed in the line of duty since statehood have been employees of the Department of Fish and Game (20 out of 34 to date). While biologists and technicians working in the field obviously incur substantial risks, many of the supervisors, directors, and other administrators routinely do so as well, as their responsibilities continue to require a considerable amount of field work and travel.

Furthermore, the vast majority of supervisors and administrators at ADF&G have spent a large portion of their career in the field, even if they no longer do so. Field experience is frequently essential if an administrator is to have the qualification necessary for his job. However, if promotion into an administrative position makes them ineligible for special retirement, disability, and death benefits, employees presently occupying field positions will be discouraged from taking supervisory or administrative jobs, and it will become much more difficult to fill these jobs with desirable persons.

This bill would modify AS 39.35.680 by providing that "qualified employees of the Department of Fish and Game" would be treated the same as are "peace officers and firemen" with respect to benefits under AS 39.35. "Qualified" ADF&G employees would be defined to mean those whose duties presently or in the past have required significant field work, travel, or exposure to hazardous working conditions, as determined by the Commissioner of Administration, in consultation with the Commissioner of Fish and Game; consequently, field

employees would not be prejudiced by promotion into a position which was not a dangerous one. Concurrently, the reference to "fish and game field biologist and technician" would be deleted from AS 39.35.680(14); use of the term "biologist and technician" is improper, as it may operate to exclude aircraft pilots, vessel personnel, and other field employees of ADF&G who encounter hazardous conditions but do not actually work directly in resource management. The bill also makes clear that, with respect to ADF&G employees who are not "qualified", their status as regular state employees for purposes of AS 39.35 would not be affected. This bill would become effective immediately.

I urge enactment of this bill so that the many ADF&G employees who are performing highly valuable public services may receive the protection they deserve.

LETTER OF INTENT

CS FOR SENATE BILL NO. 590

It is the intent of the Senate Finance Committee that benefits provided in CSSB 590 for employees shall be in effect only during the time that the employee holds a position or job classification described by regulation as being hazardous; when no longer filling a position described as being hazardous, employees would not be covered under this bill.

In addition to those positions already defined as hazardous due to the position's duties as set out by Section 2 of the bill (AS 39.25.680[23]), the following shall be included:
