

The Capital Site Planning Commission requests introduction of a special general fund appropriation of \$1,221,200 to be in three parts:

1. \$231,000 to drill test wells to determine if sufficient ground water exists to provide the new capital city with water;
2. \$928,200 to initiate the first steps of the data collection process necessary for preparation of the Environmental Impact Assessment and Statement; and
3. \$62,000 for analysis of the impact on Juneau and on State financial resources of retaining the capital in Juneau.

Please draft the transmittal memo for the Governor specifying the introduction of the bill is at the request of the Capital Site Planning Commission and being forwarded by the Governor to the Legislature.

The bill should include no lapse date.






This bill indicates the responsibilities of the Commissioner in regard to planning of public facilities. In the definition of public facility is included; "a capital improvement for subsequent occupancy or operation. . . of the University of Alaska. . ."

At present, the University maintains its own facilities planning and construction department to best perform the functions of maintaining a current inventory of facilities, current and future facility needs, space standards and design guidelines, and development of construction techniques and contracting methods. Under this bill, these functions would fall to the Commissioner. This would remove the function further from the agency administration and agency user groups creating costly communication and purpose-understanding problems.

The facility needs of the University system are unique in character as related to most other typical state agencies. These needs are best understood and treated within the University system structure with overall review at the state level in respect to budget request preparation, alternative analysis through life cycle cost studies, and final recommendation on statewide facility procurement to the Office of the Governor. This relationship now exists between the University and the Governor's Office of Budget and Management.

The University administration requests that the University of Alaska be excluded from the provisions of this legislation on the basis that no additional nor improved services or benefits are to be received by being included. Also, it is suggested that the cost of the Commissioner and the department being involved at the levels required by the legislation be carefully analyzed and compared with costs currently experienced by the University.





Approving certain recommendations of the Salary Commission.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

WHEREAS Chapter 263, Session Laws of Alaska 1976 established the Alaska Salary Commission; and

WHEREAS the Salary Commission was granted the responsibility of conducting an on-going review of compensation and retirement benefits for members of the legislature, the governor and lieutenant governor, commissioners, deputy commissioners and directors of executive departments, members of the Alaska Public Utilities Commission, the Alaska Pipeline Commission, the Alaska Transportation Commission, and the Alaska Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission, and members of the judiciary; and

WHEREAS the recommendations of the Salary Commission as to compensation become effective, retroactive to January 1, 1977, only if approved by concurrent resolution of the legislature before the end of the first session of the legislature; and

WHEREAS the Salary Commission has submitted its recommendations to the legislature regarding the compensation of the officers covered under ch. 263 SLA 1976 and the legislature has considered them; and

WHEREAS Recommendation Number (1)(A) of the Salary Commission proposes to set the annual salary of the governor of Alaska at \$52,992; and

WHEREAS Recommendation Number (2)(A) of the Salary Commission proposes to set the annual salary of the lieutenant governor of Alaska at \$47,304; and

WHEREAS Recommendation Number (3)(A) of the Salary Commis-

tion proposes to set the annual salary of commissioners of principal executive departments at \$47,304; and

WHEREAS Recommendation Number (5)(A) proposes that there be no change in the salary level of directors and the Salary Commission also recommends that the administrative rules be changed so that the salary entry level of new directors be in the "A" step of the salary range at which they are hired; the commission recognized that promotions from deputy director to director of a division may sometimes necessitate that those receiving a promotion move into a step other than "A" in order to be assured a salary increase; in such cases, that person receiving the promotion should enter at the lowest step necessary to receive a salary increase; the commission also recognized that some directors are now covered by a negotiated agreement and the commission's recommendations will not apply to them until that agreement expires; and

WHEREAS Recommendation Number (5)(B) proposes that the salary progression for directors follow the steps outlined in the state salary schedule as outlined in AS 39.27.011; and

WHEREAS Recommendation Number (10)(A) of the Salary Commission proposes to confirm the annual salary of supreme court judges at \$52,992; and

WHEREAS Recommendation Number (11)(A) of the Salary Commission proposes to confirm the annual salary of the superior court judges at \$48,576; and

WHEREAS Recommendation Number (12)(A) of the Salary Commission proposes to confirm the annual salary of district court judges at \$41,068; and

WHEREAS Recommendation Number (13)(A) proposes that state legislators be paid an annual salary of \$11,750; and

WHEREAS Recommendation Number (13)(B) proposes that the president of the senate and the speaker of the house each receive an additional \$500 per year payable on the opening day of each regular session of the legislature or upon confirmation by the House or Senate after the opening of a regular session

of the legislature; and

WHEREAS Recommendation Number (13)(D) proposes that legislators receive an annual allowance of \$4,000; and

INFORMATION CONCERNING SB 534

SB 534 would remove the regulatory commissioners from the jurisdiction of the Alaska Salary Commission and place them in the exempt service under an established State pay schedule. Salaries in this category are ineligible for merit or longevity increases but may be modified to reflect changes in the cost of living.

The Bill sets the pay level at Range 27, Step C, which is \$48,468 annually. This pay grade is between the salaries of the District and the Superior Court Judges. In the past it has been legislative policy to key salaries of members of quasi-judicial regulatory agencies to those of the judiciary. Decisions appealed from the commissions are heard by the Superior Court not the District Court. At the commissioners' present salary level of \$39,372, it is the first time that the commissioners' pay scale has dipped below that of District Court Judges. (Legislative history amply demonstrates that it was the Legislature's intent to set the salaries of the full-time Commissioners at the Superior Court level.)

The commissioners' present salary plan provides for a longevity pay increase of 3.75 percent for two years of continuous service beginning January 1, 1977. The cost of living went up 7.1 percent in 1977, and a higher percentage increase is anticipated in 1978. A 3.75 percent adjustment does not compensate for the 14+ percent cost of living experienced increase in two years.

By legislative action commissioner salaries were raised to \$41,064 on July 1, 1975. Prior to that increase the salaries were at the District Judge level of \$33,500. The salary level stayed at the \$41,064 level for a year and a half or until December 1976, when they were reduced to the June 1975 level of \$33,500 under the referendum on legislative pay increases. The Salary Commission's recommendation raised the levels up to \$39,300 in June of 1977, which is notably less than the salary level of the highest paid employees of the commissions, who are currently making in excess of \$50,000 annually. While SB 534 does not correct that inequity, it does alleviate the situation somewhat and at least allows the commissioners to keep up with inflation through cost of living adjustments.

SUBJECT: Senate Bill No. 538

This bill would make the new jobs tax credit provisions of the Internal Revenue Code effective for Alaska for any tax year beginning after December 31, 1976.

There will be no additional costs of administration resulting from the passage of this bill.

The bill would cause a reduction in the revenue received from the corporate and individual income taxes; however, there is no way to determine what this actual effect may be. This credit provision was designed to encourage employment of additional personnel and thus enlarge the job market. While it is obvious that some taxpayers will qualify for credit within the state, the number is indeterminate and thus the specific revenue loss from the credit so taken is also indeterminate. Based on the limited information available, it is anticipated that the revenue loss should not exceed \$50,000 per year for calendar years 1977 and 1978.
