REPORT ON JUNEAU CORRECTIONAL CENTER

As the maximum security institution for the State of Alaska, practically everything is wrong. Not enough space is one of the greatest problems. But the use of the space seems rather inadequate - especially if SERCI is really a maximum security facility. The idea of so much space (however small - but comparatively speaking "so much") used for dormitory housing for persons whose crimes are violent, heinous, and often repetitive, seemingly would discourage the placement of several persons of such natures in a dormitory. It seems that more individual housing for some persons would eliminate to an extent the extortion and sexual abuse.

SERCI has one medium-sized classroom, and two other spaces - one a large closet size - the other about a double closet size - in which to offer educational classes for the inmates. The educational program is geared towards an Associate Degree in Business Administration. In view of the employment in Juneau resting rather securely on government functions and office procedures, the program seems appropriate. However, with one classroom no great number of courses can be offered, and many students are forced to sit out a semester until a required course can find the space in which to be held. It seems that one large classroom - approximately twice the size of the existing dining room would have a tremendous effect on the educational program as well as the various cultural activities and religious functions. It would be supposed that the space could be separated by movable walls so that several classes or groups could have privacy when such was needed. Yet the large space would accommodate large audience activities; lectures, movies, etc.. In some part, a learning lab could be set up, either with or without carrels. In this arrangement, correspondence courses could easily be part of the educational program. This would not mean the loss of the personal teacher contact, but in fact, would allow the teacher to work with each student in his area of study or difficulty instead of the usual delivery of materials to a large group in which a few grasp the concepts presented, the majority have a somewhat idea, and several students are completely lost. With the carrel (or individual study) program, materials may still be presented to the group as a whole, if feasible, then individuals with their variety of difficulties are dealt with individually and those whose grasp of the material come easily could go ahead into other areas of study.

Perhaps sooner or later computer or satellite programs could be incorporated. Already such programs are being used in correctional institutions. The Northwest Regional Group, who were here in Juneau for a while seem to be very knowledgeable in the technical areas of such a program.

At the present time, there is quite a hassle about moving the definitely over-used, broken, and splintery chairs and tables back and forth from the dining hall to the one-and-only classroom. The officers complain that moving furniture is not part of their job. The students are usually ushered imperiously from the classroom to their dorms with less than the time allotted for any 3-credit hour college course, so that even if they were allowed to move their furniture, it would mean another few minutes cut back on a class that is already 15 to 20 minutes per day short of a regular class period. Several of the instructors must run their classes a few weeks longer to cover the time deficit.

Which points up another problem besides the room-to-room changeover to find space. The chairs and tables are not in good condition by any stretch of the imagination -but if new chairs and tables were placed in the classroom alone, a great improvement would be realized. At present the officers who work under the supervision of Richard Collum have a running verbal - chair jerking game daily with - especially me. The teacher, Wally Olson, and I try to set up his class before the men come in, but usually this happens because lunch time is running overly long - the officers are still eating - and class is beginning a half-hour late. I have talked to Frank Sauser, my superior Officer, and he is sympathetic. Yet the men continue to run a tightrope that cannot help but hurt their grades, their responses, and their morale. In an institution the instructor teaches not only subject matter, but socially acceptable behavior; coping with the unexpected situation; looking over alternatives. But when the entire program and persons involved are treated as so much garbage, the effects of the program - its offerings must lose much of its credibility. Should an officer open the classroom door 15 to 20 minutes before the class has ended while the instructor is still speaking - before the "promised" warning bell is rung?

All of the officers are not ogres. Some are great - some even take time to sit down and talk to an inmate about his problems. There are too few officers to expect all of them to do this, but some of them do. There are some who offend not only the inmates with their ignorance and macho tactics, but their language in my presence has been far more threatening than any I have heard from any of the inmates. Such as, "I'd like to take him by the neck and squeeze until his eyes popped out". And more - and more. "If he tells me the ring won't come off, I'll cut off the God-damned finger."

Our officers have a hard and thankless job. Generally they are on the go most of the hours of duty. Not just time-to-time, but during certain periods of time they become involved in physical combat with an uncooperative or "flipped-out" or just rebellious offender. I have witnessed a couple of these altercations. However, my witnessing was accidental.

It seems that the men have these situations when I am not in the facility. It seems the officers, in general, are of the "put them in the dungeon" philosophy and have not only no respect for programs, but a genuine hatred and distrust of them. It seems - to me - and no doubt many other citizens, who support the inmate population that we have a right to expect our monies to provide something other than nourishment, rest, and "plotting" time for the offenders. Should our money be spent to turn out healthier, more resentful, less adjustable, more alienated, more successful criminals? Under this system, not only does the public suffer the consequences of their "polished up" crime techniques, but we keep the good old prison going - paying the inmates way - and the officers way. (Maybe the officers want to perpetuate their employment. That is a sick thought.)

Do the officers, all of them, receive classes in psychology along with their pistol and head-slammng techniques? They have witnessed many incidents yet it seems that with intelligence and understanding the person as a human being can be more than any one single act - behavior - or idiocy or passion or some other expression for moment of crime.

Why are there no Alaska Natives and no blacks working at SERCI? It is distressful to have the Native inmates appear before an all-white committee and try to explain anything. Until they have been in prison for some time the word "waive" is completely out of context. In most instances, they are reluctant to admit that they do not know what we are talking about. The blacks fare somewhat better than the Alaskan Natives - but as one white, I would feel a little dismayed and uncertain if I faced an all black committee that picked at my story and used a vocabulary that meant nothing to me.

And how can a counselor employed by the institution keep loyalty to both his employer and his clients. Nothing seems to come easy, but things could be much better.

YOUTH RESIDENTIAL CENTER

SB 623

The Nome Eskimo Community, with planning assistance from Social Service agencies in Nome, is planning a facility to provide long-term residential care for teenagers, ages 12 through 17. The Center will provide positive reinforcement care for 26 teenagers who have behavioral/emotional problems and juveniles who are ordered by the Court System to be detained for non-violent crimes.

There is not such a home anywhere in Northwest Alaska. In Nome there is the Nome Receiving Home to care for 5 children ages 0 to 18 for no more than 90 days. There are a few foster homes available in Nome, however, of these there are none available for teenagers with behavioral problems. These teenagers are sent either to Anchorage or outside of Alaska. Juvenile delinquents often end up in Nome's jail pending court action; if they are ordered to be detained, they are sent, of necessity, outside this geographical area.

The Center will be open to teenagers from Northwest Alaska, who have been referred by the Department of Health & Social Services, Division of Corrections, and Division of Social Services; and the Alaska Court System.

Projected use by the Division of Social Services from the Kotzebue and Nome areas is an average of 10 spaces filled at all times. Projections from the Division of Corrections, from the same area, is an average of 15 spaces. The Alaska Court System anticipates 5.

The facility will be staffed by a professional director, 2 full-time professional child psychologists, 3 sets of experienced house parents to alternate time off, 2 sets of parents present at all times. 1 full time cook and 1 part time cook. The resident teenagers will be assigned chores for housekeeping and as cook assistants. The staff will meet State of Alaska, Department of Health & Social Services, licensing requirements.

The professional staff will review each child's record and plan therapeutic activities designed to help the child adjust. The residents will continue their education at Nome Beltz High School, supervised to and from school by the house parents.

It is expected that after the first year's operation, the cost of operating the Youth Center will be met by payments for the care of children by the Division of Social Services, the Division of Corrections. It is the intention of the Youth Center, to negotiate a rate with the Division of Social Services for the actual cost of care. Information provided by the first year's operation will be used to determine this actual cost.

The facility will have two wings off a central area. One wing for 13 girls, the other for 13 boys. Each wing will have 2 bedrooms for 4 children, 2 bedrooms for 2 children, 1 bedroom for 1 child, and bathroom facilities. Each wing will also have an apartment (without kitchen) for house parents. The central area will contain the utility room, kitchen, dining room, T.V. and living room, study/library room, recreation room, 2 counseling rooms, and the main office. Total space for the facility will be approximately 9,000 square feet.

Other local services available to the Youth Center, include: Norton Sound Regional Hospital; Norton Sound Health Corporation, Division of Family Services; State of Alaska, Division of Social Services and Division of Corrections; and Nome Community Center.

Vista Volunteers of America are being contacted, asking them to provide three or four dedicated young people, trained in child care and development, to provide the center with this additional child care.
