

3 fisherman doing business in the state.

HOUSE BILL 90 OVERVIEW

The purpose of the National Forest Receipts Program is to assist qualifying boroughs and unified municipalities with the support of public schools and public roads. In recognition of the costliness of education and road maintenance, this program was designed to recover losses in tax revenue from Forest Service land found within municipal boundaries by offering payment in lieu of taxes.

Each year the U. S. Forest Service makes a payment to the State of Alaska equal to 25% of the Federal receipts from the sale of timber and other land uses on National Forest lands in the Tongass and Chugach National Forests. For the period 10/1/77 through 9/30/78, the State received the following revenues.

Tongass National Forest	\$2,970,500
Chugach National Forest	\$ 139,820

AS 41.15.180 requires the State to pay boroughs and unified government with Forest Services lands within their boundaries, a share of the income derived from that forest. Each borough's share of income is proportional to the area of the National Forest located within its boundaries. The boroughs must expend these funds for public schools and roads.

The attachment indicates the distribution of funds for the fiscal year 1979 program. The \$29,700 requested in House Bill 90 represents federal

funds which are passed through the General Fund. Approval will not result in expenditure of additional State funds.



In accordance with your memorandum of July 27, 1978, this is to advise that the Department of Law has entered into a stipulation with Alaska Legal Services to pay court costs and attorney fees in the amount of \$24,000. The stipulation arises from our defense of Angaiak v. Beirne, C.A. No. 78-8726 H. Legal Services, as the prevailing party in this action, is entitled to costs and fees and they had originally sought \$37,000 for this purpose.

The Legal Services BRU has a FY 79 authorization of \$15,000 to pay for incidental judgments, including costs and fees. This authorization is intended to pay for several smaller judgments which usually average between a few hundred and a few thousand dollars. In order to avoid exhausting the limited judgment authorization available in FY 79, and thereby certainly causing the displeasure of many individuals having smaller claims throughout the year, we request that the entire Legal Services stipulation be paid by a supplemental appropriation. Alaska Legal Services has agreed to such an arrangement as noted in the stipulation which is attached for your review.

The purpose of this memo is to explain the attached stipulation in which the Department of Law agreed to pay to Alaska Legal Services the total sum of \$24,000.00 to cover costs, attorneys' fees, and the costs of distribution of notice to the class in the case of Angaiak v. Beirne, No. 76-8726 H.

The Angaiak case was a case brought by Legal Services on behalf of people in bush areas. The issue in the case was whether the Department of Health & Social Services had complied with the federal Food Stamp Program requirement that a state provide reasonable and convenient access to the program and inform people of the availability of the program. The court ruled that the Department of Health & Social Services had failed to completely comply with these requirements. The court then scheduled a trial to be held in various bush areas to determine the relief to be accorded plaintiffs. Prior to holding the bush hearings, however, we were able to enter into an agreement of settlement with Alaska Legal Services which disposed of the case.

After approval of the settlement agreement by the court, Legal Services submitted a bill for costs and attorneys' fees in the amount of approximately \$37,000.00. (Legal Services was entitled to costs and attorneys' fees because they were the prevailing party.)

Rather than pursuing through the courts our efforts to whittle down the costs and attorneys' fees bill, we entered into a stipulation with Legal Services that we would pay a total of \$24,000.00. This figure is to cover costs and attorneys' fees as well as the cost of notifying the class, as provided for in the settlement agreement. Notice to the class is expected to cost approximately \$2,000.00, so essentially we agreed to pay Legal Services \$22,000.00 in costs and attorneys' fees as opposed to the approximately \$37,000.00 which they sought.

You will note that the attached stipulation provides that we will pay the \$24,000.00 out of a supplemental appropriation which we agreed to submit to the Legislature next session. We also agreed to exercise our best efforts to see that the supplemental is passed.



The signatory authority stays the same as stated in the original contract. Workman's Comp should be revised to .41 for Librarian Trainee/ City Clerk Asst. and T.V. Technician. Workman's Comp. for a policeman should be 5.65. Annual and Sick Leave should stay the same as well as Holiday Leave as stated in the contract.

Allow me at this time to explain the Cities position in asking for a Policeman. The City did have a policeman in 1977, he quit in May of 1978, enclosed is a copy of his resignation.. The job entitled the man to be on 24 hour call with a monthly payroll of \$450.00 , if the City could get a CETA VI policeman the City will send him to training in Sitka and will add monies to his CETA payroll to allow for better wages. If we can keep the policeman on the job for 1 year with CETA VI funds, (Pending actions by Congress) we will be eligible for State of Alaska revenues and shall be able to fund the position ourselves. The City is planning on building a City Hall which would house office space for a policeman and a small jail facility. A CETA VI funded policeman would therefore enhance our possibilities of receiving Revenue Sharing, police protection and needed facilities for at the present time there is no way the City could fund a policeman, with the added burden of the City Clerk salary falling totally on City revenues.





CITY COUNCIL MEETING

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Jim Pierson at 7:00 P.M. Present were Jim Demientieff, Jim Pierson, Bob Magnuson, Dick Forsgren, Rose Winkelman. Ann Egrass and Daniel Smith arrived at 7:05 P.M.

Minutes from the June 20th meeting were read and copies of minutes from 2 special meetings were passed out among council members and members of the community to read. Bob Magnuson moved to approve all minutes, Dick Forsgren seconded the motion. Motion carried. The financial statement for the month of June was passed out among council members to be read. It was noted that June was the end of the 1977-78 fiscal year. Dick Forsgren moved to accept the financial statement as read. Ann Egrass seconded the motion. Motion carried. The City Clerk was directed to find out if an ordinance was needed to cover overdrawn budget categories for the 77-78 fiscal year. Council members requested that the City Clerk have copies of minutes for the council members to read, also the financial statement. Members felt that more would be obtained by this method.

REFERENDUM PETITION ON VEHICLE CONTROL ORDINANCE #77-7 - Jim Pierson said that the ordinance could be passed at this time. The referendum petition could then be lodged. Ordinance #77-7 would then have to go for a vote before the people on the regular election ballot in October. This would save the cost of a special election, all it would cost would be the printing on the ballot. The original purpose of the ordinance was discussed. Bob Magnuson suggested that instead of the ordinance the City should make it illegal to operate heavy equipment on roads without a permit from the City and that the terms of the permit could say that roads would have to be inspected by an appointed person to be sure that they were left in original condition. Bob Magnuson suggested that the City drop the ordinance and do more research on how to effectively keep the roads from being torn up by heavy equipment. Weight restriction on vehicles was discussed. Posting of a bond for any heavy type of construction work was suggested. The cost of the construction job would determine the amount of the bond. Dick Forsgren made the motion to contact the City's lawyers and have them research the problem and Jim Pierson wanted the lawyers to find a way to have bond posted for use of roads by heavy equipment during construction jobs, etc. Jim Demientieff seconded the motion. Motion passed.

AUDIT - City Clerk read a letter from Tom Armour that stated Mr. Armour would do the City's audit. Cost will be anywhere from

\$350.00 to \$600.00, depending on the amount of work involved.

SELLING OF LANDFILL DIRT FROM DUMP SITE - Jim Pierson spoke with Daniel Smith and Larry Wiggins and was advised by Mr. Wiggins that the City should not sell the dirt because the City did not have title to the land. He explained that if or when the City does receive title, the sub surface rights may be retained. The money collected from the sale of the dirt would then have to be held in escrow until all of the rights were decided upon. If Doyon retains sub surface rights, the money held in escrow would have to be turned over to Doyon. Jim Pierson said that the City could not sanction hauling of dirt from the dump. Discussion followed on sources of fill dirt, prices, etc. Larry Wiggins said that charging for dirt from the dump would be more of a problem than anything else. Bob Magnuson said he thought it would be a benefit to the City to allow the dirt to be moved. It was noted that Mr. Anderson was charging the City for the City's own gravel. Daniel Smith noted that Mr. Anderson was using his equipment to dig the gravel and this would account for the charge.

CRANBERRY RIDGE ROAD - Mr. Haneline and Mr. Moyer of Local Service-Roads and Trails came out on June 27, 1978 to check the proposed route. Aerial photos were taken of the area at that time. The City Clerk spoke to Mr. Haneline on July 7, 1978. Mr. Haneline said that they had done quite a bit of research, the photos they had taken were in the process of being developed and aerial maps had been sent for. Mr. Haneline requested a copy of a map the City has with the alternate route of the road marked on it. City Clerk sent a copy. Mr. Haneline said he would not be able to discuss the project further until all information was received.

7.5 ACRE SURVEY - Mayor Jim Pierson that lots were surveyed, cemetery was surveyed, road was surveyed. Daniel Smith said he was trying to contact Mr. Sorenson of B.L.M. about help on the access road to 7.6 acres. A question was asked as to whether the property was residential or commercial.

CITY POLICEMAN - One person has applied. Was noted that the policemen's salary was paid for out of revenue sharing moneys. the request for a constable could not be met at this time because of limited manpower. Dick Forsgren inquired about sharing a policeman with the Native Village Council. CETA wage and \$450.00 revenue sharing money would make a reasonable salary. City Clerk told the Council that a freeze had been placed on the hiring of any more CETA VI personnel until October.

DIVISION OF PLANNING - CENTRAL REGION - MOREY WILSON - City Clerk contacted Morey Wilson and he wants to set up a meeting with the City on September 6 to discuss resurfacing and repairing of existing roads, which roads have priority, etc. The September 6 date was agreed upon by the Council members.

RESIGNATION OF CITY CLERK - City Clerk turned in resignation effective July 31st. Reason for resigning was stated as being too much work for one person to handle. Ways of reducing workload were discussed. City Clerk was directed to write modification for Librarians job description. Discussion followed on the duties of the City Clerk. It was decided that an assistant would have to be hired and paid for out of City funds. One applicant was reviewed. Dick Forsgren suggested using CETA summer workers part time each day to help out. Jim Pierson made the motion to hire a full time assistant at \$6.41 per hour, 6 hours a day and to pay salary from City funds. Rose Winkelman seconded the motion. Motion passed.

A letter from T.C.C. was read by Jim Pierson regarding water and sewer system possibly being installed in the new subdivision sometime in the future. A letter from Alaska Federation of Natives was read.

The sharing of a City Manager with the Native Village Council was again discussed.

Bob Magnuson asked how much money was owed to Mr. Anderson for dumping fill dirt and grading roads. City Clerk said that \$2,000.00 had been paid and \$800.00 remained to be paid. City Clerk was directed to not pay the balance until the job had been completed.

The visit from Morris LeFever and Susan Todd of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service was briefly discussed. (See special minutes)

A citizen of the town was concerned with the well and septic tanks being set up for the new M.T.N.T. housing. Jim Pierson assured everyone that all state and federal regulations were being met.

Dick Forsgren moved that the meeting be adjourned. Jim Pierson seconded the motion. Motion passed. Meeting adjourned at 8:50 P.M.






Our City is in dire need of Police services. Recently there has been two rapes, an assault and battery and a number of misdemeanors. The City does have Ordinances on vehicle safety, curfew and control of dogs, by which fines are set by the Council.

We are one of the towns served by the Alaska State Troopers out of Bethel, Jim Williams of the Troopers has addressed the Council with respect to finding funds for a local police officer. The cost of transporting a Trooper to McGrath is very enormous. Williams has stated that out of 50 Villages served by his office in Bethel, McGrath is one of the only towns in which no local services are provided.

The State Department of Public Safety has a Village Police program available which allows Communities police training if they meet the 70% Native population base. McGrath has an estimated Native population of 50%.

This is a formal request that you personally waiver the Village Police Training Program to allow these service to our Community.

At Christopher Cooke's suggestion, we are writing you concerning the lack of a magistrate for McGrath. As you are aware, and as Justice Cooke has pointed out, servicing McGrath from Bethel is illogical in that there are no regular transportation links between the two communities. There are two solutions for this problem. A magistrate could be appointed in McGrath to serve the upper Kuskokwim Valley, or the upper Kuskokwim Valley could be placed under the administration of another district which is linked to our area by established transportation patterns.

Needless to say, we would like a magistrate appointed in McGrath. However, our main concern is the betterment of Court services to our region. To meet this end, we will assist you in any way possible. If there are any actions we can take as a municipality in this regards, please inform us of the actions we should take, and to whom those actions should be addressed.
