SUBJECT: Skill Center Dormitory

I talked with Bob Booher late Friday night and he had just received information from Georgia-Pacific on pre-cut dormitories for the Alaska Skill Center.

They have proposed an L-shaped two-story building, which would be 96 ft. on one side, 84 ft. on the other, and the structure would be 30 ft. wide. There would be rooms on both sides of a 5 ft. hallway, which would sleep 30 people per floor. The rooms for the trainees would be approximately 12' x 16' and house two people. The rooms would be set up so that there would be two 24" x 48" wardrobes, two beds, and two desks with chairs. There would be one restroom-shower unit combination on the second floor and two on the first floor so that it could house both men and women, if necessary. It would also include the appropriate number of storage and janitor closets, heating plant and hot water plant room, etc.

The estimated costs of putting up the building would be as follows:

We have projected that if funds were appropriated (approximately \$220,000) to cover the costs and given the time to erect such a facility, this method would be the most beneficial to the state over the long run. This kind of structure should have a life expectancy of at least 20 years and possibly 30.

We have also checked with the Associated General Contractors to find out what their feeling would be if the Skill Center would erect such a facility with trainees, and they informed us that there is no problem with this kind of training program, as they are doing it within each one of their local unions for their own training needs.

Senator Ray said they would go on to SENATE BILL NO. 599 (Instructional units for reading specialists under public school foundation). He asked Commissioner Lind of the Department of Education for his comments.

Commissioner Lind stated that the bill started out as an effort to assist school districts by providing for reading specialists. The School districts are in need of special educational monies, and part of the reason is that they are tightening the meaning of "special education". However, the original bill calls ~~for~~ ^{not} For

Reading Specialists. The Department was opposed to that because they don't want to see the State allocating money for specific kinds of teachers. The Committee Substitute is broader and allows the school to use the money as they see fit in order to get at their special needs.

Senator Ray noted that the fiscal note was for \$900,000. He asked how this would be funded. Commissioner Lind replied there was an area in the Foundation Program which speaks to the supplementary portion of it. The Commissioner felt this was the easiest way to do it.

Commissioner Lind went on to say that he was not really sure how many districts would use this additional kind of money. They had tried to estimate by what some of the school districts were already doing, but \$900,000 was probably a conservative estimate. He felt this was the best way to start.

Commissioner Lind pointed out that they haven't always been able to provide help for special cases, and their efforts at remedial education haven't always been too good. This bill would allow for the school districts to develop preventative programs.

The Commissioner concluded by saying the Department recommends that CS SB 599 Pass.

Senator Ferguson moved that they put out CS SB 599 with a "Do Pass" Motion recommendation. The motion carried unanimously.





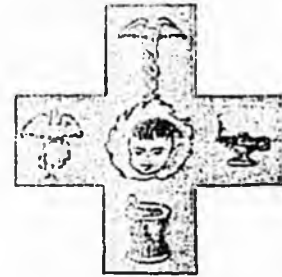

Dear Senator:

It has been brought to my attention that the State House has voted to delete the Nutritionist position from the State Budget, H.B. 586. This action, if not reversed by the House and included by the Senate, there will be serious implications for the health of the citizens of the State of Alaska. Since there is only one Nutritionist position in the Department of Health and Social Services, elimination of this position will mean eliminating the Nutrition Program that exists for the State.

Specifically, the following areas will be affected:

1. The WIC Program (Special Supplemental Foods Program for Women, Infant and Children). The Federal regulations state in part..."The State agencies will employ at least one professional person, on a full or part-time basis, who was trained as a Nutritionist (Masters of Science or Masters of Public Health Degree), or a Dietician (Registered or Eligible for Registration). This person shall have responsibility to plan, direct and coordinate the Nutrition education component of the WIC. Such person shall also provide instructional and technical assistance to local agencies and provide inservice training for the local agencies' staff in nutrition and nutrition instruction where necessary." (Title VII, Chapter 11, part 246.8 (a).) Without a State Nutritionist, this could mean termination of the programs which are meeting the real needs of the women who have the responsibility of rearing the children from infancy to the teenage level. Or it could mean individual projects (e.g., Barrow) who would have to hire their own Nutritionists. Superficially, this doesn't seem feasible although it would be ideal. Or, a consultant from outside may be hired to visit the sites plus using funds that could go for salaries. The elimination of the

position may also jeopardize new programs wishing to submit application under the WIC Program.


2. Without the State Nutritionist, the State operated itinerant nursing programs serving the many rural areas of Alaska would have no nutrition resource person to provide up-to-date information or assistance with helping people learn and adjust to difficult diet restrictions.
3. The State Nutritionist provides a coordinating function for the variety of programs in the State that have some impact on nutrition and food as they relate to health. Without such a person, programs will become more isolated and less responsive to health needs.
4. The elimination of the program in the Department implies that nutrition has no place in health which is far from true. If there is no Nutritionist to identify essential components in every health program, the programs will continually ignore the needs of nourishing foods and the knowledge to use it as the basis of health.

The elimination of this position is a very immediate concern, it also is a mechanism to stimulate thinking about the role of nutrition in promoting health; what are we doing about it; and what should we be doing if we really want to change the rate of cavities, anemia, obesity, and a whole number of things that result from malnutrition.

Your assistance in whatever way possible to reinstate this position within the State Department of Health and Social Services will be most appreciated. I think most worthwhile in the attaining of long term goals and policies of the State Department of Health and Social Services to elevate the health of the citizens of Alaska to the highest level possible.

*Note - If 270,000 vehicles were registered and taxed at an average of \$25 per vehicle of which the state received 2% to administer, the state would lose \$291,000 the first year and \$218,000 in 1978. The bill should at least give the State 5% the first year and 3% in following years.

Critique

- 1) AS 28.10.370 states: "Until the Department issues a certificate of registration and certificate of ownership title shall be deemed not to have passed and transfer is deemed incomplete and not valid or effective for any purpose . . ." How can you put an ad valorem tax on a vehicle which is not owned?
- 2) If the tax is upon vehicles which are subject to registration, are mobile homes exempt?
- 3) If companies elect to list their address in an area electing not to tax, will not the gross revenue be lost?
- 4) If #3 happens, will not the dollar amount collected by the State drop proportionately, thus making the State run at a net operating loss?
- 5) Will the taxing municipalities provide on-site personnel at all D.M.V. field offices to handle taxpayers' questions and be able to approve refunds?
- 6) The State pays commission agents in non-State operated D.M.V. offices 7% of gross collection. Will the taxing municipalities pay the State 9% of the gross?
- 7) By denying a taxpayer his right to title, is it not directly against the intent of AS 28.10.260?-- "The primary concern of the legislature in enacting this chapter was to facilitate the suppression of traffic in stolen cars by requiring certificates of ownership."

- 8) Who enforces the law if an applicant lies? AS 28.10.600 states it as a felony with sentence of no less than one year and no more than two years.
- 9) The bill will negate staggered registration.

Conclusion

It would be easier and considerably less expensive to the taxpayers if the Division provided free to every municipality monthly lists of vehicles registered within its jurisdiction. Billings would be no more than one month old and delinquencies would be taken care of immediately. The State is being asked to create a third party bureaucracy to support already existing local bureaucracies.
