RE : Senate Bill 257

Please be advised that the Senate Health, Education, and Social Services Committee, upon consideration of Senate Bill 257, believes that the employee's sick leave should be computed as a service credit on a yearly basis rather than lump sum at the same rate of pay as his salary on retirement.

The language in the bill is not specific on this point. Should the Finance Committee determine that clarifying language is necessary, we would support the addition of appropriate language.





LETTER OF INTENT

for

House Finance Committee Substitute for SB 261


In placing the University of Alaska under the provisions of AS 37.05, the fiscal procedures act, and AS 37.07, the executive budget act, it is the declared intent of the Legislature that the University budgeting, accounting, and fiscal management systems shall conform to record keeping, reporting, and budgeting requirements for other state agencies and to explicit criteria and guidelines established by the Commissioner of Administration and the Director, Division of Budget and Management, respectively. These criteria and guidelines shall be developed and made subject to review and comment by the Board of Regents and then submitted to Legislative Budget and Audit for concurrence prior to final adoption.

It is recognized that experience in operation under these established criteria and guidelines during the next fiscal year may develop the need for some modifications or exclusions, some of which may be handled by administrative agreement and some of which may require legislation. Quarterly reports of operating experience shall be prepared by state officials and by University of Alaska officials and submitted to Legislative Budget and Audit.

This legislation reflects the concern of the Legislature that implementation of sound budgeting, accounting, and fiscal management systems are essential to the University in carrying out its fundamental missions of teaching, research, and public service.

However, it is the express intent of the Legislature that the establishment of policies and directives for the actual conduct of teaching, research, and public service functions of the University within the limitations of legislative appropriations and pertinent statutes are clearly the responsibility of the Board of Regents and not that of the Executive or Legislative branch.

This intent shall be kept clearly in mind in the development of criteria and guidelines for the University to follow in budgeting, accounting, and fiscal management.

SUBJECT: Senate Bill 261

As per your request, the following analysis of SB 261 is presented:

Section 1 of the bill would have the effect of placing the University of Alaska under the Administrative Procedures Act. This section would require the University to promulgate regulations and procedures so as to assure uniformity in administration of the University. Don Dafoe, retained as a consultant to the House Finance Committee feels this section is of dubious value, but sees no problem for the University if it is left in.

Section 2 would define the University as a state agency relative to the Fiscal Procedures Act. This would place the University under the purview of the Department of Administration relative to procedures dealing with accounting, payroll services, purchasing, and pre- and post-audit. Some have objected to this section on the basis that it would give custody of University funds to the Department of Administration. Such an assumption is perhaps open to some dispute; however, I believe the section would merely assure that the University is required to perform its fiscal function in conformance to statute and in accordance with acceptable criteria and standards set forth by the Department of Administration and subject to review by the Legislative Auditor.

Section 3 would place the University of Alaska under the Executive Budget Act. This section would require the University to conform to the same budgeting procedures required of state agencies. One important result would be that the University would be subject to the revised program process relative to transfers of appropriations and receipts and expenditure of new funds.

SUBJECT: SB 261

SB 261, as is, appears to be the best bill.

HB 361, introduced by Miles, Malone and Gardiner, originally contained a section which repealed certain accounting and administrative powers of the University of Alaska. In the Committee Substitute for the House Bill the HESS Committee removed the repealers, feeling they did more harm than good. It was the Committee's feeling that the repealers left the University with no clear authority to manage "other" funds that are not subject to legislative appropriation (i.e. gifts, private grants, etc.).

All things considered, the Senate Bill as written is a good bill. It makes the University of Alaska a State agency with regards to the Administrative Procedures Act, the Executive Budget Act, and the Uniform Accounting Act. No amendments appear to be necessary.

Members of the Alaska Association of Helping Services, representing 15 child care institutions from Nome to Ketchikan, appeared in Juneau during the week of February 20th prepared to deliver testimony pertaining to SB 271. Due to postponement of the hearings originally scheduled for February 24th, the Association would like to submit the following testimony in writing.

The Alaska Association of Helping Services agencies provide care for a daily average of 254 state placed children. All agencies are private non-profit and some have been providing residential care for children since 1890.

AS 47.40 states that "When the department purchases services... the department shall... (3) pay all expenses related directly to the full costs of services at the levels of care required." For the past several years, agencies reimbursed through the provisions of this statute have suffered financial loss due to the department's interpretation of AS 47.40.040 which reads, "Full cost of services shall be determined by the per person per day cost in the preceding fiscal year plus a proportionate share of anticipated cost of living..." As a result of this interpretation, a rate is established that results in as much as a 10-20% annual deficit. In FY 77, the 15 member agencies suffered a combined loss of \$421,000 on cost of care related services. This loss can not be recovered from the state without a provision for cost settling as provided for in SB 271.

Furthermore, AS 47.40.040(b)(3) disallows reimbursement for depreciation on property and equipment necessary for the care of children. This works an additional hardship on the agencies. SB 271 corrects the problem by removing depreciation from the list of disallowable items.

At the present time, the state does not operate any facility for the care and treatment of these children. To do so would cost 2-3 times what is presently being reimbursed to the private providers. Furthermore, these agencies are committed to quality care and operate under strict regulations set by state and local authorities.

SB 271 provides for the department to determine standards of allowable costs. By the provision of these checks and balances, quality care is assured at the greatest cost effectiveness.

Your support of SB 271 would be greatly appreciated and will enable our member agencies to continue serving Alaska, its families, and its children.

In behalf of the residential childcare agencies which are members of this Association, I regret that I was unable to appear at the Senate Finance Committee Meeting on Monday, February 27, to answer questions pertaining to Senate Bill 271.

Through Senator Joseph Orsini's office, I was informed that the Committee had questions pertaining to the Department of Health and Social Services fiscal note, which estimated an additional 1.3 million to be needed for residential childcare should this bill be enacted.

Under the present interpretation of AS 47.40 our member agencies annually experience a short fall of \$400,000 to \$500,000 between what it costs to care for State-placed children and what we are reimbursed by the Department. This represents approximately a 10 percent deficit. Some member agencies without fund-raising capabilities will not be able to function much longer under these fiscal constraints.

It is our dedicated childcare workers, however, that are personally being called upon to subsidize the care of these needy children. Most childcare workers in our agencies earn less than \$1,000 per month. Those that are employed 24 hours a day, five to six days a week, are being paid at or below the state minimum wage. It is true that a 30 percent increase on the approximate 3 million dollars annually paid for salaries and benefits would amount to as much as



\$900,000. This would still be approximately 20 - 30 percent less than State employees involved in childcare at the McLaughlin Youth Center receive for comparable experience and time on the job.

Senate Bill 271 provides for the Department to establish levels of allowable cost above which agencies would not be reimbursed. It is expected that in no case would a salary be paid amounting to as much as or more than a comparable State position. Philosophically our member agencies are opposed to paying at a rate equal to or greater than the State. Therefore, it is our position that the \$900,000 figure apparently supplied by the Department would be absolute maximum and that in reality the amount would be considerably less by as much as 50 percent.

There may be other questions that you and members of your committee have. Be assured that I will be happy to attempt to answer them in writing or in person. I trust that you may be able to reschedule this bill before your committee at your earliest convenience. If you will let me know I will make every attempt to be present for the hearing. We are grateful for your interest and support.
