The specific intent of the referenced bills is to exempt the income of taxpayers in Skagway who had income in 1975 which was earned while working on the White Pass and Yukon Railroad.

In 1975, the Alaska income tax law was amended so that the State would tax all income taxable under the Internal Revenue Code that was received by residents of the State. The intent of the law change was to tax the income earned by residents of Alaska from out-of-state sources whether in the form of salaries and wages or income from investments. The effect of this proposed law change would be to exempt any income earned by individuals traveling outside the State of Alaska in the course of their employment. This would mean that the several thousand individuals who travel away from the State on business for their employers would be permitted to file an amended return for 1975, claiming a refund for the tax paid on the salary thus exempted.

The revenue loss which would result from just exempting the people in Skagway would be in excess of \$20,000. When taking into consideration the potential several thousand individuals who could claim the exemption, the total revenue loss could amount to hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Further, there would appear to be another significant inequity created by this bill in that one class of income will be exempted from tax while other classes of income from out-of-state sources will be subject to tax. If the Legislature should choose to delay the implementation of the new law for 1975, it would seem far more equitable to delay it for all affected taxpayers rather than just a portion thereof. The individuals in the State who had income from out-of-state investments have also paid a significant amount of additional tax to the State of Alaska on that income which had previously been nontaxable.





Possible Effects

1. Privileges a licensee who holds a liquor retail premises and a liquor beverage dispensary premises, that are connected by a door or other direct passage, to expand the retail premises and overlap the beverage dispensary premises, thereby allowing the licensee to sell original packages of intoxicating liquor and wine in the beverage dispensary premises for consumption off-premises.
2. Causes an enforcement problem as the packaged liquor could be consumed on the retail premises by keeping the bottles hidden and the package sales could be run through the beverage dispensary premises cash register which could cloud the retail license fee provision of \$300 for the license if gross sales are under \$20,000 and \$600 for the license if over \$20,000.

The applicable provision appears to be AS 04.10.390:

The business premises occupied by a holder of a retail license under this chapter shall not be connected by a door, opening or other means of passage for the purpose of passage by the general public to any other retail business establishment, except those licensed under this chapter.

The provision appears to have been added to the laws at the time of the recodification of the state's alcoholic beverage laws after statehood (ch. 197, SLA 1959), and has not been materially amended since. Needless to say, legislative history is sparse: the bill which became Ch. 197 was originally prepared and offered by the Senate Commerce and Labor Committee, and the particular provision originally precluded a direct or common access between a retail liquor license establishment and any other business premises. It appears that the exception in favor of other licensed premises, the last phrase of the section, was added in the House by way of a committee amendment (1959 House Journal, page 1047).

The ABC board staff referred me to an Opinion of the Attorney General of July 17, 1968 (a copy is forthcoming from Anchorage) concluding that, while common connection between a retail establishment and other business was barred by the provision cited, exception was made for such common connection between a retail licensed premises and a beverage dispensary or bar. Apparently this kind of common connection (i.e. bar-retail premises) has been the only kind with which the Board has had to contend. The lady to whom I spoke could not tell me whether the Board has previously approved a common connection between a retail premises and, say, an adjacent restaurant, though my reading of the statute would indicate that such would be allowed.
