



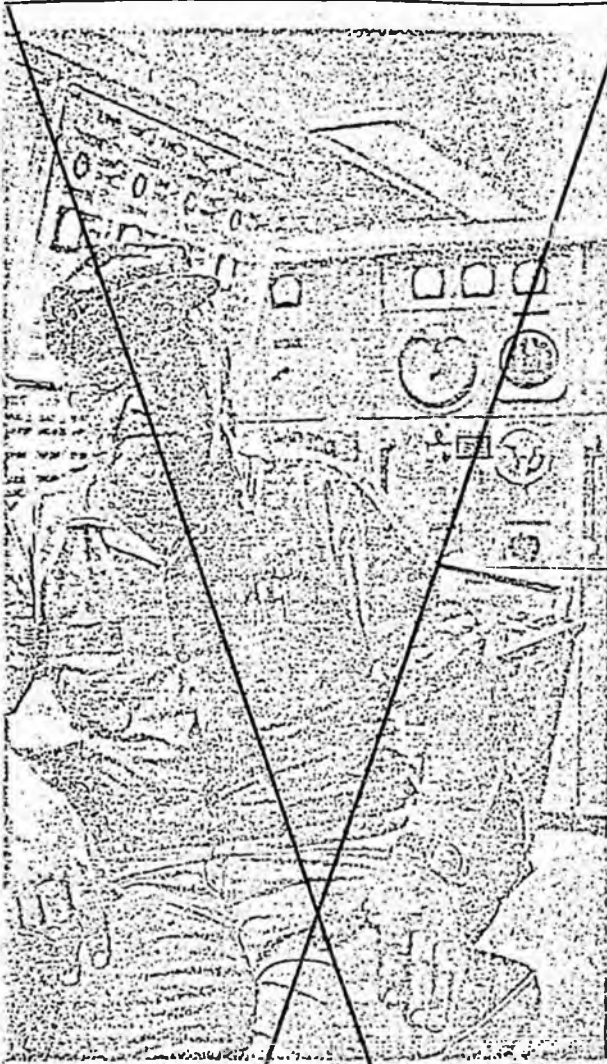

School is tough for Karluk kids

Faced with a dwindling fuel supply and a deteriorating land bridge between the two halves of the village, residents of Karluk are searching for ways to keep their children in school.

The coming of the weekend may be the best thing that has happened for the distraught parents yet.

"We're very, very close to a critical situation there with regard to fuel," Robert Greene, Kodiak 1 and Borough School District superintendent, said this morning. "We may very well have to shut the school down temporarily."

Wayne Marshall, director of the Kodiak Area Community Development Corporation, says the residents of Karluk have told him the fuel may be used up in the village today or Saturday. But even with fuel to heat and light the village school at Old Karluk, the children at New Karluk are having a rough time crossing the spit to go to school.

Winter storms have taken a heavy toll. Marshall, reporting to the Borough Assembly in January, requested a borough contribution for emergency aid to protect the foot path which extends from a foot-bridge over the Karluk River. According to Marshall, the damage now is "ten times" as great. Water is pounding over the spit on seven-foot tides, he said.

"Wave action is continuing to cause damage," says Stuart Denslow, borough manager. "The dollar value on it is almost impossible to estimate."

Feb. 3, the borough assembly agreed to pay a \$5,000 share for emergency spit repairs, as administered by the state's division of Community and Rural Development. The \$15,000 program will provide for emergency repairs so the children can safely walk across the spit, Denslow said, but "that activity is going to take some time to accomplish."

Priority is "immediate," however, and Denslow said "I'm sure they'll be under construction within the next 10 days or so."

Fuel may also be a matter of days, said Greene. Noting the school district only became involved after a series of recent storms took place—following a local Karluk resident effort to clear drift-wood away from the footpath area—Greene said the district had been trying all along to get fuel to Karluk.

In November a fuel barge attempted to deliver 10,000 gallons of fuel to the school, but a storm interrupted the delivery at 5,000 gallons. Later, it was discovered sea water accounted for about half of the liquid which arrived in the school tank.

School officials estimated the fuel would last until March, and Greene says the district has been awaiting for a local barge skipper to receive certification to ship fuel. There are no license carriers in Kodiak at present. "Once the Coast Guard requirements are adhered to, he can probably be in Karluk within 24 hours," said Greene.

Several Karluk parents, meanwhile, have asked the district provide an outboard motor and gas so children in New Karluk could be ferried the approximate 4,000 feet through the Karluk lagoon so they can attend school without having to walk the spit.

One parent, Lydia Malutin, "saw her son almost washed away one afternoon when he tried to walk the beach back to his home in New Karluk," said Marshall. Malutin came to Kodiak to make a personal plea to Greene for the motor and gas, but Greene is wary. "I'm damn reluctant to put those kids out in a boat in unpredictable weather." About half of the approximately 25 children in the Karluk school must cross the spit daily. Greene says to decide to use a skiff would be premature.

He feels a safer solution, for the present, would be to effect a temporary closure, allowing the time for fuel to arrive and for the emergency repair work to the spit to continue.

As for final solution, Denslow said the Army Corps of Engineers would have to be called in for major spit repair. Roland Jones, borough engineer, is completing a study of the damage, and Marshall says the study will be used in a request to the state to declare Karluk a disaster area—mandating Army Corps action.

Re: Karluk Spit Storm Damage

Inspection was made of the Karluk Spit damage on March 8, 1977 by Rolland A. Jones and Wayne Marshall of the Kodiak Area Community Development Corporation, Inc.

Since the inspection of December, 1976, additional storm damage has occurred to the Karluk Spit as follows:

Areas of previous damage have been extensively eroded by wave action. The worst area (No. 1, Exhibit "A") is approximately 260 feet in width and is 4 to 6 feet below the adjacent original spit level.

Area No. 2 is approximately 100 feet wide and also is 4 to 6 feet below the original spit elevation.

No. 3 area is approximately 50 feet wide and is 3 to 4 feet below the original spit elevation.

Approximately 60% of the spit shows signs of topping by storm wave action with rocks deposited on the Lagoon side of the spit.

Additional damage occurred directly across from Area No. 1. Storm waves coming through the spit broke against the river bank and commenced to undermine the banks in this area. This location is directly in line with the R.C.A. Earth Station and additional damage could undermine this facility.

As in the December inspection report, minimum repairs would consist of removal of driftwood from the travelway, filling the eroded areas to match the existing adjacent sections of the spit and repairing the telephone cable. Cost of repairs would also remain approximately the same because there is no anticipated increase in barge and equipment rentals. However, the additional damage to the spit during the three months between inspection trips makes it apparent that repair work, in addition to the above noted minimum repairs must be done if the spit is to continue as a connecting accessway between the two villages of Karluk. Two (2) alternatives which would provide protection and access are:

PLAN 1. This plan consists of a riprap protected sea wall for the total length of the spit requiring approximately 14,000 cubic yards of select fill and 5000 cubic yards of riprap. Estimated cost is \$600,000.00.

Advantages:

Permanent protection requiring a minimum of maintenance.

Good Access.

Can be upgraded to provide for future vehicular traffic.

Disadvantages:

Material sources are scarce in the Karluk area and may necessitate a barge operation. (Estimated costs do not provide for a barge haul project.)

Costs are high.

PLAN 2. This plan consists of the construction of a rock filled gabion sea wall for the entire length of the spit. Estimated cost if \$450,000.00.

Advantages:

Permanent protection.

Good access.

Could be utilized to provide protection for future upgrading to provide for vehicular traffic.

Cost would be less than for the riprap and rock fill sea wall.

Disadvantages:


Material sources are scarce.

Beach access and view would be restricted.

Possible Gabion damage from storm tossed driftwood.

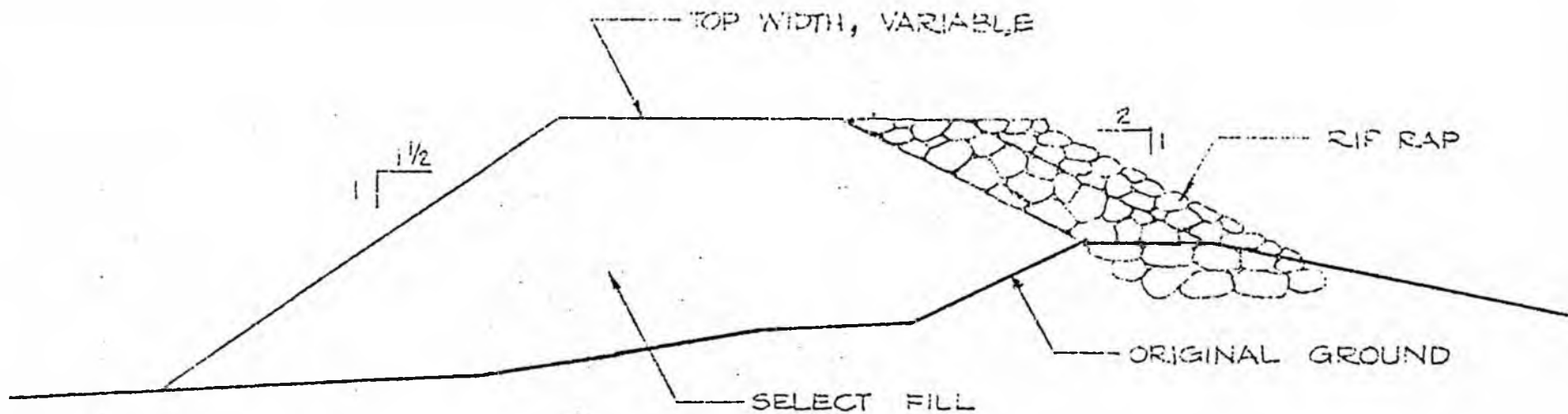
The above plans should be considered as a minimum only in work and costs. "In-depth" studies and analysis will be required for design of a permanent sea wall and location of an adequate and suitable material source.

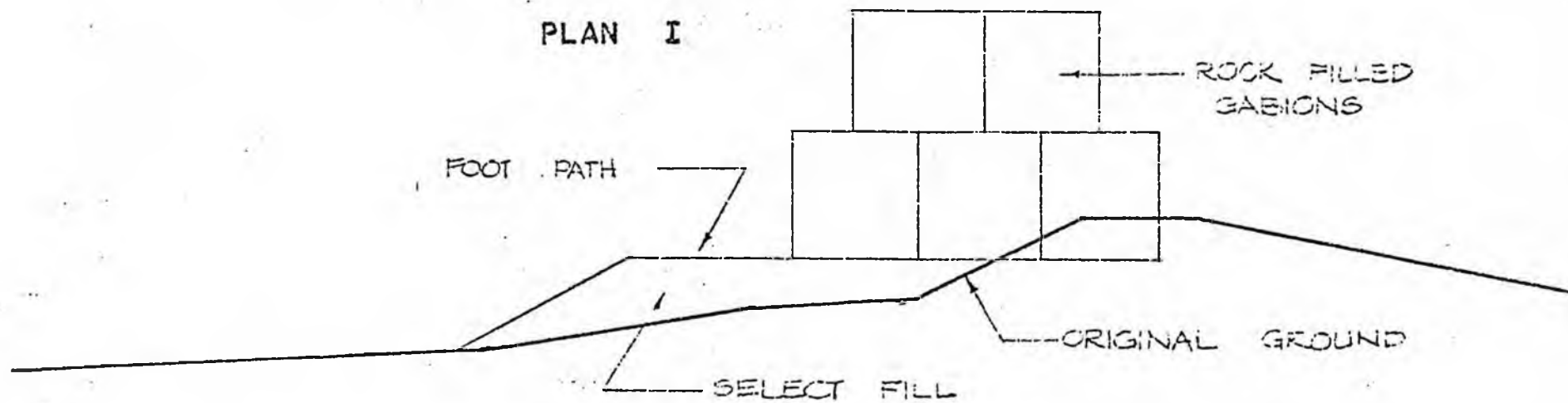

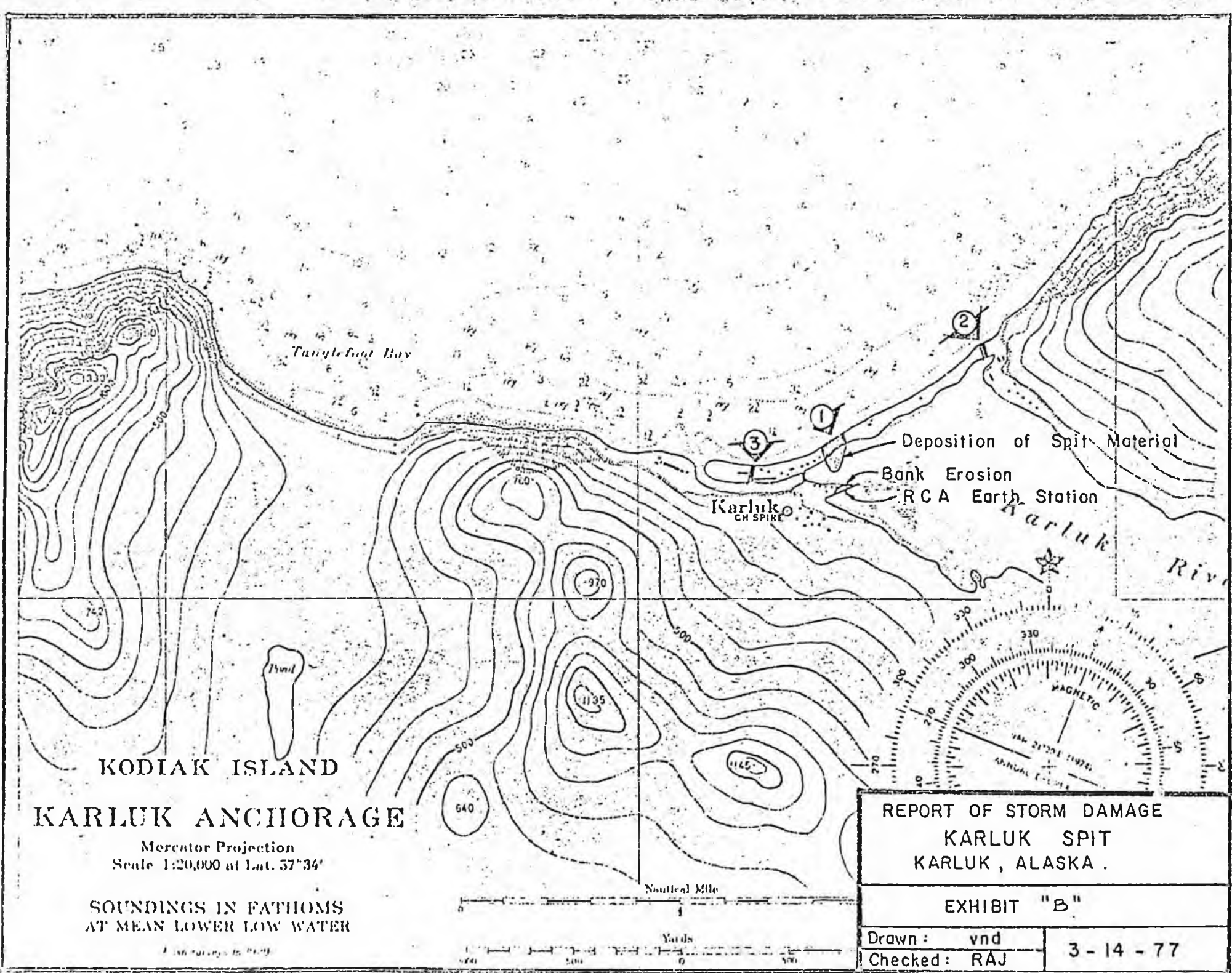

WHEREAS, the Kodiak Island Borough Assembly has caused to be made surveys estimating the extent of damage incurred to the Karluk sand spit in the community of Karluk, Kodiak Island Borough; and

WHEREAS, specific reports by the Borough Engineer and representative of the United States Army Corp of Engineers indicate severe and extended damage to the spit creating significant inconvenience and economic hardship for the village of Karluk, Kodiak Island Borough; and

WHEREAS, the most recent investigation of the spit's erosion damage by the Borough Engineer, Rolland Jones, is attached, herewith, and made a part of this resolution as technical evidence of the extent of damage requiring technical and financial resources exceeding the capacities of the Kodiak Island Borough and the Department of Community and Regional Affairs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the Kodiak Island Borough Assembly does hereby request that Governor Jay Hammond declare the Karluk sand spit erosion problem as a civil emergency requiring the commitment of significant resources by the State of Alaska and United States Army Corp of Engineers.

Whereas, Alex Panamaroff's store, the only store in Karluk, which is located on the spit, has been suffering damage from the deterioration of the spit, and

Whereas, the present location of the village's oil tank is threatened by the washout damage which has occurred, and

Whereas, the lagoon area of the Karluk River, which serves as an estuary for salmon fry, is in danger of being destroyed by the damage to the spit, and

Whereas, the people of Karluk desire that immediate permanent repairs be made to the spit, so as to preserve the present lifestyle of the village,

Now, Therefore Be It Resolved, that the Kodiak Area Community Development Corporation's Board of Directors supports the desires and interests of the people of Karluk for immediate permanent repairs to be made to the spit to preserve the present lifestyle of the village, and

Be It Further Resolved, that the KACDC Board of Directors request that the Kodiak Island Borough petition the Governor of the State of Alaska and Alaska State Legislature, to have Karluk declared a State Disaster Area for the purposes of having a comprehensive engineering study conducted by the Army Corps of Engineers and obtaining the necessary monies to make all necessary permanent repairs to the spit.

Karluk Spit Repair Project-Wayne Marshall

Wayne Marshall discussed the overall problem of the Karluk spit washout project, and the efforts to have repairs made. The spit has suffered severe damage from several winter storms. Initial damage was estimated to be between \$20,000 to \$30,000 by the Army Corps of Engineers and Roland Jones, Consulting Borough Engineer. An RDA grant for \$10,195 was submitted and approved to correct this problem, with an additional \$5,000 provided by the Kodiak Island Borough.

However, considerable additional damage occurred, and a second engineering report was completed in early March. The repair costs cited in this report, done by Roland Jones, were \$450,000 - \$600,000. As there are no conventional sources of funds to perform a project of this scope, the Kodiak Island Borough will have to request Governor Hammond to declare Karluk a State Disaster area. This request to the Borough could be made at their next regular Assembly meeting on April 7, 1977.

If a conventional funding source with a \$50,000 grant award had been available at the time the initial damage occurred to the Karluk spit, we would not be facing construction costs of \$450,000, estimated to run perhaps as high as two million dollars now.

Alex then spoke to the damage which has occurred to the spit and the problems which the village is experiencing from this damage. He also stated that the village had received reports that some discussion had taken place concerning moving the village. Alex said he spoke for all the people of Karluk when he stated that no one was interested in moving and that they want to stay in Karluk. Alex requested the KACDC Board adopt a Resolution supporting the interests of the people of Karluk.


Dear Representative Osterback:

Dear Mr. Marshall,
As previously indicated to you, the Kodiak Island Borough and various agencies, either through correspondence or verbally, the Karluk Spit has become and still is a rapidly rising problem and hazard to the village of Karluk and its people. Not to mention the expansion bridge across the river, the school and school children, and possibly the salmon runs here in Karluk which is our livelihood.

Since the first major washout by high tides, high winds, and tremendous ocean surf, requests have been made through your agency, the Borough and other agencies with promises that the problem would be taken care of as soon as possible. To date, our requests for immediate action to repair the spit has not been adhered to.

The spit has been deteriorating tremendously because of the high tides and surf. As you know the expansion bridge across the river is being used extensively by the people who go to the store and the school children who goes to school.

The dead man that anchors the large cables are buried deep on each end. The spit end of the bridge is being rapidly washed out, which would cause a great problem for

the school children and the people of the village. The possible chance that the bridge would collapse because of the deterioration of the spit can cause great injury or even death to some of the people and danger to the nearby houses.

Again the school children are using the bridge and the spit to attend school every day at old Karluk side. At the present the children have to be transported by cliff to and from school during high tides. If the spit is not fixed immediately the parents would not let the children go to school thereby causing the school to close down.

The Karluk General Store owned by Alex Panamareff Jr. is located on the spit and is the only store here in Karluk. If the situation here continues on the spit the store will be in danger of being washed out.

As you can see the Karluk spit plays a major role in the life of the village of Karluk, not to mention the history that the spit has on salmon fishing which is our life style. Even our life style can be changed drastically if this situation continues.

The village Council of Karluk along with the people hereby strongly urge that the Karluk spit be fixed immediately to prevent future disaster in the village of Karluk.





SUBJECT: House Bill No. 479

This bill provides for the refund of the cigarette excise tax on cigarettes which were destroyed by natural disaster on November 14, 1974, this being the Nome flood.

The bill provides that the claimant shall file a claim with us which shall be "verified by department receipts given for the condemned cigarettes". First of all, I was under the impression that there was no determination by the Department of Revenue or any other federal or state agency in fact condemning cigarettes which might have been lost in the flood. Second, neither the Department of Revenue or the Alcoholic, Firearms and Tobacco personnel of the Department of Treasury issued any receipts or made any record of cigarettes destroyed in the Nome loss. In a discussion with AFT personnel today, I was advised that they had not been aware of any indication of a loss of cigarettes as a result of the flood. With no specific information available to substantiate losses, this bill will be extremely difficult to administer.

There is no way to anticipate the loss of revenue which might be generated by this bill.
