~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #77-026. The claimant, a 26 year old woman, was involved in an incident whereby she left her husband in a hotel and walked down the street to get something to eat. She was allegedly assaulted by an unknown assailant and sustained a fractured jaw. Because of the conflicting evidence, the Board ordered a hearing prior to making a determination. A hearing was held and the Board reviewed the hearing officer's findings and conclusions. It was the decision of the Board to concur with the hearing officer's findings and to deny the claim on the grounds that there were inconsistencies with the police report which led to lack of conclusive evidence and insufficient proof to show the claimant was an innocent victim of an unprovoked criminal act.

DENIED: Under Section 18.67.080(c) In determining whether to make an order under this section, the Board shall consider all circumstances determined to be relevant, including provocation, consent or any other behavior of the victim which directly or indirectly contributed to his injury...

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #77-055. This was the case of the murder of a young woman in her apartment in Fairbanks by a single gunshot wound to the abdomen. There was a question whether the gunshot wound was self-inflicted or inflicted by an unknown assailant. The claimant is the husband of the victim and father of their young daughter. The Board requested more information from Mr. Pundak and also a copy of the coroner's report from Fairbanks. After reviewing the information and transcript, it was the decision of the Board to deny the claim on the grounds that the weight of the evidence indicated an self-inflicted gunshot wound.

DENIED: Under Section 18.67.130(a) No order for the payment of compensation may be made under Section 20 of this chapter unless... the personal injury or death was the result of an incident or offence listed in Section 100 of this chapter.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #78-027. This is the case where the claimant's son was shot to death. It was the determination of the Board that he was an innocent victim of a violent crime and had made an award to his wife and children. The Board, at that time, agreed to pay funeral expenses if the applications were submitted by the victim's parents. It was the decision of the Board to award the claimant \$695.50 for out of pocket expenses for the funeral.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(1) expenses actually and reasonably incurred as a result of the personal injury or death of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award: \$ 695.50

No attorney fees necessary.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXX~~, Claim #79-031. This is the case where the claimant's son was shot to death. It was the determination of the Board that he was an innocent victim of a violent crime and had made an award to the wife and children. The Board, at that time, agreed to pay funeral expenses if the applications were submitted by the victim's parents. It was the decision of the Board to award the claimant \$810.17 for out of pocket expenses for the funeral.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(1) expenses actually and reasonably incurred as a result of the personal injury or death of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award: \$ 810.15

No attorney fees necessary.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXX~~, Claim #79-026. The claimant, a 55 year old woman, was the night clerk at an apartment building when she was shot in the back of the head and left leg by two assailants. It was the determination of the Board that she was an innocent victim of a violent crime but denied the claim on the grounds that collateral sources, namely Workmen's Compensation, covered all of her expenses and her disability as she is unable to work.

DENIED: Under Section 18.67.080(c) In determining whether to make an order under this section, the Board shall consider all circumstances determined to be relevant, including...his need for financial aid and any other relevant matters.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXX~~, Claim #78-010. This is the incident where a group of young men were standing outside of a drinking establishment when several other men came out of the bar and one man started shooting. The claimant was shot in the buttocks. It was the determination of the Board that he was an innocent victim of a violent crime and it was their decision to award him \$1,625.40 for loss of earnings. This was computed at the claimants earnings of \$180.60 per week for nine weeks.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(2) loss of earning power as a result of total or partial incapacity of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award: \$ 1,625.40

No Attorney fees necessary.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #78-003. The claimant, a 36 year old man, was involved in an incident where he and several other friends went to a bar. As they were leaving, the claimant states that several men harrassed him. The claimant and friends started to leave in a car but the other men stopped the car. The claimant and his friend got out to see what was the matter. The claimant states he was beat on the head with a club. It was the decision of the Board to deny the claim on the grounds that there was conflicting evidence and there was not conclusive evidence that he was an innocent victim of a violent crime.

DENIED: Under Section 18.67.080(c) In determining whether to make an order under this section, the Board shall consider all circumstances determined to be relevant, including provocation, consent or any other behavior of the victim which directly or indirectly contributed to his or death.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #78-012. The claimant, a 34 year old cab driver, suffered gunshot wounds to the head and shoulder when two men reportedly robbed the claimant, shot him and drove off in his cab. It was the determination of the Board that the claimant was an innocent victim of a violent crime and eligible for compensation. It was the decision of the Board to compensate the claimant for loss of earnings based on their Standards of Compensation of \$230.00 per week for nine weeks. It was also their decision to compensate him for out of pocket expenses for cab fare to and from the hospital in the amount of \$25.00.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(1) expenses acutally and reasonably incurred as a result of the personal injury or death of the victim; and (2) loss of earning power as a result of total or partial incapacity of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award: \$ 2,095.00

No Attorney fees necessary.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #78-019. The claimant, a 34 year old man, and other members of the Brothers Motorcycle Club entered a bar in Healy and there was an altercation between the railroad workers and the Brothers Motorcycle Club. During the incident the claimant was shot. It was the decision of the Board to deny the claim on the grounds that there was conflicting evidence, some of which indicated consent and/or provocation.

DENIED: Under Section 18.67.080(c) In determining whether to make an order under this section, the Board shall consider all circumstances determined to be relevant, including provocation, consent or any other behavior of the victim which directly or indirectly contributed to his injury.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #77-051. The claimant, a 22 year old man, was involved in an altercation at a bar and was taken to the hospital for head injuries and multiple bruises. It was the decision of the Board to deny the claim on the grounds that there was an indication of consent to the fight. Also, there was no evidence that even if it were an unprovoked attack, that it is covered under Section 100.

DENIED: Under Section 18.67.080(c) In determining whether to make an order under this section, the Board shall consider all circumstances determined to be relevant, including provocation, consent or any other behavior of the victim which directly or indirectly contributed to his injury; and Section 18.67.130(a) No order for the payment of compensation may be made under Section 80 of this chapter unless...the personal injury or death was the result of an incident or offense listed in Section 100 of this chapter.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #78-021. The claimant, a 23 year old woman, was in her apartment when her ex-boyfriend came in and, following an argument, began striking her. It was the decision of the Board to deny the claim on the grounds that there appeared to be a boyfriend-girlfriend relationship and, also, it did not appear to be a crime eligible under Section 100.

DENIED: Under Section 18.67.130(b) No compensation may be awarded if the victim (2) is, at the time of the personal injury...living with the offender...or maintaining a sexual relationship, whether illicit or not, with the offender; and Section 18.67.130(a) No order for the payment of compensation may be made under Section 80 of this chapter unless...the personal injury or death was the result of an incident or offense listed in Section 100 of this chapter.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #78-009. The claimant, a 22 year old male, was involved in an incident at a coveery where he and the night watchman had as two young males in a boat to keep the noise down. Apparently, there was some words and the claimant threw several rocks at their skiff. The two men came back with a third man and struck the claimant several times in the back with a piece of pipe. It was the decision of the Board to deny the claim on the grounds that there was conflicting evidence as to whether there was provocation or actions to contribute to the incident. There was no medical confirmation of disability although the claimant was requesting disability for a rather extended length of time.

DENIED: Under Section 18.67.080(c) In determining whether to make an order under this section, the Board shall consider all circumstances determined to be relevant, including provocation, consent or any other behavior of the victim which directly or indirectly contributed to his injury.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #78-001. The claimant, a 15 year old girl, was on her way to school when she was attacked from behind, dragged into the graveyard and raped. It was the determination of the Board that the claimant was an innocent victim of a violent crime. It was the decision of the Board to award medical expenses and other out of pocket expenses which the Board determined to be reasonable.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(1) expenses actually and reasonably incurred as a result of the personal injury or death of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award: \$ 683.00

Attorney fees pending itemized statement.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #78-015. This is the incident where the claimant went into a bar to pick up his girlfriend who was working in the bar. There was an altercation in the bar and the claimant received a gunshot wound to the face. It was the decision of the Board to deny the claim on the grounds that there was provocation/consent.

DENIED: Under Section 18.67.080(c) In determining whether to make an order under this section, the Board shall consider all circumstances determined to be relevant, including provocation, consent or any other behavior of the victim which directly or indirectly contributed to his injury.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #77-084. The claimant, a 42 year old woman, was involved in an incident in which she states her ex-boyfriend had come to her apartment and had hit her, breaking her jaw. It was the decision of the Board to deny the claim on the grounds that there was a relationship between the claimant and assailant. Also, it appears that this was a case of simple assault which does not qualify under Section 100 and there was conflicting information given by the claimant on different occasions.

DENIED: Under Section 18.67.130(a) No order for the payment of compensation may be made under Section 80 of this chapter unless... the personal injury or death was the result of an incident or offense listed under Section 100 of this chapter; (b) No compensation may be awarded if the victim (2) is, at the time of the personal injury...living with the offender...or maintaining a sexual relationship, whether illicit or not, with the offender.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #78-022. The claimant, a 30 year old man, is requesting compensation for himself and his three children based on the death of his wife. There was a commotion in front of their and his wife was awakened when a rock was thrown through the window. She stepped outside of the house onto the porch to see what had happened and, while standing there, incurred a fatal gunshot wound to the chest. It was the determination of the Board that she was an innocent victim of a violent crime and the claimant was eligible for compensation. It was the decision of the Board to award out of pocket expenses for the funeral in the amount of \$580.00. It was also the decision of the Board to award Mr. Walker and the children \$25,000.00 for pecuniary loss.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(1) expenses actually and reasonably incurred as a result of the personal injury or death of the victim; and (3) pecuniary loss to the dependents of the deceased victim.

Motion made and carried to award: \$25,580.00

Attorney fees pending itemized statement.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #76-066. This is the incident where the victim, a 31 year old male, was assaulted and received serious injuries to his leg as a person, who he stated owed him wages, attacked him without provocation. The Board awarded him \$3,850.00 for temporary total disability, \$1,396.00 for temporary partial disability, plus medical expenses in the amount of \$9,816.45. The total award was \$13,552.45. Mr. Merriman wrote a letter submitting several more medical billings, one for \$721.00 and one for \$387.00. The Administrator wrote Mr. Merriman and quoted the statute as saying "all payments shall be made in a lump sum." In the letter, it was requested that Mr. Merriman check with Vocational Rehabilitation to see if medical bills would not be covered under their office and requested a reply by the time of the Board meeting. It was the Board's recommendation to take no action on the billings until a reply was received from Mr. Merriman.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #77-022. The claimant, a 36 year old man, was involved in an incident wherein he was stabbed in the back. The Board had awarded him loss of earnings for twelve days according to their Standards of Compensation for a total of \$552.00. The claimant's attorney submitted a billing for \$52.50 for the ambulance and \$74.08 for the doctor. In the original claim, Mr. Vasquez had thought his insurance would pay all of his medical expenses. It was the determination of the Board that the billings were legitimate and awarded Mr. Vasquez \$127.18.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(1) expenses actually and reasonably incurred as a result of the personal injury or death of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award: 127.18

Attorney fees pending itemized statement.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #77-030. The claimant, a 31 year old female, is requesting compensation for herself and five children because of the death of her husband. Her husband was apparently asleep at the time the assailant came in and killed him with one shot from a 22 caliber pistol. Although Mrs. Joe was claiming compensation for the five children, the youngest child was the only legal child of the victim. It was the determination of the Board that the claimant's husband was an innocent victim of a violent crime and the claimant was eligible for compensation. It was the decision of the Board to award Mrs. Joe \$150.00 a month for thirteen year for a total amount of \$23,400.00.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(3) pecuniary loss to the dependents of the deceased victim.

Motion made and carried to award: \$23,400.00

No attorney fees necessary.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #77-081. The claimant, a 24 year old male, took a girl to his apartment. An altercation took place and the girl shot him nine times. It was the decision of the Board to deny the claim on the grounds that, (1) he was engaged in an act of prostitution which is a crime, (2) he was engaged in a sexual encounter, while it might not be considered maintaining a sexual relationship, it was a sexual encounter, and (3) there was some evidence that he was engaged in an attempted rape.

DENIED: Under Section 18.67.130(b) No compensation may be awarded if the victim (2) is, at the time of the personal injury...of the victim living with the offender as a member of the same family or household, or maintaining a sexual relationship, whether illicit or not, with the offender...; and (3) violated a penal law of the state, which violation caused or contributed to his injuries.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #77-086. The claimant is the wife of a 26 year old male who was shot to death. The Board requested further information on the case before they could make a determination.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #77-087. The claimant, a 61 year old male, was arrested by a policeman who was intoxicated. The claimant had committed no offense, however, in route to the jail, the policeman shot the claimant four times with a 38 special revolver in the arms, legs and in the chest. It was the determination of the Board that he was an innocent victim of a violent crime and awarded him \$7,500.00 based on permanent partial disability.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(2) loss of earning power as a result of total or partial incapacity of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award: \$ 7,500.00

No attorney fees necessary.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~, Claim #78-002. The claimant, a 47 year old male, was making a phone call from a pay phone when a man approached him asked him for a ride to a nearby apartment building. The claimant gave him a ride and when they had arrived at the apartment, the man asked him to get out of the car and help him find his sister's car. The man got behind the claimant and struck him a powerful blow behind the left ear, robbed him of his wallet and stole his car. Because of this incident, the claimant has a permanent partial hearing loss. It was the determination of the Board that he was an innocent victim of a violent crime and awarded him \$5,980.00 for permanent partial disability. They also awarded medical expenses of \$50.00.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(1) expenses actually and reasonably incurred as a result of the personal injury or death of the victim; and (2) loss of earning power as a result of total or partial incapacity of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award: \$ 6,030.00

Attorney fees pending itemized statement.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~, Claim #78-016. The claimant, a 64 year old male, was sitting in the lobby of an apartment building when an elderly woman started shooting. The claimant was badly injured after being hit in the left leg with a bullet. His medical expenses were covered by Medicare, however, it was the determination of the Board that Mr. Traylor was an innocent victim of a violent crime and awarded him \$1,200.00 loss of earnings and agreed to pay for part of the Homemaker service which could not be covered by the State in the amount of \$746.24.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(1) expenses actually and reasonably incurred as a result of the personal injury or death of the victim; and (2) loss of earning power as a result of total or partial incapacity of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award: \$ 1,946.24

No attorney fees necessary.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~, Claim #78-020. The claimant, a 23 year old female, was attacked in her apartment. The Board requested further information on the case before they could make a determination.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~, Claim #78-025. The claimant, a 28 year old female, made a derogatory remark to the man her girlfriend had just married. The man struck the claimant in the face with a drinking glass. It was the determination of the Board that she was an innocent victim of a violent crime and the Board awarded her \$221.95 for medical expenses and \$254.34 for six days loss of earnings.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(1) expenses actually and reasonably incurred as a result of the personal injury or death of the victim; and (2) loss of earning power as a result of total or partial incapacity of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award:

\$ 476.23

No attorney fees necessary.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #78-028. The claimant, a 23 year old male, had his apartment broken into by friends who chased him out of his apartment and struck him about the head and body, causing a severe concussion and other injuries. It was the decision of the Board to deny the claim on the grounds that, (1) he did not press charges, and (2) there is an indication he was engaged in criminal activities.

DENIED: Under Section 18.67.080(c) In determining whether to make an order under this section, the Board shall consider all circumstances determined to be relevant, including provocation, consent or any other behavior of the victim which directly or indirectly contributed to his injury...; and Section 18.67.130(b) No compensation may be awarded if the victim (3) violated a penal law of the state, which violation caused or contributed to his injuries.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #78-029. The claimant, a 27 year old male, was pulled out of his car and kicked and beaten. The Board requested further information on the case before they could make a determination.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~, Claim #78-032. The claimant, a 20 year old male, was walking home when he was struck on the back of the head with a large piece of wood and robbed. He suffered a mild concussion. It was the determination of the Board that he was an innocent victim of a violent crime and awarded him loss of earnings of \$203.00 a week for three weeks.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(2) loss of earning power as a result of total or partial incapacity of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award:

\$ 609.00

No attorney fees necessary.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~, Jr., Claim #78-035. The claimant, a 52 year old male, was robbed at gunpoint in a parking lot. The claimant tried to grab the man with the gun after handing him his money and, in the process, the gun went off and the claimant's shoulder was injured. It was the determination of the Board that the claimant was an innocent victim of a violent crime and awarded him \$200.50 in medical expenses and \$1,150.00 for five weeks loss of earnings at \$230.00 per week. From this amount was deducted the \$1,250.00 Emergency Award granted.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(1) expenses actually and reasonably incurred as a result of the personal injury or death of the victim; and (2) loss of earning power as a result of total or partial incapacity of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award:

\$ 1,410.50

No attorney fees necessary.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~Under Section 18.67.110(1)~~, Claim #78-037. The claimant, a 21 year old female, requested loss of support for her daughter, Mia, based on the stabbing death of the claimant's ex-husband and father of Mia. At the February 1, 1977 meeting, the Board had determined that the claimant's ex-husband was an innocent victim of a violent crime. They awarded the claimant, on behalf of the daughter, \$11,200.00 for loss of support of the father. This was computed at \$75.00 per month for approximately thirteen years.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(c) pecuniary loss to the dependents of the deceased victim.

Motion made and carried to award:

\$11,200.00

Attorney fees pending itemized statement.

All board members concurred with the decision.

~~Under Section 18.67.110(1)~~, Claim #78-040. The claimant, a 21 year old male, was standing by his pickup while a man was pouring gas in the truck. The man turned and threw the remaining gas on the claimant's legs. The man then invited him into his trailer for the purpose of changing clothes. The claimant, after waiting about five minutes, approached the man who struck a cigarette lighter at his legs and ignited the claimant's pants. The claimant suffered burns on both forelegs. He was transferred out of state for grafting of the non-healing burn wound on his right foreleg. It was the determination of the Board that he was an innocent victim of a violent crime and awarded him \$4,554.26 for medical expenses, \$2,000.00 for projected medical expenses and loss of earnings for nine weeks at 1230.00 a week for a total of \$2,070.00. An Emergency Award of \$1,500.00 had been granted prior to the Board meeting and is to be deducted from the total amount.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(1) expenses actually and reasonably incurred as a result of the personal injury or death of the victim; (2) loss of earning power as a result of total or partial incapacity of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award:

\$ 8,624.26

No attorney fees necessary.

All board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #78-041. The claimant, a 49 year old male, who lived and worked at a lodge, had closed the lodge for the night when he heard a knock at the door. He opened the door and saw three men standing there. As one man had a gun, he quickly slammed the door shut. Four shots were fired through the door and two bullets struck the claimant in the back with one lodging next to his heart. It was the determination of the Board that he was an innocent victim of a violent crime and awarded him \$977.75 for medical expenses and \$300.00 for loss of earnings.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(1) expenses actually and reasonably incurred as a result of the personal injury or death of the victim; and (2) loss of earning power as a result of total or partial incapacity of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award: \$ 1,277.75

Attorney fees pending itemized statement.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #78-053. The claimant, a 35 year old female, requested compensation for herself and six children based on the death of her husband and the children's father. The victim was shot and killed and another person critically injured when a man walked into a market and started shooting with a 357 magnum. The assailant was later convicted of First Degree Murder and sentenced to life in prison. It was the determination of the Board that the claimant and her six children were eligible for compensation. The Board awarded the maximum amount of \$40,000.00 for the dependents of the deceased victim. An Emergency Award of \$1,500.00 had been granted prior to the Board meeting.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(3) pecuniary loss to the dependents of the deceased victim.

Motion made and carried to award: \$40,000.00

Attorney fees pending itemized statement.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Claim #78-055. The claimant, a 62 year old female, requested funeral expenses due to the death of her daughter. The daughter was found by the side of the road over an embankment with numerous injuries. She had already expired and was identified at a later date. It was the decision of the board to deny the claim on the grounds that there was no evidence that she was an innocent victim of a violent crime. There was evidence that indicated a possible hit and run accident. There was also the possibility that someone attacked her, however, the evidence was not conclusive to prove she was the victim of a violent crime compensable under this program.

DENIED: Under Section 18.67.080(c) In determining whether to make an order under this section, the Board shall consider all circumstances determined to be relevant, including provocation, consent or any other behavior of the victim which directly or indirectly contributed to his injury or death, the prior case

or social history, if any, of the victim, his need for financial aid, and any other relevant matters.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~Claim #78-059.~~ Claim #78-059. The claimant, an 18 year old female, was confronted by three females whom she knew and a fight ensued. The claimant was struck on the head with a pair of nunchucks. It was the decision of the Board to deny the claim on the grounds there was evidence that indicated consent and/or provocation.

DENIED: Under Section 18.67.080(c) In determining whether to make an order under this section, the Board shall consider all circumstances determined to be relevant, including provocation, consent or any other behavior of the victim with directly or indirectly contributed to his injury.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

The victim was ~~being~~ when he was picked up by a male and female who later beat him brutally and shot him to death. It was the determination of the Board that the claimant was eligible for compensation and awarded funeral expenses in the amount of \$697.00.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(1) expenses actually and reasonably incurred as a result of the personal injury or death of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award: \$ 697.00

No attorney fees necessary.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

~~Claim #78-054.~~ Claim #78-054. The claimant, a 29 year old male, was home with his wife and new baby when the landlord entered the home and accused the claimant of hiding the landlord's girlfriend. The landlord picked up a part of a handy-man jack and beat the claimant, breaking his arm in addition to giving him several cuts, bruised the claimant's wife and threatened harm to the baby and destroyed several articles of furniture. A hearing was held and it was the hearing officer's recommendation that the claimant's wife be reimbursed for one week loss of wages as she was the sole support of the family and babysitting expenses for six months. The claimant was not employed at the time of the incident and was receiving disability from the Veteran's Administration. The medical reports indicated that the claimant would be disabled because of the broken arm for a period of six months. Medical expenses were paid by the Veteran's Administration. It was the decision of the Board to award babysitting expenses in the amount of \$1,200.00 and one week loss of wages in the amount of \$187.50.

AWARDED: Under Section 18.67.110(1) expenses actually and reasonably incurred as a result of the personal injury or death of the victim; and (2) loss of earning power as a result of the total or partial incapacity of the victim.

Motion made and carried to award: \$ 1,387.50

No attorney fees necessary.

All Board members concurred with the decision.

In our discussion of HB 933, you asked that I compute the costs of including in this bill all judges and justices within the Court System, all commissioners, and other non-elected state officials covered by the salary commission recommendations. Applying the five per cent cost of living adjustment to these positions would lead to an annual expense of approximately \$197,000.

I am also providing you with a sample of the wording that could be used in HB 933 to include the individuals mentioned above:

Under authority of art. III, sec. 18 of the Alaska Constitution, and in accordance with AS 24.30.060(b) and the Uniform Rules of the Alaska State Legislature, I am transmitting a bill pertaining to the salaries of employees not covered by a collective bargaining agreement. This bill would grant to these employees the five per cent cost-of-living adjustment which has been granted to the general government employees, the confidential employees, the supervisory employees, and the labor, trades, and crafts employees as of January 1, 1978.

The traditional section extending the cost-of-living adjustments to employees of the legislative and judicial branches as well as the University of Alaska has been included in the bill.

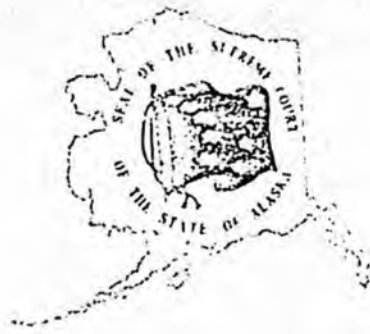
In addition, section 3 repeals two outdated provisions in the pay statutes.

In considering the salary structure for all state officers and employees, I see several inequities and other problems in the system. The Senate Finance Committee incorporated cost-of-living adjustments into SCSHB 933 for members of four state commissions. Should the Committee wish to fund the FY 78 portion of the COLA for SCSHB 933, the sum of \$2,559,520 should be appropriated to the Office of the Governor (not the Department of Administration as written in HB 939, the bill which funds non-covered employees):

Non-covered employees' cost-of-living adjustments for FY 79 are already included in the FY 79 operating budget; commission members' cost-of-living adjustments for FY 79 are not included in the budget (FY 79 cost is \$136,440) but can probably be absorbed by the Salary and Benefits Increase component for the Executive Branch for FY 79; should funds fall short, (usually the Salary and Benefits Increase component lapses more than required to fund the commission members) a supplemental appropriation could be introduced next session.

Dear Mr. Speaker:

Under authority of art. III, sec. 18 of the Alaska Constitution, and in accordance with AS 24.30.060(b) and the Uniform Rules of the Alaska State Legislature, I am transmitting a bill pertaining to the salaries of employees not covered by a collective bargaining agreement. This bill would grant to these employees the five per cent cost-of-living adjustment which has been granted to the general government employees, the confidential employees, the supervisory employees, and the labor, trades, and crafts employees as of January 1, 1978.

The traditional section extending the cost-of-living adjustments to employees of the legislative and judicial branches as well as the University of Alaska has been included in the bill.

In addition, section 3 repeals two outdated provisions in the pay statutes.

In considering the salary structure for all state officers and employees, I see several inequities and other problems in the system. I have therefore directed the commissioner of administration and the director of personnel and labor relations to begin immediately to re-analyze the entire system and to work closely with the salary commission so that a comprehensive report, with recommendations for legislative action, can be presented to the next session of the legislature.

Dear Senator Rader:

Reference is made to our telephone conference pertaining to my request that justices and judges be included in the five percent cost-of-living salary increase provided for in House Bill 933 am. With judges having had no salary or merit increases since July 1975, it is essential that some recognition be given of the tremendous inflationary factors reducing their salaries in the ensuing three years. This would involve the insertion of a new Section 2 in HB 933 am to read as follows:

The salaries of supreme court justices, under AS 22.05.140(a), superior court judges, under AS 22.10.190(a), and district court judges under AS 22.15.220(a), as recommended by the Alaska Salary Commission under AS 39.23, and approved by the legislature in 1977, are increased five percent to recognize the rise in the cost of living during the past year.

In addition to the above new section, the only other changes required would be to renumber the existing sections, delete the phrase "(other than judicial officers)" in the former Section 2 and add "Section 2" to the provisions of former Section 5 which make the cost-of-living adjustment retroactive to January 1, 1978. Your consideration of this matter is very much appreciated.


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

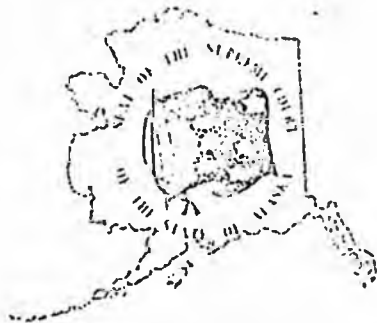

Dear Senator Rader:

Reference is made to our telephone conference pertaining to my request that justices and judges be included in the five percent cost-of-living salary increase provided for in House Bill 933 am. With judges having had no salary or merit increases since July 1975, it is essential that some recognition be given of the tremendous inflationary factors reducing their salaries in the ensuing three years. This would involve the insertion of a new Section 2 in HB 933 am to read as follows:

The salaries of supreme court justices, under AS 22.05.140(a), superior court judges, under AS 22.10.190(a), and district court judges under AS 22.15.220(a), as recommended by the Alaska Salary Commission under AS 39.23, and approved by the legislature in 1977, are increased five percent to recognize the rise in the cost of living during the past year.

In addition to the above new section, the only other changes required would be to renumber the existing sections, delete the phrase "(other than judicial officers)" in the former Section 2 and add "Section 2" to the provisions of former Section 5 which make the cost-of-living adjustment retroactive to January 1, 1978. Your consideration of this matter is very much appreciated.

In our discussion of HB 933, you asked that I compute the costs of including in this bill all judges and justices within the Court System, all commissioners, and other non-elected state officials covered by the salary commission recommendations. Applying the five per cent cost of living adjustment to these positions would lead to an annual expense of approximately \$197,000.

I am also providing you with a sample of the wording that could be used in HB 933 to include the individuals mentioned above:

Sec. 2. The salaries of supreme court justices, under AS 22.05.140(a), superior court judges, under AS 22.10.190(a), district court judges, under AS 22.15.220(a), the deputy head of each principal executive department, under AS 39.20.080(b), members of the Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission, under AS 16.43.060, members of the Alaska Public Utilities Commission, under AS 42.05.091, members of the Alaska Pipeline Commission, under AS 42.06.090, and members of the Alaska Transportation Commission, under AS 42.07.071, as recommended by the Alaska Salary Commission, under AS 39.23, and approved by the legislature in 1977, are adjusted five per cent to recognize the rise in the cost of living during the past year.

In addition to the above section, the only other changes required would be to renumber the previous sections 2, 3, and 4, and to delete the phrase, "other than judicial officers" on page 2, line 16.


Under authority of art. III, sec. 18 of the Alaska Constitution, and in accordance with AS 24.30.060(b) and the Uniform Rules of the Alaska State Legislature, I am transmitting a bill pertaining to the salaries of employees not covered by a collective bargaining agreement. This bill would grant to these employees the five per cent cost-of-living adjustment which has been granted to the general government employees, the confidential employees, the supervisory employees, and the labor, trades, and crafts employees as of January 1, 1978.

The traditional section extending the cost-of-living adjustments to employees of the legislative and judicial branches as well as the University of Alaska has been included in the bill.

In addition, section 3 repeals two outdated provisions in the pay statutes.

In considering the salary structure for all state officers and employees, I see several inequities and other problems in the system. I have therefore directed the commissioner of administration and the director of personnel and labor relations to begin immediately to re-analyze the entire system and to work closely with the salary commission so that a comprehensive report, with recommendations for legislative action, can be presented to the next session of the legislature.



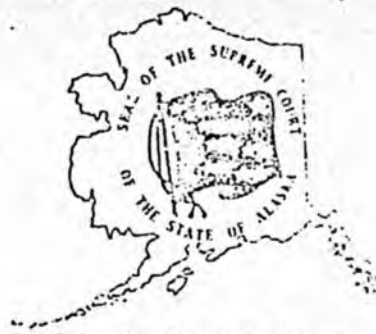

Several comments seem appropriate relative to the foregoing in the interest of communication. First, specific to the Fund #2 salary cost calculations, such have been pursued with a view to the University supporting/contributing to 50% of the cost of the COLA. The rationale for such approach is fundamentally one of carrying forth past practice (i.e., in previous fiscal years, up through the first six (6) months period in the FY 78, the University's practice has been to support Fund #2 COLA salary increases @50% of the cost). Wherein recognition is given to the fact that Dr. Neil D. Humphrey did talk of not contributing to the Fund #2 salary cost of a COLA(s) in future fiscal years, in entertaining the full impact of such decision, if implemented, one soon encounters some real problems of equity and disparity (e.g., the real cases where given professional personnel's assignments are divided in such fashion as to be partially funded by Fund #2 monies and partially funded by Fund #1 monies....such cases, if divided say 50-50, would obtain only one-half of a COLA



increase. Such cases could be expanded upon to three-part assignments, etc.).

Secondly, still addressing the Fund #2 COLA matter, to change past practice at this point in time would create havoc and ill-feelings in that it would not permit sufficient time for any 'units' to seek project cost adjustments through the given agencies involved.. ..even if the potential of such procedure were reasonably positive, which in any case is highly problematic. Lastly, still speaking to the Fund #2 COLA increases, if such increases were to be borne totally by projects, in due course such approach would undoubtedly serve to negatively affect the success witnessed by the University in competitively vying for project awards in and among any number of applicant-competitors. Accordingly, on balance, it is the considered opinion of the University that the past practice of the University should be continued, now and in the future.

Beyond the foregoing the COLA salary cost projections presented hereinunder are viewed as reasonably accurate for the purpose(s) outlined in your memo. 
