III. ANALYSIS (See Fiscal Note Preparation Instructions, Section III)

This is an amendment to an existing grant program. It increases the amount from \$250 to \$500 per library and makes it a direct rather than reimbursable grant. It also allows local municipalities to qualify for the public libraries. Fiscal Impact would come from three areas:

1. Doubling amount presently granted associations
 32 associations times \$250 each increase = \$8,000
2. Municipalities now providing library service that would be made eligible
 15 municipalites time \$500 each 7,500
3. Communities incorporated or not, in which some limited library activity is taking place and which might be expected to organize in order to obtain a grant of \$500. There are 40 such communities and approximately on-half might so organize.





The road to Bear Valley would be of little use without the rail shuttle portion of the proposal.

Project scope is as follows:

The new roadway construction for this project would begin on the Portage Glacier Road approximately 1700 feet east of the Portage Glacier Observatory. The alignment curves to the east away from the observatory area to cross Portage Creek approximately 200 feet downstream from the Portage Lake outlet. From this point the alignment curves around the base of the mountain at the northwest end of the lake and crosses Placer Creek with a structure about 400-feet north of the inlet into Portage Lake. The roadway alignment then parallels the mainline tracks of the Alaska Railroad and would terminate at a parking lot 1300 feet west of tunnel door number two.

Construction of the new roadway should be to State Standards for Secondary Highways using six inches of select material, six inches of crushed aggregate base course and three inches of hot bituminous pavement. There would be two driving lanes 12-foot wide with two-foot shoulders and 4:1 side slopes. The first 2000 feet of construction would consist of building a new fill eight to ten feet high to raise the elevation of the proposed roadway to the level of the existing roadway at the beginning of the project. After crossing Portage Creek 3250 feet of rock excavation will be necessary to construct the road into Bear Valley. From this point, an additional 2400 feet of fill, 10 to 12 feet high, will be necessary for constructing the roadway to its termination point at the proposed parking lot.

Two bridges would be required on this project. The first one would be approximately 280 feet long across Portage Creek while the second one crossing Placer Creek would be about 160 feet.

REQUEST FOR STATE FUNDS TO COVER EXPENSES INCURRED DURING OPERATION OF STATE CONTRACTS

Kawerak, Inc. is asking the State of Alaska to cover the expenses incurred during fiscal year 1976-76 resulting from the operation of State Contracts. These losses are primarily due to the operation of Education and CETA Contracts. The recovery of \$189,940 is justified on several grounds. These are covered in the attached letter to Representative Al Nakak asking for funding.

Further clarification is necessary to clarify the losses. The biggest contributor to Kawerak's losses was the Boarding Home Program. In 1976 alone Kawerak lost \$224,176.78 on that program. This is the difference between computed actual cost of \$641,945.84 (Schedule A of attached Analysis of Bankruptcy position) and the amount reimbursed by the State of \$417,769.06. The losses were due to two factors; first, was administrative expenses. The amount allowed for administrative expenses on the 1976 contract was \$13,340. Our actual administrative expenses were \$102,067 (Schedule D). A comparison of the 1977 Budget approved for the Nome Public School (NPS) operation and the 1976 approved Kawerak Budget shows that the 1977 NPS budget includes approximately that amount as line item expenditures in addition to a 5% indirect fee. Many of these items are not included in the 1976 Kawerak Budget as line items. The allowed indirect rates for Kawerak was 2.9%.

While schools may be able to operate at 5% indirect rates because of the way they are funded, non-profits cannot. The cost of non-profit operation is generally 25-30%. Based upon reconstructed records, Kawerak's cost of operation was approximately 28% on all contracts.

Second, the high cost of dormitory operations contributed significantly to the cost of the program. The difference between the 1976 and 1977 actual cost of operation can largely be attributed to the Dormitory Program. That program was dropped in 1977 as unworkable. One example of over-expenditure is utilities which went as high as \$30,000 a quarter. One of our creditors is the Nome Public Schools which paid approximately \$32,000 on our utility bills for the last quarter of 1976.

The cost comparison for 1976 and 1977 reads thusly:

If we delete the cost of dormitory operations (it costs as much as \$70,000 per student per year at Mt. Edgecumbe), our cost per student compares very favorably to those under which the Nome Public School operated.

The total assignable losses that can be attributable to State contracts is \$189,940 (Schedule F) and is spread over the Boarding Home Program, CETA programs and Receiving Home. An examination shows that only 48% of the debt is assignable to the Boarding Home Program. What this means is that we kept the Boarding Home and Dormitory Projects operating at the expense of other State-funded programs such as CETA.

Kawerak felt it was most important to keep the kids in school. Note that none of the claims against Kawerak were from individuals housing students.

Kawerak has re-established itself and is again serving the people of the Bering Straits Region. We have continued to grow in spite of the past problems.

The State has an obligation to meet the expenses of the programs mandated by State Law. We feel we have done our share; now, it is up to the State.

Because of Kawerak's problems, some positive events have happened which were initiated by Phil Smith, Barry Jackson, and me to resolve the funding problems of non-profits. Once we are out of court, I feel that we can be an example that you can proudly point out as indicative of the capabilities of the Alaska Native people.

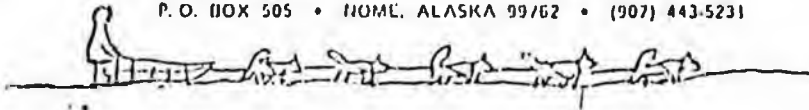

Dear Al:

I appreciate the time you have taken to stop in my office to offer your assistance to help Kawerak solve its old financial problems. As I have indicated to you and to our congressional delegation, our rebuilding efforts have been primarily focused on re-establishing our credibility with people like you, the state and federal agencies, and most importantly, our people. This I feel we have largely accomplished by demonstrating that Kawerak can effectively manage its programs and finances and can deliver the services that are mandated by the Articles of Incorporation.

In our rebuilding process we have been able to convince our congressional delegation and key U.S. Senate and congressional committees that the U.S. government shares with us the responsibility to solve our old debts. We must now receive some kind of commitment from the state to help us out and your support is vital to this effort.

We have reconstructed the records of the time that Kawerak was incurring its debts and have developed preliminary figures to assign the debts to various state and federal programs. Our figures are primarily based on fiscal year 1976 which runs from July 1, 1975 to June 30, 1976.

During this time Kawerak direct program expenditures were \$1,225,311, of which \$634,177 or 51% was state programs. To date the claims against Kawerak for this period total \$329,933 of which \$211,028 or 65% can be
