Steve and Jim--

At the time House Bill 710 passed out of the House, the bonding proposal included hatchery construction at Snettisham which would accommodate primarily chum salmon production (55 million chum salmon as opposed to only 1.2 million coho or king salmon smolts). Representative Eliason and I both felt that this very small king salmon and coho salmon capacity overlooked a rare opportunity to aid thousands of sport fishermen and commercial trollers in the northern panhandle. Accordingly, although we voted to pass the bill out of committee, we asked the Department to provide an estimate of what it would cost to significantly increase the king and coho hatchery potential. I've just obtained this information from the Commissioner of Fish and Game, and I'm enclosing it with this memo. My request is that in Finance Committee consideration be given to increasing the Snettisham bond to the extent indicated in Commissioner Skoog's letter (that is from \$5,462,000 to \$6,020,000).

Thanks for your consideration.

At the House Resources Committee meeting of April 13, 1978 you requested an estimate of capital costs associated with an increase of coho and king salmon rearing capacity at the proposed Snettisham Hatchery.


As you know, the presently proposed capacity is 55 million chum salmon fry and 1.2 million coho or king salmon smolts. A 150% increase to 3.0 million coho or king salmon smolts requires the addition of 10 - 3ft. x 10ft. x 100ft. concrete raceways and ancillary items costing an additional \$558,000.

The cost breakdown is as follows:

Construction cost increase	\$ 503,000
Administration cost increase	15,000
Planning & Engineering cost increase	<u>40,000</u>





SUBJECT: G. O. Bond Bills

All G. O. bond measures introduced by the Governor failed to appropriate the proceeds of the bonds they authorized. In any case where a bond bill introduced by the Governor survives in its original form, at least the following change should be considered (example language taken from SB 624, a bill introduced by the Senate Finance Committee as a duplicate for HB 711):

"* Sec. 2. . .The amount of \$60,100,000 is appropriated from the '1978 Transportation Facilities Construction Fund' to the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities. The proceeds of the bonds shall be allocated statewide as follows:"

Inclusion of the above language, modified as to amount, construction fund and department, will appropriate the funds. You may also want to consider whether the proceeds should be appropriated or allocated. Projects "allocated" may have funds shifted from project to project. Projects "appropriated" have specific amounts earmarked only for each project.

Attached is a list of the Governor's G. O. bond bills.





Committee Substitute for House Bill No. 712, an Act providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$3,848,800 for the purpose of paying the cost of capital improvements to parks, waysides, trails, footpaths, and other recreational facilities, was referred on April 17, 1978 by the House Resources Committee to the House Finance Committee.

The State's Bond Counsel, Mr. C. Richard Walker of Orrick, Herrington, Rowley & Sutcliffe has advised that general obligations bonds of the State and nearly all other state and local government bonds are issued in the denomination of \$5,000, the standard unit.

Using Committee Substitute for House Bill No. 712 as an example, according to Mr. Walker, this would result in issuing less than the total amount of bonds authorized or in issuing one odd bond in the denomination of \$3,800 along with 769 bonds in the usual denomination of \$5,000.

Issuing a bond in an odd denomination requires extra time, expense and confusion in connection with the preparation of the resolution, notice of sale, official statement and other documents relating to the bonds, the printing of one odd bond with all of its special coupons, and all of the selling, accounting and paying activities.

Consequently, it is respectfully recommended that your Committee round off the principal amount of the proposed bond issue to the nearest \$5,000.
